

Happy 90th Birthday, Mrs. Brandt



Mrs. Fred (Jewelle) Brandt was the honoree this week at two parties celebrating her 90th birthday. She is a long-time resident of Hansford County moving here in 1913.

Belying her years is a sparkling, vibrant 104 pound bundle of humanity by the name of Mrs. Fred (Jewelle) Brandt of Spearman who noted her 90th birthday Wednesday, 17 December.

This delightful person has seen much, done almost as much during her lifetime, and has maintained a sweet, loveable disposition throughout her nine decades in this old world, which is better by far for her having been here. She was born in Chapel Hill, Texas (which she noted is way down south between Houston and Austin), the former Jewelle Justice. She has served humanity well by being a teacher, wife, mother and loveable citizen wherever she has been. Her teaching experience began in a one room school and she mentioned that she had taught in east Texas, west Texas, south Texas, and finally wound up in north Texas!

She married Fred Brandt 18 October 1913 at Chapel Hill and came with him to a home in Old Hansford where Mr. Brandt managed the P. M. Maize General Drygoods Store. Later their home was moved to Spearman and stands now at 222 South Haney where Mrs. Brandt still resides.

She could keep one fascinated for hours with her stories of early Hansford days for she has many, many fond memories of her lifetime of activities.

She and Mr. Brandt had a family of three, the late Mrs. D. A. (Mary) Jackson; a son, the late Billy Brandt; and a daughter Mrs. Bill ("Baby" Jewel) Kenyon who lives now in Portales, New Mexico.

The Brandts moved from Old Hansford to Spearman when Mr. Maize moved his store here in 1919 with the Brandts buying the mercantile in 1929, operating the store for many years on the corner of Main and Hancock, serving the area residents well as the Brandt General Dry Goods Store. Mrs. Brandt said they had a stock of "some of everything" -- groceries, shoes, hardware, clothing, yard goods, and just about anything and everything anyone needed!

Mrs. Brandt is justly proud of the fact that she has been a member of the Baptist Church for seventy-two years, having joined the Baptist Church in Chapel Hill when she was a young girl of 18 years. She was one of the first members

of the Spearman Baptist Church and has maintained her membership here for 55 years.

When asked if she had a formula for living so fully for 90 years, Mrs. Brandt hastened to say that her age was a mere nothing compared to her sister's, Mrs. F. C. (Mamie) McCorkle of Tyler, who has Jewelle beated by several years, already being 98 years and nine months young. Mrs. Brandt confided that she was planning on flying down to visit her sister on the occasion of her one hundredth birthday (if not before!)... by the way, she loves that flying bit but misses being able to see things along the way!

Several parties have feted Mrs. Brandt on this, the occasion of her 90th birthday, including a special dinner given Sunday by the young people of the Baptist Church for the Senior Citizens and a birthday party in her honor Tuesday afternoon at the home of Mrs. Luke Stewart.

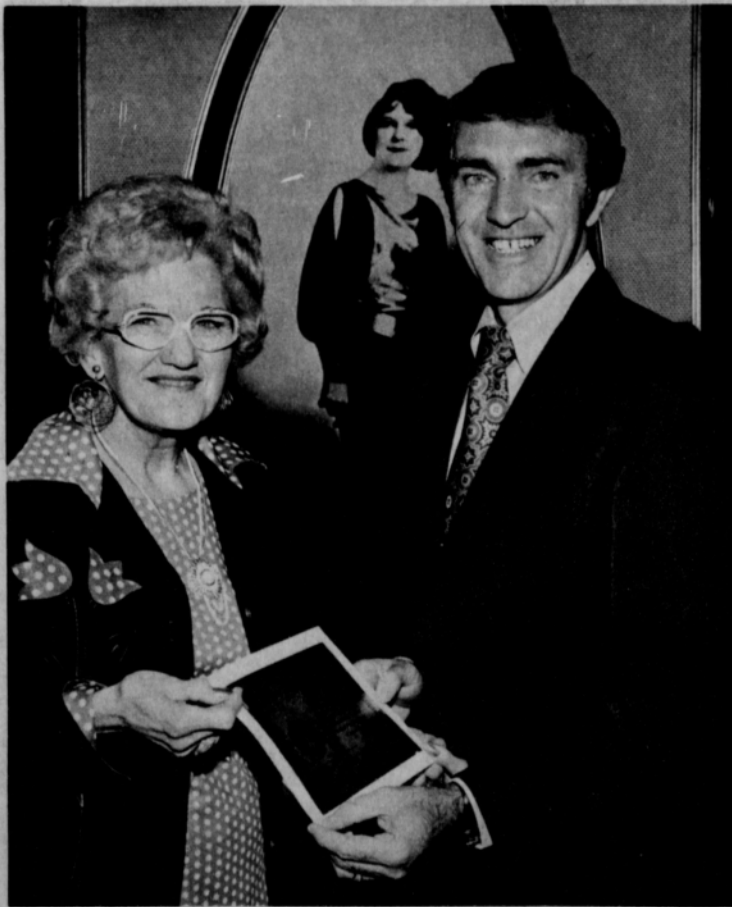

Lynxette B team wins

The Spearman Lynxettes B-Team avenged an earlier loss to the Canyon B-Team by upsetting the Canyon Eaglettes in Lynx gym Tuesday night. The Lynxettes who lost to Canyon at Canyon 47-38 back in November trailed only once in the game and that was at the end of the first quarter 10-8. The game was played in front of a good home crowd as they saw their B-Team upset one of the most powerful B-Teams in the Texas Panhandle.

Trailing by two points to start the second quarter the B-Team behind the shooting of Christy Collier who scored 11 points in the second quarter and 7 of those points on free throws the Lynxettes fought to a 22-22 halftime score.

In the third quarter with the Eaglettes stopping Christy Collier another freshman 5'9" Tracie Keetch scored 12 of the team's 18 third quarter points the Spearman Lynxettes B-Team took the lead and from that point on in the ball game the B-Team was never behind again. Though the Canyon B-Team played with good intensity the third quarter ended with the Spearman B-Team on top by the score of 33-34.

The Spearman Lynx demoralized the visiting Canadian Wildcats here Tuesday night in Lynx gym as they set a new scoring record for the high school as well as the most points scored in Lynx gym scoring 108 points while holding Canadian to 66. The game was never in doubt as the Lynx controlled both ends of the court as the Wildcats never got within 18 points of the Lynx.

The Century mark was broken at 5:35 in the fourth quarter as Raymie Porter rebounded a missed free throw and Randy Reid sank a tum-around jump shot to put the lead at 101-61. The game, played before a good home crowd, cheered the Lynx on and on as they kept increasing their lead.

The first quarter saw the Lynx jump to a 8-0 lead before Richard Reeves made the first two points for the Wildcats. From that point on, the Lynx scored at will as they jumped to a comm-

ending lead at the end of the first quarter by the score of 24-6. Leading the Lynx in scoring the first quarter was 6'3" Senior, David Steele, as he had 8 points the first quarter on four field goals. and Roger Jones who had 6 points the first quarter on three field goals. Leading scorer for the Wildcats was three players with 2 points each.

The second quarter was much different than the first quarter for the Canadian Wildcats as they scored 26 points in the second quarter with 12 of those points coming from Kevin Wilson, a 5'7" Senior, as he made 12 of 13 chances from the free throw line. The Lynx, on the other hand scored 30 points in the second quarter, thanks to the shooting of Roger Jones who had 14 points and Leon Hagerman who scored 6 to lead the Lynx in scoring the second quarter. The Lynx went to the dressing room at halftime leading by 22 points, 54-32. The Wildcats were hurt time and again when their shots fell short and Spearman came down on a 2 on 1 fast break and converted them into easy scores.

The third quarter saw the Lynx turn the game into a rout as they scored 10 points in the third quarter before Canadian could score. The Lynx opened leads of 30 points midway through the third period as the Lynx could do no wrong as they scored at will, and if they missed, they usually had people in right spots to put the ball back up for two points. The Lynx defense held the Canadian team to only 13 points in the third quarter while scoring themselves, 25, to lead at the end of the third quarter 79-45. Leading the Lynx in scoring in the third quarter was Roger Jones with 8 points and Paul Comegys who came off the bench and scored 7 points and brought in 5 rebounds. Leading the Wildcat team

in scoring on the third quarter was Kevin Wilson with 9 points.

The fourth quarter saw the only question for Spearman all night. Would they hit the magic Century mark? Leading by 34 points to start the fourth quarter, the Lynx offense scored 29 points in the fourth quarter while the Canadian Wildcat team scored 21. With 5:35 left in the game and the score at 99-61, Randy Reid was fouled, and the Spearman crowd that had been yelling all night long, became deathly silent and the 5'8" Soph. missed both of his shots, but on the second one Raymie Porter rebounded and made a tum-around jump shot to break the century mark at 101. David Lesley added a free throw while Twain Freimel, Raymie Porter and Leon Hagerman each added one basket apiece, to stop the scoring at 108-66. Leading scorer for the Lynx in the fourth quarter was Leon Hagerman with 7 points followed by Roger Jones, Randy Reid, Raymie Porter each with 6 points apiece. Leading scorer for the Wildcats in the fourth period was Jesse Miller who had 6 points followed by Mike Schafer, Gary Hutchinson, Dewayne Armstrong each with 3 points. Kevin Wilson tallied 4 points in the last quarter.

The Canadian Wildcat team from the opening tip-off was out-matched with the Lynx as the tallest player on the team, also is a starter, is Terry Charminsen a 6'0" Junior. Also hurting the Wildcat team last night was the fact when they got inside, they either lost the ball on turnovers or shot the ball too short while making some costly mistakes and fouls.

The next game for the Spearman Lynx is in the Shamrock Tournament. The Lynx are seeded No.1 in the boy's division and

play Wheeler the first round. This was the first win for the Lynx this season and only the third ball game of the year. This was Canadian's 10th game of the year and their record drops to 2-8. Their next game is against the Sunray Bobcats the 19th of this month.

Spearman teams seeded No. 1!

Spearman boys and girls are top seeded in Classic tournament at Shamrock.

The Spearman Lynx and Lynxettes will journey to Shamrock this week-end to play in the big Shamrock Classic basketball tourney. A complete bracket and times of games are in this paper, and a complete story on all of the teams in the tourney, is included in the exclusive write-up in this Thursday's paper.

Spearman and Erick, Oklahoma girls have been seeded number 1 and 2, in the Girls Bracket. The Spearman boys and Quail boys have been seeded 1 and 2 in the boys bracket.

Both of these top seeded teams, from Spearman will open play in the big tourney Thursday afternoon!

The complete tournament round-up is printed below.

QUAIL QUAILS

The Quail Quails, coached by Bill Wilson, return five players with starting experience off a 20-14 club and that went 6-4 in district and finished third and are the favorites to win the District 4-B championship in 1975-1976. They are also seeded No. 2 behind Spearman Boys in the Shamrock Tournament.

Leading the list of returning players are 6'1" Senior Gary Wischkaemper, with an easy set shot that netted him 18 points a game last year; 6'0" Senior Johnny Needham, who hit 14 points a ball game; and Tommy Caldwell, another 6'0" Senior who averaged 15 points a game.

David Russell, a 5'9 1/2" guard who hit nine points, and part-time starter Harvey Oatman, 6'0" who managed four points, complete the five veterans back.

One of Coach Wilson's qualities is teamwork, and these five players have become unselfish masters of the teamwork strategy. Coach Wilson's club is loaded with good outside shooters, the Quails will have better-than-average overall height and they are competitive.

With these qualities and a break or two, the Quail of Coach Wilson could capture their district title for the first time since 1972, but ever-present Hedley and balanced Valley must be dealt with.

Players to watch: Brian Barton, David Russell, Harvey Oatman.

QUAIL BOBWHITES (GIRLS)

The Quail girls, missing their two graduated scoring mainstays, face a massive rebuilding year on the forward end, and only if they are successful will the Bobwhites be able to put together a winning season.

Gone are Lenora Oatman and Debra Culpepper who averaged 33 and 20 points respectively. Miss Oatman started for four years and Miss Culpepper started for three years.

Six letterman return, led by guard-forward Sharon Childers a 5'8" Senior who is a three-year letter winner, and two-year letterman Kathy Guthrie a 5'6 1/2" Junior, who is a two-way performer.

Three sophomores-forwards Melissa Guthrie a 5'8 1/2" Sophomore, Cressie Torrez a 4'11" Sophomore and guard Karen Caldwell, 5'2", own letters as does junior forward Rita Fielding, 5'6".

Three other underclassmen-freshmen Donna Langley and LeAnn Marcum and sophomore Mary Pendergraft also figure in Coach Wilson's plans.

If the Bobwhites can overcome their youthfulness and replace their graduated scoring punch, they could make 1975-1976 more than just a rebuilding year.

Players to watch: Sharon Childers, Kathy Guthrie, and Karen Caldwell.

WHEELER MUSTANGS

The Wheeler Mustangs, coached by Bill Wiggins, return four starters, all over 6'0", of a 16-10 mark with a team that finished third in District 2-A last year. With this many returning starters Wheeler can look forward to an even brighter season this year.

Coach Bill Wiggins begins his seventh season as head Mustang mentor, but it's been 18 years since Wheeler's boys have won a district championship.

Von Chapman, a 6'0" Senior, Jim Verden, a 6'3" Junior and Robert Wills a 6'0" Senior are returning starters, and carried scoring averages of 10 and nine points, respectively last season. Danny Helton, a 6'0" Senior, is the fourth expected starter back, along with returning letterman Bill McIlhany, a 5'10" Senior, Billy McWhorter a 6'1" Senior and David Massick a 6'0" Junior, who each saw some variety action last season.

Players to watch: Robert Wills, Danny Helton, Von Chapman, and Jim Verden.

WHEELER MUSTANGETTES

With returning experience on both sides, the Mustangettes, with early-season improvement, could have a promising season, but vacancies due to graduation must be filled.

High-scoring Janice Verden and forward Susan Richardson must be replaced along with guard Dana Thomas off last season's 10-14 team that finished fourth in the tough District 2-A loop.

Second-year coach John Copeland returns four starters, however, two on each end.

Junior forward Anne McIlhany a 5'9" Junior, who hit 15 points a game last season, returns as does 5'10" forward Nat Timmons, who missed most of last season with a knee injury. Miss Timmons, also is on the 1975-1976 All-State Honor Roll.

At guards, Shonda Johnson, a 5'9" Senior and Darla Moore, a 5'7" Junior, will be back with starting experience.

Players to watch: Nat Timmons, Anne McIlhany, Shonda Johnson, Darla Moore and Teresa Hefley.

MEMPHIS CYCLONES (BOYS)

The Memphis Cyclones, who are coached by Bill Montgomery, return 4 starters off of a team that finished in third place in District 2-A and finished with an overall record of 12-7.

Back with starting experience are 6'1" forward Daryl Smith, 6'4" Ricky Spruill, 5'11" forward Ricky Miller, and 5'11" forward Glenn Johnson.

Smith averaged 18 points a game, Spruill nine at guard, Miller eight and Johnson 7.8. All should join three other returning lettermen to give the Cyclones strength.

Charles Bryley, a 5'8" senior, and Steve Flemmons 6'0"

are lettermen who scored four points a game last season, while 5'11" Ricky Woodard hit for three.

The Cyclones have 6 seniors on the squad with all of them starting at one time or another. The tallest player for the Cyclones is 6'5" Sophomore Ricky Guy.

Impressive quickness and returning experience have forecasted a bright future for Coach Montgomery and his Cyclones.

The Cyclones are picked this year to finish third again in their district with Wellington and Claude being No. 1 & 2.

MEMPHIS CYCLONES (GIRLS)

The Memphis girls, coached by second year head coach Bill Montgomery has a rebuilding job on his hands this season as four starters off of a 22-4 team graduated.

The biggest job of rebuilding appears to be on the guard end. Two starters - Faye Beck a Sophomore and Jana Davis a Junior - return at forward. Melba Walker also starts at forward. Also give a shot at starting a forward is Jane Richardson, a sophomore, who played last year on the junior varsity.

For the guard spots Coach Montgomery will be looking

at Alfreda Walker, Zetta Austin and Viola Henderson, all capable of starting.

The players to watch for the Cyclonettes are Faye Beck, Melba Walker and Jana Davis.

The Cyclonettes who lost only to Claude in district play last year face a rebuilding year especially on the guard end if they are to challenge for the District 2-A title this season.

HEDLEY OWLS

Seeking a fifth straight District 4-B playoff berth, Hedley returns three members off a team which compiled a 31-6 record en route to a loss in the regional quarterfinals to District 1-B's Channing, who was the eventual regional runnerup.

Fourth year coach Troy Lemery, must replace All-Staters Dan Bolin and Terry Collins, and all-district championship teams and the 1974 Owl team that reached the state semi-finals.

But Coach Lemley, still returns good height and strength in 6'4" Senior Kelly Rieken and 6'1" Junior Ricky Bolin, both starters in every Owl contest last season while contributing eight and 10 points, respectively.

Also back is 6'1" Junior Stuart Messer, who finished the season as a starter and averaged six points an outing.

Three more lettermen are in the ranks for a starting position this season - 5'10" Junior John Lemley, who added four points a game; 5'9" Soph. Mike Parnell, and Bob White a 6'0" Soph., who each scored three points a game for the Owls last season.

Many times the guards for Spearman would drive the baseline and have a easy 5-footer but Miss Smith would either be there to block the shot or distract enough attention of the shooter to make Spearman shoot at a higher ark and miss the shot or have the ball roll around and fall out. In the first quarter the Lynxettes scored 14 points, and were led by Shelly Schumann and Janyth Lackey each with 5 points and Carla Harper with 4 points. The Wildcats were led by Miss Williams who scored 13 of her team's 17 points in the first quarter with Kristi Berry and Cristy Cullender each scoring 2 points apiece. The quarter ended with the score 17-14 in favor of Canadian.

The second quarter saw the Lynxettes still unable to go inside with any consistency and the Wildcats allowed Shelly Schumann only 2 points in the second quarter and this hurt the Lynxettes but at the same time Spearman had plenty of chances to make a comeback but the lack of inside scoring and the inability to hit the free throws hurt them all through the second quarter alone

the Lynxettes went to the free throw line 11 times and could only connect on 4 of these.

On the other hand the Canadian Wildcats were hitting from everywhere as Kristi Berry who had only scored 2 points in the first quarter erupted in the second quarter with 14 points as most of her set shots came from the top of the circle. Miss Williams scored 9 points in the second quarter with 5 of these points coming on free throws, as she went to the line 9 times and connected on 5 of these. Of the 23 points that were scored in the second quarter by the Wildcats Miss Berry and Williams had 21 of them. The Lynxettes went into the locker room at halftime trailing by 14 points 40-26.

The third quarter was the only quarter that the Wildcats did not score in double figures as they scored only 7 points. Teresa Williams again led Canadian with 6 of the 7 points with 4 of the points coming off free throws. The third quarter ended with the Lynxettes trailing the Wildcats by 11 points, 47-36.

The fourth quarter saw the Canadian team keep their lead and making the Lynxettes come after the ball. The Wildcats scored 17 in the third quarter and again were led by Teresa Williams who had 12 of the 17 points scored and 8 of those points were on free throws. The Lynxettes only scored 15 points in the fourth quarter as Shelly Schumann led the Lynxettes in the fourth quarter with 7 points. The Lynxettes shot only three free throws in the fourth quarter and 19 for the game while making 9. The final score ended with the Canadian Wildcats on top 64-51.

The next game for the Lynxettes is the Shamrock Tournament where they are seeded No. 1 and will play Wheeler.

ROSE CARE--A little extra care of rose bushes can bring a season of beautiful blooms, says a landscape horticulturist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Prune roses now before active growth starts. Cut off any insect damaged or diseased canes and leave about five vigorous canes 18-24 inches tall for Hybrid Tea varieties, cut back one-fourth of the plant for small blooms, cut back about one-half for medium blooms, and prune back about three-fourths of the plant for exhibition-size roses. Prune rambling and climbing roses after they bloom. Apply an asphalt would dressing or caulking compound to all pruning cuts.
