EXPLANATION STRAIGHT CLASSES - GARDEN FLOWERS

Straight classes are those in which flowers are shown for hor- ed flowers and unnaturally refleticultural perfection alone, (also called "cultural casses.") MERITS - FAULTS

ANEMONES

Merit -- Large size; good shape; VIOLAS broad petals; freshness; pur and vivid coloring, or delicate and harmonious shading: long stems.

Faults - Irregular or indistinct coloring; weak and short stems. bold blotches on picotee-edged ANNUALS

Merits - Large flowers; freely flowered sprays; freshness; elegant arrangement: pleasing association of colors; long stems; bright or clear coloring: fragrance in kinds where fragrance is expected, i.e. in sweet peas, mignonette, etc.

Faults - Crowding; faded flowers; lack of substance and color; the use of dull subjects resulting in an ineffective group. ANTIRRHINUMS

Merits - Large shapely spike;

large number of perfect and expanded flowers; size of individual blooms; purity of selfs; rich colors, and regular markings in fancy forms: broad full lip. Faults - Few expanded flowers;

dingy coloring; flowers far apart; tips of spike showing evidence of distress owing to lack of moisture; narrow tube and lip. DELPHENIUM Merits - Large spikes, branched

at base: large flowers, evenly disposed so as to form a well - furnished and pleasing spike; large numbers of expanded flowers on a spike; flowers that are well expanded an do not droop. Faults - Weak ,thin spike; ab-

sence of branches; few expanded flowers: weak coloring. GERANUMSI Merits - Stocky branched grow-

th, well furnished with healthy foliage. Plant symmetrical and and with many trusses or bloom evenly and perfectly developed. Flowers trussed on long stiff Stems. Flowers neither crowded nor sparse. Flowers regular in out line with broad segments and of good color and substance. Faults - Spindly, weak growth.

Foliage poor, often yellowish, leaves deformed in shape. Plant of poor shape, flower trusses few, on weak stem; flower poor in its shape, color and substance. HANDY FLOWERS Merits - Large flower and spik-



sion service poultry specialist. A rooster, Ivory points out, eats about \$5 worth of feed a year at current prices. All you get in return, he insists, is a lot of crowing-accompanied by NO eggs!

A rooster is worthless in a poultry flock unless he is being used for breeding purposes in supplying fertile eggs for hatcheries or home in-

Hens won't lay any more eggs than they are laying just because a rooster is on the premises, so why not sell that "crowing so-and-so"?

Trade him for a \$1.93 alarm clock that tells the time of day for the entire 24 hours and you'll save about \$3 in feed costs on the swap!

Quality Chicks Needed To Offset Feed Costs

One method through which poultrymen can combat the present high cost of feed is to purchase good quality chicks. Feed costs, records compiled by the extension service indicate, now amount to 60 per cent or more of the total costs of producing eggs and chicken meat in contrast to 50 per cent in

It often takes 50 to 75 years to raise a good shade tree. But, extension foresters insist, it takes only a few minutes for an untrained pruner to ruin its beauty. Poor trimming technique is destroying the beauty of many streets.



Legumes Open Soil To Air and Water System of Rotation **Prevents Compaction**

Tight "stuffy" soils are robbing many farmers of high bushel-peracre yields of corn and small grains each year. Loams, silt loams and clay loams need large amounts of organic matter in the plow layer and deeper to keep them open and loose for high crop production.

Heavy soils that are low in organic matter and worked with heavy tractors and machinery become



clover, as shown in sketch, break through packed soil to assure water and plant food for growing

packed, especially just below the plow sole. These compactions slow down the intake of water. They cut down the amount of water and air the soil will hold for crop use. They keep the fibrous roots of corn and small grain "upstairs" away from water and plant food held deeper in

Temporary relief can be had by using machines that reach below the ordinary plow layer and break up the plow sole compactions. Real relief, however, comes only through regular use of deep-rooted legumes in the

The driving tap roots of sweet clover and alfalfa force their way through the compactions and reach deep into the soil, thus opening it to air and water. The mineralized organic matter they leave there improves soil tilth and furnishes plant food for other crops.

Channels of the tap roots are routes for water and air and fibrous roots to follow deep into the soil. Compaction-busting alfalfa and sweet clover need phosphate and potash if they are to do a good job.






