1984 Building Permits Near \$2,000,000.00!

1984 building permits for Spearman totaled approximately 2 million dollars. New residential construction totaled \$903,300. New business construction totaled \$379,600. Additions totaled \$354,680. Alterations/repairs totaled \$150,000. The grand total of estimated cost of construction for 1984 included \$1,787,580. Residential construction went from a low of \$300.00 to a high of \$400,000 dollars. New businesses constructed included a new building built by Roy Bulls, the new

First National Bank building, the Hansford Appraisal Dist. building, and the new Dr. Cobb building.

The remodeling and construction in Spearman the past year has improved the shopping and living conditions greatly. Many stores on Main Street and in the Shopping Center have remodeled and are competing greatly for the customer dollar. And the fact that residential construction approached 1 million dollars for 1984 implies that a bright future lies ahead for Spearman.

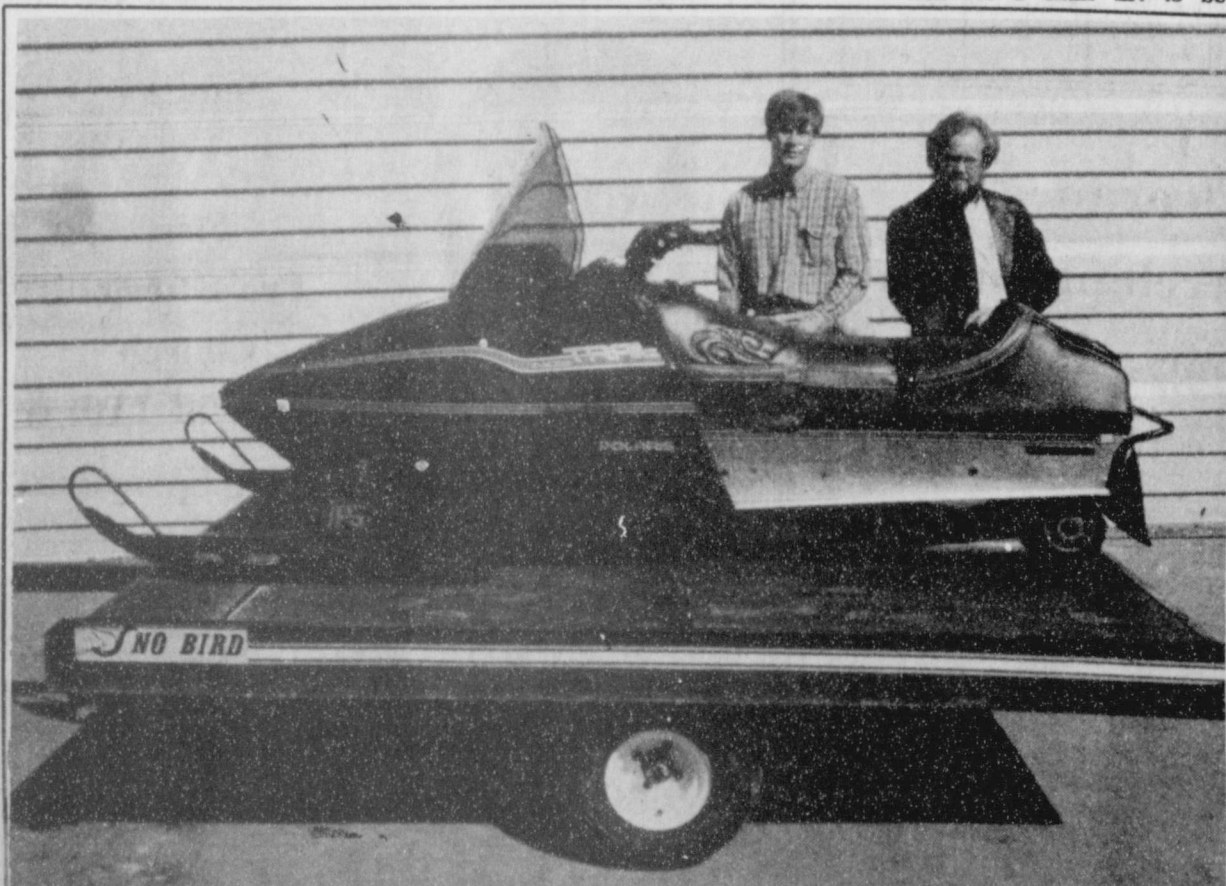

Karen's Kooky Corner

Excessive stress is not an adult-only problem anymore. While adults like to think of childhood as "the carefree years," the increasing incidence of stress symptoms in children indicates otherwise. Growing numbers of adolescent suicides, especially here in Texas, have underscored the problem.

Experts in child development point out that children have to cope with all the growing pains and uncertainties their parents faced, plus a few more. Children may be pushed to excel in school, athletics and social activities at ever-younger ages. Some youngsters are simply "over-programmed" with organized sports, music and dance lessons, clubs and planned social activities.

In addition, more children face the break-up of their families through divorce and adjustment to a single-parent family, a joint custody situation, or a new family formed by remarriage. Youngsters must often make difficult choices about drugs, smoking, drinking and sex much earlier than their parents did.

Just as their parents, kids may also worry about the economy, unemployment and nuclear war.

What all this can add up to is a stress overload that causes behavioral changes in a youngster. The

symptoms can range from compulsive crying and nightmares to difficulty concentrating, insomnia and vague physical complaints unrelated to any illness.

Parents can help their children with stress by being alert for symptoms and identifying the source promptly. They can set reasonable goals for their children, remembering that the child doesn't have to be the best at everything. Parents can also offer a positive example by managing their own stress to minimize family tension.

Youngsters can also be taught stress management techniques. Even small children can learn deep breathing, progressive relaxation by tensing and relaxing muscle groups on command, and creating positive mental pictures.

All children can find positive ways to let off steam through exercise, sports, dance and other activities - if they're left simply to enjoy themselves.

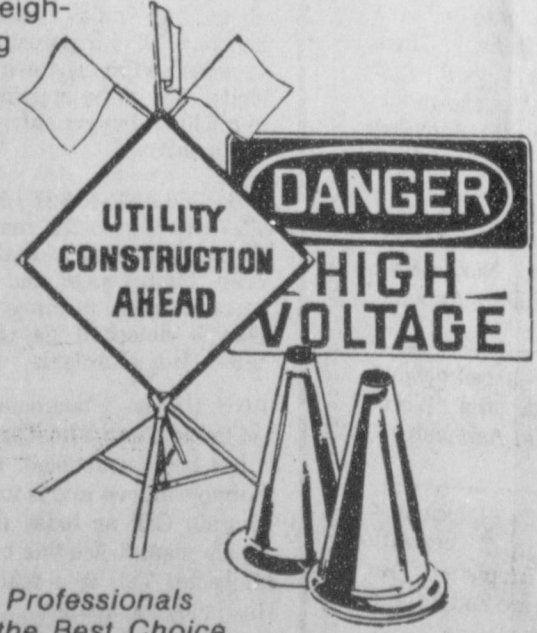

"We take a tremendous amount of pride in knowing that the Houston Livestock Show attracts entries in the junior show that are more than just animals," noted Don Jebes, Jr., assistant general manager.

"They represent continuous, hard work by a Texas youngster who's committed himself or herself to a livestock project. These junior show exhibitors are a rare breed in themselves," he added.

Premium monies available for open and junior show exhibitors top more than half a million dollars in prize money and in premium auction prices paid in excess of market value. Prior to the Show, volunteer committee

members contact auction buyers to guarantee that each market animal sold in the four junior auctions brings a price above the current market value of the animal.

Junior livestock competition includes beef heifers, dairy cattle breeding sheep, goats, commercial steers, breeding rabbits, market lambs, poultry, swine and steers. For the second year, there will be carcass contests for the market lamb, swine and steer shows.

Beginning with the 1985 Show, all junior market turkeys must be purchased from Texas A & M University as poults from the same hatch. Weight limits are then eliminated in the market turkey show due to the standardization and control this rule imposes on potential entries.

The Show this year will be the site of the Texas Beef-Cook-Off, a contest to determine the Texas representative to the National Beef Cook-Off. Sponsored by the Texas Cowbelles, it will be held in the Astro-hall on Monday, Feb. 18 and Tuesday, Feb. 19. Five Texas finalists will prepare their beef recipes for judging.

Once again, in the market lamb, barrow and steer shows, the three-judge system will be used. This system helps insure selection of an animal based on production, feeding and carcass merit.

Junior market barrows will again be sifted at the Washington County Fairgrounds in Brenham on Feb. 23-24. Sifted barrows are then loaded directly for sale through normal livestock auction consignment. Non-sifted barrows proceed to Houston and the livestock show competition.

In addition to its position as the world's largest livestock show, the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo is

also the largest donor of agricultural scholarships in the nation. A total charity benefiting youth and education, the Show currently has 885 students on scholarships and annually commits \$1.9 million to its regular scholarship program.

Also, research project money and scholarship endowment funds are given by the Show to colleges and universities throughout Texas.

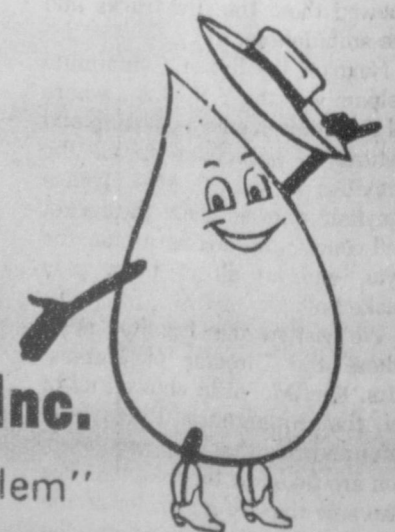

David Sorgi, senior percussionist in the Spearman High School Lynx Band, performed with the Texas All-State Symphonic Band in San Antonio Saturday, Feb. 8, as part of the Texas Music Educators Association Convention-Clinic (TMEA) meeting there. He was chosen for the honor as a result of intensive competitive auditions held earlier this year across the state at region, area and state levels.

The first tryout was held Dec. 8, 1984 at West Texas State in Canyon. David was selected first chair in that audition, which qualified him to compete in the second round audition which was held at Texas Tech University in Lubbock on Jan. 12, 1985. He was again selected first chair as a result of those auditions. The music for those auditions was extremely difficult—usually played only by college or professional performers. The music consisted of two advanced snare drum studies and three mallet etudes, two of which were performed on the marimba, and one very challenging excerpt which was played on the xylophone.

The choir audition at the state level was to determine placement into either the symphonic band or the concert band and was over the music of both bands. At this level, out of the ten best players in the state, David placed third and earned a spot in the top band, the Symphonic Band, which was directed by Dr. Karel Husa, the internationally recognized composer of music from Cornell University in Ithaca, New York. It should be pointed out that David's accomplishment is truly remarkable when you realize that he was not competing for spots just in conference AA, but competed with all conferences A-AAAAA. Usually the players from the large schools (4A-5A) tend to place 90% of the chairs, and in fact, David was the only percussionist to make All-State from a school smaller than 5A. David overcame these long odds by much hard work and determi-

nation. While most All-State performers study with private teachers at least once a week, David had to practice more diligently to try to lessen the advantage.

Performing with the All-State Symphonic Band is the highest honor David has achieved so far in his band pursuits. Among the others are four All-Region selections, three TMEA Area Band selections, one TMEA Area Orchestra selection, selection to the Five-States Honor Band, earning first division honors in solo and ensemble, and earning the John Philip Sousa National Band Award.

This was a memorable performance opportunity for David as the Symphonic Band presented a new musical work by Dr. Karel Husa entitled "Concerto for Wind Ensemble". This technically demanding musical selection had never before been attempted by high school musicians due to its extreme difficulty. But Dr. Husa, knowing the reputation of the Texas All-State bands as the premier All-State groups in the nation, was determined to put the group to the test. After the performance, he was most complimentary of the effort and the skill of the bandmen in preparation and performance of the selection.

High Plains Pavers is awarded contract

High Plains Pavers Inc. of Plainview has been awarded the contract to seal coat 119 miles of Texas Panhandle highways, including sections of three state highways in Hansford County.

State Highway 207 will be seal coated from SH 15 north 19 miles to the Oklahoma state line. SH 15 will be seal coated from Spearman northeast 7 miles to the Ochiltree County Line. The seal coat material will also be placed on SH 136 from SH 15 north, west and north 18.4 miles to the Oklahoma state line.

High Plains' bid of \$1,281,179 was the lowest of six submitted on the contract to the State Highway and Public Transportation Commission.

"Texas' recent growth has put pressure on the State's roadway system" according to A.L. McKee, Amarillo District Engineer of the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation (DHT).

In the state agency's efforts to upgrade the deteriorating network, McKee said the DHT has mobilized

its staff to design and construct improved highway facilities as rapidly as possible.

McKee said fort projects, including this seal coat work, designed by the department were left for bids to construction last month. The seal coat work in the Panhandle is expected to begin late this spring and conclude by the end of the summer.

Statewide, the majority of the projects involve some form of maintenance and rehabilitation, rather than new construction. Included are such things as resurfacing, resealing, rehabilitation of existing bridges and upgrading of sign systems.

"A seal coat rehabilitates and protects the riding surface of a highway and extends the useful life of a roadway," McKee said.

In the Panhandle a total of 236 miles of highways will be seal coated at a cost of \$2,525,879. While the statewide projects are estimated to total over \$8 million in construction costs, two-thirds of the jobs are in the less-than-one-million dollar range.

Music Students Show High Academic Achievement

A survey of the most outstanding high school musicians in Texas revealed that they are also high academic achievers. According to Texas Music Educators Association President Sally Schott, the survey was designed to demonstrate the parallel between outstanding musical accomplishments and high academic standing.

The survey was conducted during the convention of the Texas Music Educators Association in San Antonio, Feb. 7-9. It included members of the All-State Band, Orchestra and Choir. The selection process for these organizations involves a series of rigorous tryouts in which only 812 students from the 30,000 who audition win places.

Twenty-eight National Merit Scholarship Finalists and Semi-Finalists performed with these

All-State organizations. Although membership in National Honor Society is open only to juniors and seniors, disqualifying a significant number of underclassmen all-staters, 229 students have attained membership in the National Honor Society. Six hundred and seventy-two students returned surveys which were verified by their school counselors.

The most significant measure of the academic achievements of these gifted musicians is their average score on SAT tests: 1985 Texas All-State Performers average—1081; 1982 National average—893; 1982 Texas average—868. Averages by performing group: Jazz Ensemble—981; Symphonic Orchestra—1135; Philharmonic Orchestra—1135; Choir—1036; Symphonic Band—1074; Concert Band—1088.

Heart Month

Texas Governor Mark White issued a proclamation designating February as Heart Month and urged all Texans to support the 1985 campaign of the American Heart Association.

In the proclamation, Governor White asked for support from the residents of Texas in the American Heart Association's campaign against heart and blood vessel disease -- our nation's number one killer.

The proclamation reads, in part: "Heart and blood vessel disease will claim over 325,000 lives and is expected to cost our economy \$72.1 billion in 1985. This is why the American Heart Association will continue to lead the fight against heart and blood vessel disease."

Thousands of volunteers in Texas will join the effort to distribute information and collect contributions to support medical research programs, and the implementation of community service programs. These American Heart Association programs are aimed at achieving its goal of preventing premature death and disability caused by heart and blood vessel disease.

The proclamation continues: "Through the funding of extensive research programs, and the implementation of community service and public education programs, the American Heart Association helped to lower the number of deaths due to heart and blood vessel disease. For the first time since 1952, deaths from heart disease in 1983 accounted for less than 45 percent of all deaths in Texas."

"Through the support on its volunteers, cardiovascular research sponsored by the American Heart Association has grown 505 percent since 1976."

Warning issued on Hay Baler Rims

POTENTIAL TIRE SAFETY HAZARD SEEN FOR SOME IMPORTED IMPLEMENT RIMS

Washington, D.C. - A potential tire safety hazard exists for a small number of farmers who have recently purchased implements imported from Europe with wheel rims 9 inches wide between the flanges and 15.3 inches in bead seat diameter, the Tire Industry Safety Council warns.

The trouble is no U.S. manufacturer makes a replacement tire which fits that odd-sized rim, the Council says. And if you try to force a domestic-made 15 inch tire on one of those 15.3 inch rims, the beads may break during inflation with explosive force which may result in serious physical injury or even death.

The imported implements known to be equipped with the 15.3 inch rims include orchard sprayers and round hay balers. They have appeared in Arizona, California and in upper mid-west states such as Minnesota and Wisconsin.

If you own one of the implements with wheel rims having 15.3 inches in bead seat diameter, when the tires wear out, ask your implement dealer for replacement tires made to fit that rim exactly, the Council says.

If no such tires are available, ask the dealer for a new tire and wheel assembly suitable for the requirements of the unit, the Council urges.

Rims of 15.3 inch bead seat diameter have recently been so marked, but unfortunately, a few farm implements were made in Europe several years ago with both tires and rims having 15 inch bead diameter designations. The only sure way to identify the rim

bead seat diameter of these rims is to measure them. The rims in question are all of 9 inch width between the flanges and this is one indication that users will find helpful in identifying them.

"Always replace a tire on a vehicle with one of the same rim diameter designation and compatible width for safety and optimum tire performance," Council Chairman Donald G. Brotzman said.

"If an attempt is made to seat tire beads on overinflation, the tire bead may break with explosive force sufficient to cause serious injury," he added.

But the damage just one exploding tire can do to a person trying to fit it onto a wrong size rim is catastrophic. That's why the Council has issued this warning.

"For this type of service, agricultural tires produced by U.S. manufacturers are made to fit 15 inch bead seat diameter rims which are either 8 or 10 inches wide between the flanges," Brotzman explained. Such tires and rims are plentiful.

The current problem seems to have begun a few years ago when some small European manufacturers of farm implements sought to utilize surplus aircraft tires on agricultural implements.

A few of those vehicles have now been imported into the U.S. Implement tire sizes mounted on those rims include the following:

- 10.0/75-15.3
10.0/80-15.3
11.5/80-15.3
12.5/80-15.3

Prospective buyers of such equipment should check on the availability of replacement tires or replacement rims before purchasing this equipment, the Tire Industry Safety Council says.

IRS appears to be backing off regulations

Mike Moeller, President of the Texas Farmers Union, said today that he is pleased that the Internal Revenue Service appears to be backing off from their recently announced record-keeping regulations for farm and ranch vehicles. Earlier this week, Treasury Secretary-designate James Baker indicated that the IRS, yielding to pressure from the Farmers Union and other agricultural associations, would rewrite their new rules which require extensive paperwork to exclude most farmers and ranchers.

Moeller, who farms in Hays and Guadalupe counties and services as Chairman of the Board of the National Farmers Union, said that TFSU would want to closely examine the rewritten regulations when they become available before deciding whether to push for additional relief. Since the proposed new regulations were announced

last month, the Farmers Union and others have sent a deluge of protest to Congress and the IRS critical of the proposals.

"If the Federal government really wants to get more income tax dollars out of farmers," said Moeller, "they should give us a farm program that allows us to make a profit. When farmers are losing money, they aren't paying income taxes no matter how much bureaucratic red tape they have to dig through."

"The proposed regulations on farm vehicles were symbolic of this Administration's attitude toward farmers. We hope Secretary Baker follows through on his commitment to exempt farmers and ranchers."

Texas Farmers Union members at their recent state convention in Houston had voted to push for the exemption of farm and ranch vehicles from the new regulations.



KENNETH EARL BARNARD

VICTORIA, TX-- Just who is the man who calls himself "Kenneth Earl Barnard?"

Texas law enforcement authorities would sure like to know. They want him for bank robberies in Victoria and Corpus Christi. "Barnard" is also wanted by police in Utah and California for other savings and loan robberies.

Here are a few things investigators know about the suspect:

- he uses a number of aliases. He has an Arkansas driver's license issued in the name of Kenneth Earl Barnard. However, investigators have discovered that Kenneth Earl Barnard was the name of an infant who died in 1941. Other aliases used by the suspect include John Roger Canoyer, Edward R. Bright, Edward Grant, and William Grant Osborn.

- the suspect is in his early 40's, is a white male, 5-10 to 6-0 tall, 180 to 200 pounds, has short sandy blonde hair, blue eyes, and has a small facial blemish above the upper lip on the right side.

- he is an avid bridge player and compulsive gambler and travels extensively in the southwest and western states.

Investigators from the Corpus Christi Police Department and the Texas Rangers say "Barnard" robbed the First Texas Savings Association in Corpus Christi on February 8, 1984, at about 12:35 pm.

Then on Friday, March 3, 1984, the same suspect allegedly robbed the Goliad Savings and Loan in Victoria at about 2:00 pm. Witnesses say the offender entered the Savings and Loan armed with a blue steel handgun, possi-

bly an automatic. At least \$100 worth of marked money was taken in the robbery, all in \$20 denominations. The vehicle used in the robbery was rented from a Ford dealership in Victoria. Apparently the suspect switched vehicles shortly after the robbery and was last seen driving a Honda motorcycle with Arkansas plates.

Investigators say "Barnard" is also a suspect in the December 28, 1981, armed robbery of Presidential Savings and Loan in Salt Lake City, Utah, and the February 4, 1982, robbery of Gibraltar Savings and Loan in Sacramento, California. In both of those robberies, he used the alias "William Grant Osborn."

The two Texas robberies have landed "Barnard" on this week's Texas Most Wanted list. Anyone with information about the true identity of the fugitive and where he might be located is asked to call Texas Crime Stoppers toll-free at 1-800-252-8477 or their local Crime Stoppers program.

All callers may remain anonymous. A \$1,000 cash reward will be paid for information leading to the fugitive's capture.

Texas Most Wanted is a weekly cooperative effort between Crime Stoppers and the Department of Public Safety and is designed to enlist the support of citizens in capturing dangerous fugitives.

As of January 28, 1985, the Department of Public Safety reported that Barnard is wanted on the following warrants:

Corpus Christi Police Department, Warrant #24980; and Victoria County Sheriff's Office, Warrant #84-3-11-463.

Through proper and early prenatal care, the pregnant woman can receive guidance and support in maintaining or adapting health habits that will enhance her well-being and the development of her baby.

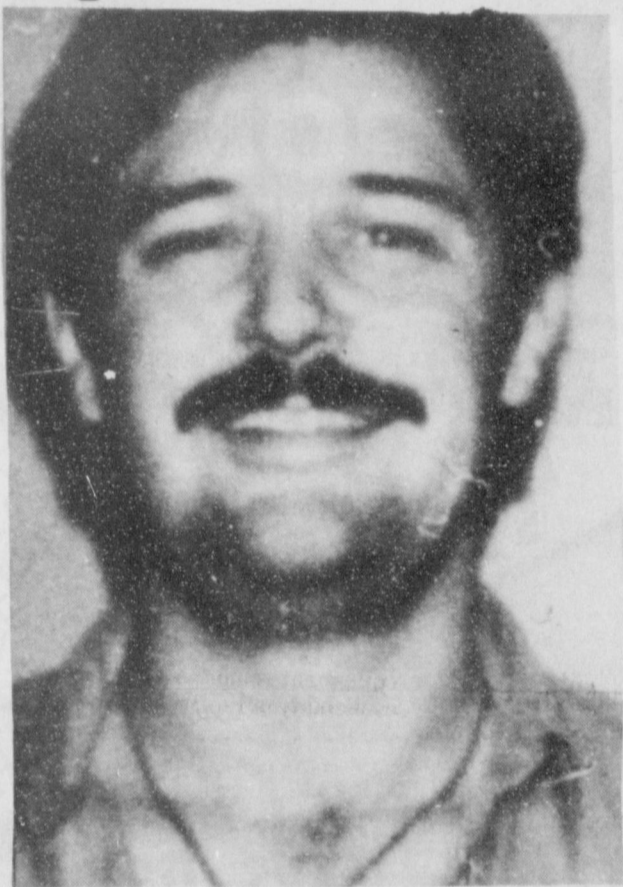
Dr. Robert Bernstein, Texas Commissioner of Health, said that as many as one third of all Texas

women who were pregnant last year failed to see a doctor in their first trimester (three months). About 10,000-15,000 women did not receive prenatal care at all.

"With proper medical supervision, expectant mothers can avoid, in many cases, the leading causes of death for babies less than 28 days old. These include birth defects, respiratory disease syndrome, prematurity, illness caused by maternal complications, and low birth weights," Bernstein said.

Fugitive of the Week



TOMMY TEUTSCH

HOUSTON, Texas -- Tommy Teutsch enjoyed the good life. Nice restaurants, expensive cars and clothes -- these were the trappings that went with Teutsch's lifestyle.

But state and federal law enforcement officials say there was another side to Teutsch's life -- one not quite so glamorous.

Investigators say the 34-year-old Corpus Christi native was involved in an international narcotics ring suspected of committing at least six murders.

Now Teutsch is running from the law and this week he has been placed on the list of Texas Most Wanted. A \$1,000 reward is being offered for information leading to the capture of Teutsch.

Investigators say Teutsch disappeared in June, 1982, after failing to appear to answer federal charges of Racketeering, Influence, Corrupt Organization (R.I.C.O.). The charges stem from a 1981

arrest in Corpus Christi on four counts of conspiracy to smuggle marijuana and cocaine into the United States.

Texas Department of Public Safety officials say Teutsch was a member of the late Samuel Camarata organization, a far-flung syndicate that had international drug connections.

Teutsch is described as a white male, 6-2, 225 pounds, with black hair and brown eyes. But investigators say Teutsch is an accomplished make-up artist and may have altered his appearance. He also uses numerous aliases, including Tommy Titsch, Tommy Tyson and Thomas William Teutsh.

Prior to his disappearance, Teutsch left a note suggesting that he was going to commit suicide. But investigators scoff at the notion, pointing out that sightings have been reported of the fugitive since then.

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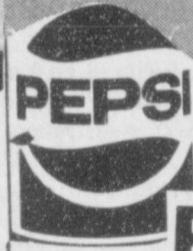
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
