# HIGHLIGHTS FROM THE PAST TO THE PRESENT

Highlights from the Past to the Present looks at the town of Spearman this week as we take a different picture of Hansferd County. This week the history of our county is found in the building and developing of

As we begin we find that Spearman started in 1917 as the town was platted in May of that year. Spearman was named for Thomas Spearman, Vice-President of the Santa Fe Railroad. The town began as the promotion of the railroad started.

The First World War delayed the building of the town but in May of 1917 the townsite lots were sold. The lots were purchased from Thomas E. Spearman by the indi-viduals of the area. With the railroad potentials ar riving. many citizens of the area saw a future inthe town began work upon moving the town of Hansford to the milroad and to Spearman.

The first building to be moved from Hansford was the John R. Collard Real Estate Office which stood where the present T.G.Y. store stands. It was two years later or in October of 1919 that the train finally reached Spear man. The Santa Fe line branched from the main line at Shattuck and ended at the site of Spearman.

In 1921 the town of Spearman was incorporated and city officials were named to handle the business of the town. Hugh James was named the first Mayor. Lee Mo-Clellan served as the City Clerk and was also Alderman. The other four Aldermen were Madison (L.M.) Wom-ble, M.C. Head, Tom Kerr and Fred Brandt.

The st banks of Spearman were the First National Bank d the Guaranty State Bank. The Methodist church ilding was moved and served as the only church of the wn for several years. The bullding is still used and is rving as the First Christian Church Sanctuary at the

Albert Liske of Canadian built the first elevator for the county as well as for Spearman. Until this time the farmers freighted their wheat to Texhoma or Gaymon to be sold but as the railroad moved into the county the trip was shortened and their grain was carried to Spearman. It was a short while after the railroad was completed efore an elevator was built and ready for use but several farmers brought their grain and scooped the grain into box cars rather than freight it to Texhoma or Guymon. box cars rather than freight it to Texhoma or Guymon. The first brick building on Main Street of Spearman was the Hale Drug. Another first for the town was the show which was built in 1920 and was owned by Tom Finley. It was located where the First Christian Church of Spearman now stands. The show had its awn light plant and many early residents recall that they could tell when it was time for the show for they would hear Mr. Finley "crank" up the light plant. Of course the only movies available were silent. At one time Spearman had six lumber companies. Their There was no bridge across the Canadian River. There-fore all the oil equipment and supplies were shipped into Spearman by rall. The early settlers of the town recall that there would be as many as 100 trucks in the town at a time hauling the equipment out of town to the oil sites south of the county. Spearman was the end of the mailroad until 1934 when the line was extended on to Moree and points couth.

Morse and points south. The school burned to the ground in 1923 and the brick building was erected and in 1930 the High School Build-ing was erected. The first president of the School Board was Mr. A.F. Barkley who was also president of the School Board at Old Hansford. The first organization for the town was the Chamber of Commerce which was observed to the total of the school Board

The first organization for the town was the Chamber of Commerce which was organized by 1921. Their first project was to dig a well for water for the town and after it was in operation the Chamber saw that it was properly in operation. The well was operated by an engine powered what was called a "Hot Ball Engine" that burned

kerosene. Mr. Leo Dacus took care of the city water. The Chamber of Commerce would go from house to house to collect \$2 from all that would pay to keep the well in operation. It was some time before the water was piped over town and the citizens would bring their barrell from home to the well in a two wheel cart to carry water home. At first when the well was dug the city of ficials

home. At first when the well was dug the city of ficials had a problem of the range stock roaming into town and drinking the water supply. The Aldermen met for bond elections. They appropria-ted the bonds for the building of the city light plant which went into operation in about 1924. Another of the jobs for the Aldermen was completed when the ice plants was built. Spearman had no refrigeration at the time or had no way of making ice. The town grew iteadily until 1953 with no particular "booms" in population.
