## Saturday to Talk School

The following information in regard to women voting is sent out by the Texas League of Women Voters and is furnished by C. M. Cureton, attorney general:

1. Every woman who desires to vote in any primary election or who desires to participate in any nominating convention, shall, first of all, possess all of the qualifications necessary of an elector, such as twelve months residence in the State, six months residence in the County, and must vote in the precinct in which she lives

A mass meeting is called to be held in the Andrews Hardware building in Spearman on Saturday afternoon, January 24, at 1 o'clock, for the purpose of devising ways and means of Securing adequate school facilities for Spearman. This is a step in the right direction and every citizen of the town and community should attend the meeting. Spearman must have a good school; the very best school, and it should begin the first alonday in November, 1920. To secure this kind of a school we must begin real earnest work immediately. 2. 



#### CLINIC HAS PROVED WORTH GOLD IN GRIP OF NEPTUNE

Firm Well Worthy of Imitation by Other Employers.

A pioneer medical clinic, established 15 years ago to protect the health of 600 employees, and gradually enlarged the medical director was in charge of and visiting nurse. Now the clinic is in charge of a practicing physician and graduate nurses.

During the influenza epidemic of last winter, over 350 employees were treated per day, with only six deaths during attempt recovery of the vessel, and the entire course of the dreaded disease. All cases were given careful individual attention and, in instances where no family doctor was in attendance, immediate arrangements were made for medical care.

It is the policy of the nurses in the clinic to advise all employees with whom they come in contact to be insured, an activity which the firm itself handles through an employees' organization. The purpose of such advice is to secure insurance for all employees in order that they may receive its benefits after one week's illness.

This arrangement does not place a premium upon the employees' being ill, and at the same time the clinic cooperates in the matter of insurance.

A dental clinic is in a formative state and, no doubt, will be established in a short time. The plan and method of administration and organization is simply in the making, but it is safe to say that the dental clinic will be as efficient as the medical clinic.

The Modern Hospital, in describing the clinic, says that it has fully proved its value in protecting the health of the employees of this particular company and merits the commendation and imitation of other mercantile and industrial establishments.

Both Combatants.


William Lessig, gateman at the Erie railroad crossing east of Ramapo, N. J., tells a story of a battle he saw between a rattlesnake and a pet cat.

These things are ill for the buyer and the poor man, and should not be allowed."


