In the words of Coach Gregg Sherwood "we did not play well, but we won!" And, the mark of a good team is one that wins despite the fact that they do not play well. In any event, the Lynx are still rocking and reeling from the squeaker at Sunray.

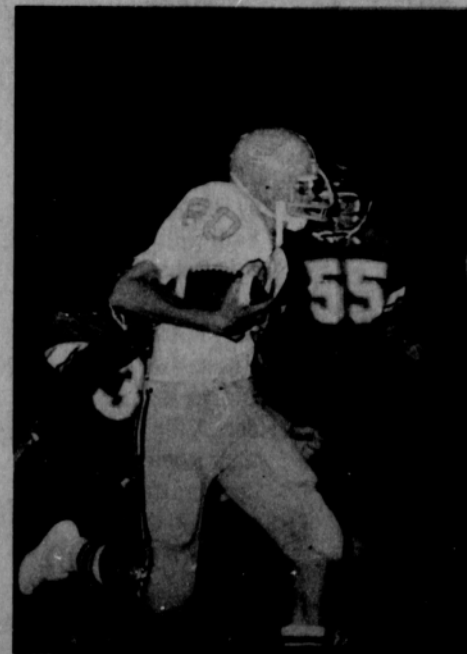
Sunray made 15 first downs to Spearman's 7. They rushed 227 yards to Spearman's 101 yards; Spearman DID our pass Sunray, as Steele hit for 92 yards passing compared to Sunray's 27 yards. The total yards, however weren't too far apart, 193 for the Lynx and 256 for the Bobcats. Spearman attempted 11 passes and completed 4; Sunray attempted 6 passes and completed 2; Spearman intercepted 0, and Sunray intercepted 1; Possibly the highlight of the evening was the punting: Newton punted 7 times for a 36.4 average, and Sunray 4 times for 41.3; Spearman covered 1 fumble. Spearman was penalized 6 times for 50 yards, and Sunray 3 times for 18 yards. One of these penalties cost the Lynx a touchdown and another was on third down, the only time in the first 3/4 quarters that the Lynx were able to hold the 'cats. These two penalties almost cost the Lynx the game.

In rushing, Fox carried 2 times for a -1.5 yards. Steele 5 times for a 0.4 average; Morris 5 times for 0.8; Hargis 2 times for 3.5 yards; Newton 15 times for 91 yards and a fantastic 6.1 average.

On pass receptions, Comegys had 2 receptions for 37 yards. Beedy 1 pass for a 43 yard touchdown; Fox 1 pass for a 12 yard touchdown.

Steele passed 11 times and completed 4, had one intercepted, for a total of 92 passing yards. Scorings: Beedy 1 TD; Fox 1 TD; Newton ran over PAT 2, total 14 pts.

City Adopts Budget

Tommy Messer of the Volunteer Fire Dept. of Spearman met with the City Council at the regular meeting Monday night, and informed the Council that the Fire Chief had resigned. The following prepared statement from Mayor Coy Palmer to the Council and to the public was issued. "I have a statement to make prior to taking up item number 4. The grass roots of this nation are composed of the Spearmans, Amarillos, Houstons and New York Cities. Since the establishment of this country there has been a concerted effort on the part of certain factions to destroy the framework of the liberty and freedom of mankind. The so called silent majority may be too silent. If it continues to remain silent, this great nation will crumble like all other great nations have crumbled throughout history. We must hold the line. Integrity and honesty must be preserved in every government, be it local or national, if we are to maintain the freedom we now enjoy. "I have here, undisputed evidence of dishonesty within the framework of our local government. I have been assured by officers of the Volunteer Fire Department of Spearman that this matter has been completely resolved. Let me assure you that I believe they have, and I am recommending that the council accept what the officers of the fire department have done, and that the council need not take further action. I want to take this opportunity to praise the members of the Volunteer Fire Department for their fine work in fighting fires within the city and the county. Let me assure every member of the fire department that this council, and the mayor, are wholeheartedly in support of them. I am herewith turning this evidence over to the county attorney, and unless there are members of the council who desire further action, we will consider the matter closed, and proceed to the next item on the agenda." The council adopted the 1975-76 budget of \$961,037.00 and voted to re-examine the budget in the second meeting in January, 1976. The tax rate was set for 1976 at \$1.50 per \$100 valuation. The council accepted Jett Mason to do the audit for the coming year.

Discussion was held on the paving of 9th street. Jimmy Shieldknight of the Golden Circle Development Co. was present to meet with the council. A survey was made of the intersection at 9th and Roland Monday afternoon and 840 cars were counted during the afternoon. Representatives of General Telephone Co. met with the council asking for a rate increase within the city. Action on the increase was tabled until a meeting in October. It is expected that the Volunteer Fire Department will elect a new fire chief at their next regular meeting. A new councilman was not appointed at this meeting.

Texas Drivers Could Forfeit Discount

AUSTIN, Tex.--State Insurance Board Chairman Joe Christie Tuesday said 35,000 Texas drivers could forfeit automobile insurance discounts this fall.

Christie said drivers who completed the National Safety Council's Defensive Driving Course in the Fall of 1972 will lose their eligibility to a 10 percent discount on insurance premiums unless they re-take the course.

He said the discount program, established by the State Board of Insurance, is valid for a three-year period, but former DDC graduates can renew their eligibility for another 36 months by completing the 8-hour program.

"Over 400,000 Texas motorists have completed the course in the past three years and statistics show that DDC graduates have 32 percent fewer accidents. Fewer accidents mean lower rates," Christie said.

The Texas Safety Association, which administers the DDC program in Texas, reports that the DDC program has been revised, Christie said. The new program contains many new films and visual aids, as well as new information on traffic

laws, driving habits, road design and engineering innovations.

The Defensive Driving Course has also been translated into Spanish and is being offered to Spanish-speaking Texas motorists by a number of training agencies in the

state. Christie said the State Board of Insurance has also extended the 10 percent premium discount to motorcycle operators who complete the DDC Motorcycle Supplement. Under the Board's rules, cyclist who finish the regular 8-hour course and the 2-hour motorcycle supplement are eligible for a discount on both automobile and motorcycle insurance premiums.

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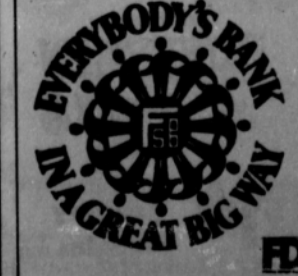

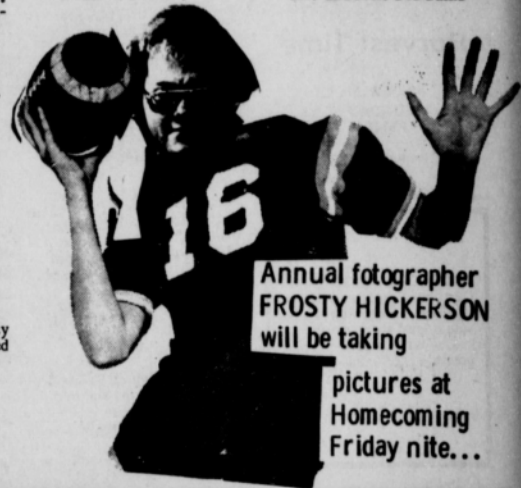

PRPC Lets Ambulance Bids

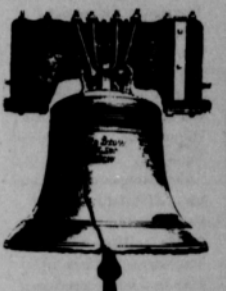

Cost Of Medical Care Locally

For residents of Hansford County, the cost of getting sick has skyrocketed in the last few years.

Their bills for medical and dental services, for hospital and nursing care, for prescription drugs and other health needs have climbed to an all-time high.

And even though most of their bills in the past year were absorbed by the Government or by private health insurance--\$2 out of every \$3 being taken care of in that way--the remaining one-third, which they had to pay themselves, amounted to more than ever.

The facts and figures relating to health care throughout the United States are detailed in

reports made by the Department of Health, Education and Welfare, by the Conference Board and others.

In Hansford County's regional area, based on their latest findings, the average out-of-pocket costs in the past fiscal year came to approximately \$148 per capita, it is estimated. This is exclusive of their premium payments for insurance.

By way of comparison, the average was \$140 per capita in the United States as a whole.

For specific individuals, the health bills ranged from well above average to well below. They varied from area to area and from family to family. Age makes a difference--

a big difference--in a person's health care bill.

During the past year, the over-65 population had out-of-pocket expenses averaging \$415 per capita as against \$117 for the rest of the population.

The overall average, \$149, is broken down by HIEW to \$34 for physicians, \$25 for dentists, \$39 for hospital care, \$29 for drugs and sundries and \$31 for other requirements, such as home nursing care, eyeglasses and the like.

These averages lump together all people, including those who had big expenditures and those who had none at all.

The total out-of-pocket cost to Hansford County residents for health services in the past year, based upon the estimated regional figures, comes to approximately \$1,006,000.

For the nation as a whole, health care amounted to over \$104 billion in 1974, a 10.6 percent increase over 1973.

Dr. Clifford Trotter, minister of the Polk Street Methodist Church officiated at both services. Mrs. Higgs died Friday following a long illness.

Mrs. Higgs was the daughter of Hansford County pioneers, Mr. and Mrs. L. S. McClellan. She and her parents came to this area in a covered wagon in 1903, settling in the Grand Plains community. On December 12, 1915 she married Paul B. Higgs, son of Mr. and Mrs. S. H. Higgs, also a pioneer Hansford County family who had moved to the area along with the same wagon move of the McClellans.

Active in community life, Mr. Higgs was in the hardware business in Spearman and Gruver and also a stockholder in the First State Bank of Spearman and opened the first bank in Gruver. Mrs. Higgs was active in music circles and served the Gruver Music Club as president in 1938-1939.

The Higgs who had farming and ranching interests in Hansford County moved to Amarillo in 1940 where they operated a ranch near Amarillo and continued farming in Gruver. He preceded her in death.

She was a member of the Polk Street United Methodist Church, the L'Aiguille Club, and Philharmonica Club here.

Survivors include a son, Browning of Amarillo; two daughters, Mrs. Mary Lou Shippee of Dallas and Mrs. Rose Rogers of Roswell, New Mexico; two brothers, Lee McClellan of Spearman and Dave McClellan of Gruver; three sisters, Mrs. Walter Wilmet of Spearman and Miss Orene McClellan and Mrs. Howard Hunt, both of Lubbock.

Social Security

Howard L. Weatherly Branch Manager of the Pampa Social Security Office points out that 1976 is fast approaching and that many people are thinking about filing for their Social Security Benefits and having their checks start effective with January, 1976.

To make sure your checks will begin on time, a claim must be filed with the Social Security Administration in advance of when you want checks to start. A rule-of-thumb to follow in applying for benefits is to visit your social security office about two or three months in advance of when you want your checks to start. This will allow time for

any problems which might arise (proving your age for example) to be cleared up and will allow social security to process your claim in time to get your checks started when you need them.

"There are certain things you can do to help get your check on time", says Mr. Weatherly. "At the time you file, you will be required to prove your age. A birth certificate or baptismal record recorded before age five is preferable, but if you have neither, other documents may be used to establish your date of birth. Bring whatever documents you have which show your age or date of birth. Also, if you have been in the military service any time since 1939, you may get additional credit for that military service. When you come in to file, bring in proof of your military service. If you have any questions concerning filing

for social security, please call your social security office and remember, don't delay in filing for your social security benefits if you plan to retire at the end of this year. Delay in receiving your check can be avoided by preparing to prove your age and filing two to three months before you want your checks to start.

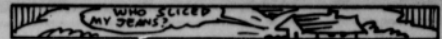
Parish served Texas Grain Sorghum Producers Board as chairman four years and has traveled

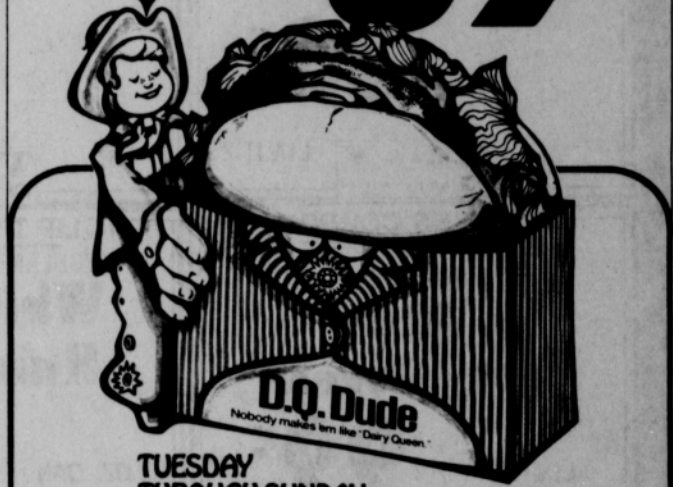
