If you are careful and feeling the tube as it goes in the den you may feel the tube hitting or pushing the rattlers aside. But that takes a lot of experience. But again when you
have felt this continue to push/lead the tubing to the end of the den, and again, then give the rattlers a few squits. Let me tell

Land Board holds interest rates The Texas Veterans Land Board this week announced it has been able to hold interest rates for the Veterans
Land Program below 10 percent, Land Program below 10 percent,
despite earlier action by the board to raise the rate above the 10 percent leve. VLB staff said falling market interest rates made it possible to set
the new interest rate at 9.97 percent.

The old rate for Veterans Land Program loans was 9.25 percent, but
that rate has been adjusted to 9.97 percent effective January 29, 1985identical to the rate now offered under
the Veterans Housing Assistance Program. This rate increase will mean a $\$ 10$ per month increase in payments for Veterans land loans made after this date, but the increase does not

## Veterans Job Training Act Deadlines Extended

The Veterans Administration
announced today that the Emen announoed today that the Emen sency Veterans job Training A le Korea and Vietnam that elig rans have until February 28th to make initial application for placement under the program.
Stephen Lemons, Director of the Waco VA Regional Office, said that employers now have unti September 1 to place veterans in
on-the-job training positions under the program. He seid application the program. He said applications
for renewal of eligibility from veterans already certified to participate would be accepted beyond the February 28th date.

Lemons said the program pro vides a "unique incentive" to employers to hire and train unemployed veterans. "It's particularly attractive to small businessmen, he said "because it reimburses through traditional end of year credits."
More than 20,000 veterans went to work in new jobs last year under the program; 1,676 in Texas. The A pays their employers 50 per cent of their starting hourly rate of
pay for up to nine months, 15 for disabled veterans, to a maximum reimbursement of $\$ 10,000$ per veran.
