

Lynx meet Bobcats at Pampa Friday nite!

The Spearman Lynx will meet the Childress Bobcats at Pampa Harvester Stadium Friday night, 7:30 p.m. in the Bi-District 1-AA contest. The Childress Bobcats currently are rated as the Number One team in the UPI rating system and are also rated in the top 4 in the Harris System. The Lynx are not in the top 20, unless the ratings have been changed as of last week, when they were sure to at least tie for a district championship.

We can learn very little from talking with the coaching staffs of either team, about the sizes of the teams, or whether they pass, run or punt! In fact, we do not even know if Childress can pass or not. They have had to pass very sparingly because of their great running game. But, they will be playing a great defensive team when they play Spearman Friday night and most observers believe that if the Lynx can keep their offense rolling, they will have a good chance of playing on the field with the Bobcats. Childress has a perfect record for the year and have played only one team that the Lynx have played--that was Shamrock--and both teams defeated Shamrock rather easily.

Pampa will host the play-off game and this delights most all of the Lynx fans. The Lynx have always played well at Pampa and the facilities in the AAAA school are plenty ample to handle the large crowd expected for the game.

Highlight of the game will be the performance of the Spearman Lynx-Childress Bobcat bands at the half. This will be worth the price of admission to all fans!

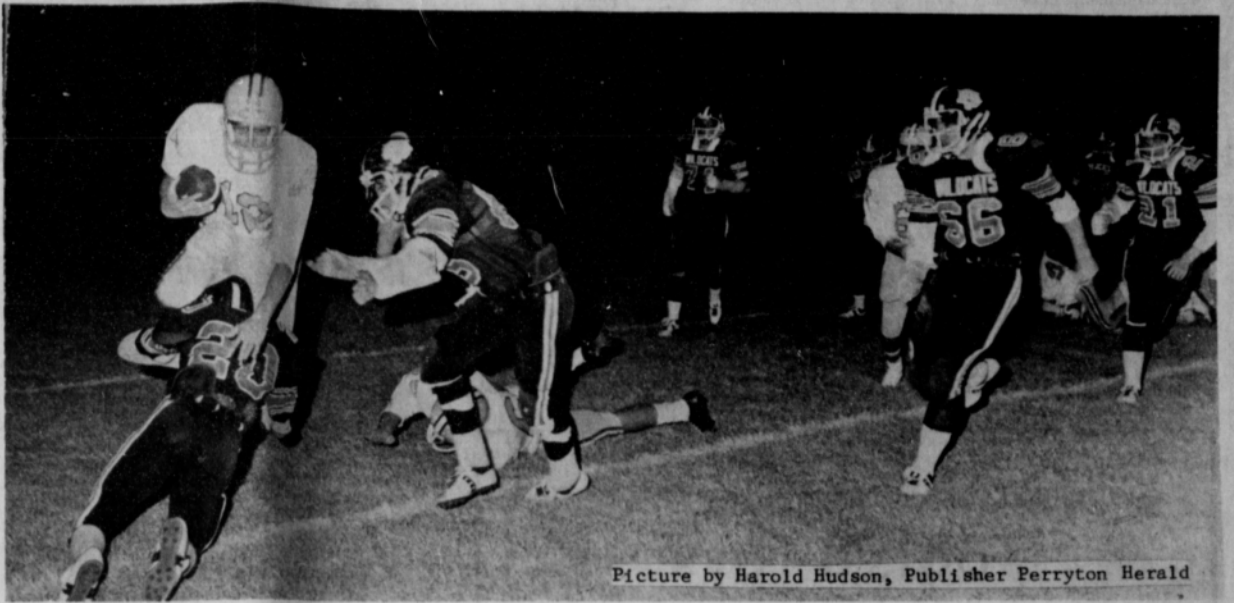

Church To Observe 50th Anniversary

On Sunday, November 21, the First Christian Church of Spearman will be celebrating its 50th Anniversary. Morning Worship will be at 10:30 a.m., preceded by coffee and registration. Following worship there will be a noon luncheon. At 1:30 there will be a time of reflection and remembering the past history of the church.

From 3:00 until 4:30 p.m. there will be an Anniversary Reception with community churches and churches around the area coming to share with us. We invite all our friends to join in our joy and celebration. Former ministers and members are coming to share their memories of the past and our hopes for the future. You are cordially invited to attend.

As early as 1910 Services were being held in Hansford County by a minister of the Christian Church. However, it was not until May 1926 when Jasper Bogue, District Evangelist for the Panhandle, made application through the Texas Christian Missionary Society for land to be purchased from the Santa Fe Townsite Co. for a Building Site for a church in Spearman, Texas.

During evangelistic meetings held in November and

December of that year thirty-nine persons lined up as Charter Members: Mr. and Mrs. A. R. Hull, Mr. and Mrs. N. F. Hull, Mr. and *Mrs. Carl F. Services were held in the Union Church and the I.O.O.F. Hall. A committee of seven served as a Board in charge of the organization of the church. A Sunday School Superintendent was chosen to

begin Bible study classes. The first Annual Meeting was held at the Presbyterian Church in 1928, a total of forty-six members composed the roll. An Official Board was appointed at that time. Bro. Bogue was still serving as Minister. During that year the old Bank Building was secured and lots purchased for the church.

Services continued with various ministers serving the congregation. Bro. McClure took over the duties of the minister and was followed in 1938 by Bro. Eulis Hill. Bro. George Bradford served the church for a short time and was followed again by Bro. Hill, he served until 1940. Between 1940 and 1942, the church was served by visiting ministers. In 1943 D. F. Bastion became the minister and served until 1946.

Many improvements were made to the church building including the addition of a small stucco structure which served as four class-rooms. During 1944 a four-member orchestra provided music for services and in 1947 a choir was organized by Mrs. Bill Masters. Bro. Masters was serving the church as Student Minister while attending Phil-

lips University. In 1949 the old church building was sold and moved from the lots to make room for the new church which stands today at the present location. It was completed and dedicated in 1949.

Bro. Clifford Parker served the church from 1950 until 1952, followed by Ellis Veal who ministered here until 1954. In 1954 C. J. Van Dyke became the minister and served through 1957 when Donald Cox took over the duties and served until 1960. John Waddell came to serve the church in 1961. In 1962 the new Parsonage was built at 1002 S. Barkley. Graham Pugh became the minister in 1963. During his ministry here, their son Fred Pugh,

served our neighbor church in Gruver as their Student Minister. In 1966 Dayle Schnelle became the Minister, serving until 1970. Vernon Stagner served as Interim Minister until our present Minister Don Wirsdorfer came in August of 1970.

During this time span, many changes have been made in the church and in the community it serves. But one thing remains the same: The God of our early founders is the God of the present disciples--and will be the same God for all who follow after. May all things be done to glorify Him and may we continue to serve in whatever ways He leads this Body of Christ, The Church.

Thanksgiving Day Gift Of Life

Freeman Barkley, Memorial Committee Chairman for the Hansford Unit of the American Cancer Society today announced a special Thanksgiving Day/Gift of Life Program. In the spirit of Thanksgiving, all Texans are asked to give a Gift of Life in honor of the progress being made in Cancer Control. According to Dr. R. L. Kleeberger, Unit Medical Committee Chairman, the ability to cure and control ten kinds of cancer has been developed since 1960. These cancers frequently occur in children, cause great emotional and economic strains and a staggering loss in years of life. Dr. Kleeberger was quoting a recent report by George J. Race, M.D., Ph.D., Director of the University of Texas Health Science Center Cancer Center in Dallas. The report indicated that some cancers like Hodgkin's Disease have changed from an almost 100 percent fatality rate to approximately 85 percent cure rate if the patients are treated by a team of surgeons, medical oncologists, immunologists and chemotherapists.

Mrs. W. L. Maupin, Unit Public Education Chairman reports that according to National Cancer Institute figures, over 3,000,000 Americans have now been saved from cancer. Mr. Barkley indicated that all contributions given during the Thanksgiving Day/Gift of Life campaign would be used to support the Society's three-part program of Research, Education, and Service to cancer patients. He also encouraged anyone interested in learning about cancer or the various programs of the Society to attend the next regular Board meeting, at the Community Room of the Gruver Public Library at 7:00 p.m.

Presbyterians will also participate in the union Thanksgiving Service at the Assembly of God on Monday, November 22, at 7:00 p.m.

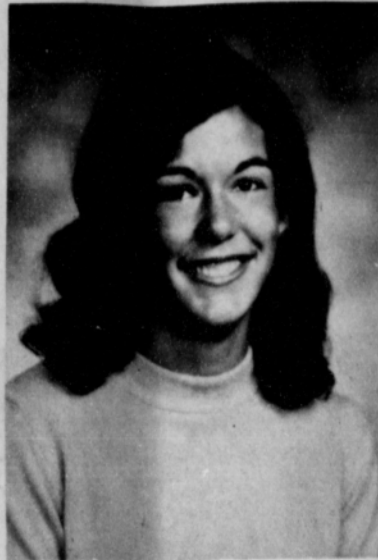

Pork Producers Short Course Planned

A January short course is being planned by the North Plains Pork Producers. Air Force Recruiting News

ARLINGTON-Young men and women may now reserve a specific Air Force job and entry date up to nine months in advance, according to Air Force Recruiting Service officials. The new nine-month option called the "Delayed Enlistment Program (DEP)", allows Air Force enlistees to accrue service time for active duty and retirement pay purposes from the day they enlist. Also, people enlisted or commissioned prior to Jan. 1, 1977, will be eligible for the benefits of the current GI Bill even though they may not report for active duty until September 1977. Individuals entering the DEP after Dec. 31, 1976 will be eligible to participate in the new contributory GI Bill benefits packaged signed into law last month. Persons interested in the educational and job training opportunities offered by the Air Force may be qualified for guaranteed training in a specific job or may elect training in one of four occupational areas (mechanics, electronics, administration, and general). Previously, the DEP allowed recruiters to offer a 180-day (six month) DEP option in most Air Force specialties with a confirmed entry day for the Air Force. More information is available from local Air Force recruiters.

Local People Make Autumn Flaming Ozarks Tour

Four Spearman people, Mr. and Mrs. C. W. (Jake and Josephine) Kirk from Holt Community, Viola Graves and Mildred Chamberlain of Spearman joined a Continental Trailways Tour at Holiday Inn 1-40 in Amarillo, October 25th for the Autumn in the Flaming Ozarks Tour. Forty two people were on this tour with Mr. and Mrs. Robert Thompson from Hereford as Escorts and Bill Weigand from Amarillo, driver.

Highlights of the tour were a visit to the Cowboy Hall of Fame, traveling the scenic drive through the Kaimichi mountains, touring the University of Arkansas Campus, viewing the Pea Ridge Battlefield and enjoying lunch at the Chateau of the Ozarks Restaurant, viewing the Christ of Ozarks Statue and attending the Shepherd of the Hills Play, visiting Silver Dollar City and the Will Rogers Shrine. We left Amarillo Monday, October

25th, 1976, from Holiday Inn 1-40 at 7:40 a.m. on an almost new Continental Trailways Silver Eagle Bus with 38 passengers and picked up four more in Oklahoma City from Wichita Falls, making 42 passengers. At 8 a.m. the sun was just coming up and the most beautiful sunrise we ever saw. At 10:30 a.m. we had a 20-minute coffee break at Quality Inn at Elk City, a very nice place. We enjoyed a delicious lunch at Hensleys Restaurant at El Reno at noon. At 3:15 p.m. we had finished 1 1/2 hours touring the Cowboy Hall of Fame at Oklahoma City, browsing, looking and viewing this interesting place preserving our heritage. We would have enjoyed more time here. The Cowboy Hall of Fame is the world's largest exhibit hall of Western lore, opened June 26, 1965. Proclaimed a national memorial by the U. S. Congress August 5, 1957. Here you are met by sparkling

fountains and a flag esplanade, commanding a magnificent view from atop Persimmon Hill. Sponsored by the people of 17 Western States and dedicated to all great Westerners.

The scenic drive to Lake Eufaula was surely pretty. We reached Fountainhead Lodge at 6 p.m. We saw little deer around the lake before evening. higher than Amarillo. We traveled in the Jack Fork Mountains, Sambois Mountains and Winding Stair Mountains. At 11:25 a.m. we were really winding and going up and down and over these beautiful foliage covered mountains. We passed Horse Thief Springs. At 11:40 a.m. we were 32 miles from Mena, Arkansas, where we will eat lunch at Hungry Owl Restaurant. At 12:45 p.m. we had lunch at Mena, Ark., buffet style, very good. We were on our way at 2 p.m. for Fayetteville, Ark. We traveled only 160 miles this morning 4 1/2 hours. The distance across the Kaimichi Mountains only 52 miles but took us 160 miles. At 4:30 p.m. we had 30-minute stop at Van Buren at the Kopper Kettle where they had all kinds of smoked meats and cheese in one store and china in the other. We had a little time to shop here and Mildred, Jo and Viola bought dry roasted Cashew Nuts to serve our traveling companions as our treat tomorrow. At 5 p.m. we

were climbing through the beautiful Boston Mountains and at 5:30 p.m. we were only 15 miles from Fayetteville. We stopped and many got out and made pictures of beautiful trees. We enjoyed a most beautiful mountain drive to Fayetteville and reached Holiday Inn at 5:15 p.m. where we noticed a welcome banner "Welcome Autumn In Ozarks Tour". Pictures were made. This was all exciting.

At 8 a.m. Wednesday, October 27th we enjoyed a big breakfast and left at 8:30 a.m. The weather cloudy and cool but still very nice. Leaving Fayetteville we drove around by the University to view the campus and the Razorback Stadium. We crossed the Oklahoma state line at 1 p.m. We continued through the Flaming Ozarks to Claremore where we visited the

Will Rogers Shrine. This was one of the most interesting places we had found. Films were shown, and we were guided to see scenes depicting the life pattern of the much loved and remembered Will Rogers.

Still raining lightly. We spent the night at Western Hills Lodge on Lake Gibson where we had our Farewell Banquet. At 8:30 a.m. we were homeward bound, via Oklahoma City where Viola left us to attend the funeral of a relative. Local Population Shifting In Age

NEW YORK--For a number of years after World War II, up to 1960, residents of Hansford County were getting younger and younger. Collectively, that is. Not individually.

Year by year, the median age of the local population, which is the level at which there are as many persons above that age as below it, had been dropping, in line with the changes that were taking place elsewhere.

It was due to the high birth rate experienced after the war. The sharp increase in the number of children had the effect of lowering the overall age level.

After 1960 there was a change locally. The median started moving upward despite the fact that, throughout the country as a whole, the age level continued to drop, falling from 29.4 years in 1960 to 27.9 in 1970.

Since then, however, there has been a reversal in the national trend. The age level has been rising in most areas.

Hansford County saw its median age go from 25.6 years in 1960, as determined by the census taken at that time, to 27.5 years in 1970.

More recently, as indicated by the latest figures, it has been going up. It is approximately 28.3 years at the present time.

Elsewhere in the United

States, the median is now 28.8 years and, in the State of Texas, 27.2.

Nationally, the sudden end to the growing-younger process is tied up with the drop in the birth rate. The figures show that women in their 20's are having fewer children than previous generations of women had at their age.

According to a Government survey, this trend is likely to continue for some time. The average wife, it shows, intends to have 2.17 children in her lifetime, down from 2.4 in 1970.

The extent to which this relates to the local area is to be seen in the Census Bureau's reports on the number of children in the population under the age of five per 1,000 women of child-bearing age. This is called the "fertility ratio".

In 1960, Hansford County's fertility ratio was given as 507. It is currently estimated at 348.

The average nationally is approximately 337 at present and, in Texas, 352.

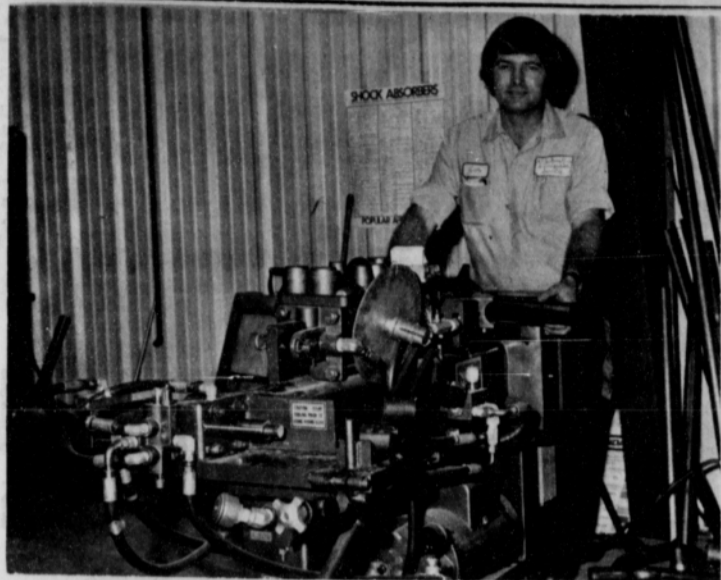

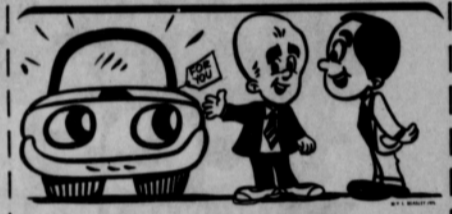

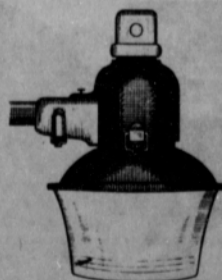

Local C of C Manager On Panel

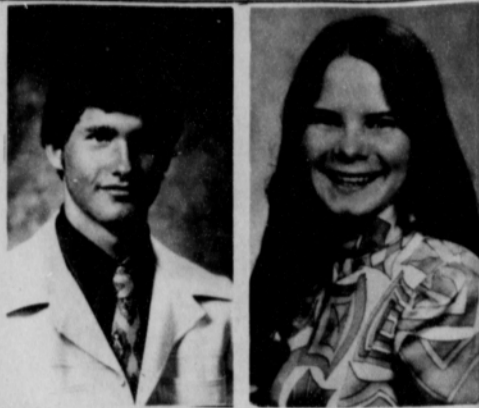

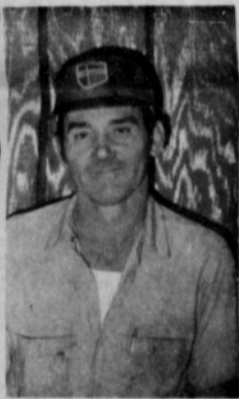

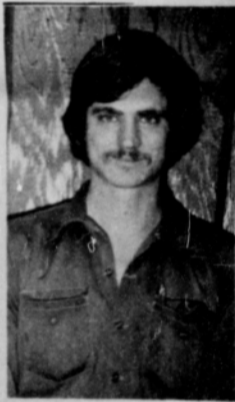
