## Senate Moves To Support Low Income and Elderly Housing

Washington, D.C., June 18th, 1986 - One of the most meaningful issues involved in the quest for tax reform is being discussed here this week as the Senate considers an amendment to its current tax reform bill designed to continue incentives for private sector participation in federally sponsored programs aimed at providing housing for low income families, the elderly and the handicapped.

The amendment, known as the Mitchell Amendment after its sponsor, Senator George Mitchell of Maine, will correct some serious oversights in the Senate Finance Committee's proposed tax reform bill. If passed in its present form, the bill would cause increased deterioration and abandonment of existing low income housing projects. It would also eliminate incentives for

private developers to build new projects in areas where they are sorely needed. "While it clearly was not their intent, the Senate Finance Committee has crafted a bill that could deal a devastating blow to the preservation and development of low income housing," says Barry Zigas, Executive Secretary of the National Low Income Housing Coalition.

Support for the Mitchell Amendment is running high in the Senate, even among those who favor passing the Finance Committee's package as is. "The reason is simple dollars and

cents," explained Warren Geddes, Chairman of the Rural Housing Action Committee. "It will be far less expensive for the government to retain a few tax incentives for these programs than to foreclose on upwards of \$15 billion worth of deteriorated low income housing units."

Even with the incentives retained by the Mitchell Amendment, private investments in low income housing will still not be as attractive as in the past.

However, the Mitchell Amendment is a step in the right direction and may lead to additional low income housing incentives later this year when the Conference Committee attempts to reconcile the Senate tax reform bill with the one passed by the House last December.

## Texas Tax Break

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Friday said Texans will get a multi-million dollar tax break because of a Senate vote on the federal tax overhaul bill that will permit partial deduction of state sales tax.

Bullock said the sales tax amendment, co-sponsored by Texas Sen. Phil Gramm and supported by Texas Sen. Lloyd Bentsen, would let Texas taxpayers deduct 60 percent of their state and local taxes in figuring federal income taxes.

"The sales tax provision will save Texans who use this deduction at least \$112 million. Anytime we don't have to send over \$100 million to Washington, it's good news," Bullock said.

Bullock said Gramm's amendment was especially beneficial to Texas

because the tax reform bill pending in the U.S. Senate originally allowed deductions for state and local income taxes.

"We were being penalized because we didn't have a state income tax despite the fact that we don't want an income tax," Bullock said.

Bullock said the amendment would save a deduction worth more than \$270 to the average Texas taxpayer who files an itemized return.

He said that Texans claimed an average of \$449 in sales tax deductions in 1984 and the 60 percent rule would preserve most of that deduction.

According to Bullock, about 27 percent of Texas taxpayers itemize on federal returns so the amendment allowing sales tax deductions will affect more than one-in-four taxpayers.

# Officer dismissed

The city council met in regular session here Tuesday night with all city council members present and the mayor, plus some dozen or so visitors. Also present was the local news media and channel 7 TV. Channel 7 TV

First on the agenda was the discussion of the minutes of the June 10th meeting. They were approved by the council.

The council also approved the hiring of the Appraisal District for \$12,020.00 to handle their tax collections for the coming year.

Consideration was given for updating the Fire Dept. Paging system. Chief Antalek agreed to wait until next year and include some \$2500.00 in the budget to handle this project as the council was trying to stay within their budget for the year.

The council went into executive session shortly after 8 p. m. They were out of session by 8:54 p. m., supposedly to discuss the local personnel.

A crowd was on hand to discuss the firing of Jerry Newell, local police officer. Newell was fired because of violation of written policy. Newell had picked up an allegedly drunk teen-ager on a motorcycle at 1 a. m. Saturday morning (approximate on time). She was driving and had a passenger with her on the motorcycle in Spearman. Officer Newell put the teen age

girl in the front seat with him, and started to Perryton to give her a "Breathalyzer Test." Spearman and Gruver can not give these tests, because we do not have a hiway patrolman in the county!

As the officer and his teen-age prisoner approached Perryton the girl jumped out of the car. She was bruised, and taken to the Perryton Hospital. She is recovering, at this time. The officer was dismissed, according to Chief Joe Raper, because she was not "restrained" in the police car. It was learned from Chief Raper that the back seat of the car would not lock up, so apparently she had to be put in the front of the squad car.

Chief Raper stated that "under city policy" Newell was dismissed because he did not have a seat belt or some kind of restraint on the teen-age girl. Several local citizens were on hand to testify on Newell's behalf at the meeting here Monday night.

Mayor Blodgett stated that under city policy, if a person is dismissed, and wants a hearing he can appear before city manager Jim Murray. And, at 10 a. m. Thursday morning, at the city hall Newell has been granted a hearing. If the city manager agrees with the Chief on "the firing of the officer" then Newell may appeal to the city commission for another hearing.

In other action at the council meeting Tuesday night. Councilman Mike Cudd discussed the possibility of running a diagram, drawing, and pictures of the approach and new markings at "Crazy Corners." We will of course do everything to make the new markings available to our readers in the near future. In the meantime, the state hiway dept. is working at crazy corners to make it safer to the public.

## ARB To Begin Hearing Appeals of Property Values On July 1, 1986

ARB to begin Hearing Appeals of Property values on July 1, 1986

Taxpayers in the Hansford County Appraisal District will have an opportunity (next month) to protest values proposed for their property for local taxes. Protest hearings by the appraisal review board (ARB) begin on July 1, 1986.

When the ARB concludes its hearings and approves a final roll of property appraisals, local governments will levy their taxes against values from that roll.

Alice Peddy, chief appraiser for the district, said that a taxpayer who wants to lodge a protest of a proposed value must file a written "notice of protest" with the ARB. The taxpayer must file the protest by June 30 or within 30 days of receiving a notice of appraised value from the chief appraiser, whichever is later.

If the ARB sends a property owner a notice of any other kind of change in the appraisal records on the property, the owner has only 10 days to file a protest.

According to Mrs. Peddy, the ARB is a group of appraisal district residents appointed by the district's directors to see that property values are equal and uniform and to consider claims for exemptions and agricultural value.

Property owners appear before only one review panel, the chief appraiser noted, instead of one for each taxing unit. "They may protest any of seven specific actions of the appraisal office," she said.

- The seven protest areas are:
- the appraised or agricultural value of the property;
  - unequal appraisal of the taxpayer's property in comparison to the median level of appraisals of other property in the district;
  - inclusion of the property on the appraisal records;
  - denial of a partial exemption, such as a homestead exemption;
  - denial of agricultural-use, open-space or timber productivity valuation;
  - identification of the taxing unit or units in which the property is located;

and --determination that the taxpayer is the owner of the property.

Taxpayers may also protest any other actions of the appraisal office that apply to and adversely affect them. However, Mrs. Peddy said that the ARB has no authority over tax rates or taxing unit spending and will not hear any protests of those matters.

Official forms for a notice of protest are available at the appraisal office. "But a letter from the taxpayer is also acceptable as a notice," the chief appraiser said, "as long as it identifies the property owner and the property which is the subject of the protest and indicates dissatisfaction with some decision or action of the appraisal office."

The ARB will schedule hearings as property owners file protests and will inform them of the time, date and place of their individual hearings at least 15 days before the scheduled date.

Each protesting taxpayer may appear in person to offer evidence or argument but may also offer the evidence or argument by affidavit without appearing personally.

After the ARB decides on a protest, it will notify the property owner of the decision by certified mail.

Mrs. Peddy said that protest hearings will be held for (one day), and the ARB expects to be able to approve the appraisal records on (July 16, 1986). State law requires the ARB to review and approve the appraisal records by July 20.

After the ARB approves the records, it can hear a protest under very limited circumstances. If a property owner can prove that the ARB or the appraisal office did not deliver a required notice, then the board can hear the taxpayer's protest on any of the permitted protest topics. The ARB may also hear a late protest if the chief appraiser and the property owner jointly request correction of an error in the records that substantially affects the owner's tax liability.

A pamphlet issued by the State Property Tax Board in Austin and available from the appraisal office explains how to prepare and present an appeal. ## Congressman Beau Boulter Reports from Washington



### INCREASING FARM INCOME

In light of the current depressed state of agriculture, the Secretary of Agriculture should jump at any chance he gets to constructively help the American farmer without busting the federal budget. I have introduced a resolution which, by bolstering farm income and reducing burdensome commodity surpluses, has the potential to do just that. Through a relatively inconspicuous provision of the 1985 Food Security Act, the Secretary has the authority to accept bids for up to \$20,000 in payments for land diversion. These payments, it should be noted, would be in the form of surplus Commodity Credit Corporation crops.

*This is a chance to increase farm income, reduce carryover stock, AND reduce future budgetary expenditures.*

Section 1009(c) of the 1985 Farm Bill gives the Secretary of Agriculture the authority to accept bids from producers for the conversion of crop acres to diverted acres, in return for payment in kind from CCC surplus stocks.

The key element of this provision is that the payments aren't counted as part of the normal \$50,000 per person payment limitation established under section 1001 of the Farm Bill. They are, as I mentioned, limited to a total of \$20,000 per producer for any one commodity.

My resolution expresses the sense of Congress that the Secretary should take full advantage of the authority to implement this program and provide much needed relief. It will provide the opportunity for increased farm income as producers would have the option of submitting bids and receiving payments in addition to deficiency payments and land diversion payments. The separate \$20,000 payment limit assures that all participating pro-

ducers would have the ability to take advantage of this program.

The program would also reduce huge carryover stocks that are creating downward price pressure on the commodity markets, and would lower future government storage costs for holding those stocks.

Finally, the in-kind payments do not constitute a direct budgetary outlay.

This is the kind of help hard-pressed farmers need to get through this particularly hard time. My resolution has the strong support of the American Farm Bureau, the National Wheat Growers, the National Cotton Council, and the National Corn Growers. Together we will continue to urge Secretary Lyng to take advantage of this program to address our currently troubled agriculture community.

I have introduced two other pieces of legislation which would provide assistance to the agriculture economy. The first would ease banking restrictions so that agriculture loans can be restructured rather than written off as non-performing assets. The other, the Foreign Agricultural Investment Reform Act (FAIR), would stop the flow of U.S. taxpayer dollars into foreign countries for the subsidization of agriculture commodity production.

There aren't any simple solutions to the current farm crisis. However, the government, through its policies of high interest rates and embargoes, has had a hand in creating many of agriculture's problems, and government must take some responsibility for providing assistance to our farm families and rural America. Each of the three legislative remedies I have proposed would provide significant relief while working toward a system of less government involvement and greater individual freedoms.

## Orange Chiffon Cake: An American Delight


### Orange Chiffon Cake

- 2 1/4 cups cake flour
- 1 1/2 cups sugar
- 3 teaspoons baking powder
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 cup vegetable oil
- 5 egg yolks, at room temperature
- 3 tablespoons grated orange peel
- 3/4 cup orange juice
- 8 egg whites, at room temperature
- 1/2 teaspoon cream of tartar

Sift flour, sugar, baking powder, and salt into mixer bowl. Make a well in the center and add oil, egg yolks, and orange peel. Beat on low speed 30 seconds. Stop and scrape bowl. Add orange juice. Beat on high speed 1 minute. Remove from bowl and set aside.

Place egg whites and cream of tartar in a clean mixer bowl. Beat on high speed until stiff but not dry. Fold flour mixture into egg whites, just until blended.

Pour batter into an ungreased 10-inch tube pan. Bake at 325° F for 55 minutes. Increase oven to 350° F and bake 10



minutes longer. Invert cake to cool. To remove from pan, gently loosen all edges with a paring knife. Place on serving plate and drizzle Orange Glaze over top.

Yield: one 10-inch cake.

### Orange Glaze

- 1/2 cup orange juice
  - 4-5 tablespoons sugar
- Place orange juice and sugar in small saucepan. Bring to a boil over medium heat and stir until slightly thickened. Remove from heat and cool.



## Karen's Kozy Korner

Early summer is good to us in Texas. Garden - Fresh vegetables and fruits are widely available and because of their abundance, their prices are low. Home gardens are doing nicely, too, so lots of folks are starting to preserve surplus food for later use.

But is home food preservation "worth it"? An economic analysis says, "sometimes."

First, consider the direct costs of food preservation: The cost of the produce itself; other ingredients needed to put up the food; the containers and equipment; and the gas or electrical energy for processing and freezing food.

Then there are the indirect costs, such as the time it takes to preserve food. This cost depends on the value you place on your time. Plan to spend close to three hours in the kitchen for every seven quarts of tomatoes or peaches you can.

Another indirect cost is whether the food you preserve will actually be eaten. If you can green beans, and the family won't eat them, the cost will be high.

Researchers have shown a real cost advantage in canning peaches and tomatoes, especially if you either raise the produce or get it free, and if you already own canning jars and equip-

ment.

It might cost you as little as 5 cents a quart to can your tomatoes; in the store you may pay over a dollar a quart. Home-canned peaches can cost as little as 11 cents a quart and more than \$1.50 in the supermarket. But if you have to buy both the peaches and the canning jars, the cost goes up to about 94 cents a quart.

Freezing produce gives good results, but can be costly. Energy costs may represent half the total cost of freezing green beans, for example. If your freezer isn't very energy efficient and your electrical rate is high, the cost of running it might wipe out any savings from gardening and preserving food.

But if you just enjoy preserving food, this economic analysis probably won't make much difference to you. You don't care what the cost-you just know that come next winter you'll want to eat some garden-fresh, home-grown produce from your own pantry.
