New Wing Ready at the Museum

The Spearman Museum recently completed several new display cases. The display cases are available to anyone who might wish to buy one.

The new room addition to the museum has been finished and the public is invited to come by and see the progress being made at the Stationmasters Museum.

One of his Georgia delegation colleagues in Washington, Congressman Richard Ray (from Perry, 3rd District), says this move was the signal Nunn is looking hard at the national political situation.

Nunn was recently quoted, however, as saying: "I just haven't developed an interest in running for national office." But since Henry Jackson (D-Wash.) died in 1983, he has been ranking Democrat on the Senate Armed Services Committee, and he has won wide praise for his leadership.

He has won the grudging admiration of President Reagan and the White House. Recently, Nunn was named "Outstanding Young Man" by the Georgia Young Men's Christian Association.

Republican he would support him for president. Levin says he's the best informed member of the committee.

Nunn is very close to Senator Lawton Chiles of Florida, was one of 11 senators who supported him for the job of Senate Minority Leader in January 1985. He's also close to Tennessee's new and liberal young senator, Albert Gore.

But he refused to back Gore for a seat on the Armed Services Committee last year, backing John Glenn of Ohio, because he thought Democrats already had enough liberals on the committee. (He'll back Gore for a future seat.)

Nunn once angered President Carter so much Carter threatened to withhold his support. His first senate campaign had an anti-Carter aroma. But they have made up. Thus he's not an all-out partisan Democrat. He won't campaign against his Republican friends, like Senator John Warner of Virginia (though he likes Gov. Charles Robb).

He helped Gov. Jim Hunt in North Carolina and might help Bob Graham this year. But his loyalty to Republican friends, refusal to be all-out partisan, and lack of desire and service to his constituents could make him a hard sell.

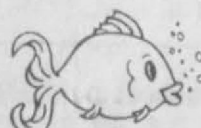

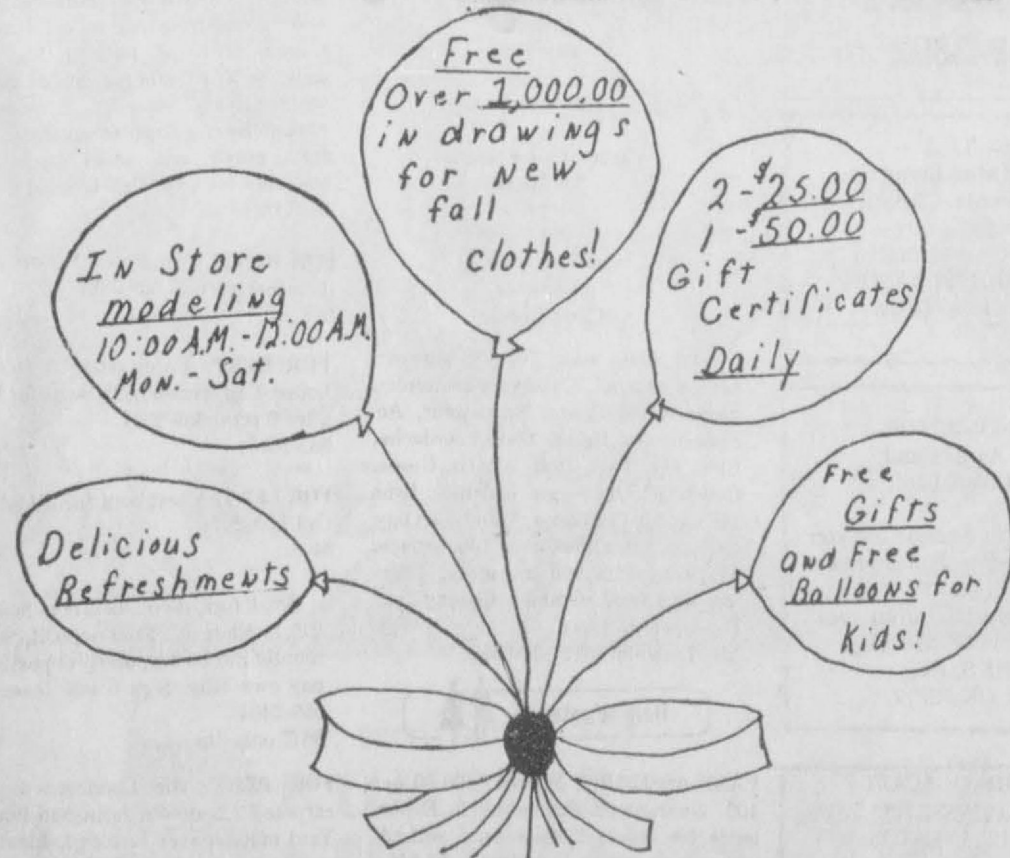

Guidelines Released

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Tuesday released guidelines to county governments in Texas to simplify accounting for the state's new Indigent Health Care (IHC) Act.

"It is our responsibility to provide a system that will make the paperwork easier for the Texas counties while they give health care to the areas that need it most," Bullock said.

The INC law, passed in 1985, requires county governments to provide medical assistance to the county's residents who can not support themselves. The IHC act will effect 70,000 Texans who do not qualify for other federal or state health care programs.

Texas counties are likely to spend as much as \$20 million in the 1986-87 biennium on medical services as a result of the IHC act, Bullock estimates. The Indigent Health Care Accounting Systems Manual is a step-by-step approach to deal with these funds.

The over 200 page manual can be used independently or integrated into

the Standard Financial Management System for Texas Counties, also produced by Bullock's office. The Comptroller's Financial Management System for counties and the system designed for cities are both highly praised for effectively helping local governments in Texas with their accounting functions.

The IHC manual includes sections on budgeting for IHC, accounting procedures and financial management procedures. Also included in the manual is a section on internal auditing. In each of these sections comprehensive examples are given to show transactions that relate to the IHC program.

A copy of the Indigent Health Care Act is also included in the manual along with a glossary of accounting terms that are commonly used.

The IHC accounting manual was produced by employee Glenna Hastings during her internship with the Comptroller's office this past spring. Hastings was one of the first nine college students to participate in the Comptroller's Honors Internship Program.

Broaden the State's Sales Tax Base

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Friday said his staff is drafting a plan to broaden the state's sales tax base to make it fairer and at the same time raise additional revenue at lower rates.

"We are looking at taxing all goods and services, except food, medicine and medical services," Bullock said.

Bullock said that by removing exemptions and broadening the tax base, hopefully the present sales tax rate of 4.125 percent can be reduced.

"We are not only seeking ways to raise revenue for state government, but we are seeking to make the sales tax more equitable."

Bullock said that the service sector of the Texas economy accounts for nearly 20 percent of the state's non-farm employment and is virtually untaxed.

"We haven't put the final pencil to it,

but I think we can lower the present rate, make it fairer and less regressive and still keep an income tax off the backs of Texans."

Bullock said his plan to broaden the sales tax would be ready for the Legislature, if they meet in August.

"I'm going to try to give the Legislature the broadest possible range of options we can possibly put together. It will be their prerogative to add to or take away from this blueprint."

He said the budget deficit isn't something that you can put under your pillow and hope the tooth fairy will take care of it.

"If the Legislature addresses only budget cuts in a special session, that's just fine. With our plan at least they will have something to study when and if they decide to bite the bullet."

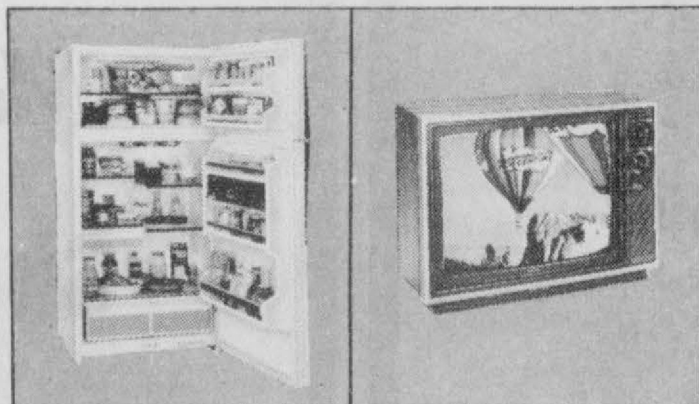

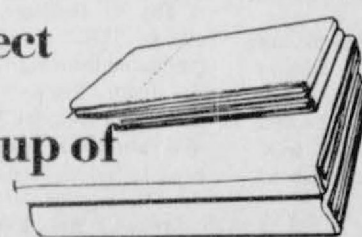
