High flying Eagles next game for Spearman Lynx! Mule Train Featured As Bi-Centennial Theme

The high flying Fritch Eagles will play host to the Spearman Lynx at Fritch Friday night. The Fritch Eagles boast 19 seniors on their roster this year, and they come off of a big win over the Guymon Tigers, at Guymon last week. On offense, the Eagles will start Mike McClellan at end 152 lbs.; Scott Richardson at QB, a big 177 lb. boy; Kenny Draper, Fullback, 190 lbs.; Guy Walton back, at 174 lbs.; Gaylon Anderson, FB 168 lbs.; Donnie Sperry, Tackle 210 lbs.; Kim Parker, Guard 173 lbs.; Ray Adams, Tackle 186; Terry Summers, End, 180;

The Eagles offensive unit started 8 of these boys on offense last year, and every man on the starting unit are seniors except Junior Gaylon Anderson. The Fritch Eagles will boast the most experienced and possibly the "classiest" team to play against the Lynx this year thus far!

The Lynx, in the meantime, played their "best" game of the year before a record homecoming crowd at Lynx Stadium Friday night.

It would be impossible to pick an outstanding player for the evening; we must mention the blocking of senior Mark Fox, however, as he was sensational on some of his offensive blocking assignments. Bo De-Armond and Roger Jones were up to their usual top performances, along with all-stater Terril Evans, and on the speciality teams, Reneau and Snider played very well. Spearman jumped into a 20 point lead with 1:26 still left in the first quarter Friday night, and this looked like one of Greg Sherwoods finest evenings as the Rattlers just couldn't get anything going, despite having a fine team, and they were a "great" bunch of kids; we feel that the Rattlers will make a "good show" in the tough I-A District this year.

In the meantime, the "game of a lifetime" is shaping up at Blackhawk Stadium when the Lynx and Hawke meet; but as one fan said, we have to get by Dalhart some way! And, the wolves will be tough. Some fans think Fritch will be the toughest regular

season game of the season for the Lynx!

The Spearman team didn't have any bad injuries at the game Friday night. It is thought that Hargis will be in better shape for the game Friday night, as he is still having trouble with his knee.

Probably the "most perfect" pass play of the season was watched by the record crowd Friday night, when Steele hit Beedy for a 52 yard touchdown pass. Beedy was running at full speed, caught the ball on the 22 and raced into the end zone! It was perfect in every detail.

Contract Let

The State Highway and Public Transportation Commission has awarded a \$418,165 contract to Cooper and Woodruff Inc. of Amarillo for construction on the first phase of a new highway-State 51-- in Hansford County.

The contract calls for construction of a two-lane highway on what is now a graded, dirt, county-maintained road near the Hansford-Hutchinson County line in the southeast portion of Hansford County.

The new highway will extend from where the dirt road intersects State 207 about eight miles south of Spearman eastward 5.7 miles to the junction of Farm to Market Roads 281 and 760.

Lewis R. "Timer" Loyd, department resident engineer at Perryton, will supervise the project that will take an estimated 7 1/2 months to complete.

A continuous highway system that crosses the northern Panhandle from the Oklahoma state line near Higgins westward to Dalhart ties in with the new section of State 51. The network, on U. S. 60, U. S. 83, State 207 and FM 281, may eventually be co-designated State 51 as an aid to the traveling public.

ment, the cameramen began all over again taking pictures and giving orders to the staff of walke talkie boys they had in the wagon for the episode. Then they spent 7 hrs. & 600 ft. of film shooting pictures along the trail.

About sundown the cameramen satisfied with the days work & pictures, all were served a bountiful dinner at the country home of Mr. & Mrs. Gordon Green, Turpine, Oklahoma.

Now a movie film company is wanting to film a movie of 8 of your wagons drawn by mules. This is only in planning stage, since several members are very busy preparing for the Bi-Centennial Trek by wagon to Philadelphia.

Assessor Reminds Voters To Register

"Voters in Hansford County only have until October 4 to register if they want to vote in the November 4 election which will include a statewide decision on the proposed new Texas constitution," Helen Dry, county tax assessor-collector said this week.

She noted that there are a number of people in the county whose voter registration has expired since the last election and those who do not realize their registrations

have expired will not be able to vote unless they register again at the tax office in the courthouse. Those who have been registered only have to go to the tax office and re-new their registrations. New voters, of course, will register before October 4 to be eligible to vote in November.

There is no time limit on who can register now, and anyone can register to vote as long as they have moved to Texas before they register to vote.

Anyone in the county who has moved since they registered to vote should go by the tax office and make sure they have the right address on their registration and that they are still voting in the correct precinct.

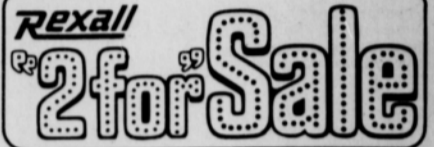

FARM AND RANCH NEWS

SORGHUM DISEASES -

Recently several sorghum fields have lodged after becoming infected with a root rot fungus, which later led to a stalk rot condition. The affected sorghum fields have dead plants that have lodged due to the weak, rotten lower stalk. Most of the fields I have seen and discussed with farmers went through a water stress in late August, or early September, and the plants were in the milk to dough stage at that time. These areas have lodged to a large extent and considerable grain will be lost in harvesting.

I at first identified the problem as a stalk rot. However, after visiting with two Plant Pathologists who are sorghum disease specialists, I have found out that the problem started or was caused by root rot fungus. These Specialists have been seeing an increase in sorghum root rot during the past few years.

The root rot fungus attacks and weakens the roots, making the sorghum plant more susceptible to attack by other fungus and more susceptible to stress conditions, such as moisture shortage. When the sorghum roots have been attacked by fungus and have become partially rotted, then the plant is not able to take up as much water as the plant requires. If the soil was kept extra wet, the rotted roots would be able to take up more water than if the soil was a little on the dry side. This helps to explain why affected areas in fields seem to be located in traditional hot spot areas of fields or in fields that ran short of water.

Stalk rots usually affect sorghum plants that has suffered from a moisture stress or water shortage. Therefore, the most apparent thing we see is the rotten lower stalk on affected sorghum plants. However, I have seen one field belonging to Dwight Hutchison, where the stalks were still good but his roots were rotting away and the plants were dying.

This is a real complex problem and no one thing has been isolated as causing this problem to develop. Apparently the South Plains area of the Panhandle is more severely affected than our northern plains area.

Crop rotation is not necessarily the answer to the problem. Corn can be affected with these same root rots as sorghum.

Limited evidence indicates that some hybrids might be more susceptible to these fungus rots than others. We don't know this to be true, but I would like for you to call or let me know what hybrids you may have that are affected with this condition of dead, lodged sorghum plants. My office telephone is 659-2136 or 733-2901.

Recommendations I have received on trying to avoid the root-stalk rot complex next year are as follows:

1. Plant hybrids that are not known to have been affected. However, stage of

plant growth at time of fungus infection may affect the degree to which a hybrid is affected. So, each hybrid may not resist the fungus each time. 2. Reduce seeding rate a little so plants will tend to have larger, stronger stalks. 3. Reduce nitrogen fertilization a little. 4. Plant only the acreage that can be adequately watered, without stressing plants for moisture.

LAWN CARE - Now is a good time to fertilize your lawn, especially if you have a blue grass or cool season grass mixture in your lawn. You should apply a complete lawn fertilizer at the rate to supply 2 lbs.

of nitrogen per 1,000 square feet of lawn area. This fall application will help to give your grass a good early start next spring.

Also, I believe now would be a good time to use a weed spray on bindweed and dandelions. Some type of 2,4-D weed killer would be good. Follow directions on the label for specific use.

STORE LEFTOVER SEEDS PROPERLY - Every gardener worth the title has a few packets of flower or vegetable seeds left from spring and summer planting. Or they may have collected seed from their own or from their neighbor's plants.

Although old seed often has a lower germination rate as well as reduced vigor, especially if left in a

hot shed or storage area, the temptation is to try to save it for next year. Proper storage can greatly increase the shelf life of many seeds.

The seed should be air-dried before placing in tightly sealed containers. It should then be kept in a refrigerator or cool basement at a temperature range of 35 to 50 degrees F.

When collecting seeds from garden plants, remember that many of the new improved varieties are hybrids and will seldom come true. This means that the offspring will have little or no resemblance to the parent plant.

Education Pinpointed In Proposed Constitution

If anyone in Hansford County has anything to do with education--either as one who is receiving an education, one who has received an education, one who is paying, for an education, or anyone of the many actively involved in the education processes, Section 2-d of Article VII, Education, of the Proposed Constitution has something to say to you.

To wit: (d) The State Board of Education shall set aside from the Available

School Fund an amount sufficient to provide the free textbooks, (the following is the new material as proposed) and other instructional materials authorized by law, that are required in educational programs in the free public schools. The remainder of the Available School Fund must be distributed among the counties

according to their respective scholastic populations" and must be spent for the support of free public schools in the manner prescribed by law.

Section 2, Article VII includes parts (a), (b), and (c) as well as the above (d) and is entitled "Permanent and Available School Funds". (a) The Permanent School Fund consists of the property set apart, before or after this article takes effect, for the support of free public schools; the proceeds from sale and mineral development of the property; and the property purchased with the proceeds. (b) The Permanent School Fund is held in perpetual trust for the free public schools. The principal of the fund may not be spent. The land of the per-

manent fund may be sold, leased, or exchanged as provided by law. The State Board of Education shall direct the investment of all Permanent School Fund money in the manner prescribed by law. (c) The Available School Fund consists of the income from the Permanent School Fund and the state taxes dedicated to the Available School Fund.

According to Gruver School authorities, budget balanced schools, of which Gruver Independent School District is one, would get less money from per capita (ADA--average daily attendance)--upon which the monies are allotted. 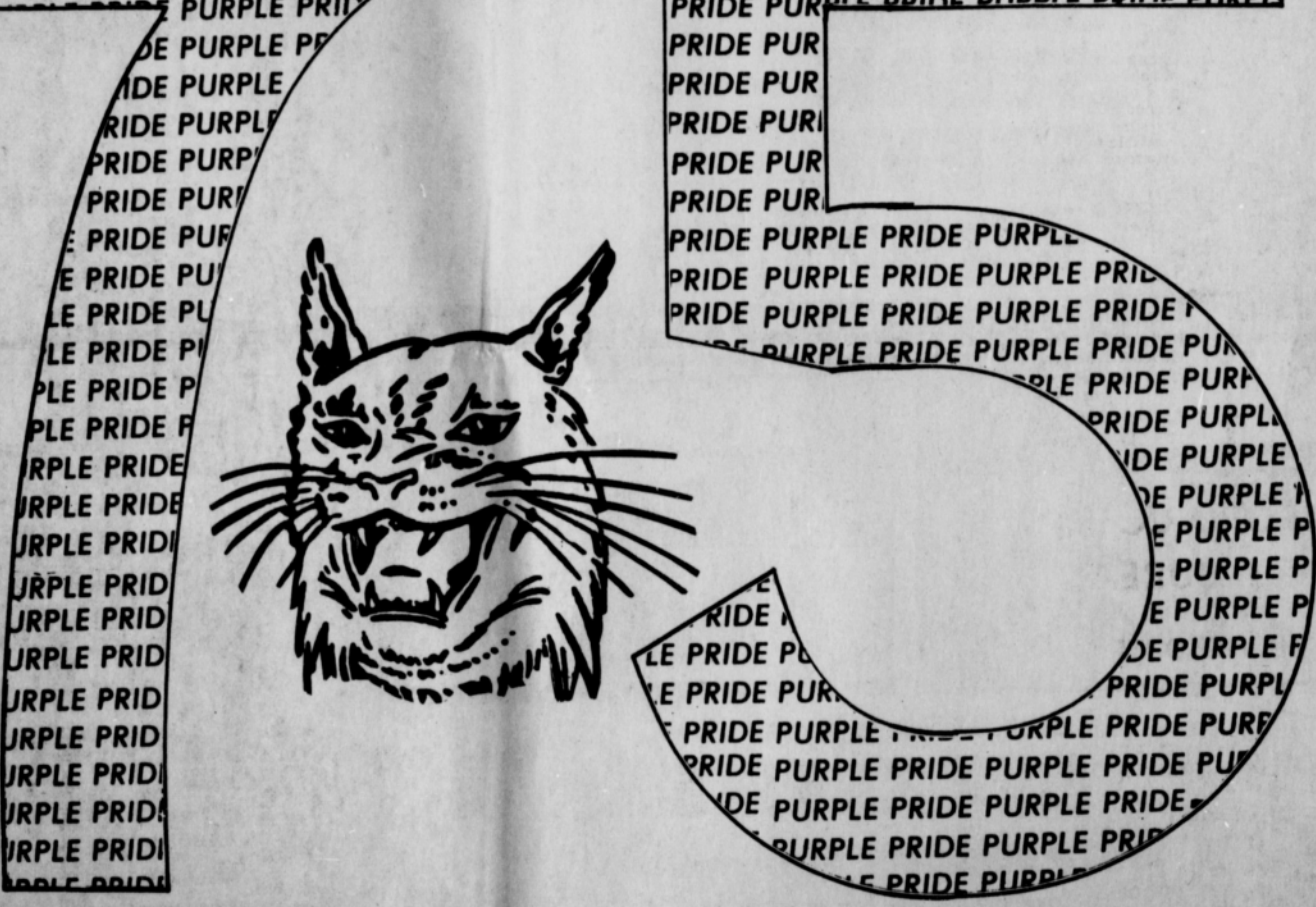
