The quartet of snowsuits pictured above will insure a "warm and dry" forecast for active youngsters no matter what the thermometer and barometer say. Little boy in right photo wears three-piece that comes in camel. Copenhagen blue and brown. The girl's comes in camel with Alpine blue trim, in the reverse of this and in camel with flame trim. Both outfits are cotton. backed wool and rayon blend fabric, treated with invisible water_repellent finish. In the other photo, above, Little Sister wears a jacket and hood of water-repellent cotton poplin and pants made of 50-50 blend of wool and cotton. Outfits comes wth red jacket and navy pants or powder blue with wine. Older girl's suit is water-repellent cotton gabardine, with furedged hood attached to the jacket. Colors are all-Copenhagen or red jacket with navy pants.

It won't be long now before the snowdrifts pile high and your youngsters will be wanting to romp outdoors all the day long, in spite of the weather, and if they are dressed warmly in snowsuits which will keep them dry, it's good and healthful for them.

Mothers will be glad to know that the fabrics of many of this year's snowsuits of tweed, fleece, gabardine and poplin have been processed to shed rain snow and sleet, so that they no longer have to worry about little Mary and Junior getting themselves soaked to the skin and catching cold.

The double-duty treatment, say fabric experts, also helps these clothes to keep their shape and retain their look of newness in spite of the hard wear given the elbows, knees and cuffs.

One treated jacket, which is bound to make a hit with the female small fry this year, is of powder blue cotton poplin with garlands of bright-colored flowers appliqued down either side of the front closing. Tight-fitting knitted cuffs of wine-colored wool, to match the wool and cotton ski pants, keep the winds from whistling up the sleeves. There is a little flower-trimmed bonnet of the jacket fabric which fits down well over the ears and ties snugly under the chir

Some snowsuits come with eskimo-like fur-edged hoods attached to the jackets. One of the gayest of these has a hip-length Copenhagen blue cotton gabardine belted jacket and bright red gabardine which were shown tucked into fur-trimmed boots to match the furred hood. The protective finish, the stylist assures, is easily renewed at little cost each time the suit is dry cleaned

Another type of water-repellent finish has the added feature of resisting spots. Non-oily ones, that is. And repeated washing or dry cleaning won't spoil the effect of the finish. It is featured in one front reversible jacket of RAF blue cotton poplin with drawstring parka hood. The navy blue wool pants shown with it had a play. The fly-front reversible double thickness of material at the knees for youngsters who always give their clothes extra hard wear.
