DC holds off Mules in aerial show Late rally lifts Mustangs to 45-27 victory

MULESHOE—For the second week in a row, it was the tale of two halves for the Muleshoe football team as the Mules dropped their home opener to Denver City, 45-27, at Benny Douglas Stadium.

In a game that was closer than the final score would indicate, the Mules (1-1) fell behind 24-6 early in the second quarter and went into the locker room trailing 31-13 at the half, but the third quarter was a different story.

Muleshoe scored two straight touchdowns to close the gap to 31-27 with 4:49 left in the quarter and it seemed as if the comeback was inevitable.

Denver City, however, scored on a 51-yard completion from David Azam to David Todd Carrillo and added a touchdown with :16 left to save the victory.

"The Denver City kids know how to believe, we're

County to set tax rates; hold hearing

The Bailey County Commissioners Court will meet on Monday, Sept. 12 at 10 a.m. at the Bailey County Courthouse.

The Court on Monday is expected to consider general fund and farm to market flood control tax rates for 1994 and set tax rates. They will also consider sheriff's fees and Emergency Medical Services rates.

During the meeting, the Court will also conduct a public hearing on the fiscal year 1995 budget (at 1 p.m.) and will consider and adopt the county budget for the fiscal year 1995.

The Court will discuss and consider a solution to deputy's compensatory time, amend the personnel policy and consider authorizing the county judge to advertise for bids for Law Enforcement Liability Insurance.

yards, 2 TDs) and the Mules were still alive.

Garbarino displayed his versatility as he caught the quick slant and spun around back to the sidelines, causing the Mustang defender (Wells) to trip over his own feet. Garbarino won the footrace to the goal line and Muleshoe trailed 31-13.

The Mules held Denver City on their opening possession of the third quarter and blocked Azam's punt at the 34-yard line. After an offensive pass interference call moved the ball back to the 40-yard line, Gauna found Garbarino down the right sideline for 38 yards.

Garbarino ran a stop and go route and used his size to out-jump Mustang corner Jeremy Wells and took the ball to the 2-yard line and a late hit by Denver City gave the Mules a first a goal at the one. Gauna poked his way into the end zone and Muleshoe trailed 31-20.

"We split Daniel out by himself, one-on-one with their DBs and we took advantage of his size," Adair said. "He's 6-2 and their corner was 5-7. It doesn't take a Phi Beta Kap-

pa to figure out who's going to win that match up."

The Mules next score again came after a great play by their special teams. Jesus Flores fielded a 50-yard Azam punt and made three defenders miss before breaking down the right sideline for 30 yards.

Gauna once again went to his Garbarino, this time for 53 yards and a score. Gauna took a quick drop and lofted the ball over the outstretched hands of Mustang corner Michael Davis and Garbarino broke free for the final 25 yards.

"I don't think Denver City knew that we were capable of doing what we did offensively," Adair said. "We got back in the game and did some things to them."

Gauna finished the game 9-20 for 181 yards and a pair of touchdowns, but was intercepted three times as the Mules were forced to throw the ball down the field late in the game. He also led the Mule rushing attack with 19 yards and two scores on 11 carries. Robert Toscano picked up 12 yards on six carries.

The board will also receive a report on the Practical Parent Education Program that is being implemented in the district this fall.

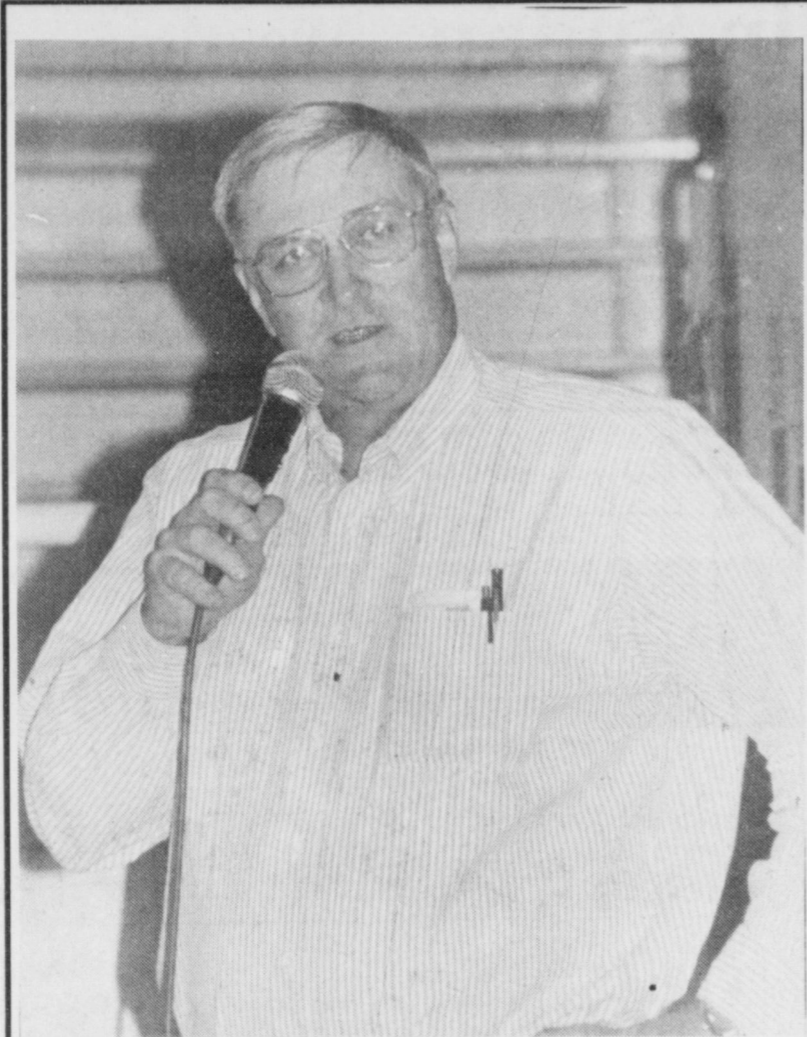
The board will conduct an executive session to receive resignations and considered hiring new personnel, followed by possible action following the closed session.

The company places work at home ads in newspapers offering a guide containing listings of companies that offer opportunities for making money from the home. The guide costs \$29 plus \$5.00 shipping and handling.

The BBB in Idaho reports that the company has been responsive to any complaints brought to their attention however the company has a pattern of using the BBB as a reference in its marketing.

Use of the Bureau name is prohibited. BBBs across the country routinely advise potential homeworkers to be aware that work at home promotions seldom offer salaried employment. Give us a call at 763-0459 and request "Tips on Work-at-Home Schemes".

Salespersons who peddle books of coupons for only \$20 or \$30 will claim that the coupons are good for merchandise and services valued at thousands of dollars.


However, before you start clipping your way to savings, make sure you'll get the deal that is promised. Coupon books are typically designed, developed and sold by commercial marketing companies.

The company enters a community and encourages merchants to participate by promising them new customers and increased business from buyers who will use their coupons. To sell their product to the public, promoters claim the books have a retail value equal to the maximum possible value of all the coupons combined.

Coupon books can represent a real value, and at the same time introduce you to new stores or restaurants. But, be wary of exaggerated or misleading claims, ask to look through the book before you purchase, and check them out with your BBB first - call 763-0459.

Area cotton growers manage aphids

LUBBOCK - Cotton growers in West Texas are turning to Integrated Pest Management (IPM) to help minimize potential problems such as pyrethroid resistance and the flaring of secondary insects such as aphids. The IPM philosophy is geared toward providing the cotton crop a fast start, rapid development and an early maturity. Insect control is a major component in managing for earliness. In recent years, West Texas growers have had severe problems

with secondary insects such as aphids. According to Jim Leser, entomologist with the Texas Agricultural Extension service, aphid populations reached unprecedented levels in 1991 and caused yield losses valued at over \$88 million with accompanying control costs of \$25 million.

"Clearly the use of insecticides for control of other insects can have a profound effect on the later development of cotton aphid infestations," Leser says. "In our tests, the increase in aphid numbers following pyrethroid use appeared to be at least partially attributed to an increase in the aphid's reproduction."

"For this reason, the Cotton Aphid Task Force was created following this record aphid infestation," Leser explains. "Its goal was to coordinate research and extension efforts, and it continues to focus on factors that influence aphid outbreaks and management."

Growers should carefully consider their options for bollworm control while pyrethroids are inexpensive, effective bollworm materials, the problems associated with using them any prove to be much more expensive.

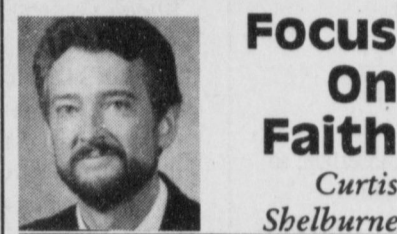
a sports coat? Tradition speaks loudly, but often the question is not one of right or wrong. God's word gives no clue (though the "bedsheet" dress of early Christians might favor the robe!). Does it matter?

Go ahead and sing the grand old hymns! Or belt out the old songs with bass and alto leads! Either way, do it with joy to the glory of God! But God forbid that we cut ourselves off from God's children who choose differently.

Robert Roberts writes, "If you're from Bumpkin Ridge you may need a different strategy than genuflections and incense. It's the old favorite hymns that make you feel the religion in your heart.... And it's not the priest crossing himself that makes you feel religious, but the thump of his fist on the pulpit, and the song leader flingin' his arms every which way. If there isn't enough arms-flingin' and Bible-thumping, the Holy Spirit just doesn't grip on you. If the high liturgy was a French dinner, this is a hotdog and a Coke."

There's a place for both. After all, given the right setting, both French dinners and hotdogs & cokes have a very useful place.
