giene school in Amarillo College

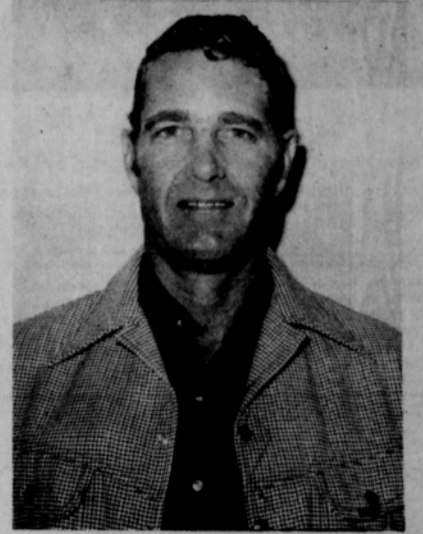
"I grew up in the hardware and implement business in addition to our farming operations. I operated a wholesale petroleum station for three years.

Commemorative Coins On Sale

The second commemorative coin series of Hansford County are now on sale according to Mary Lou Wysong, manager of the Chamber of Commerce.

There will be a limited edition of the 1975 serial numbered medals which are certain to grow in prestige and value thru the years. Only 75-24 karat gold on .999 fine silver, 15 .999 fine silver, 500 antique silver and 300 antiqued bronze medals have been struck. The first individual gold coin will be numbered 51; the first individual silver coin will be numbered 101; the first individual antiqued silver

and antiqued bronze will be numbered 251. The present owners of the first (1974) issue, serial numbered coins, have exclusive right and owner ship of all future issues if they so desired. All other orders will be filled on a first come, first served basis.

The gold coins sell for \$50.00; silver, \$25.00; antique silver numbered \$5.00; antique silver unnumbered \$4.00; bronze numbered \$3.50; bronze unnumbered \$2.50.

The sets of coins include the 4 coin set starting at number 11 for \$100.00, 3 coin set, starting at number 61, \$35.00; 2 coin set, starting number

11, \$10.00. The first 10 of each set will be auctioned off.

Also on sale will be necklaces with unnumbered coin \$10; unnumbered coin, \$11.00; key chains with unnumbered coin, \$5.00, numbered coin, \$6.00; plain necklace, unnumbered coin, \$7.95 and numbered coin \$8.95. Solo ties, in black and brown will sell for \$8.00. All sales are subject to

.5% sales tax.

The coin this year commemorates the Kiowa-Comanche Buffalo Hunt. The art work was done by Mary Alice Gbner, and historical authority was Linda Crawford of Stationmaster's House Museum.

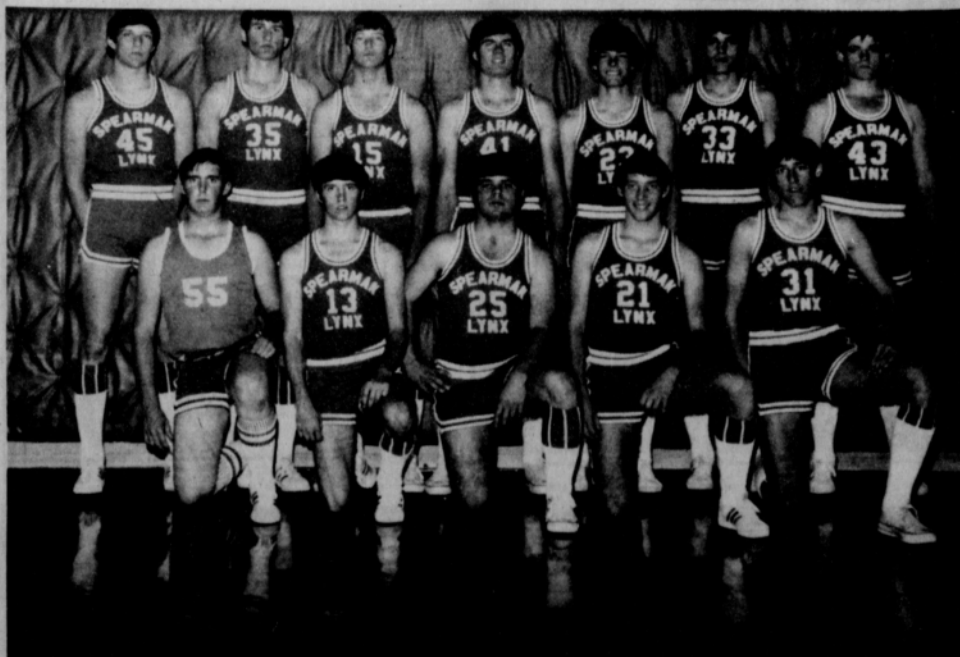

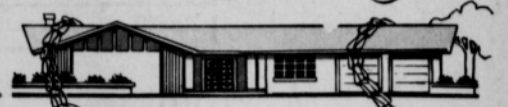

Drug Treatment Center Permit Issued

The Texas Health Facilities Commission ruled on January 15, 1976 that The Treatment Centers of America is entitled to an Exemption Certificate to construct and operate a 21-bed alcohol and drug addiction clinic in Amarillo, Texas.

Official notification was received by Fred Ready, Robert L. Dutton, C. O. Blagg, Amarillo, residents and others on February 9.

The licensing application process was initiated in February of 1975.

The addiction clinic will be private, no tax monies will be involved. The facility expects to be fully accredited as a hospital limited to treatment of addicts.

The site of the facility has not yet been determined. The plans call for a 21-bed facility with a detoxification unit, similar to the intensive care section of a regular hospital with four beds. There will be an additional 15 private rooms and a double room. Fred Ready, head of the group, is a former alcoholism counselor and director for the Amarillo Hospital District, and former director of the AHD division of mental health. He said the hospital will be "strictly private, not a public or indigent program."

Draft Board Offices To Close

AUSTIN--On February 27th all draft board offices in Texas will be closed, Colonel Melvin N. Glantz, State Director for Selective Service announced today.

This action which will take place in all states terminates the operational capability of Selective Service for the first time in 28 years. All registered processing including the obligation of men to register has been halted. "Draft records are being transferred to the Fort Worth Federal Records Center", Glantz said.

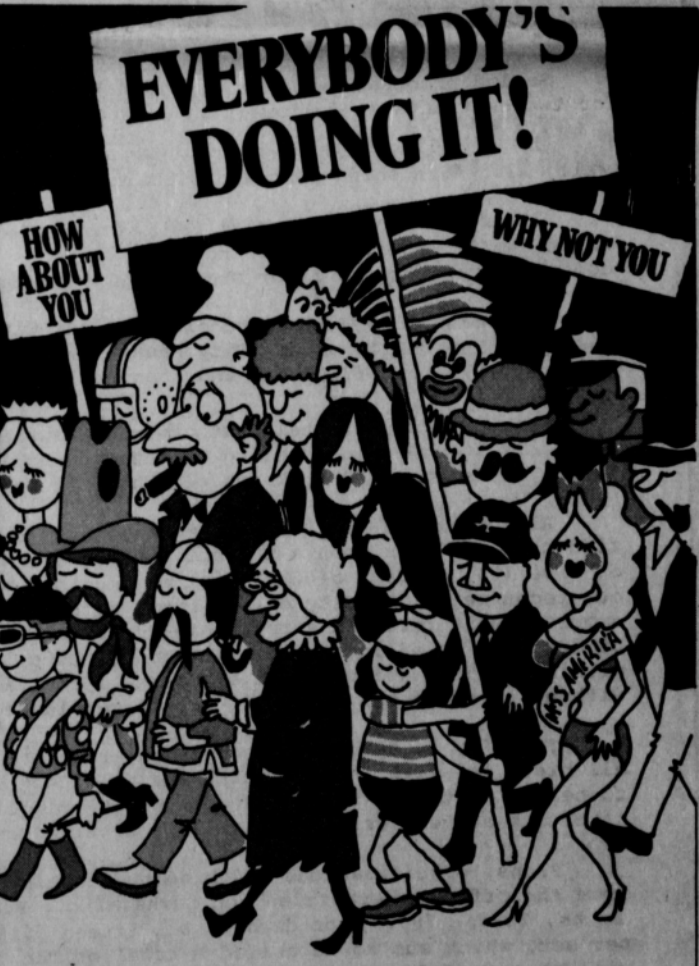
The National plans call for Selective Service to be reduced to a minimum deep stand-by posture. The phase down which is expected to be completed in the next 12 months will leave only a small National Headquarters, and five Regional offices located at San Francisco, San Antonio, Chicago, Atlanta and Baltimore. The function of these offices will be to develop plans for restoring the System in event of a National emergency and to continue the training of a small number of Reserve and National Guard Officers who have mobilization assignments with the Selective Service System. The only stand-by state draft structure which will remain will be the stand-by State Headquarters made up of the Selective Service National Guard Section.

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Governor Reports On Immunization Action

Governor Dolph Briscoe announced today that the final report on Texas Immunization Action Month shows that several thousand Texas children were immunized from preventable diseases as a direct result of volunteers and health officials working together. The October, 1975, statewide immunization action month campaign was co-sponsored by the First Lady's Volunteer Program, Office of the Governor, and the Texas Department of Health Resources.

In announcing the results, Governor Briscoe said, "Many concerned Texans volunteered countless hours to make parents aware of the need to protect their children from crippling diseases. We could have never reached the hundreds of families that are now protected had it not been for dedicated public health employees and private physicians, as well as interested volunteers."

"I am gratified to see that in the 0-1 year age group the immunization level jumped by 30 percent and in the 1 to 4 year group an increase of 23 percent was recorded by public health officials over last year's statistics. Members of the Texas Medical Association and the Texas Osteopathic Medical Association also reported an average 28 percent increase in the immunization level of their patients. These figures represent the children who are so often disease-damaged because of a lack of vaccinations," Governor Briscoe added.

"We, in Texas, must continue to educate our citizens on the importance of updated immunization records, so that not even one child is struck by a disease that is preventable," Governor Briscoe concluded.

The Texas Immunization Action Month steering committee which planned the month-long health emphasis project was chaired by M. N. Dolph Briscoe. The committee was composed of representatives

\$\$\$ For Local War Veterans

The Veterans Administration has good news for war veterans living in Hansford County. Some 120 of them will receive approximately \$10,000 as their share of a record payout of \$376.8 million being made to various classes of service men and women.

The payment, representing dividends declared under their GI Insurance policies, is being accelerated by the government. Normally, when such dividends become available, they are paid on the anniversary dates of the policies and, as a result, stretch out over a period of 12 months.

This year, however, distribution of most of the money will be completed by the end of this month. About \$233 million of the total will be paid out by that time, according to Richard L. Roubush, Administrator of Veterans Affairs.

The dividend checks will be going only to World War and Korean War veterans. Those who participated in the Vietnam War will not share at present because of the type of insurance they hold.

Most of the recipients have National Service Life Insurance, issued to those who served in World War II. The World War I vets who are eligible carry U. S. Government Life Insurance policies and those who were in the Korean War, Veterans

Special Life Insurance. The 120 residents of Hansford County who will be on the receiving end are those who retained their policies. They constitute about 21 percent of the World War and Korean veterans in the local area. The total, according to the latest VA tabulation, is 570.

Just how much each recipient will get depends upon the size and age of his policy and the kind of insurance he holds. The general average, for those who were in the first World War, is \$184. For the World War II vets the average is \$93 and, for the others, \$18.

The VA insurance officials explain that the dividends represent returns to the policy holders of excess money that is available due to high interest rates earned by the funds and due to savings realized because of a lower-than-expected death rate among veterans.

Some of the recipients will be using their money to buy additional insurance. The rest will be putting the cash to other purposes.

Social Security News

People who had low net earnings from self employment in 1975 may get social security credit if they report their earnings by an optional method, according to Howard L. Weatherly, social security branch manager in Pampa, Texas.

"Instead of reporting their net earnings for the year," Weatherly said, "people can report two-thirds of their gross earnings from self-employment for social security credit - if two-thirds is \$400 or more and not more than \$1,600, provided these amounts are not less than their actual net earnings. "They can get social security credit," he said, "if their net for the year

is under \$400 but their gross is \$600 or more and they report their self-employment earnings by the optional method."

Earnings reports and social security contributions should be sent with income tax returns to the Internal Revenue Service by April 15.

The optional method of reporting may be used only by people who had net self-employment earnings of \$400 or more for at least 2 out of the 3 previous years. Under the law, the option may be used only five times.

"But these rules don't apply to self-employed farmers," Weatherly said.

Eligibility for social security benefits depends on credits earned by people who work in jobs covered by social security. The amount of monthly social security benefits is based on the worker's average earnings over a period of years.

People can call or write any social security office

for more information about the optional method of reporting self-employment earnings. The Pampa social security office is at 1541 North Hobart. The phone number is 689-3381.

Daylight Time set for Feb. 29

The time change this year from standard time to daylight time falls on Feb. 29, which is the last Sunday of the month. Daylight time will remain in effect for eight months to the last Sunday in October.

Disaster Acres Reporting Is Required Soon

Wheat producers whose land has started to blow and who have started control measures are reminded by county ASCS manager Ellzey Vanderburg that reports are necessary to comply with government regulations.

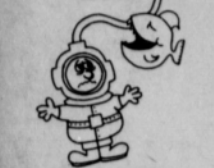
A form must be filed as soon as possible after control measures have been taken and prior to total destruction of the crop evidence.

If the land is chiseled, or other control measures used, the farmer should report the number of acres worked. This requires measuring all the wheat on the farm and a report of total wheat acres planted.

April 1, 1976, is the final date to graze wheat or barley and expect to produce a full grain crop.

Easter Seal Campaign Begins March 1

Last year 10,768 handi-

capped people received help from the Texas Easter Seal Society and its statewide network of treatment centers and local volunteer programs. With the costs of providing expert professional care rising, more money than ever will be needed to assist more disabled Texans and remain ahead of inflation.

Funds help support professional treatment centers in Texas, where services are provided to those crippled children and adults who cannot provide for themselves and who do not qualify for help from any other source.

"The people of Texas have always responded generously to helping the handicapped, and I feel certain they will make it possible to increase

Easter Seal services to crippled Texans throughout the coming year, Barkley said.

The Easter Seal Campaign which provides funds for continuation of these services, continues through April 18, Easter Sunday.

Corn Production Meeting Set

DUMAS -- On-farm storage of high moisture corn is one of four topics on corn production to be discussed in a meeting of farmers, research scientists and agriculture specialists at the Community Center in Dumas Feb. 24.

The afternoon event, which begins at 1:30 p.m., will also include deliberations on water economics of corn production, weed control practices, and a farmer's testimony of how he grows corn.

Speakers are Dr. Frank Petr, area agronomist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Amarillo; Jim Dawty, a Moore County farmer and rancher; Dr. John Shipley, Texas Agricultural Experiment Station research economist, Bushland; and Dr. Allen Wiese, Experiment Station weed researcher also of Bushland.

An added feature of the program will be a report on agriculture in Russia by Dr. Bob Stewart, director of research, USDA Agriculture Research Service. Kenneth L. Hollaway, Moore County Extension agent, will chair the meeting, according to Paul E. Gross, district Extension agent.

"In 1975, well over a million acres of corn were grown on the Texas High Plains," says Gross. Farmers are deliberating about how they can trim heavy production costs this season through such measures as efficient watering, on-farm drying and improved weed control. Information presented in this program on these topics should be of great importance to corn producers.

The Panhandle Economic Program (PEP) of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service is sponsoring the production meeting. PEP is a voluntary organization of citizens interested in the social and economic growth of the upper Texas Panhandle area.

There is no charge and the public is invited.

Battle Against Arthritis Expensive

"Waging war is always expensive, and the battle against arthritis -- America's number one crippling disease -- takes a tremendous economic toll," reports Ralph Bauder, President, West Texas Chapter Board of Directors, The Arthritis Foundation.

How expensive is arthritis? Mr. Bauder said medical care costs of \$3.6 billion, including drugs and hospitalization, are annual expenditures for the one in four families or over 20 million Americans who are victims of arthritis. He also cited \$4.7 billion in lost wages and \$1.3 billion in lost homemaker services annually.

"These and other expenditures related to arthritis add up to nearly a \$13 billion annual impact on the U. S. economy," said Mr. Bauder. "And no price tag can be put on the enormous human suffering, disability, lost potential, and family problems that often accompany the disease.

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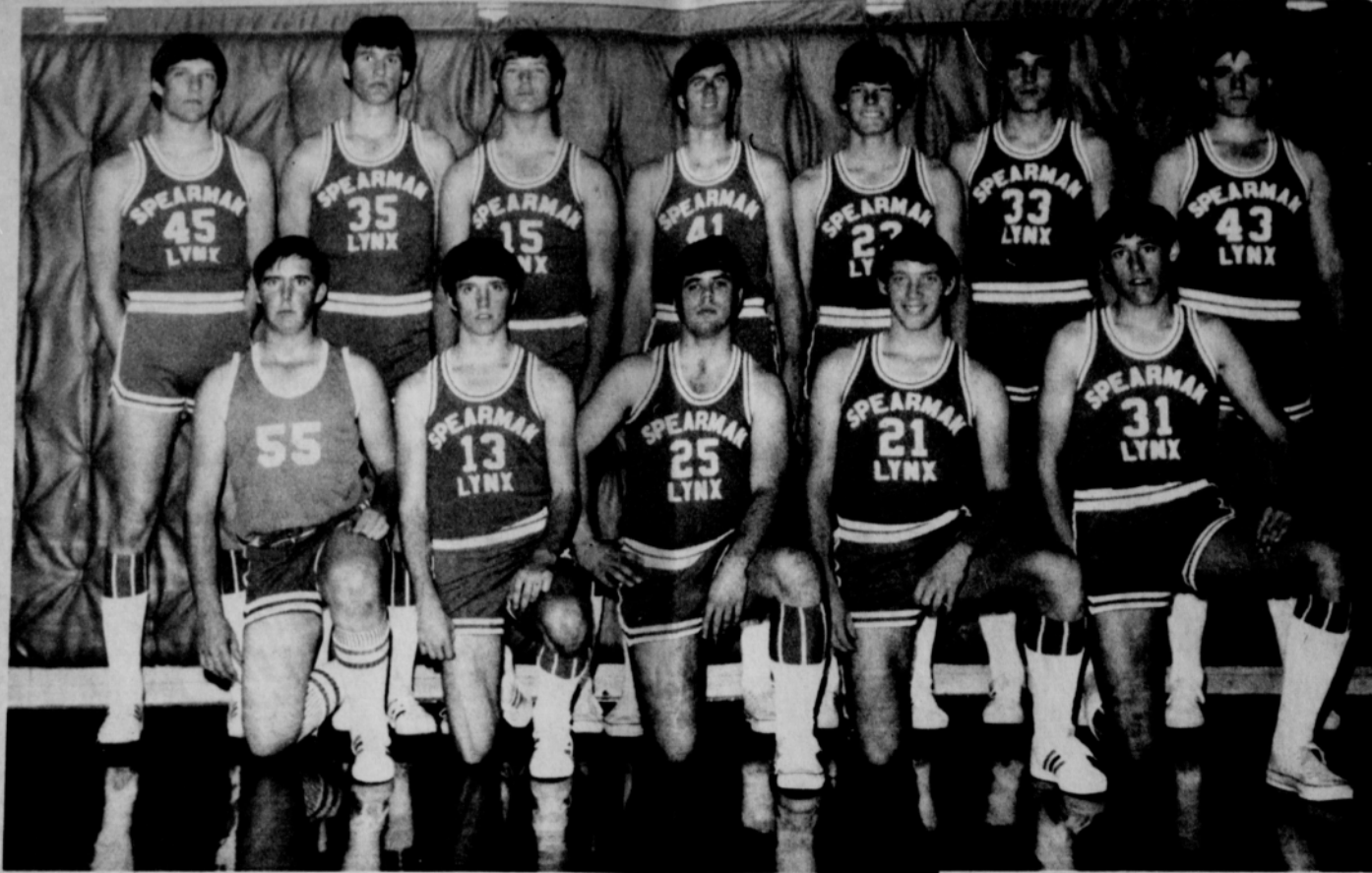
