Hackley memorial benefits Hansford Manor

Trustees for the Dr. Hackley memorial fund presented a check for \$6,618.94 to Hansford Manor last week for a wide screen TV for the lobby and for the sprinkler system for the lawn.

There will be a picture and plaque of Dr. Hackley presented to the manor.

Taking care of elderly patients was a special duty to Dr. Hackley. He was active in getting the first nursing home in Spearman and treated many elderly patients without charge so this presentation to the Manor is very fitting.

Dr. Hackley, who opened his practice here in 1945, died Jan. 19, 1976 at the age of 54 at Hansford Hospital following an illness of about two months.

He attended Kirksville College of Osteopathic Medicine in Missouri from 1941 to 1944 and interned in the Amarillo Osteopathic Hospital before opening his office here.

Dr. Hackley was very active in civic and community affairs here.

He was appointed mayor in 1967, serving out the term of the late Bob

Vaughn and was elected to the position two times.

He was past president of the Lions Club, Chamber of Commerce. He was a charter member of the Rotary Club. He served on the Spearman School board from 1959-1965 and on the Hansford County School Board from 1967 until the time of his death.

He was chairman of Panhandle Regional Planning Commission in 1971 and was a member of the board of directors from 1969 until 1971.

In 1973 he was named a director of the Texas Municipal League and was a member of the Governor's Rural Development Commission from 1972-1973 and was chairman of the health division of that commission.

Dr. Hackley was a member of the regional health council board of the Discovery Center in Amarillo.

He was instrumental in securing treatment for handicapped children in the Spearman area.

In 1974, he was named in Texas Who's Who.

The memorial fund was begun after his death by 15 couples who

gave \$250 each and the fund has grown through the years with the annual Dr. Hackley Memorial Golf Tourney which is held each year.

The first Hackley Memorial golf tournament was held May 23, 1976.

The following tribute appeared in the Spearman Reporter on the occasion of his death.

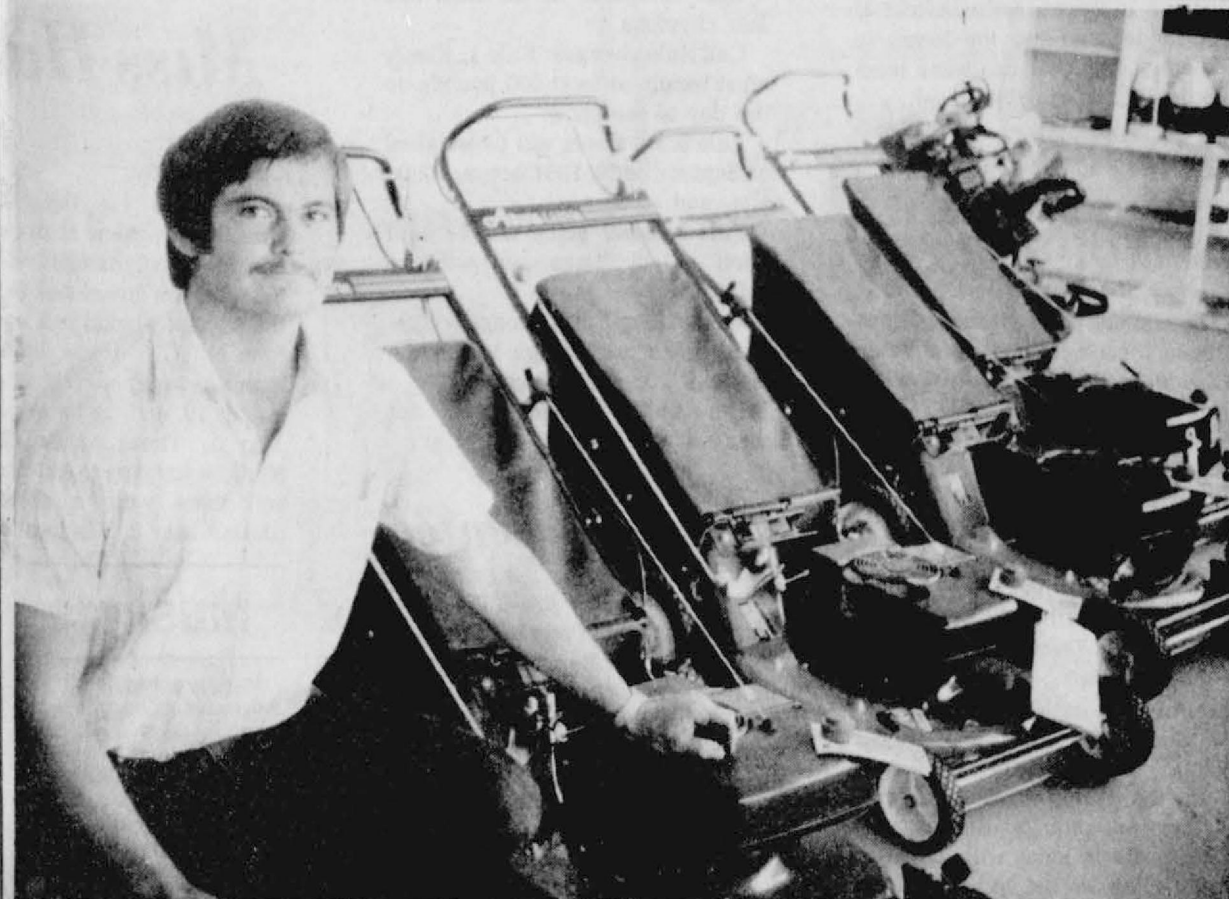

Steer validation date set

The Hansford County Steer validation date has been set for Monday, June 25, 1984 from 7:00 a.m. to 10:00 a.m. at Val Winger's in Gruver for all steers showing at major shows. Steers showing at County Show only will be weighed on Saturday, September 29.

The Hansford County Stock Show Board voted to change some rules for the County Stock Show. The following General Rules have been changed or added.

Rule 22. Each exhibitor will show and sell his own animal unless he has approval of Show Superintendent for someone else to show it, otherwise they will not show or sell.

Rule 28. Absolutely no hay in barn.

Rule 29. No feed, buckets, or troughs left unattended.

Rule 30. Clean up all wool and hair clippings.

Calf Rule changes: Rule 1. Steers must weigh at least 900 pounds on the day of the show.

Rule 6. All steers will be weighed on September 29, 1984 between 7:00 a.m. and 10:00 a.m.

Rule 7. Steer stalls will be kept clean at all times and will be enforced.

Market Hog Rules changed. Rule 6. All hogs must weigh within the range of 200 and 250 pounds.

The Sheep Rules were not changed.

There are 103 candidates for master's degrees and two candidates for education specialist degrees.

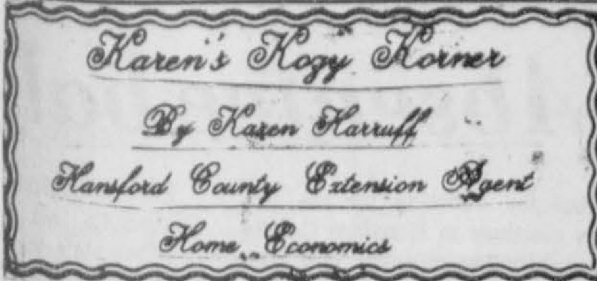

You may not think about it much, but every time you go to the store to buy anything—groceries, a new dress, a video game—you're contributing to the economy and employment.

The third week in April is traditionally "National Consumer's Week." This year, it will highlight the importance of consumers in the marketplace and the fact that "consumers mean business."

Consumer spending patterns have a significant influence on the economy from the local to national level. As consumers, we spend our money in one of three categories.

We buy durable goods, or products which can be used repeatedly, such as cars and refrigerators. Durable goods are more expensive to buy and to manufacture. So any change in consumer preferences for durable goods, such as buying small imported cars rather than large American cars, has a great impact on the economy.

Consumers spend money on non-durable goods like food, gasoline or paper products, which are used up rapidly. Although non-durable goods are individually less expensive than most durable goods, we use them in such quantity that they make up a large part of our personal expenditures and the total economy.

Consumers also spend dollars on services—the valued actions of others—such as medical care, legal or financial advice, prepared food and entertainment. Some services like home maintenance, we could provide ourselves but purchase instead of save time or gain convenience.

When spending for all three categories is combined it accounts for about two-thirds of our gross national product each year.

In the last 20 years, personal consumer spending has

changed dramatically. The percentage spent on durable goods has remained about the same, but the percentage spent on non-durable items has decreased steadily while the percentage spent on services has grown.

For example, if your family eats less at home and more in restaurants and fast food outlets than you did a few years ago, your spending has had important implications for the national economy. While many manufacturing jobs have been lost, new jobs have been created in the service category.

Consumers will still "mean business" for both durable and non-durable goods in the future, but economists forecast even more spending will be in the service sector. Historical commission lists grants

The Texas Historical Commission has selected 15 recipients for fiscal year 1984 matching survey grants. The grants, totaling \$225,000, represent a significant portion of the \$703,289 appropriated to Texas from the federal government's Historic Preservation Fund. These funds are administered by the Texas Historical Commission to assist in funding survey and planning projects and Multiple Resource National Register Nominations in carrying out the state's responsibilities under the National Historic Preservation Act of 1966.

The cities of Paris and Ennis (both 1984 Main Street cities) — \$15,000 each for survey and multiple resource nomination projects in both cities;

The city of Belton (also 1984 Main Street city) — \$10,000 for a survey and multiple resource nomination for the city;

Old Oak Cliff Conservation League — \$3,000 for a multiple resource nomination for the Oak Cliff Neighborhood in Dallas;

The Historic Preservation Council of Tarrant County — \$30,000 for the Tarrant County Survey, Phase IV, which will

cover several large residential neighborhoods in Fort Worth; The city of McKinney — \$14,000 for a survey of the residential areas of McKinney; Victoria Preservation, Inc. — \$10,000 for a multiple resource nomination for the entire city;

The Center for the History of Engineering and Technology, Texas Tech University — \$3,000 for a pilot project county bridge survey, \$40,000 for the Panhandle-Plains Survey, Phase II, which will focus on the urban areas of this region, and \$10,000 for a reconnaissance survey of 15 counties in West Texas;

The Dallas Historic Preservation League — \$30,000 for a survey of residential neighborhoods in Dallas;

The Junior League of San Angelo, Inc. — \$20,000 for a survey and multiple resource nomination for the entire city of San Angelo;

The city of Lubbock, Planning Department — \$6,000 for a survey of several neighborhoods in Lubbock;

Houston County Historical Commission — \$4,000 for a survey of the city of Crockett; and

Historic Waxahachie, Inc. — \$15,000 for a survey of the city of Waxahachie.

SERVICE YOUR ROOM AIR CONDITIONER

Window air conditioners should be serviced each year before being put back into service. The sealed, pressurized, refrigeration system which is the heart of the unit requires the attention of a professional. But you can do three simple things to make sure you get

of the unit. Usually this is done by loosening thumb nuts at the corners of the panel.

- Immediately behind the front panel, you can see the unit's filter. It may be a metal screen in a metal frame, or it may be a sponge plastic screen held in place by elastic bands. Remove the filter.
- Wash the filter with soap and water. If the filter has not been cleaned in a long time, you may have

to soak it to get the dirt out. Sometimes you can clean it easiest by taking it into the yard and spraying it with the garden hose. Clean the filter several times during the summer. The cleaner the filter is kept, the more cooling the air conditioner will do.

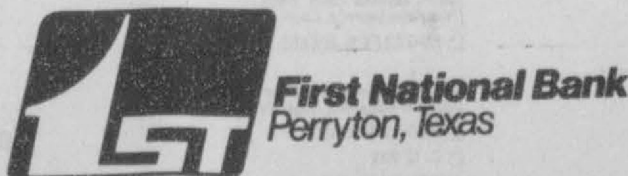

Manage your pastureland properly

Pastureland, a pasture which has been seeded to an improved species of grass, can be very productive if it is properly managed. After the pasture has been established, the amount of forage it produces depends greatly on the level of management it receives.

In managing pastureland, the objective is to maintain a satisfactory quality and quantity of forage and provide adequate soil protection. In this objective, the word satisfactory is a key word. What is satisfactory to one producer may not be to another producer, but there is a minimum

level of management needed. The soil must be adequately protected from erosion. The quality and quantity of forage depends on the level of management the producer puts into the pasture.

To receive a desired level of production, the producer should know how much and when to fertilize. Also, weeds should be controlled if they are providing too much competition on the grass for moisture and nutrients.

The number of livestock able to be grazed on the pasture depends heavily on the level of management. The higher the level of manage-

ment the more animals can be grazed. Also, knowing when to start grazing and when to stop grazing the pasture is important. This depends on the species of grass and whether it is a cool season or a warm season grass. Furthermore, to

get the maximum grazing use from the pasture some type of rotation grazing system will help tremendously. The pasture should be allowed to complete a growth cycle at least once a year.

For further information on pasture management and other conservation practices contact the Soil Conservation Service at the Pittman-Shield-Blinding Building in Spearman.

Save Time & Money

TOSS OUT — Did you know the average American produces three to five pounds of trash daily? A staggering fact and the problem of trash disposal is worsening. Make this the season you begin recycling and reusing products you usually toss out. Shop for natural products that last and refuse to buy those whose chief virtue is that they are disposable. Recycle to save precious resources.

FISH SAVER — A whole fish is a stunning dinner party entree, but sometimes there are leftovers. Save every expensive bit. Scrape fish off bones and use flakes in salads, spreads and sandwiches. Put bones, head and tail in a kettle filled with water. Add seasonings and simmer these for fish stock (called court bouillon in French recipes).

BREAD MAKER — Save a separate step when baking bread by pre-greasing loaf pans. Let bread dough rise in the pans first; remove and knead dough. Add flour to the already oiled pans before replacing dough. Let it rise again, then slip prepared pans in the oven for baking.

RUG CARE — If you have an Oriental, you can double its life by reversing the rug's direction. Give it a 180 degree turn from time to time, and vacuum Oriental rugs weekly. A beater-bar machine works best, and a carpet sweeper will remove tracked in soil.

In 1983 the Tigers finished second, and won their series over the world champion Orioles. Since that time they've filled weak spots and added pitching.

Darrell Evans, a proven power hitter, came from San Francisco to bolster the infield. So did Dave Bergman, a .286 hitter—which gives the Bengals two strong additions at first and presumably third to go along with Lou Whitaker and Allen Trammell—both .300 hitters (.320 and .319 respectively). That's some infield.

The Tigers acquired a badly-needed left-handed middle reliever or spot starter—from the Philadelphia Phillies. He's Willie Hernandez, hot with the National League champions in 1983 with a 9-4 record. He led the Phillie staff in

appearances and had eight saves.

If highly promising but injury-prone Kirk Gibson comes through this season in the outfield, he—with Larry Herndon (.302 and 92 RBI's in 1983) and Chet Lemon will be a strong outfield.

The Tigers have a fine pitching staff, led by Jack Morris, Dan Petry, Milt Wilcox, Dave Rozema, and Juan Berenguer. They've got Doug Bird, Aurelio Lopez, Hernandez and some promising youngsters on their staff—handled by Roger Craig.

This is a power team in 1984 with strong pitching. The catching staff is headed by Lance Parrish, whom some consider one of the two best in the league (114 RBI's in 1983).

It just may be that, after all, he was right last year when he predicted in the next few years the Tigers would win more games than any other team in the eastern division of the American League.

Great Idea!

Within the next year, millions of Americans will be able to receive specially-packaged television programming sent directly to their homes from satellites 22,300 miles in space.



The idea for direct broadcast satellite (DBS) television services was pioneered in the United States by Satellite Television Corporation (STC), a Washington-based company that plans to deliver five channels of pay television to the densely populated Northeast within the next year. In 1986, STC will expand its service to six channels covering the entire Eastern half of the United States.

STC is a subsidiary of COMSAT (Communications Satellite Corporation), a world leader in satellite communications. Five years ago, COMSAT formed STC as a way of bringing the benefits of satellite technology di-

rectly to American consumers. The idea for DBS seemed a natural: specially-designed satellites, more powerful than those currently in orbit, would transmit television signals to homes equipped with small two-foot dish-shaped antennas. The concept is simple: the more power in the satellite, the smaller the receiving antenna. Also, since satellite transmissions are not limited by geography, DBS programming can be delivered to both rural and urban areas alike.

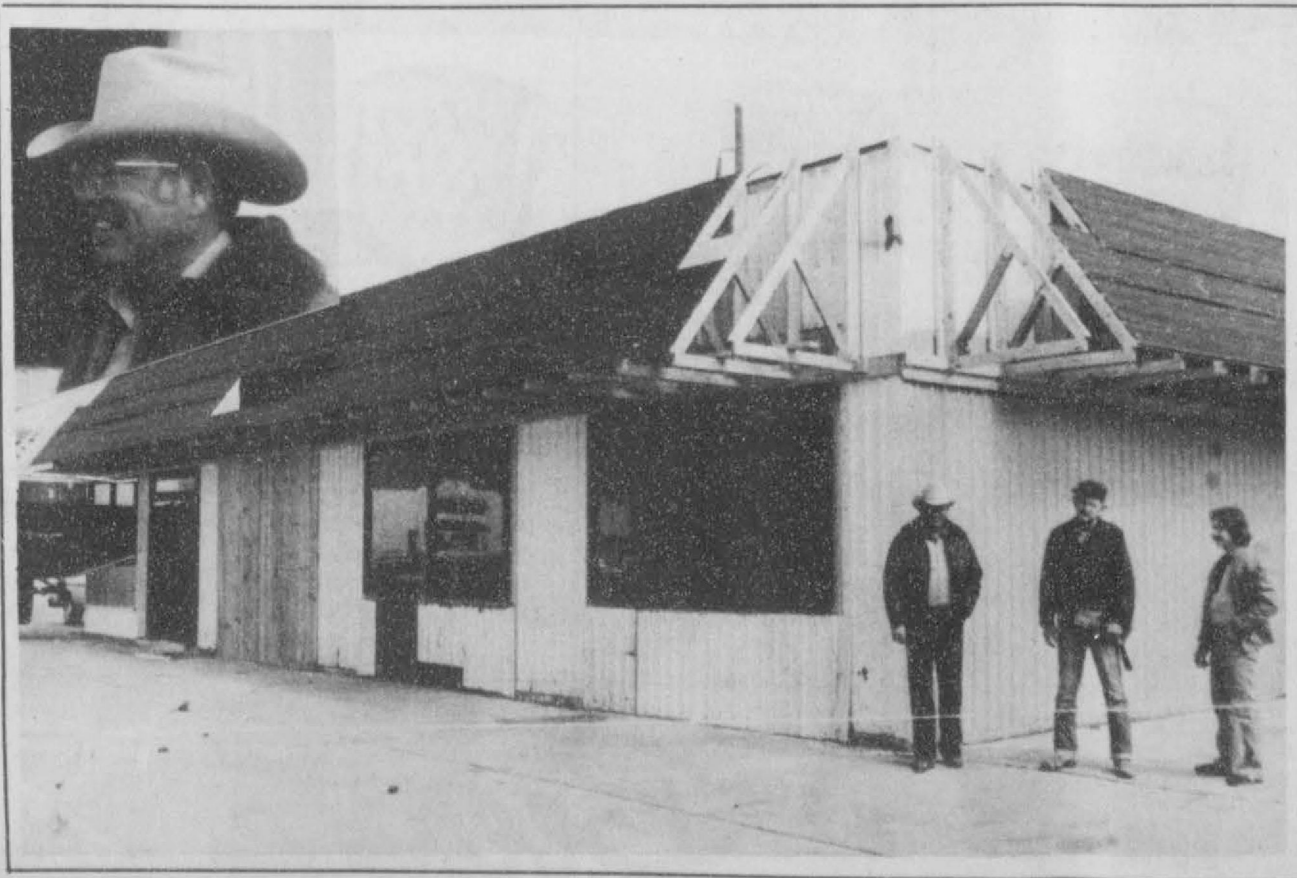

Senior Update BY VIVIENNE BODEAU

The beginning of this year brought about many changes in Medicare. In case you have not yet been brought up to date on them we are capsulizing the major points.

The deductible for part A of hospital insurance of Medicare increased to \$356 starting in January. Co-insurance costs for long-term hospital stays and skilled nursing facility care also has gone up. It now costs \$89 for hospital stays from 61 to 90 days; \$178 a day for patients who draw on their 60-day lifetime reserve after a hospital stay exceeding 90 days; and \$44.50 per day for skilled nursing facility care from 21 to 100 days.

The Part B premium has increased to \$174.20 annually. Part B pays for 80 percent of the "reasonable charges" (as determined by Medicare) for certain covered medical services such as physician care, therapies, outpatient hospital services and home health care, supplies and equipment.

The reasonable charges break you if nothing else does because their idea of a reasonable charge is nowhere near what a physician and therapist charge and most patients end up paying around 50 percent of the bill, not 20 percent.

Since Medicaid funds have

decreased greatly and the costs of long-term care continue to increase, more and more states are passing laws to force families to pay, or help pay, for the care of patients placed in nursing homes.

We wonder if such laws are good. Children, who care for their parents voluntarily may be in a minority but children who are forced to care for them may abuse them physically or mentally. Secondly, it may cost more to force children to take care of their parents, than to use government funds.

Social Security and Supplemental Security recipients received a 3.5 percent cost of living adjustment in January — their first in a year. Unfortunately the increases in insurance costs wipe this out.

A little good news, the earnings limitations for seniors has increased. Social Security beneficiaries, ages 65-69, will be allowed to earn \$6,960 above their Social Security benefits and those under age 65 will be able to earn \$5,160 in 1984. Those who are over 70 years of age are not subject to these rules and can earn all they wish.

Of course, first you will have to find a way to earn the money.

LOSING WEIGHT WITH A PARTNER

If it's true that marriage can be fattening, and that too much shared "contentment" at the conjugal dinner table can make both partners jolly and fat, it's also true that losing weight with a partner can be more effective than losing weight alone. In studies at Brown University and the University of Pennsylvania, dieters with partners actively involved in a program designed to promote weight control were significantly more successful than dieters without partners. And dieters whose partners were also overweight were more successful than dieters with thin partners! So, while marriage can be a liability if one partner insists on undermining the efforts of the other, marriage can also be a significant advantage if each partner is committed to offering support.

There are many reasons for the success of the team approach. One is an enhance climate of understanding. When a dieter is married to a thin non-dieter, it is often difficult for the thin spouse to understand the difficulties of resisting that piece of cake, of staying "legal" at that special social occasion. When both spouses are struggling with the same temptations, however, a special sympathy springs up

between them. Another reason for success is the companionship of the effort. Just as the spouses may once have enjoyed sharing chocolate sundaes or a bowl of buttered popcorn, now they can share in the companionship of planning and shopping, exercising and attending meetings together, of cooking for each other. The team spirit is also largely responsible for the success of partnership dieting. When each partner is willing to lavish praise, compliments, and non-food rewards on the other for each milestone along the way, the path to goal weight is made much smoother.

A final, unexpected benefit of partnership dieting is an often improved relationship between the partners. Working together over time to achieve an important goal, and then finally reaching it together, can help bring the two of you closer. And as each partner begins to feel better about him or herself, both begin to feel better as a couple, as well.

If you've never considered partnership dieting with your spouse, why not give it a try? Dividing the effort in two can produce twice the rewards!

The tragedy today of seeing U.S. students graduate so less well educated than their counterparts in Europe, Japan or Russia reminds one of the old days, the old school house, where discipline was real, and learning, even with limited facilities, real.

With apologies to Whittier, one looks back with nostalgia to the schoolhouses of earlier American generations—which turned out the men and women who made this country, by the time of World War II, the strongest and richest in the world.

Still sits that school house by the road

A ragged beggar sunning;

Around it still the jonquils grow,

And blackberry vines are running.

Within, the master's desk in seen,

Deep-scarred from raps official;

The warping floor, the battered seats,

The jack-knife's carved initial,

A full-length blackboard still with chalk,

TIPS ON SIGNS OF QUALITY

Buying a house will probably be the biggest financial transaction your family will ever have to face. That's why it is vitally important to look for signs of quality—and to buy wisely.

• DO check to see that the house is well constructed. It is wise to get expert advice on this, for much construction detail is hidden. Get an architect, for a nominal fee, to look over the house you are considering; he or she will give you a reliable opinion on its soundness.
