Joseph Howard Kudka, fouryear-old child of the grief-stricken parents, escaped unharmed.







So the extra fat from the drippings is delicious for gravy or sauce, meat or vegetables dishes or even for the crust of a meat pie, but not for cake or cookies.

Roast the bird in an oven that is moderate or even slow during the entire cooking period not only to save cooking losses but also to keep the fat from being spoiled by overheating. The larger the bird, the longer it must cook and the slower the oven outside before the inside is done.




