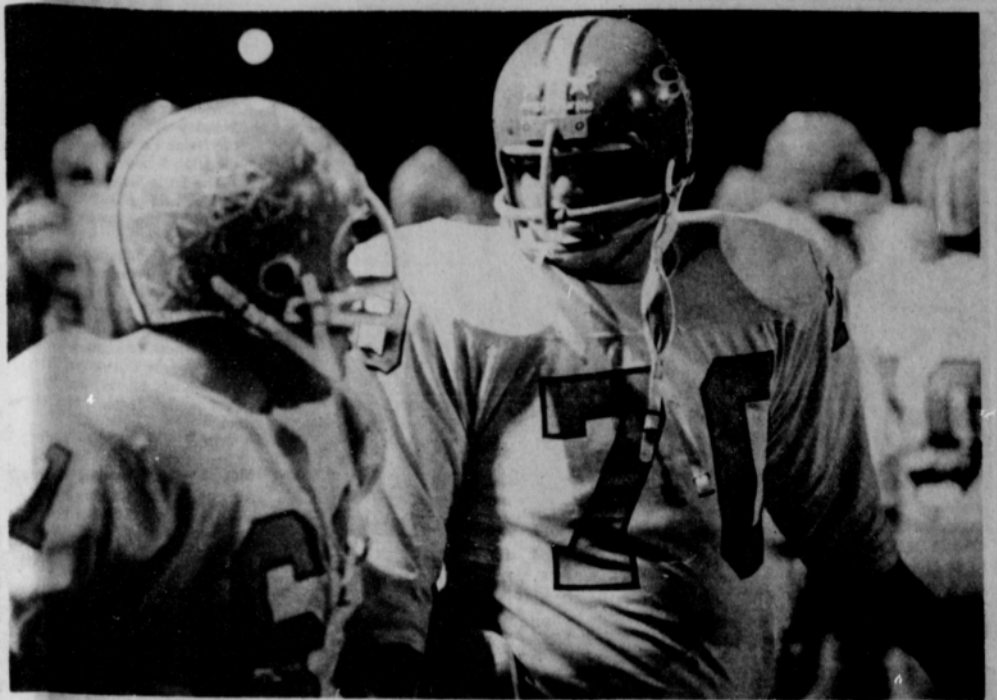
Highlight of the evening was the presentation of Gold Star Girl and Boy Awards.

Fifty-eight years ago at the eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month of the year 1918, the armistice marking the cessation of hostilities of World War I went into effect. Whistles blew, bells tolled, sirens shrilled, people crowded into streets in urban areas and in the smallest villages in rural areas, laughing, crying, shouting, waving flags, and sharing the great news that World War I was at an end.

Today, in a changed world, Veterans Day has become a matter of time confusion and not much recognition for those honored war dead and the day is now known as Veterans Day by dint of a bill passed in 1954 in honor of all servicemen and servicewomen who have served our country. And yet another change has taken place for the day now known as Veterans Day has been changed from the traditional November 11th date to a Monday in October--observed by the Federal Governmental agencies, and some on October 25th this year--a date chosen for some obscure reason or perhaps for convenience sake alone.

However, regardless of the date, the time, or the name the original meaning cannot be changed and the significance underlying the observance indicates that nations made up of people do remember their war heroes and reminds us that the world has yet to find a truly lasting peace. One of the great tasks committed to us is to instill good will and to hope to maintain peace at home and abroad for now and ever.

Bringing our obligations to these honored war dead most vividly to our minds is a poem "In Flanders Field", written by a young Canadian soldier, John McCrae, who gave his life in World War I.

IN FLANDERS FIELD
In Flanders Fields, the poppies blow
Between the crosses, row on row,
That mark our place; and in the sky
The lark, still bravely singing, fly
Scarce heard amid the guns below.
We are the dead. Short days ago
We lived, felt dawn, saw sunset glow,
Loved and were loved, and now we lie
In Flanders Field.

Take up our quarrel with the foe;
To you, from falling hands we throw
The torch; be yours to hold it high.
If ye break faith with us who die
We shall not sleep, though poppies grow
In Flanders Field.

In Flanders Field,
Fear not that ye have died for naught,
The torch ye threw to us we caught;
Ten million hands will hold it high
And Freedom's fight will never die.

We learned the lesson that ye taught
Ye Flanders Dead!
Veterans Day 1976--the date is unimportant--our pledge of faith to the future is and our prayer is that Freedom's light will never, never die.

AMERICA'S ANSWER
Rest ye in peace, ye Flanders dead
The fight that ye so bravely led
We've taken up. And we will keep
True Faith with you who lie asleep,
With each a cross to mark his bed,
And poppies blowing overhead
Where once his lifeblood ran red,
So, let your rest be sweet and deep

preacher. United Methodist Bishop Alsie Carleton recently declared, "As pastor of St. Luke's, Dr. Robb demonstrated the fact that people today are hungry for positive, Biblical preaching."

"There is no substitute for preaching," according to Mr. Robb. "One reason for our nation's moral breakdown is our current lack of vital, prophetic preaching," insists Mr. Robb.

Mr. Robb's preaching ministry has carried him to 40 states and 39 countries. He has frequently traveled abroad preaching the Good News of Jesus Christ in such countries as Brazil, Chile, India, Japan and Indonesia. Asked why he bothers to preach in dirty villages in India or freezing outdoor weather in southern Chile, Mr. Robb quickly answers, "Why should any person be privileged to hear the gospel more than once, until all have heard it?"

Since the beginning of his ministry in 1947, Mr. Robb has had keen interest in "the church beyond the local church." In 1966 he participated in the World Congress on Evangelism (Berlin, West Germany); and in 1974 he was an official participant in the International Congress on World Evangelization (Lausanne, Switzerland).

But Mr. Robb has never neglected the local "body of Christ." He effectively pastored churches for over 20 years. And according to Bishop Alsie Carleton, "Dur-

ing the two years and eight months of his pastoral leadership at St. Luke's, more than 800 members were received, attendance at worship and Church School increased dramatically, and financial support of all the causes of Methodism was generous..."

Mr. Robb is chairman of Good News - a national organization of United Methodists for Scriptural Christianity - which Billy Graham says, "... represents one of the encouraging signs for the church fulfilling its evangelistic mission, under the Bible's authority and the leadership of the Holy Spirit..."

Journalism is a primary interest to Mr. Robb. As executive secretary of the Ed Robb Evangelistic Association, he publishes "Challenge to Evangelism Today," a quarterly religious publication with a circulation of 15,000. He has also authored three books and had articles appear in several national magazines, including Christianity Today, Good News, and The Herald.

In 1972 Asbury Theological Seminary conferred an honorary doctor of divinity degree on Mr. Robb.

Mr. Robb is the father of five children, with a son and son-in-law in the United Methodist ministry. He lives a simple lifestyle with his wife on their family farm near Marshall, in the piney woods of east Texas.

"It is time we evangelical Christians set an example by the simplicity of our lifestyle," Mr. Robb stated.

"We must become aware of our responsibilities toward this planet and its people. Our consumer-mad society is quickly depleting earth's resources. We are polluting our streams. We are poisoning our air. We are disfiguring our environment."

"In the name of commercialism we may be destroying God's earth!" Mr. Robb warns.

Preacher, journalist, church leader, farmer. But, most of all, Mr. Robb wants to be known simply as "a sinner saved by grace."

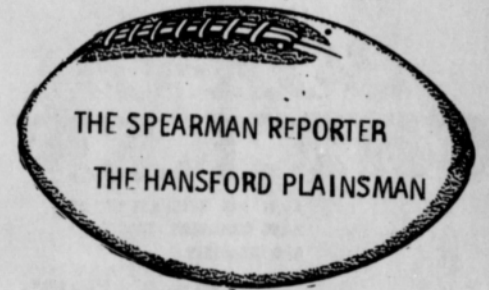

Public Forum Set On Elderly People's Problems

Ideas for community solutions to problems of elderly people will be sought at a public forum from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. November 17 at Villa Inn Convention Center, Amarillo. Named The Generation Connection, the forum will feature workshops in various areas of interest, and those attending will identify local needs and consider practical solutions.

More than a thousand people, representing rural and urban areas of the Panhandle, are expected for the one-day activity, according to Mrs. Jack Hazlewood, steering committee chairman.

Workshops will consider local level action to meet

problems of the elderly in the areas of legal matters, communication, finance and employment, transportation, recreation, education, health, housing and nutrition. Persons with experience in these specialties in the Panhandle will chair the workshops and serve as consultants.

"This is one of 12 similar Generation Connection conferences to be held in Texas this year," Mrs. Hazlewood said. "Our conference in the Panhandle has been planned by a local steering committee to consider problems we find to exist in our own part of the state.

"Society today tends to

isolate older people. We hope to develop ways of including them in the mainstream of community activities, thus enriching the lives of all concerned," Mrs. Hazlewood said.

The First Lady of Texas, Mrs. Dolph Briscoe, is heading the state-wide effort to increase public awareness of the problems of older persons and will be in Amarillo to address the forum.

State Welfare Commissioner Raymond Vowell and O. P. Bobbitt, executive director of the First Lady's Volunteer Program, will accompany Mrs. Briscoe and are scheduled for talks.

State Sen. Max Sherman will serve as master of ceremonies, and Potter County Judge Branch T. Archer will be the keynote speaker. Others who will address the opening general session include Cong. Jack Hightower; Fred Ochs, executive director of the Amarillo Senior Citizens Association; Mike McQueen, coordinator of the Panhandle Regional Office on Aging.

Registration for the forum is free. Lunch will be available for \$2 for those attending. Agencies and organizations sponsoring the Amarillo forum include the First Lady's Volunteer Program, the Amarillo Retired Teachers Association,

Amarillo Senior Citizens Association, National Association of Retired Federal Employees, American Association of Retired Persons, Panhandle

Regional Office on Aging, and the State Department of Public Welfare.

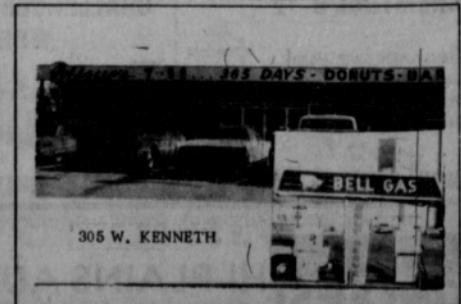

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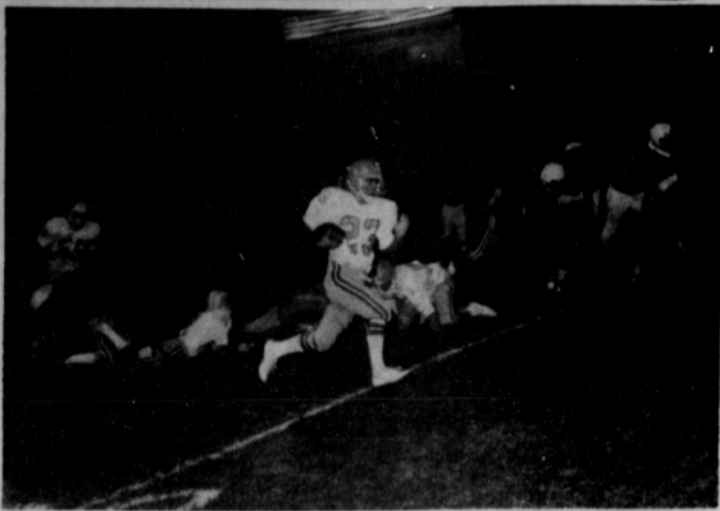

County Agent News

Swine dysentery will cost hog producers throughout the U.S. an estimated \$64 million this year and losses from the disease are increasing, says Jim Kuykendall, county agent for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

The disease which is caused by harmful bacteria in the digestive tracts of pigs is characterized by diarrhea with blood or mucous in the feces, reduced feed consumption and gauntness in pigs. It is highly contagious and is transmitted by pigs eating the feces of infected animals. Infected feces can be carried on inanimate objects or by animals who physically move feces from one place to another.

Because swine dysentery has many of the same symptoms as salmonella and whipworms, a laboratory confirmation must be made before the disease can be absolutely verified, explains Kuykendall.

Also, an animal with a health certificate does not necessarily mean the animal does not have swine dysentery, as some animals with the disease will not show any symptoms.

Treatment is costly to the producer, so preventive measures are especially important, emphasizes Kuykendall.

One way to keep the disease from infecting your swine herd, says Kuykendall, is to buy pigs from sources with no known history of the disease and to maintain a closed breeding herd.

Isolate newly purchased animals for at least 30 days and check them once a day for signs of symptoms. Plan your chores so that the new animals are cared for last and do not return to the main herd unless all boots and equipment has been thoroughly cleaned.

Keep in mind that every animal, vehicle or person who comes into contact with your swine herd is a potential

carrier of the disease, warns Kuykendall.

If your herd does not become infected, tell your veterinarian and accept any type of quarantine to slaughter arrangement.

Be sure to inform all nearby neighbors of the appearance of the disease in your herd so they can watch their animals for symptoms, notes Jim Kuykendall.

If any infected hogs are taken to market, clean and disinfect the transporting vehicle before using it again.

Practicing good sanitation is the best way to minimize the severity of losses from swine dysentery, points out the county agent.

Keep hog pens and lots as clean and comfortable as possible and try to reduce stress from overcrowding, chilling, filth and poor nutrition. Keep traffic between pig lots to a minimum.

To rid the disease from your herd calls for the slaughter of all infected animals and then a thorough cleanup and disinfection of the areas where pigs were kept.

Let hog lots lie idle for several months before moving in new pigs, cautions Kuykendall. Then stay on the alert as the disease commonly reoccurs.

Health Tips

The United States' most vicious killer stalks silently. High blood pressure, the most common chronic disease in the U.S., has no symptoms until it strikes. It causes about 60,000 deaths yearly and contributes to strokes, kidney problems and heart attacks, the Texas Medical Association says.

Anyone can have high blood pressure, even children, but certain factors increase risk. A black, overweight person who smokes and is under stress would have three factors against him or her. Eating too much salt or lots of food with cholesterol also can help bring on high blood pressure.

A family history of high blood pressure further increases the odds against a person. If one parent had high blood pressure a child would have a 50 percent chance of getting the disease (usually between 40 and 50 years of age). If both

parents had high blood pressure, the chance would rise to 90 percent.

Fortunately diagnosis usually is easy and treatment can be as simple as regularly taking a pill in some cases. Hypertension, the medical term for high blood pressure, is detected by a quick, painless test. Treatment varies in individual cases but often drug therapy and modest dietary restrictions can control the disease.

The most troublesome part about treatment for many people is continuing it. Since high blood pressure does not have any symptoms, many patients get tired of taking their medicine and stop. Unfortunately, the disease does not stop its deadly progress. It may continue until a serious symptom, such as death, occurs.

A blood pressure test can be done quickly using an inflatable, bag-like cuff wrapped around the arm above the elbow. A tube connects this cuff to a measuring device that contains a column of mercury (a barometer).

The cuff is inflated until the main artery in the arm is squeezed tightly enough to shut off the flow of blood. The examiner takes two readings while deflating the cuff and listening with a stethoscope.

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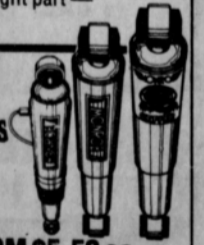
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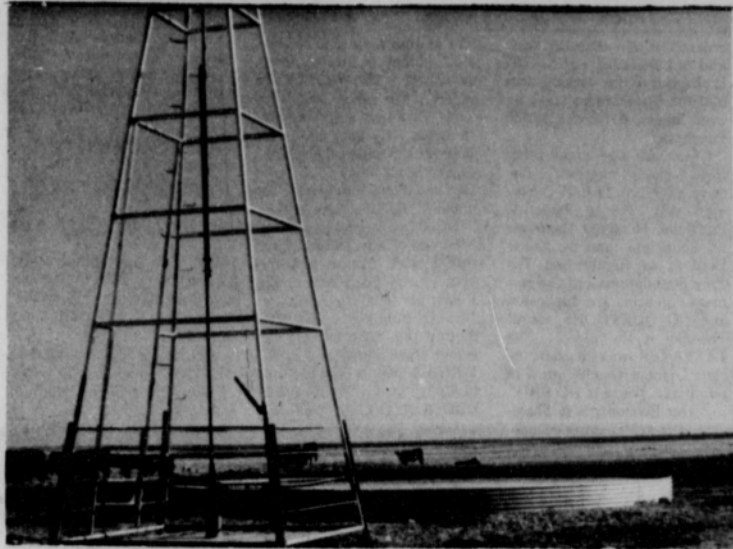
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The Great Plains conservation Program is designed to help farmers and ranchers do needed conservation work on their land. Cost share is available for drilling, casing, and gravel packing of the well. Also cost share is available for construction of needed water troughs and livestock pipeline. Good clean water enhances

good livestock production. Water should be situated so that animals do not have to travel more than 3/4 mile to get water. Good water and mineral placement helps the producer to do a better job of utilizing his grassland.

Cost share is also available for crossfencing pastures for better grazing distribution and

to enable the producer to carry out a planned grazing system.

Other cost share items on rangeland include brush control and reseeding of rangeland.

See your local conservation technicians in the Spearman Field Office of the Soil Conservation Service for further information about the Great Plains Conservation Program.

County Agent's Report

The vaccine used to immunize swine against hog cholera may actually be one of the ways the dreaded disease is introduced to hogs, says Jim Kuykendall, county agent for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Therefore, its use is no longer warranted or recommended.

"It may seem ironic that the very thing designed to stop a

disease could be one of the ways the disease is spread," notes Kuykendall. "However, in 1971 the federal government took away all licenses to produce the vaccine for hog cholera and set up regulations prohibiting the shipment of both the vaccine and vaccinated hogs."

This was done because officials thought that in some cases of hog cholera the vac-

cine introduced the disease. Also, the vaccine made diagnosis of infected swine difficult.

The last outbreak of hog cholera which occurred in New Jersey, Rhode Island, and Massachusetts during February and March cost \$2.4 million in indemnities, points out Kuykendall. It cost taxpayers additional money to pay the expenses

Parents: Don't Let Your Children Burn

This is the third of a five-part series by Dr. Gary S. Nelson, safety engineer with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, designed to help parents teach their children and themselves how to survive a house fire.

COLLEGE STATION -- A home burns every 45 seconds and up to 2,000 children burn to death annually. Following are two more drills offered in this series designed to teach children how to survive a fire. In the fifth part of this series, a final 'rookie' examination will be offered to determine whether your children qualify as 'firemen.'

A drill called 'Get Out Fast' trains youngsters in the importance of a quick escape. A child's first impulse in fires should always be to 'get out', even though the blaze may be small, for it can become an inferno in minutes. Fire most often strikes at night while children are asleep, so the most important drill you can give them is this: Have them lie on their beds and then sound the alarm. Tim them to see how long it takes to reach the meeting place outside the house. At first, let them escape the simplest way. Then make them go through obstacles, such as 'smoke' and the 'hot' door. Block off stairways with a string so they know an alternate route. Be sure they practice going out a window. If they use a rope ladder, have them throw it out the window and actually climb down. If they are on a roof until someone comes with a ladder, make them wait while you get the ladder. They must behave exactly as they would

in a real fire.

The next drill is called 'Call the Fire Engines.' Teach your child exactly how to call the fire department; his quick action could save his life or your house. However, impress on him that if he discovers fire, he should act in this order: First, alert everyone so they can begin their escape. Then call the fire department if he can still do so safely. Lives have been lost because someone paused to call the firemen when he should have fled.

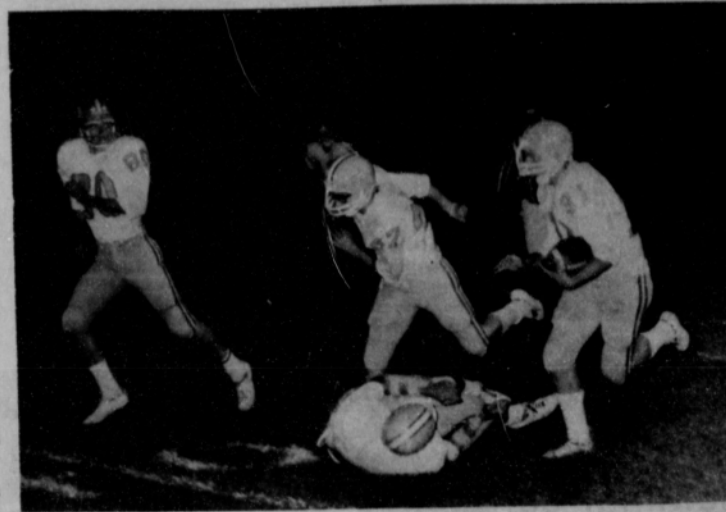
Have the children memorize the number of the fire department. Also, write out the number and place it permanently near the phone. Very small youngsters who can't dial long numbers at least can learn to dial '0' for the operator in an emergency.

When practicing, place a strip of tape over the receiver buttons so you can dial without letting the call go through. Have youngsters go to the phone, dial and give this information: 'Our house is on fire at (address). The name is (head of household).' Then don't let them hang up immediately, but wait to be sure they were understood.

Part 4 of this series provides a final drill in teaching children how to survive a fire.

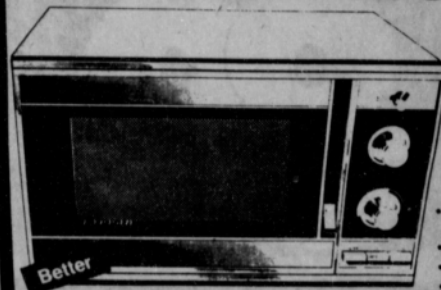

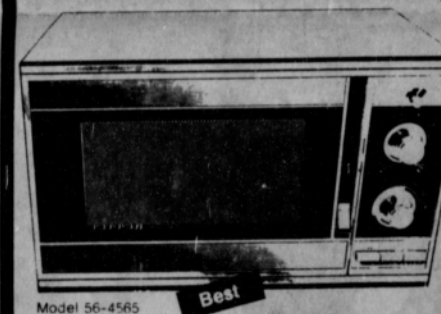

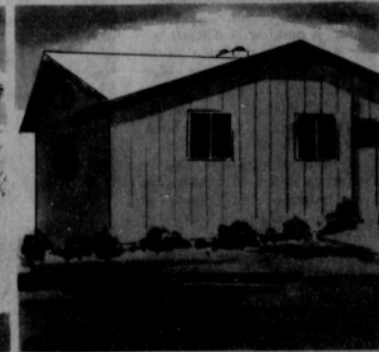

Tips On Order By Mail

"Thumbing through a sales catalog, choosing merchandise and dropping an order in the mail can be fun and an easy way to Christmas shop," according to Postmaster Ray Robertson.

"Most mail order firms rely on repeat business and usually provide fast shipment and quality merchandise. That's good business," he said. "However," Postmaster Robertson warns, "if you or-

der merchandise by mail and must wait a long time to receive it or never get it at all -- that's bad business."

Postmaster Robertson points out that a Federal Trade Commission rule now protects customers who order merchandise by mail. The rule gives customers: --The right to know when to expect shipment of the merchandise. For example, if an ad indicated a "rush" shipment in less than

a week the manufacturer must do so within that time. If no date is stated, the items must be shipped within 30 days.

--The right to cancel the order when shipment is not made within the stated time or the maximum 30-day period. The firm must indicate the delay and provide a free means for the customer's response, such as a postage-paid postcard. Customers may cancel the order or agree to the new shipping date.

--The right to receive a refund when canceling an order because shipment can not be made within the prescribed time period. The

seller must mail the refund within seven days after a customer cancels. If there is a credit sale, the firm has only one billing cycle to make the proper adjustment to the customer's account.

The rule, however, does not apply to the following mail order services; photo finishing; magazine subscriptions; serial (more than one) deliveries except for the initial shipment; seeds and growing plants; COD (Collect on Delivery shipments); and credit orders where the customer's account is not charged prior to the merchandise shipment.

With dissatisfaction occurs

and the mail order company does not comply with the rules, the customer should contact the firm once more. If no result follow two courses of action may be taken.

If the customer feels the company has not fulfilled its obligations under the Federal Trade Commission rule, a short letter -- outlining all of the circumstances -- should be mailed with a copy of the ad to: Director, Bureau of Consumer Protection (MO-P, Federal Trade Commission, Washington, DC 20580).

"On the other hand," Postmaster Robertson said, "when customers feel that they may be victims of a mail order

fraud or believe that the Postal Service may help resolve a dispute with a company, they should immediately contact local postal officials at 659-3313."

Wrap and pack packages securely, address them correctly and mail today. Your cooperation now will save delays later on, the Postmaster said.

WACO -- The Texas Farm Bureau has recorded one of its largest membership gains in its history, according to Carol Chaloupka of Dalhart, president.

Official tabulations just completed show that the state's largest farm organization now has 195,571 member families, an increase of 15,101 over last year. The IFB membership year runs from Nov. 1 to Oct. 31.

"This makes the 24th consecutive year for the Texas Farm Bureau to gain in membership," Chaloupka said. "Just as significant is the fact that this is the fourth year in a row for all 210 organized counties to show a gain."

The Dalhart grain and livestock producer said that 97 counties gained more than 75 members this year.

"This tremendous gain in membership strength indicates that farmers and ranchers are realizing more than ever the need for a strong organization to represent them," Chaloupka said.

The present Texas Farm Bureau dates back to 1934 when it was organized as the Texas Agricultural Association. The name was changed a few years later when it affiliated with the American Farm Bureau Federation. The original IFB was organized in Texas in 1920, but had ceased functioning by the early 1930s.

The American Farm Bureau Federation is the largest general farm organization in the world with more than 2 1/2 million member families in 2800 county Farm Bureaus in 49 states (all except Alaska).

The benefits of being in the National Guard are many. There are basic reasons and motivations for being in the Guard--such as patriotism, self-satisfaction, money, career skills, retirement pay, etc.

Extra pay per year ranges from about \$800 for a new enlistee to \$1900 for a Master Sergeant (these figures are in the middle range of the pay scales.)

Some of the other advantages are commissions, service schools, home loan benefits, Texas Veterans Land Program, PX-BX privileges, and educational grants for children.

A man with four years of active duty in any branch of the Armed Services already has 1440 points and with the National Guard of Texas can earn approximately \$80 to \$100 for 16 hours of duty on the weekend. The duty is usually the first weekend of each month. This stipend is paid each month.

Some of the activities for Company B 2nd 142nd Infantry have been bivouacs at Palo Duro Canyon.

There are three towns in this area where drills are held. They are Berger, Pampa, and Shamrock.

A high school student may enlist up to 90 days before

graduation and go on 4 months active duty and then go to college.

A person can retire after twenty years, including any Armed Forces duty with approximately \$250 a month payment.
