We ask that you RSVP by Tuesday, May 14 by calling the High School so we can plan for the

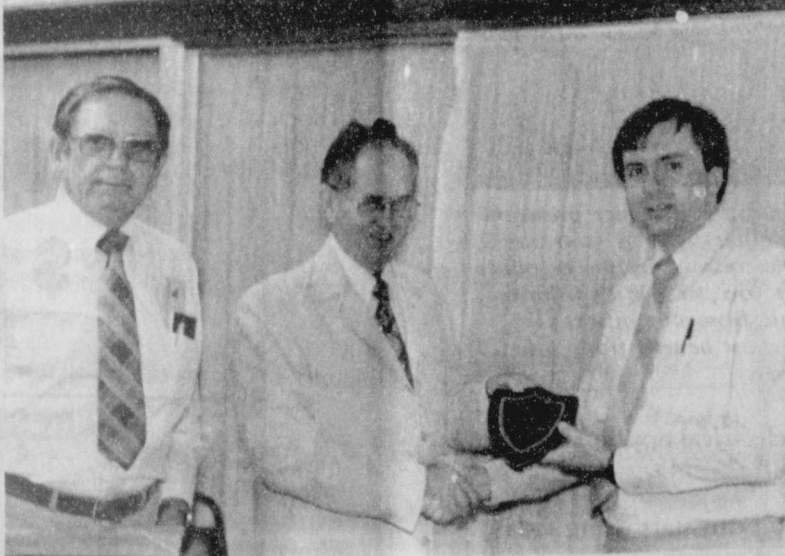

Those absent last Monday were Pete Fisher, Todd Brock, Kim Brock, David McClellan, Ronnie Lusby, and Edgar Womble.

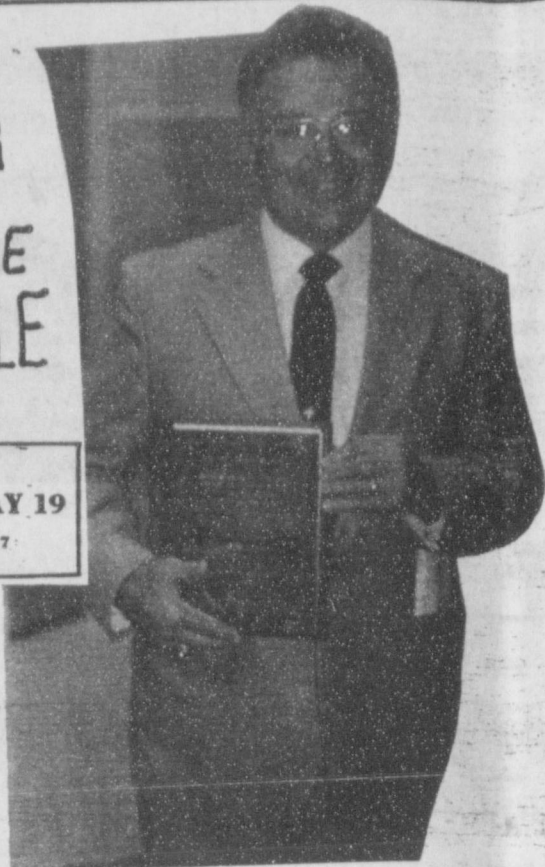

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Leaf rust hits wheat

LUBBOCK--Most wheat farmers throughout the Panhandle, South Plains and Rolling Plains have missed their opportunity to use fungicide to combat the worst outbreak of leaf rust to strike the region in many years, says a plant pathologist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

But a few may still be able to obtain some advantage from treating their crop, said Dr. Robert Berry, who sounded the alarm for area producers two months ago.

County Extension agents in the northern tier of Panhandle counties echoed the view that producers need to take a very close look at their crop to decide if it is economically feasible to apply fungicide. "This is especially true from Interstate 40 north," said Fred Smith, Hutchinson County agent.

"Most producers made their decision a month ago," with many feeling the rust wasn't serious enough to justify the treatment, Berry said. But changing weather conditions have provided warmth and moisture which have aggravated the situation.

Producers who have wheat already blooming, or in later stages of development, with rust already evident on the flag leaves will find it is too late to expect satisfactory results from fungicide application, the Extension specialist said.

"Those plants will continue to decline and results of fungicide

application will probably be disappointing, although there might be some yield enhancement," Berry said.

Fields which are in the flag stage or early heading, but without rust damage to the upper leaves, can still be treated with an expectation of good results, the pathologist said.

Berry described the Rolling Plains wheat crop as a "complete disaster" from the rust. "Many early fields are in the milk stage with absolutely no green leaves to fill the grain," he said. He said late fields are blooming and many have good color, but rust infestation is heavy and will probably kill the leaves before the grain is filled.

Berry said some fields in the Rolling Plains which were probably treated with fungicide are now showing rust. But he said it appears the two weeks of protection provided by the fungicide may be enough to yield a fair crop in these fields.

Soil Stewardship Week Observed

The Hansford Soil and Water Conservation District (SWCD) will join the nationwide observance of Soil Stewardship Week during the week of May 12 to 19, 1985.

"Tomorrow Together" is the theme of the 1985 observance. As the 1985 booklet for the observance points out, human survival depends on other living things: the grasses and grain, fishes and birds, wild and domestic animals. And we all depend for our basic necessities on soil and water. Together, we must think about ways to preserve and renew the topsoil from which all our food comes. Together, we must work to purify and protect our waters.

In 1985, the soil conservation movement in American marks its fiftieth anniversary. During the Dust Bowl era of the '30s, conservation districts, local units of government, were founded to take soil conservation information and techniques out to farmers and ranchers. ASCS final certification is May 15

Keith Martin, director of ASCS, announced that May 15 is the final day to request measurement service or to certify wheat and other small grains ACR (setaside) devoted to small grains must also be reported at this time.

To hay and graze ACR after May 15 you must file a request to do so by May 15 and pay a \$10 field visit fee. If farmers plan on planting a cover crop that will be hayed or grazed they will need to file the same request. Farmers cannot sell hay or grazing rights on ACR.

May 15, 1985 is the last day farmers may request measurement service on fall seeded crops. Farmers need to plow or swath a line between haying wheat and that wheat that will be used for grain for measurement purposes.

The Working Woman's Dilemma

With literally hundreds of magazines, books and seminars offering advice on what to wear, who to know, where to go and how to get there, today's working woman is faced with a difficult decision.

Many of us hold responsible, non-administrative, positions. Women (and some men) who have reached the upper level in the world of work are urging us to join

them on the heights, to breathe the rarified air of the executive. The decision we must make? Do we really want to be president of the firm? Is it alright, despite what we hear, to be content with where we are, or must we, like the woman who is "just a homemaker", flush with frustration and embarrassment because we are "just" a secretary, busdriver or cook. Good questions with no instant answers. In this area, as in many others, peer and family pressure and Madison Avenue hype muddy the waters of decision. However, here are some suggestions that might be helpful.

1. Decide what YOU want, Not what Jane Fonda, your mother, husband, best friend or children want for you. In the long run, you will be much more content if you are pursuing your own goals and not someone else's.

So the question, do you want to be president has importance. If so, by all means, go to the library and check out every book you can find on making it to the top and follow their advice.

If you are content in your job,

stop feeling guilty about not wanting to rule the world. Having worked as a secretary, I can tell you that the world of business would collapse without some of those vital, non-administrative professionals.

2. A corollary to the first step is to decide what is best for you. Many top executives, ulcer-ridden, have neglected this step. Given your temperament, your abilities, your emotional strength, your likes and dislikes, decide not only how far up the corporate ladder you want to go, but how far your abilities and desires will carry you before your job becomes more pain than pleasure. Taking a job that is challenging and exciting is fine. Taking a job that will put you in the hospital with ulcers, heart disease, colitis or migraines seems foolish.

You may have noticed by now that these decisions may take longer than a 15 minute coffee break. Set aside some time for SERIOUS THINKING, get a notebook and keep a log or journal of your decisions, feelings and progress. A written description of your plans will keep you on track. Recording feelings and progress will give you an outlet for some emotional energy and provide encouragement during setbacks.

3. Set some specific Short Term and Long Term Goals. For example, you've decided you want to move into management. A short term goal might be to enroll in your company's management training program TODAY OR TOMORROW. A long term goal would be to have a management position within the next two years.

If you're content in your position but feel that improving your skills (and salary) would be appropriate, a short term goal might be to write or update a complete job description, detailing everything you do. A long term goal might be to get your job description upgraded to reflect your skills and responsibilities, with an equitable salary, within the next two years.

You may want to set goals for three months, six months, one year, two years, three years, five years, ten years. No matter how you set your goals, remember, BE SPECIFIC about what you are going to do, when you are going to do it, how long it should take and what you expect to happen. It is easier to leave out steps you don't need than to add steps as you go. Get down to details. Be specific.

4. Be realistic. If you want to change jobs and the job you want is held by someone who will only leave it when she dies or retires, you may need to look for another job, possibly with a different company. If all the management positions are filled by family members from somebody else's family, again, you may have to change companies.

Many executives are expected to travel extensively or be willing to relocate with each promotion. If your husband or children would just die if you were asked to transfer to Tawanga, it may not be realistic for you to pursue that promotion.

5. Finally, look at your personal life and decide if or what you are

willing to sacrifice. Enrolling in classes to improve your skills will take time that previously was committed to something or someone else. Relentlessly pursuing an executive position will probably involve overtime or bringing office work home. Look at your personal responsibilities and decide what can be shifted, modified or dumped.

I personally don't advocate the pursuit of happiness and fulfillment to the exclusion of everybody else in your world. I believe such a course is a sure road to loneliness and despair. However, that is my personality and value system. You don't have to agree with me, either. You must decide what's important to you.

Regardless of your decisions, whether to make major or minor changes in your life and job, do decide to do your best. Let me offer one more word of advice. Never, never compare yourself to anyone else. This is a fruitless and annoying exercise in frustration. No matter how much you admire, respect or envy your mother, boss or best friend, trying to produce a carbon copy of that individual will deny what is unique and exciting about you. Certainly there are many valuable qualities in others that we may want to have in our own life. Separate the quality from the person and add the quality you admire to your personality. Please don't bury what is good in you under the personality of someone else. Look for your own assets, what you do well. Be proud of who you are and don't let the things you hear about others drag you down because of who you aren't. Just keep in mind, you are the expert on YOU. Use that knowledge to make the most of who you are. What you do professionally and personally will always reflect positively on that expertise.
