


Officials and members of the Hansford County Chapter of the American Red Cross attending the regional conference on Friday of last week were:

All of the money raised in Hansford county goes to the national campaign. This is one of the few counties that has no local activities to be deducted from the proceeds.

Many counties have set up budgets of \$2 to \$4 per inhabitant, but Hansford county folks will be asked to give only about 75 cents each on the average. However small contributions can never put over any worthwhile project.

So. Hansford county should give on the basis that the citizens have been blessed materially. Dozens of persons can give 1 per cent or \$21.50 of the amount neded : others can give several times that. Some persons may not be able to give over 50 cents or a dollar. The big thing is for every on to be liberal in proportion to his or her ability.

# HOW TO GET MORE LIGHT FROM YOUR PRESENT EQUIPMENT



# **Shade Bare Bulbs**

Glare from bare bulbs wastes light by making the pupils of the eye contract-like facing bright headlights at night. When contracted the pupils admit less light, hence make seeing more difficult. Reflected glare is just as harmful as direct glare, causing squinting and blinking which indicate eyestrain. The cure is to equip bare bulbs with shades or diffusing bowls to break up harsh direct rays of light ... provide restful, eyeeasy illumination.

## OTHER WAYS TO CONSERVE LIGHT

4. Avoid direct glare from lamp 1. Remove and clean lamp bulb and lamp bowls regularly. Dry bulbs by using shades deep thoroughly before using again. enough and wide enough.

2. Keep shade linings light. Clean or brush regularly. Repaint or reline dark-colored paper or parchment shades.

After the volley the officer responsible will, on orders from the attending medical officer, fire a final shot into the body of each with a regulation pistol. Death is to be certified by the medical officer.





