

Spearman coach "golf coach" of year

Spearman golf coach Ralph Newton, will be inducted in the "hall of fame" next Sunday during services held at the Amarillo college Badger gym.

"Coach Newton said last year was the third year for there to be a girls state golf tournament. He recalled the Lynettes marched to the state title, we finished third in 1974 and the girls remembered it. They got inspired. Three returned for the 1975 team. Concerning the Panhandle Sports Hall of Fame recognition, Newton said, "I was elated when I first found out. My wife (Fem) was possibly more excited that I was. She grabbed that newspaper each day to check if it had been announced.

Now I still have the same kind of feelings," he said. "I'm elated personally, but it all goes back to those five people who swung the clubs.

Really, all they needed was someone to get them in the course on time. They did the work."

Newton has coached Spearman to back-to-back regional golf crowns. He also coaches girls basketball.

The five members of the girls golf team who made it possible for Coach Newton to win this honor were: Loretta Shelton, Becky Wheeler, Carla Harper, Khristi Gressett and Willetta Shelton.

Bank Deposits Increase for '75

Bank deposits in the First State Bank was up some \$2 million for 1975 over the end of the year totals in 1974. Total deposits at the bank at the end of 1975 were \$21,558,359.78, up from a total of \$19,513,745.40 at the end of 1974.

Loans at the First State Bank totaled \$11,197,997.80 at the end of 1975, an increase of a little more than \$1 million from the 1974 total of \$10,058,508.48.

Although deposits for 1974 were higher than total deposits for the end of the year in 1973, the increase in the past year was significantly greater than the increase in 1974.

Deposits at the end of the year in 1973 totaled \$18,472,714.29, with loans listed as \$10,066,795.38.

Deposits at the Interstate Savings & Loan with a branch here were up to \$26,646,799 as of December 1975, whereas deposits were \$22,728,576 at the end of the year in 1974. With the increase in deposits at the Interstate Savings & Loan, officials noted that the deposits have increased every year since the start of the financial institution.

Deposits at the Savings and Loan at the end of 1972 were \$15,778,582 and jumped to \$19,510,651 at the end of 1973, an increase of about \$4 million.

The year end statement of condition of the Gruver State Bank showed their deposits of \$11,818,344.17 as compared to the 1974 year end total of \$10,370,995.33. Loans at that institution were \$8,573,769.08 at the end of 1975 compared to \$7,027,416.07 at the end of 1974.

Services Held For Prominent Physician

Services were held at 3 p.m. Wednesday at the Spearman High School Auditorium for Dr. Donald E. Hackley, 54, prominent physician of Spearman since 1945.

Dr. Hackley died at 1:45 A. M. Monday in Hansford Hospital. He became ill in November and had been hospitalized most of the time since then.

Bill Osborne, minister of the Church of Christ, officiated. Burial was in Holt Cemetery by Ed Brown & Sons Funeral Directors of Borger.

Pallbearers were V. N. King, Carl Archer, R. C. Fisher, Jim Nicholson, Ronald Schaefer and Darce Foshee.

Honorary pallbearers were E. J. Copeland, Gordon Parrish, Dr. R. L. Kleeberger, E. C. Abston, Erlis Pittman, Jim Kritzler, Frank Massad and Freeman Barkley.

Dr. Hackley attended Kirksville College of Osteopathic Medicine in Missouri from 1941 to 1944. He interned in the Amarillo Osteopathic Hospital and entered private practice here in 1945.

He was mayor of Spearman from 1967-73. He was appointed to serve out the term of the late Bob Vaughn and was elected to the position for two terms.

He was on the board of trustees of the Texas Osteopathic Medical Association from 1964 to 1967 and was a member of the house of delegates to the Texas Osteopathic Medical Association for 11 years.

He was very active in Community affairs, was past president of the Spearman Lions Club, and served as president of the Chamber of Commerce in 1957. He served on the Spearman Independent School District board of trustees from 1959 to 1965, and was president of the board in 1965.

He was elected to the Hansford County School Board in 1967 and was serving on the board at the time of his death.

In 1968 he was named chairman of the Hansford County Red Cross.

In 1971 he was named chairman of the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission and was on the board of directors of the PRPC from 1969-71. In 1973 he was named a director of the Texas Municipal League and a member of the Governor's Rural

Development Commission from 1972-73 and was chairman of the health division of that commission.

Hackley was also a member of the regional health council board of Discovery Center. He was instrumental in securing treatment for handicapped children in the Spearman area. In 1974, he was named in Texas Who's Who.

He was a member of the Church of Christ in Spearman.

Survivors include the widow, Effie Pearl; two daughters, Mrs. Joan Crum of Amarillo and Mrs. Cathy Patterson of Spearman; one son, Bobby Archer of Spearman; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. L. R. Hackley of Oskaloosa, Iowa; and five grandchildren.

He is a partner in the Perryton law firm of Lemon, Close, Atkinson & Shearer and active in professional affairs. Ann Lee Close is a partner in a needlepoint store in Perryton, The Yam Barn, and also a graduate of Texas Tech University.

Pay Telephone Bills With Bank Drafts

General Telephone customers can save the increasing cost of postage involved in paying their telephone bill each month by signing up for the company's bank draft plan, according to Paul Farrar, Perryton Customer Service Manager.

Farrar explained the convenient payment plan automatically pays a customer's telephone bill through the customer's bank each month at no extra cost or charge.

"Customers need only to call or come by our business office to obtain a bank draft agreement," Farrar said. "Thereafter we will mail their monthly phone bill to them in the usual manner and they need only to deduct the amount from their bank balance. We do all the rest."

He said the customer would continue to review the statement and call the business office with any questions or errors that appeared on the statement. Credits for any erroneous charges would appear on the next month's statement as they presently do.

Farrar continued that the postage increase will cost General Telephone an estimated additional \$359,000 during 1976 of which over \$255,000 will be due to the increase in cost of postage for billing.

The manager added that telephone customers also can pay their phone bills at the business office at 301 S. Amherst, in Perryton.



Unfortunately many youngsters spend some time sick in bed. Wise selection of play materials provides emotional comfort for a sick child during illness and convalescence.

But entertaining the confined child takes planning. Since play is a vital part of every child's life, toys are usually as important to an ill child's happiness and well-being as when he is well.

Parents could consider these points when selecting toys for convalescent days.

---Choose toys that require quiet play and use little energy.
---Provide a wide variety because attention span is shorter when a child is ill.

---Avoid play materials that spill, turn over, or get lost in bed linens.
---Avoid toys that cause eye-strain.

---Select toys that can be played by one or two people.

---Choose toys easier than those he enjoys when well.

---Choose a toy with your child's interest in mind.

Specific toys sick children usually enjoy are dolls and stuffed animals, picture and drawing books, balloons tied to bed, modeling clay or dough, simple dress-up props, manipulative dolls or animals, simple handcraft projects of hand puppets.

Toys that fit the child's play needs will keep him entertained and his mind off himself. And the contented child is less likely to demand his parent's constant attention.

If you need to do some housecleaning but are out of cleaning supplies take heart. You can find modern cleaning power with "old-fashioned" products--baking soda and washing soda.

And best of all, they're less expensive than modern "high-powered" cleansers.

Although they have different formulas, both are soda compounds derived from sodium chloride--that's common table salt.

One is baking soda (sodium bicarbonate)--an old reliable for cleaning and deodorizing.

It is effective in cleaning refrigerator interiors, removing stains from china, cleaning teeth, killing cat litter odor and putting out flash fires.

Washing soda (sodium carbonate) is also an effective cleaner and can be used for most routine cleaning chores. But its major contribution is for water softening--it's a valuable laundry aid in hard-water areas.

Cattle Scabies Confirmed

Seventeen outbreaks of cattle scabies were confirmed in three states during December 1975, according to the U. S. Department of Agriculture (USDA).

Officials of USDA's Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service (APHIS) said that state quarantines were placed on all affected and exposed cattle. The animals were then treated under federal supervision before the quarantines were lifted.

 Scabies is caused by tiny, parasitic mites that puncture the skin of cattle and feed on body fluids released from the wounds. The mites are spread by contact between animals. They are killed by dipping in USDA-approved pesticides. Mites cause economic losses from hide damage and reduced feed efficiency, but they do not affect the wholesomeness of meat.

IRS News

Dallas, Texas--Officials of the Internal Revenue Service's Dallas District office say that, so far in the 1976 filing season, the most common errors showing up on tax returns are those caused by a

misunderstanding of the \$30 tax credit for each personal exemption.
 "Apparently, many taxpayers are confusing the \$30 tax credit with the \$750 personal exemption deduction," A. W. McClesley, district director of the IRS for North Texas, said today. "They wind up thinking each personal exemption is worth one deduction of \$780."
 The two are not related, however. Mr. McClesley said that taxpayers should compute their tax liability in the normal manner before dealing with the \$30 tax credit. When the normal tax is computed, the taxpayer is then entitled to subtract \$30 from the total tax liability for each personal exemption claimed on the return. For example, a married couple with two children would claim four personal exemptions on a joint return and come up with a certain amount of tax due. They would then

subtract \$120, or \$30 for each exemption, from the tax due.
 "A deduction, such as the personal exemption, is a reduction of the income on which tax is figured," the tax official said. "A tax credit, on the other hand, is a dollar for dollar reduction of the actual amount of tax due."
 He also pointed out that, while extra exemptions are allowed for blind taxpayers and those over 65, these people do not receive extra tax credits.

The unborn baby is especially sensitive to the mother's health habits in the first month and a half of pregnancy, says The National Foundation-March of Dimes. Good personal health care before and during childbearing age is always important, the Foundation reminds.

General Telephone Customer Policy

General Telephone's customer policy explained. Paul Farrar, Perryton Customer Service Manager for General Telephone, today explained the company's deposit policy as "a protection of revenues" and an obligation the company has to customers.
 He explained that control of bad pay accounts protects the majority of customers who are good credit risks since the cost of uncollectibles eventually becomes a cost of doing business.
 Farrar said an applicant is considered a good credit risk when ability and willingness to pay for services are shown.
 The service manager said customers requesting service are assigned a credit classification based on a company investigation. The investigation normally reveals present or previous telephone service and record of payments. Business applicants usually indicate the type of organization, years in business and product or services offered. Residential customers provided information concerning employment including both husband and wife where applicable.
 He added that some deposits on file are required because the applicant has not had previous telephone service, has not had previous credit experience, employment is seasonal or temporary, applicant is new on the job, or is unable to give references.

He said the company basically has five credit classifications. The first is assigned to an account when special treatment is desired. This includes government offices, large business, community offices such as chambers of commerce and hospitals.
 The second class is assigned to good paying customers.
 The third class includes applicants whose credit records reveal inability or unwillingness to pay regularly, insufficient information to assign a classification or no investigation can be made.
 The fourth class is assigned to high risk accounts. Some accounts in this group receive semimonthly billing in addition to the deposit requirement.
 In addition, there is a fifth class established by a policy that is of particular interest around election time. It is the policy issued in 1971 by the Federal Communica-

tions Commission as a result of the 1968 political campaigns which left telephone companies throughout the nation with unpaid and uncollectible bills for telephone service provided national candidates. The policy assures equal treatment to all candidates and requires adequate se-

curity for services provided political candidates.
 Farrar emphasized that these are company guidelines, but there is a judgment factor involved in evaluating each applicant with the end result always the desire to protect all customers.
Local Families Heavily Insured
 A sign of the times, for the average Hansford County family, is the extent to which it has protected itself against the economic uncertainties of the day.
 It has health insurance, accident insurance, unemployment insurance, social security and life insurance, to mention the major safeguards. Backing these up are such assets as private pension plans, savings and equity in real estate.
 With respect to its life insurance protection, it is more heavily covered at the present time than it has ever been. Over the past ten years the average local family has doubled its holdings, the figures indicate.
 This is so despite the fact that 1975 was a no-growth year generally, as far as sales of life insurance were concerned. It was the first time in 25 years that there was virtually no gain. Economic conditions are cited as the cause.
 Nevertheless, there is a tremendous amount of insurance in force in the United States -- \$2 trillion, according to the Institute of Life Insurance.
 On the basis of its findings, it is estimated that residents of Hansford County are now insured to the tune of approximately \$64,324,000, an all-time high.
 Throughout the State of Texas, the total in force is placed at \$111,534 million. Ten years before, by way of comparison it was \$39,421 million.
 And this, it is noted, is exclusive of insurance provided for veterans and others by the Federal government.
 In terms of the individual family, the extent of its coverage is almost directly proportional to its income, the figures show. In general, the more a family earns the more insurance it has.
 The average family in the state carries an amount of insurance that is equal to about 25.1 months of its net income, after taxes.
 Applied to Hansford County and to the average level of income locally, ownership of life insurance in the area comes to approximately \$27,850 per family. That is considerably more than in many communities across the country.
 Throughout the United States, the average is \$26,500 per family. It is \$26,400 in the State of Texas.
 Ordinary insurance is the type most people own. Some 51 percent is in this kind. Group insurance is next, with 42 percent.

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DPS Investigates 2 Accidents

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated two accidents on rural highways in Hansford County during the month of December, 1975, according to Sergeant C. E. Henderson, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.
 These crashes resulted in no persons killed and no persons injured.
 The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first 12 months of 1975 shows a total of 42 accidents resulting in no persons killed and 25 persons injured.
 The rural traffic accident summary for the 60 counties of the Lubbock Department of Public Safety Region for December, 1975, shows a total of 534 accidents resulting in 22 persons killed and 325 persons injured, as compared to December, 1974, with 598 accidents resulting in 11 persons killed and 340 persons injured. This was 64 less accidents, 11 more killed, and 15 less injured in 1975 at the same period of time.
 The traffic deaths for the month of December, 1975, occurred in the following counties: Four in Parker; three in Hardeman; two in Lubbock; and one each in Bailey, Dickens, Hockley, Jack, Montague, Palo Pinto, Wise, Young, Gray, Ochiltree, Farmer, Potter, and Wheeler.
