William Jackson Announces Candidacy

This statement is to announce my candidacy for State Representative from the 64th Legislative District, in which I seek to represent the people of this district as a Democrat.

I realize, of course, that an announcement cannot contain a full statement of all my positions and beliefs, and will here attempt to present only a brief resume of myself and at least some of my strongest political beliefs.

I am an attorney 52 years of age, born in Canadian, Texas, and have practiced as a country lawyer in Canadian for more than 27 years. I am an elder in the Presbyterian Church, married, with three adult daughters, the youngest being a student at the University of Texas, and the two older being married to Aggies (which I hate to admit, but I guess is poetic justice for a University of Texas ex). I graduated from Canadian High School and took both my pre-law and law

school education at the University of Texas, being licensed in December of 1947, and starting my practice in Canadian in April of 1948. During my practice, I have served as both County Attorney and City Attorney, and feel that I am well versed in the needs of both the counties and the cities of our district. I believe my wide experience, not only in office, but in representing farmers, ranchers and businessmen and the problems of the wage earners, qualifies me to represent all of the people of our district.

I feel very strongly that no one can adequately represent this district if he is obligated to any group or faction, and for this reason, I will not accept any campaign contribution from any source in making this race. I also feel very strongly that too many things pass the Texas Legislature because the legislators are running for reelection, or because no one really pays much attention or cares. If elected, I pledge to you that I will not cast one vote during my tenure because of political expediency, and I will keep abreast of all pending legislation, including its source and the motivation behind any proposal. I am deeply disturbed by the proliferation of legislation, and feel that we have about all the law, rules and regulation that we can possibly live with now. I frankly would probably vote "no" more often than not. I would hope to be effective, but if not, I could at least make a lot of noise, and personally, I think someone needs to be hollering.

I am in favor of some legislative changes, particularly in punishment for crimes of violence, which I feel should be made much more sure and definite. Land use will be a critical area in our legislature in the coming years, and I don't believe the people and representatives of the metropolitan areas of Dallas, Fort Worth, Houston and others, have either the knowledge or the right, with 8% of the land area, to tell the rest of the people in the State

HIGHLIGHTS FROM THE PAST TO THE PRESENT

"and that's the way it was"

Highlights from the Past to the Present looks at the town of Spearman this week as we take a different picture of Hansford County. This week the history of our county is found in the building and developing of a town.

As we begin we find that Spearman started in 1917 as the town was platted in May of that year. Spearman was named for Thomas E. Spearman, Vice-President of the Santa Fe Railroad. The town began as the promotion of the railroad started.

The First World War delayed the building of the town but in May of 1917 the townsite lots were sold. The lots were purchased from Thomas E. Spearman by the individuals of the area. With the railroad potentials arriving, many citizens of the area saw a future in the town and began work upon moving the town of Hansford to the railroad and to Spearman.

The first building to be moved from Hansford was the John R. Collard Real Estate Office which stood where the present T.G.Y. store stands. It was two years later or in October of 1919 that the train finally reached Spearman. The Santa Fe line branched from the main line at Shattuck and ended at the site of Spearman.

In 1921 the town of Spearman was incorporated and city officials were named to handle the business of the town. Hugh James was named the first Mayor. Lee McClellan served as the City Clerk and was also Alderman. The other four Aldermen were Madison (L.M.) Womble, M.C. Head, Tom Kerr and Fred Brandt.

The two banks were moved from Hansford, as well as the Methodist Church, the hotel and many others. The first banks of Spearman were the First National Bank and the Guaranty State Bank. The Methodist church building was moved and served as the only church of the town for several years. The building is still used and is serving as the First Christian Church Sanctuary at the present.

Albert Liske of Canadian built the first elevator for the county as well as for Spearman. Until this time the farmers freighted their wheat to Texhoma or Guymon to be sold but as the railroad moved into the county the trip was shortened and their grain was carried to Spearman. It was a short while after the railroad was completed before an elevator was built and ready for use but several farmers brought their grain and scooped the grain into box cars rather than freight it to Texhoma or Guymon.

The first brick building on Main Street of Spearman was the Hale Drug. Another first for the town was the show which was built in 1920 and was owned by Tom Finley. It was located where the First Christian Church of Spearman now stands. The show had its own light plant and many early residents recall that they could tell when it was time for the show for they would hear Mr. Finley "crank" up the light plant. Of course the only movies available were silent.

At one time Spearman had six lumber companies. Their two grocery stores were the John Hays Store which was the first building erected on Spearman's Main Street. The other grocery was the Fred Brandt Store or the P.M. Malze store which was moved from Hansford.

One of the trademarks of Spearman is their brick streets and these streets were laid in 1927. Very few towns have brick streets anymore. This was the first paving for the town.

In 1920 the school was moved from Old Hansford and the district of Spearman was made up of the consolidation of Hansford, Happy Jack and Mico school districts. As the years passed there were other areas included in the district.

As the early 1920's rolled around oil was discovered on the north side of the Canadian River and Spearman was the nearest town with a railroad to the oil sites.

There was no bridge across the Canadian River. Therefore all the oil equipment and supplies were shipped into Spearman by rail. The early settlers of the town recall that there would be as many as 100 trucks in the town at a time hauling the equipment out of town to the oil sites south of the county. Spearman was the end of the railroad until 1934 when the line was extended on to Morse and points south.

The school burned to the ground in 1923 and the brick building was erected and in 1930 the High School Building was erected. The first president of the School Board was Mr. A.F. Barkley who was also president of the School Board at Old Hansford.

The first organization for the town was the Chamber of Commerce which was organized by 1921. Their first project was to dig a well for water for the town and after it was in operation the Chamber saw that it was properly in operation. The well was operated by an engine powered by what was called a "Hot Ball Engine" that burned kerosene. Mr. Leo Dacus took care of the city water.

The Chamber of Commerce would go from house to house to collect \$2 from all that would pay to keep the well in operation. It was some time before the water was piped over town and the citizens would bring their barrel from home to the well in a two wheel cart to carry water home. At first when the well was dug the city officials had a problem of the range stock roaming into town and drinking the water supply.

The Aldermen met for bond elections. They appropriated the bonds for the building of the city light plant which went into operation in about 1924. Another of the jobs for the Aldermen was completed when the ice plant was built. Spearman had no refrigeration at the time or had no way of making ice. The town grew steadily until 1953 with no particular "booms" in population.

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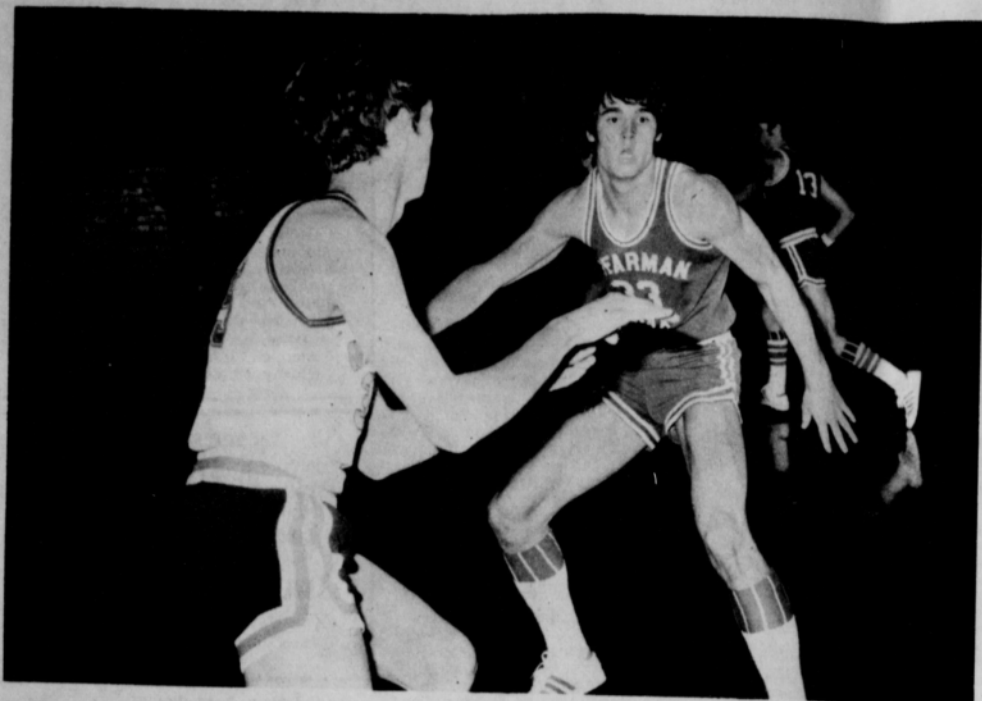

Council Gives Go Ahead To K.I.D.S. Program

K. I. D. S. of Spearman is happy to announce that at the Monday night city council meeting, the K. I. D. S. program submitted was unanimously accepted for a 1 year period. The council was 100 per cent in favor of the following program which was submitted to them.

K. I. D. S. organization was formed for the Kid's Individual Development of Spearman, both morally and physically. New programs will be invited and the organization will assist and help further develop existing programs.

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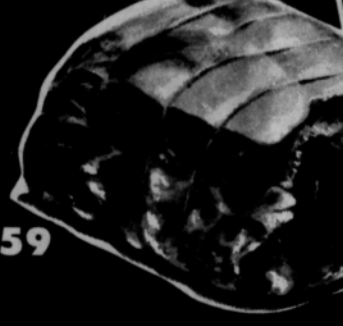
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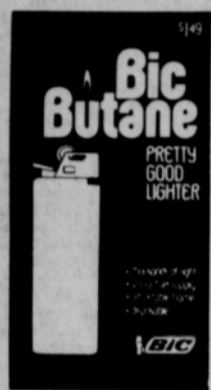
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
