## Not Official But Hansford Lads Did Report

Due to the fact that we have some real patriotic Americans in charge of government bureaus here in Hansford county, the Reporter is unable to give the public any official information about the contingent of Hansford county men who reported to Lubbock last week for pre induction physical examination.

The government has made rules concerning news releases and here in this county officials who are in charge of the local induction office, intends observing these rules. Apparently the rules are grossly disregarded all over the nation, since most papers come out with a complete list of the men who take the physical test together with the branch of the service they will report to when and if they report. Just as a matter of curiosity this editor checked six exchanges and found that each one had a complete list of those who were reporting for the physical examination. Doubtless they did not publish official information, and were just familiar with the facts from news that could be picked up on the streets.

While this is not official, and cannot be taken for the truth, this writer can state that nineteen men from Hansford county got on the bus at Spearman last Tuesday a week ago to journey to Lubbock to take the pre induction physical examination. Practically every one in Hansford county knows this fact, so we figure we are not helping the enemy. The main reason we wanted to divulge these staggering facts is to brag about Hansford county. ### SPEARMAN MAN IS HONOR GRADUATE

U. S. NAVAL AIR STATION, Jacksonville, Fla., Feb. 29.—Aviation Machinist's Mate 3rd class Arthur M. Adair, of Spearman, Texas, was one of ten men to receive the personal commendation of his commanding officer for excellence in his studies during a course in aerial gunnery and is now assigned to an aviation training squadron for final operational gunnery training.

SURFACE OF TONGUE IS AID IN DIAGNOSING ILLNESS

By MARY BEARD Director, Nursing Service American Red Cross

The doctor nearly always asks to see the patient's tongue. It really gives him a good deal of information that need not be classed as gossip.

Considering how hard the tongue of the average person works in health, it is not surprising that it is one of the first organs of the body to show the effect of illness. A little digestive disturbance and it becomes covered with a white or yellowish coating. Or it may become a vivid red and have a raw appearance. When fever is present it becomes dry and brown or it may break into deep cracks that become very painful.

In some diseases there are characteristic spots on it that assist the doctor materially in making a diagnosis. Although he looks to the tongue for a clue to the nature of the illness, it is also a good index to the quality of nursing care that the patient is receiving.

Salt for Mouth Wash In illness the mouth should be cleaned after each meal or feeding. If the patient is not able to do this himself, the home nurse should clean the teeth, gums and tongue with swabs of cotton wound on a small clean stick. Unless the doctor prescribes a special mouthwash, plain salt water (a teaspoonful of salt to a pint of water) is highly acceptable.

Water should be given frequently to help keep the mouth and tongue moist. If the taste of water is repellent, as it sometimes is, a few drops of lemon juice may be added.

When lack of mouth secretions makes the tongue especially dry, try placing a drop or two of equal parts of glycerine and lemon juice on it at intervals. This is an old-fashioned treatment that has stood the test for year, and is usually considered refreshing by both adults and children.

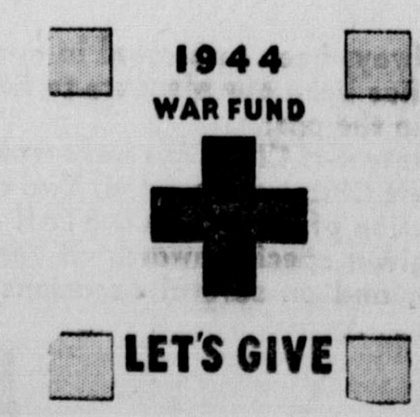

#### STITCH-IN-TIME WILL ADD WEEKS TO CORSET WEAR

By ALICIA HART

First aid for corsets — a war-time course that's good to know — is a stitch in time as a garter rip, a hook loosens, an eye dangles or a seam pops. These efficient repairs will extend the life expectancy of your little two-way stretch, which also stays with you longer, if you'll make replacements — keep spare parts in your sewing box — as often as they are needed.

Next time you buy a garment, buy two. It's good economy. While you are wearing one for a few days at a stretch, the other can take a rest, a practice which prolongs life of elastic. Buy war-time girdles a little larger than those that you used to squeeze into, which, because they were perhaps more plentifully supplied with elastic, could take more strain.

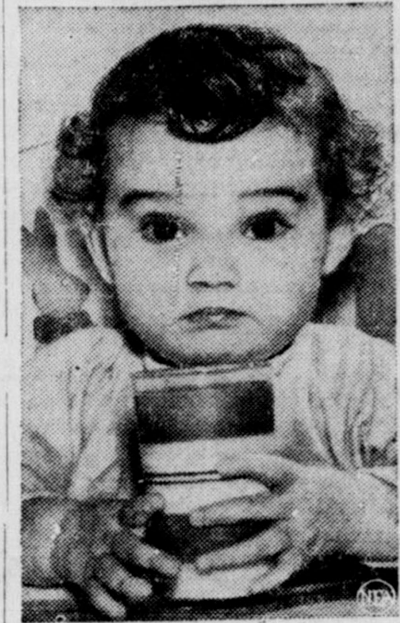
Washing your corset often also extends its life. Body acids, oils, and talc combine to cause fatalities. In laundering it, float your garment in good but gentle suds and scrub it inside and out with a soft bristled brush. Hand rubbing and twisting often bend a corset's bones and stretch the foundation out of shape. To extract drabbiness after it's washed, roll it in a towel and knead out moisture with your knuckles. Fold through middle on hanger and dry in a cool spot.

### WELL-LOVED CHILDREN MAKE MOST RAPID PROGRESS, SCIENTIST FINDS

Don't be afraid of being called an old-fashioned mother. Don't restrain yourself from kissing your child, hugging him, showing him with praises, showing him what affection you feel for him, if you want him to be a completely normal child.

This is the advice, not of an old aunt who raised her children down on the farm 50 years ago, but of a progressive psychiatrist and research fellow for the National Committee for Mental Hygiene, Dr. Margaret A. Ribble, who has made a study of hundreds of babies and their parents.



Dr. Ribble has put her findings into book form, which she calls "The Rights of Infants." In explaining the title, she says, "Most babies' books deal almost exclusively with such matters as nutrition, fresh air and sunshine, immunization and daily routine. Distracted young mothers, who have given earnest attention to watching the clock instead of the child, sometimes treat the baby as if his mental and physical insides were run on the same principle as the clock."

But Dr. Ribble, through her studies, has found that those babies who do not have consistent mothering grow up less well equipped for later life than those who do. She calls the separation of a mother from her infant absolutely damaging to the mental security of a child. And she thinks that working mothers have no right to plan to return to their jobs soon after the baby is born.

"It is interesting to note, from the close month-to-month development of babies whose mothers are emotionally detached or absorbed in social, professional or artistic pursuits, that such babies are apt to be retarded in either beginning to talk or beginning to walk or crawl. They are slower than those children whose mothers are not worrying about their careers," observes Dr. Ribble.

She feels that the same holds true for eating problems and other disturbances of the digestive system. Babies whose mothers leave them too early in life are apt to sleep too little, and then grow up to be hyperactive children who

are not well focused or adjusted. Then there are the modern young mothers who start out with a passion for standardization, she points out. "They want to follow whatever they have read in the most modern book on child welfare. Well, this is not right. In the first weeks of life, it is necessary for the mother to give close attention to the routine which suits her baby, for no two babies are alike, and the books are written along a certain planned line which doesn't take individual cases into account enough.

"Any arbitrary attempts to set up and maintain an artificial schedule on any basis other than spontaneous behavior, natural to the healthy baby, will be damaging to his development," Dr. Ribble warns.

Those mothers who must return to work after their baby is born will find it is better to start the infant on a bottle right away, she says, because nursing for the first three months is only for nutrition, while if the nursing keeps up after that time, a real mother-infant relationship is built up. However, if the infant starts out on the bottle, his relationship with his mother will be the same after the mother returns to work.

Feeding, bathing and all the details of physical care should be most certainly be studied by

mothers, Dr. Ribble agrees, but she warns that just as much attention must be paid to the psychological care of infants. Fondle your child, rock him to sleep, lavish affection on him. It won't spoil him, this baby authority insists, but will make him more fit for a normal adult life.

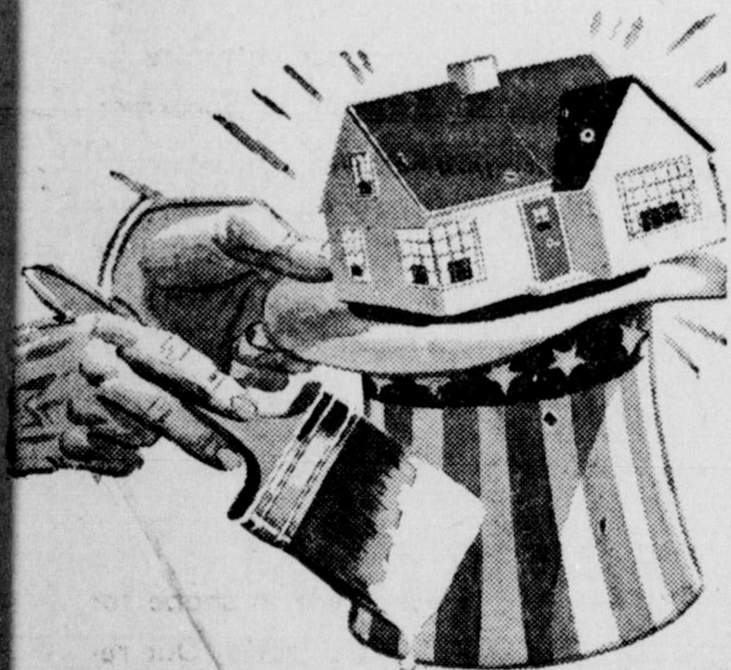

#### GELATIN DESSERTS GIVE MENU INEXPENSIVE ZEST

By GAYNOR MADDOX  
Here are two new gelatin desserts to add inexpensive surprise to your wartime meals.

#### Cocoa Pudding (Serves 4 to 6)

One envelope plain unflavored gelatin, 1-2 cup cold water, 2 cups warm milk, pinch of salt, 2 tablespoons cocoa, 3 tablespoons sugar, 1 teaspoon vanilla.

Soften gelatin in cold water. Mix cocoa, salt and sugar with a little milk to make a paste, then add to the warm milk and heat to boiling point. Remove from fire, add gelatin and vanilla, and stir until gelatin is dissolved. Pour into individual molds that have been rinsed out in cold water first, and chill. When ready to serve, unmold on dessert plates and serve with plain cream.

NOTE: If left-over cocoa is used, soften gelatin in 1-2 cup cold water, add to hot cocoa and stir until dissolved. Proceed as above. One stiffly beaten egg white may be added if desired.

#### Refrigerator Indian Pudding (Serves 4 to 6)

One envelope plain unflavored gelatin, 1-4 cup cold milk or water, 1 3-4 cups milk, 2 egg yolks, 3-4 cup cooked cereal (farina, oatmeal, corn meal, etc.), 1-4 cup molasses, 1-4 teaspoon ginger, 1-4 teaspoon cinnamon, 2 egg whites, 2 tablespoons sugar.

Soften gelatin in cold milk or water. Make a boiled custard with the 1 3-4 cups milk and egg yolks. Add softened gelatin and stir until dissolved. Blend molasses, cereal and spices. Stir in custard. Cool until mixture begins to set. Fold in stiffly beaten egg whites to which two tablespoons sugar has been added.
