A good percentage hold permanent certificates, while all have had Normal or College training. Eleven full grades of work will be offered and we expect to have a nine months' term.

It is possible to provide instruction in music and expression for those who desire it at a nominal tuition fee. Those who desire to avail themselves of the services of a competent teacher in either of the above branches should make application by letter at once to the undersigned.

The result was that the game was free of all unpleasantness; no one threatened to kill the umpire, and, by the way, he was a good one. Spearman boys and Perryton boys play ball as the game should be played. It is these hired players that cause the wrangles and disputes and incite the betting and general disorders at the games. It may be the old-fashioned view of it, but the Reporter dearly loves to see a team of our own boys go forth to battle for our town. We would rather see the home boys lose than a hired team win for the town. Spearman has a good team and Perryton has a good team without hiring outsiders, and the money paid these transient players, is thrown away. Ross Hays for Spearman and Whippo for Perryton pitched as good ball as anyone expects to see at these games and far better than many of the hired pitchers have done. Hays struck out seventeen men, and Whippo did almost as well. If the teams have money to pass around among the players why not pass it to the home boys. They deserve it. The score in Sunday's game was 2 to 4 in favor of Spearman. This will likely be the last game of the season. The Spearman team won several more games than they lost during the season and are quitting in good shape.

The buyers paid Max \$63.70 for these two shoats. These are the kind of hogs to raise. ## Perfect for the College Girl



IT IS certain that one-piece dresses for street wear are to rival suits during the coming fall and winter, and they may achieve leadership in the beginning of the season. Quite as certainly every fall wardrobe will contain one or more of these neat, convenient and economical garments. They are of the same character as suits, made of the same materials and adorned with the same trimmings. This makes it easy for the thrifty to convert a last year's suit into a this year's dress. An ingenious seamstress enjoys this remodeling of gowns and will find a variety of styles, ranging from very plain dresses to those that allow touches of bright color and the introduction of clever draperies, which she can follow in her work. It is refreshing to have these changes in everyday clothes and substitutes for suits. Combinations of two materials, as satin and wool in the same color, solve the problem of sufficient material in made-over dresses.

The frock shown here will hardly tax the abilities of the average seamstress. Its skirt is straight-hanging, with rows of silk braid encircling it at intervals of about five inches and machine stitched, on one edge, to place. It is joined to a plain bodice at the

wastline and has a narrow panel set on at the left side over the ends of the braid. Satin covered, round buttons, set on in pairs, make a telling finish for this panel and the skirt may be taken as a criterion as to length.

The bodice has several details that are interesting. It opens at the side and on the shoulder, closing with snap fasteners. The sleeves are a little longer than elbow length and depend upon braid for their adornment, having no cuffs. Braid redeems the lower part of the bodice from uninteresting plainness and a close-set row of small satin-covered buttons extends from the braid to the throat. The collar is very new, being a wide ruche of accordion plated material like the dress, banded by a tie of narrow ribbon finished with a rosette at the left side. A wide girde is made of satin ribbon having a single long loop at the back, but the girde may be of the same material as the dress and finished at the left side, where it fastens with satin-covered buttons. This is a little more practical than a sash end.

## Pin Money Propositions

THERE are women in every community who would like to earn pin money by some means that will not interfere with their home duties. In the larger cities there are "short hour" women employed in the shops, with hours from eleven in the morning until three or four in the afternoon, who find they can manage their household affairs and go to business too. But their homes are usually small and convenient apartments in which housework is reduced to a minimum of effort. The same opportunities do not come to women in the smaller towns and villages or on the farms. In the larger communities also there are opportunities of merchandising in a small way. Some women, familiar with millinery, do a thrifty little business in the spring and fall of the year, buying and selling hats which they display in their own homes. Waists and neckwear prove worth while for others. A business of this kind is usually conducted by women who have had experience in a store at some time.

About the most salable of all things are good foods. Women who excel in any direction, as in making bread or cake or preserves, jams, pickles, or in canning fruits, have an opportunity to build up a permanent source of income if they can introduce and market their products. Many of them are using the parcels post for shipping direct from country to city. The first requisite is to gather together a few customers, and this must be done either through solicitation by mail or by personal solicitation. A friend will sometimes undertake to place farm products among her acquaintances in the city, and after the producer gets in touch with a few regular customers these can be asked to recommend commodities to their friends. Preserves, jams and pickles, being less perishable than fresh fruits and more profitable, ought to prove interesting prospects to women who excel in making them.

Women who live near the main traveled roads used by motorcar tourists often pick up considerable money during the summer months selling all sorts of eatables to the passers by. A signpost at the side of the road directs the hungry and thirsty motor party to the wayside refreshments. Sandwiches, hard-boiled eggs, bread and butter, doughnuts and cookies are conveniently handled. Women who find themselves near summer camps for boys or girls can usually arrange

to furnish supplies of some sort to them.

Besides these usual means of picking up pin money there are opportunities for women who own and drive cars. In summer and winter resorts they get together sightseeing parties and take them on short motor trips that yield a pretty profit, or they establish a regular trip carrying people to and from certain points. Women have proved themselves quite equal to driving motorcars in all parts of the country. Some young women have a very happy faculty for entertaining children. They undertake to look after a number of little ones one or two afternoons in each week, relieving mothers from their care for a brief time. The children must be brought to the home of their entertainer and called for. She provides for their amusement and gives them any attention they may need, for a fee. By looking after a number of them regularly the income is worth while.

Some women and girls are successful in soliciting subscriptions to periodicals and books. Some do well selling merchandise, as stockings, corsets, embroideries, among their friends. In considering the matter of making pin money it is necessary first to take stock of one's accomplishments to determine what work is easy to excel in. Women who know how to plan all the details for entertainments, luncheons, dinners and parties are in demand in thickly settled communities and many of them turn their gifts to good account.

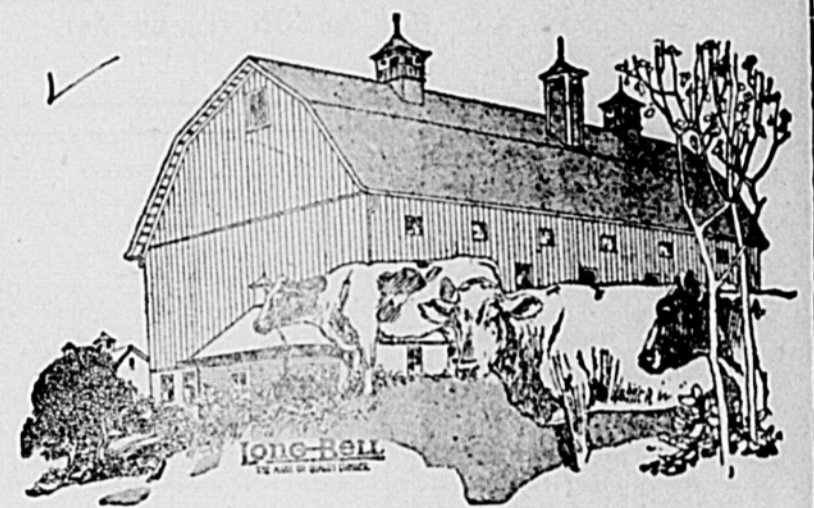

## Today's Geography



### WARSAW: THE PARIS OF POLAND

No other people, in all the world's history, has borne oppression so bravely and gloriously as the Poles, except the Jews; and Warsaw, where the "Russians had to keep a garrison of 200,000 troops to overawe a city of 800,000 people," is to Poland what Paris is to France.

Indeed the vivacity, the gaiety and the quick wit of Warsaw's people are a constant reminder of Paris; as well as those deeper likenesses which spring from Warsaw's ascendancy in the letters, the arts and the social graces.

All this, too, in a city where the most gruesome tragedies have stalked. As recently as the years of our own Civil war the Russian army mowed down thousands of men and women as they knelt in the snow, singing their national anthem. Deportations are an old story in Warsaw, every effort at nationalization was followed by slaughter, and hundreds marched the long trail to Siberian exile.

But Poland's spirit meanwhile, became a synonym for the indomitable. The success of the Russification of Poland has been described as the process of keeping 12,000,000 Poles pinned to Russia by bayonets. Politically non-existent, for even Poland's name was expunged from all official Russian records, the pre-war Warsaw vied with world capitals in science, particularly in literature.

Though Warsaw betrayed none of the grimness characteristic of Russian cities, reminders of her by-gone glories and tragedies were to be found even before the World war restored her autonomy.

In the Lazienki gardens is a monument to John Sobieski, who stemmed the advance of the Turks in Europe, a figure as picturesque as Paderewski who now sees his land a barrier to bolshevism's westward spread. It was in 1683 that a Turkish force had thrown itself in crescent formation around Vienna. The encampment was no less threatening because it resembled a circus rather than a siege, with its herds of camels, and luxurious tents with baths and parrots within and fountains without.

Mighty events often hinge on slender circumstances. Sobieski hesitated because Leopold, Austria's emperor, first declined to address him as "Your Majesty." But Sobieski's hesitation is said to have vanished when he learned that the French ambassador had written to Louis XIV., who rather hoped for the worst for Austria, "Don't trouble yourself, Sobieski is too fat to sit on a horse and fight." The "fat man" rode his charger into the thick of the fight, helping hew his way to where the Turkish grand vizier stood, and after the battle handed one of that dignitary's stirrups to an aide, with the command, "Take it to the queen and tell her that he to whom it belonged is defeated and slain."

### HOW ANTS CAN HINDER AIRPLANES

Ants have assumed a new role in Africa—that of enemies of aviation. Reports from surveyors of the proposed air route from Rhodesia to Cape town say that ant hills have interfered seriously with the placing of aerodromes.

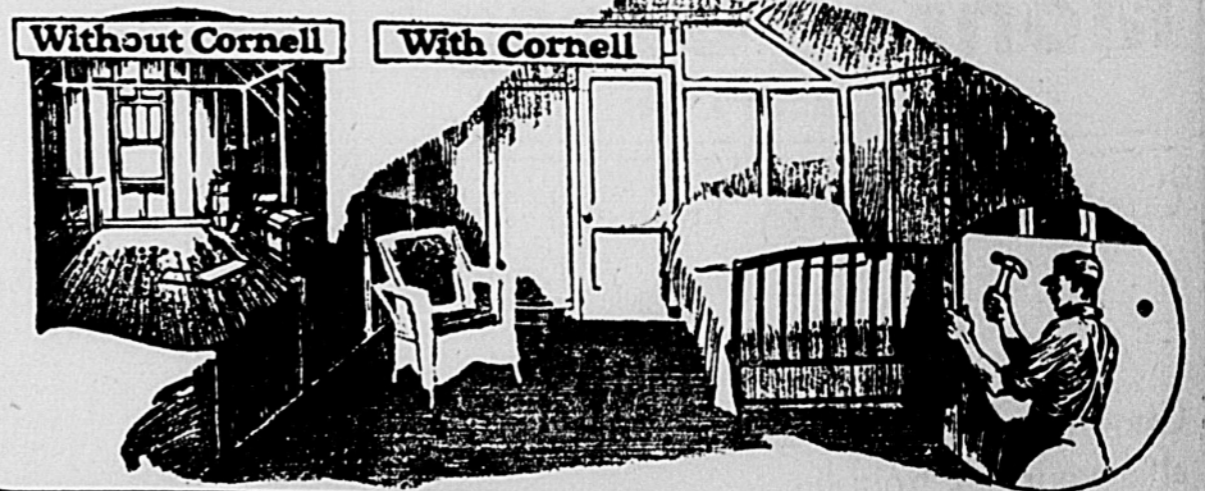

## MAKING WAR ON DISEASE MENACE

American Red Cross Announces  
Budget of \$48,200,000  
For Current Year.

### NEW DISASTER RELIEF PLAN

Continuance of Heavy Work Abroad  
Deemed Necessary to Protect  
United States—\$21,000,000  
Less Than Last Year.

A program of relief and service toward which appropriations of \$48,200,000 have been made has been outlined for the American Red Cross for the fiscal year, July 1, 1920, to July 1, 1921, according to official announcement by national headquarters of the organization at Washington. The figures for 1920-21 are \$21,000,000 below those of 1919-20, in which \$69,400,000 was spent.

Important among the items of the budget for the present year is the appropriation of \$31,500,000 for relief in foreign lands, which includes \$11,000,000 in purchased supplies on hand and not distributed.

Must Protect United States. This will enable the American Red Cross to continue its humanitarian effort to aid stricken peoples to re-establish themselves, to fight the disease epidemics which threaten many countries and to efface largely the remaining traces of the blight left by the World War. It is regarded as social as well as physical sanitation on a large scale that will have a direct bearing on future conditions in America. Central Europe, the chief sufferer

from the conflict, today is facing another winter of famine, pestilence and ruin. Typhus decreased much during the summer months where last winter it had its greatest stronghold, but physicians who investigated the situation at the behest of the League of Red Cross Societies have given their unqualified opinion that this coming winter will see a recurrence on an unprecedented scale. The Red Cross feels it must continue preventive measures abroad to keep this and other deadly maladies from the United States.

Millions for Work at Home. When the disease was sweeping Central Europe last winter the American Red Cross, with the aid of the governments of afflicted nations, undertook the fight against it. Hospitals were established wherever possible and food and clothing were distributed to the undernourished populations, who by reason of their undernourishment were easy prey to the epidemics. Where disorganization contributed last year to the great inroads made by the disease, by virtue of its knowledge of the disease and the presence of well established hospital centers, the American Red Cross this year will undertake the work with a new confidence.

Including the total of \$11,000,000 in supplies left from the last fiscal year, the \$31,500,000 is \$21,000,000 less than the expenditures for 1919-20.

Appropriations for domestic activities total \$18,700,000. The largest item of this "home" budget is \$7,800,000 for civilian relief work. This includes service and assistance for families of soldiers, sailors and marines, and work incidental to disaster. Of the total appropriation for civilian relief, \$5,000,000 is held in reserve for the carrying out of actual disaster relief.

Reduced Overhead Expense. The Red Cross invariably is the first thought of a community visited by calamity. With this in mind, it was determined by the Executive Committee in preparing the budget of 1919-20 to have a fixed reserve fund from which to draw in these instances.

For assistance to soldiers, sailors and marines in hospitals and in camps this year \$1,900,000 has been set aside. Four million two hundred thousand dollars has been appropriated for improvement of health and prevention of disease throughout the United States during the current twelve months. The Red Cross is co-operating fully with the United States Health Service in this work and through its Junior Red Cross is doing much to spread among children the principles of sanitation. An appropriation of \$1,000,000 has been made for developing the peace time program of the Red Cross by service to its chapters in all regions.

The appropriation of \$48,200,000 is exclusive of the local expenditures of the 3,000 or more chapters.

Administration expenses this year will be \$1,800,000. Last year they were \$2,300,000.

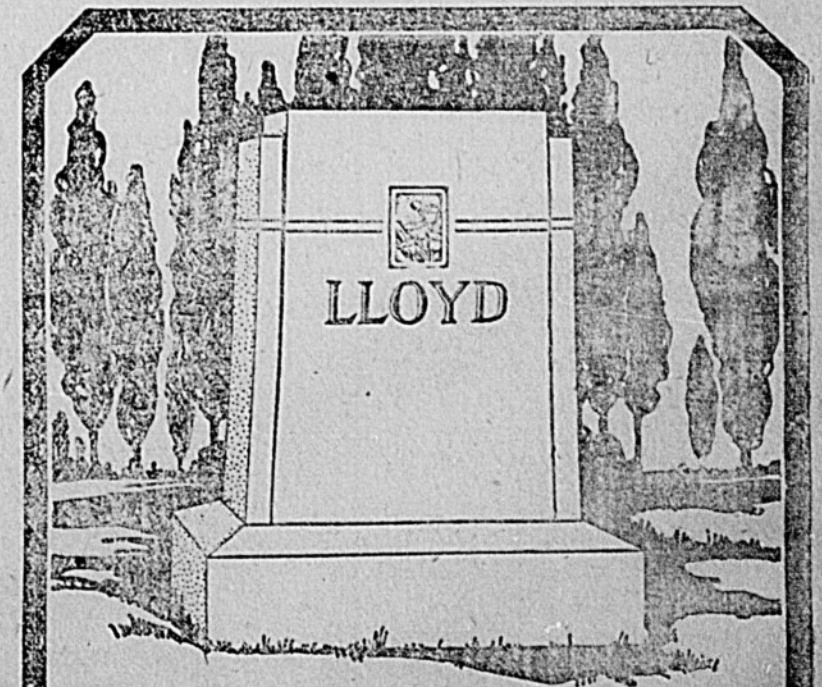
