CITY LOOKING FOR NEW MANAGER The city council in a special called meeting Monday evening discharged Ed Thompson as city manager effective Dec. 29.
An executive session was held to discuss the termination of the employment of Mr. Thompson.
Following the executive session a motion was made by James Jackson and seconded by Troy Sloan to terminate the city manager's employment. Jackson, Sloan and Jim Nicholson voted for the termination. Alton Ellsworth voted no and Richard Holton abstained.
The city manager has two weeks vacation coming and will be paid for this time which will bring his termination date effective Dec. 29, 1975.
