21 Bed Addition Proposed To Hansford Manor

Al LaRochelle gave the program at the noon Lions Club, consisting of a discussion on the Hansford Manor and Hansford Hospital. He stated that a 21 bed addition to the Hansford Manor has been planned for the new future. The Manor presently has 39 beds. They have been full for the last 1 1/2 years and there is a waiting list of some 21 people wanting to get into the Manor. The Manor has a superior rating and is one of the very best in the southwest. At the present time the Board of Directors will be looking at the plans of architects about the addition. LaRochelle went ahead to say that probably three rooms will be added on the north end of the Manor and three rooms on the south end of the Manor which will make room for the extra 21 beds.

Voters will have final say on whether to build the Manor or not to build the Manor. It should cost between \$600,000 and \$1,000,000.

Board Members include: Jack Oakes, President; Alton Ellsworth, Vice President; Lesly Barkley, Sec. Tres.; and John Trindle, Jerry Hunt, and Dwight Hutchison.

Al LaRochelle stated that Dr. Sangalang will be here by July 8. He is an outstanding surgeon and will open his offices at the Hansford Clinic, formerly occupied by Dr. Muthali.

Sales tax rebate up in county

The City of Spearman and the City of Gruver both received sales tax rebates this past week which represent taxes collected on sales made in April and reported to the Comptroller by May 20.

The City of Spearman received \$14,425.46 up from the \$10,847.38 for the same period last year.

1985 payments to the City are \$94,425.46 up 26.88 over the same period last year, when they received \$74,422.34.

The City of Gruver received \$2,733.84 for this period as compared to \$2,444.99 for the same period last year. Total payments to the City of Gruver to date are \$20,009.15 compared to \$18,472.65 for last year, up 8.32.

Library could get a computer terminal

The Texas Panhandle Library System will place a computer terminal in two one-person area libraries in the fall, said Rita Curtis, Hansford County Librarian.

There are about four possible placements for the terminals in the area. The Hansford County Library is a contender for one of the terminals, Mrs. Curtis said.

The Hansford County Library has approximately 18,500 books, and total circulation was 22,000 in

1984. The two libraries that receive the terminals will have their entire book collection placed on-line. Eventually patron files and circulation will be available throughout the computer.

The TPLS will link the two libraries to the Harrington Library Consortium, a unique automated computer system, said Mrs. Curtis.

The Harrington Library Consortium wants to make each library's holdings available to everyone in

the area. Thirty percent of a library's book collection is thought to be unique. The two terminals would inform librarians of the books that are available in the area.

The Harrington Library Consortium has continued to expand since it received the first fundings through a Harrington grant. Through the terminals, retrospective conversion of library information is exchanged. The main computer is located in the Amarillo College Library. The Amarillo Pu-

blic Library, West Texas State University, and other large Panhandle libraries are linked through the Consortium.

Hopefully, in the future, all of the libraries in the Panhandle will be in the computer system, said Mrs. Curtis.

the rare art of trick riding and roman riding to give rodeo spectators the thrill and excitement they expect when she enters the arena.

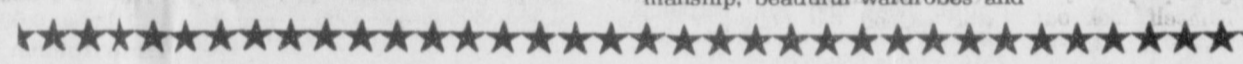

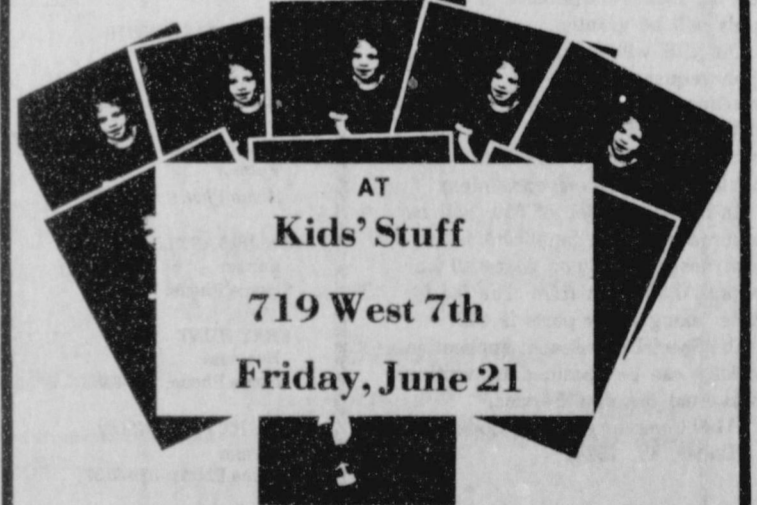
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USDA seeking public comments

WASHINGTON, June 6—The U. S. Department of Agriculture is seeking public comments on proposed provisions of the 1986 Wheat Marketing Quota Program. The program sets price supports, acreage and marketing quotas for wheat producers in years when an excess wheat crop is expected.

To become effective, marketing quotas must be approved in a referendum by two-thirds or more of the eligible wheat producers.

Everett Rank, administrator of USDA's Agriculture Stabilization and Conservation Service, said the public comments will be used to finalize program provisions for the wheat producer's referendum. Rank said, will be choosing the type of program they want in effect for the 1986 wheat crop. If two-thirds or more of the voters favor marketing quotas, basic program provisions would include mandatory acreage controls and penalties for overplanting; a three-tier price support system ranging up to 90 percent of parity (the June 1985 parity price for wheat is \$7.09 per bushel); a domestic and export certificate program financed by processors and exporters; and a mandatory unpaid land diversion program.

If one-third or more of the referendum voters opposes marketing quotas, basic program provisions would include no acreage controls or penalties for overplanting; a price support loan program set at 50 percent of parity for cooperators (price support may be extended to noncooperators); no domestic or certificate program; and no land diversion program.

Rank said that USDA wants comments on the following aspects of the program:

- eligibility requirements for voters in the producer referendum;
- method of balloting employed in the producer referendum;
- diverted acreage requirements and uses if the marketing quotas are approved by referendum;
- levels of price support for cooperating and noncooperating producers if marketing quotas are approved by referendum;
- levels of price support for cooperating and noncooperating producers if marketing quotas are disapproved by referendum.

Comments must be received no later than July 5 by the Director, Commodity Analysis Division, USDA-ASCS, Room 374-S, P.O. Box 2415, Washington, D.C. 20250. A regulatory impact statement on the 1986 Wheat Marketing Quota Program that covers the options considered may be obtain-

ed by writing to the same address or calling (202) 447-3391. Further details on the proposal were published in the June 5 Federal Register.

Burning wheat stubble is adding cost to you. For an average wheat crop, burning stubble sends about ten dollars worth of nitrogen fertilizer an acre up in smoke. All nitrogen in residue is lost by burning.

Using conservation tillage, however, you can plant in wheat stubble and use the nitrogen that is tied up in the residue said Duval Burton, Soil Conservationist for USDA's Soil Conservation Service at Spearman, Texas.

"The use of wheat residue is especially important in the Hansford Soil and Water Conservation District, where more than 113,000 acres are planted annually," Burton continued. "Less than 10,000 acres are planted by conservation tillage. This practice, depending upon equipment used, leaves from 90 to 30 percent residue on the ground after planting.

"When residue decomposes in the soil surface, the nitrogen is made available for the next crop. In addition to the nitrogen, decomposing stubble adds organic matter to the soil, helps control erosion, reduces soil moisture loss, and improves soil aeration, tilth, and permeability. The stubble also helps provide a habitat for such wildlife as pheasants, rabbits, and quail."

Burton said to make the nitrogen in the residue available requires the activity of numerous soil or-

ganisms. They flourish in a soil rich in organic matter.

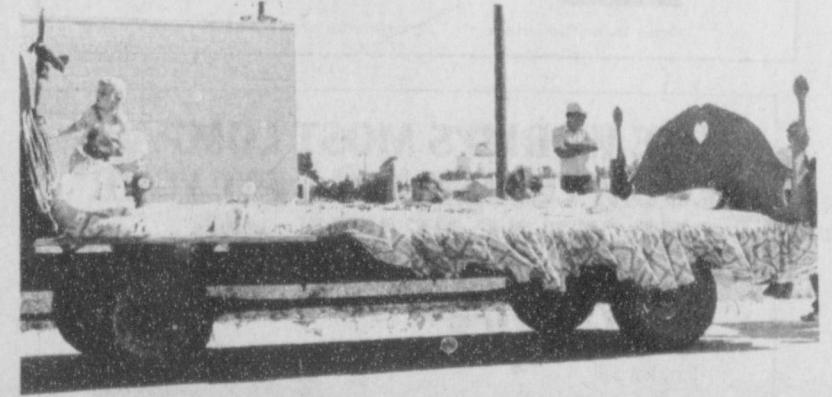
"One important organism is the earthworm," Burton said. Research has shown that earthworms increase when a dependable supply of crop residue is available.

"They digest the organic matter and pass nutrient-enriched soil through their bodies. This recycles nutrients and makes the soil richer. In addition, their tunnels allow air and water to penetrate soil more

rapidly. Burning stubble takes away possible organic matter.

"Don't pollute the air by burning money--that is, wheat stubble. Use conservation tillage to keep your nitrogen, protect against erosion, and improve the soil."

IRS enrollment exam

Tax practitioners who are not CPA's or attorneys may qualify to represent their clients before the IRS by successfully completing the Special Enrollment Examination. The 2-day examination, given annually, is scheduled for October 10-11, 1985.

Individuals who wish to take the 1985 examination must have the application postmarked no later than July 31, 1985. No extension of time to apply will be granted.

The IRS will send to applicants, upon request, a copy of a special enrollment examination package which includes the application form, instruction, study materials, and regulations governing enrollment.

An application fee of \$50 will be required with the application form from those who plan on taking all four parts of the examination. The fee for those taking fewer parts is \$40.

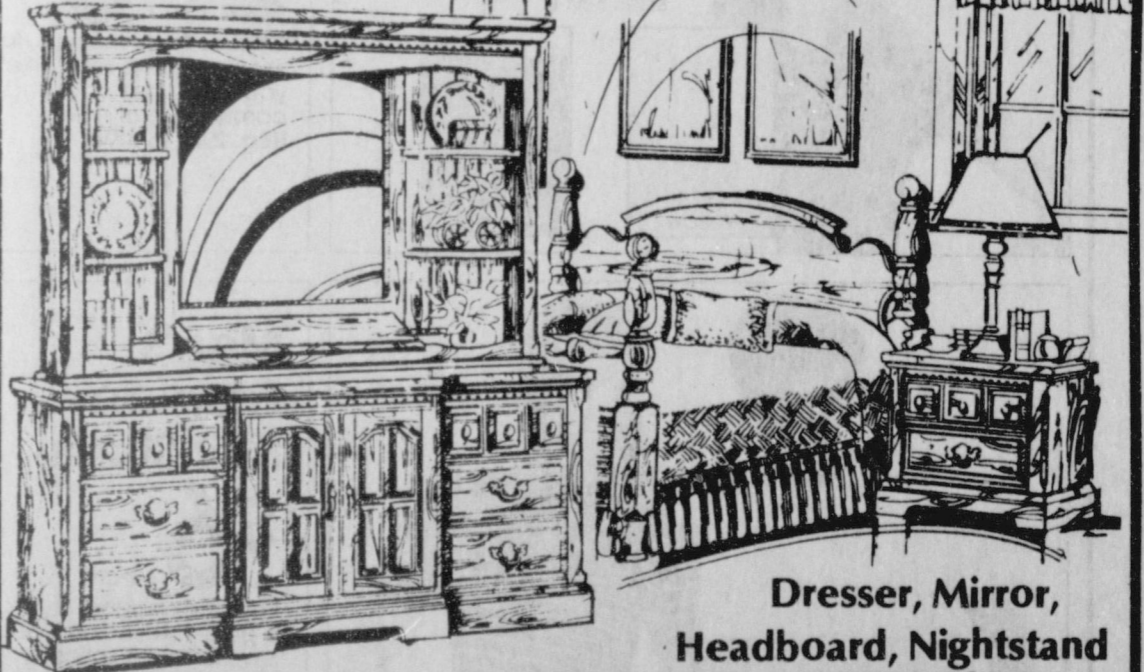
