

Maybe You Will Earn A Refund On Income Tax

Having trouble with that Income Tax return? Cheer up-maybe you'll get a refund, as did thousands of individuals and corporations whose names were reported to Congress today by the Treasury

During the 12 months ended last June 30, almost \$57,000,000 was returned to taxpayers for taxes erroneously collected. And that's only a drop in the bucket compared with what the department expects to have to refund this year and next year.

Estimated refunds for the current fiscal year are \$386,170,000. while for 1945 they are expected to reach \$781,620,000, the increase being due mainly to the larger number of taxpayers and the withholding provisions of the new tax

Hundreds of taxpayers in every state received refunds last year, so many, in fact, that the Treasurvy's report to the House Committee on expenditures in executive departments listed only those who received \$500 or more. The bulk of the refunds were

fdr over-assessments of income taxes, with excise overcharges on distilled spirits, employment, estate and gift, and tobacco next in

The biggest refund went to the Ford Motor Company, Dearborn, Mich., \$3,549,958.90.
