does not have the time. Right now he and employee Hilous Hargrove are doing a brisk business in small engine repairs.

Bowen officially keeps his shop open from 5 to 8 p.m., but he and Hargrove have been logging a lot of extra work hours because of the growing demand for their services.

"We work on all types of two and four-cycle engines including repairs, tune-ups and overhauls," he said.

In addition, Complete Small Engine Repair Service carries a large supply of parts for two and four-cycle engines, "and we can get replacement engines on request," he added.

Bowen said, "Our customers find we are very competitive with our prices—very competitive."

Besides being the authorized dealer for Ariens lawn and garden equipment, Bowen can also "get any commercial lawn and garden equipment customers want in within two to three days of the time it is ordered," he said.

A graduate of Belsaw Institute of Small Engine Repairs, Kansas City, Mo., Bowen is certified in small engine repairs and in advanced small engine repairs. He has lived in Spearman most of his life, attended all 12 years of public school here, and was graduated from Spearman High School. He and his wife, the former Kathy Dowdy, have two children, Lorrie, 4, and Rodney, 1.

From behind the wheel, Larry Bowen lifted a hand and waved to the crowd lining the parade route. He was driving an Ariens 19-horse tractor, pulling a trailer with walk-behind mower, a rear tine tiller, a front tine tiller and his own specialty tiller.

Apostolic Faith Church Revival



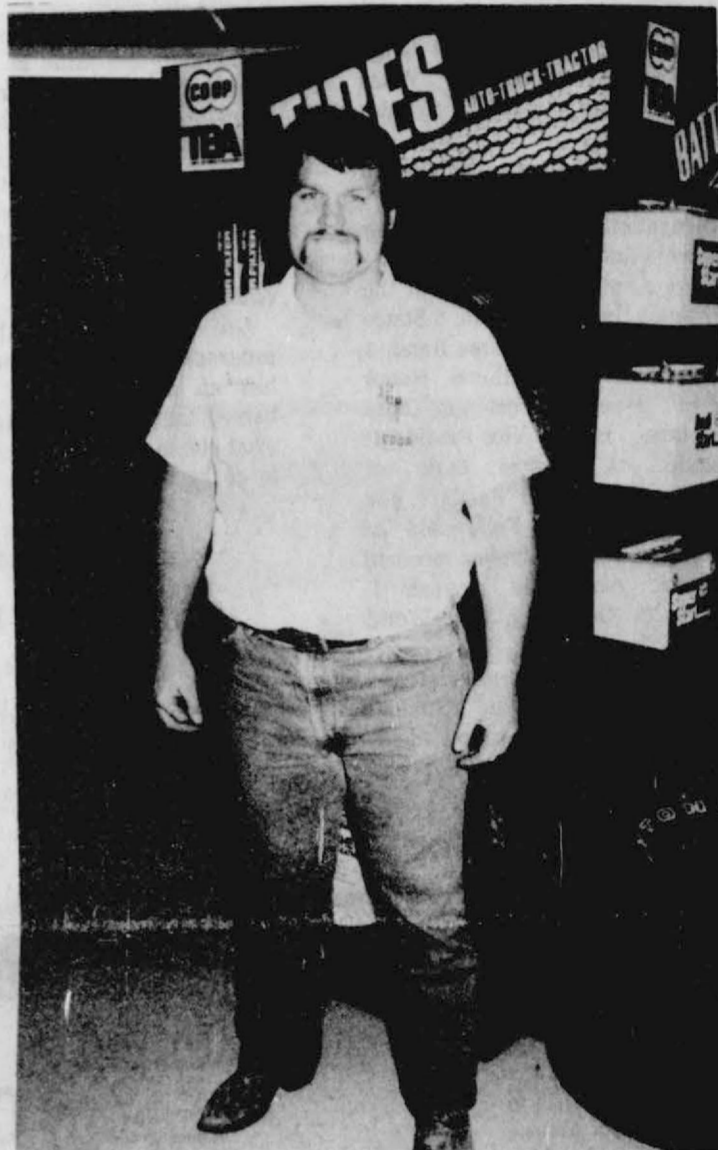

New manager at Consumers Sales Co.

It's a long ways from coaching along the sideline of the Minneapolis, Kansas football field to managing a Co-op sales firm in Spearman, Texas.

That's the "route" taken by Gene Harris, who taught and served as head football and wrestling coach for three years in the rural Kansas community before moving here to take over as manager of Consumer Sales Company on May 16.

Yet Harris is not exactly a stranger to Co-op work, and is having no problem adjusting from gridiron coach to Consumer's manager. Back in his home town of Wahoo, Nebraska, Harris said he "grew up in a co-op," where his father has served as general manager since 1963.

Gene worked seven years in the Wahoo co-op himself, but this is his first stint at managing. Harris attended Wahoo schools and was graduated from Wahoo High School, where he starred in football.

He went on to play football four years at Nebraska Wesleyan University in Lincoln. Harris was graduated from Nebraska Wesleyan with a bachelor's in physical education, but worked another year with Wahoo co-op before going into coaching and teaching five years ago.

Leaving the teaching and coaching profession for the manager's post here was not a spur of the moment thing, or snap decision. Harris said he enjoys coaching, but he also enjoys co-op work.

With his background in co-op before he ever entered college, Harris "pre-determined" before enrolling at Nebraska Wesleyan that he would coach for five years, then reassess his situation and decide which of the two "routes" to take. When his five years were up he did, and his decision led him to Spearman.

"I could not see any opportunity for advancement in the teaching field unless I pursued the administration degree, and I had no desire at this point to be an administrator in a school system," he said. "I had several chances to quit teaching and go into co-op work, but they were not opportunities like this.

"There is real opportunity here—and a real challenge—and I'm interested in that.

Harris, his wife Kerri, and their children Eugene III, 3, and Cortny, 11 months, have moved here and he commented, "I think we are really going to enjoy living here. The people we've met have been real friendly."

As new manager at Consumer Sales Company, Harris said, "I'd like to invite everybody in to see what we sell.

"Our main concern—to provide service for our customers and help them get the best product they can."

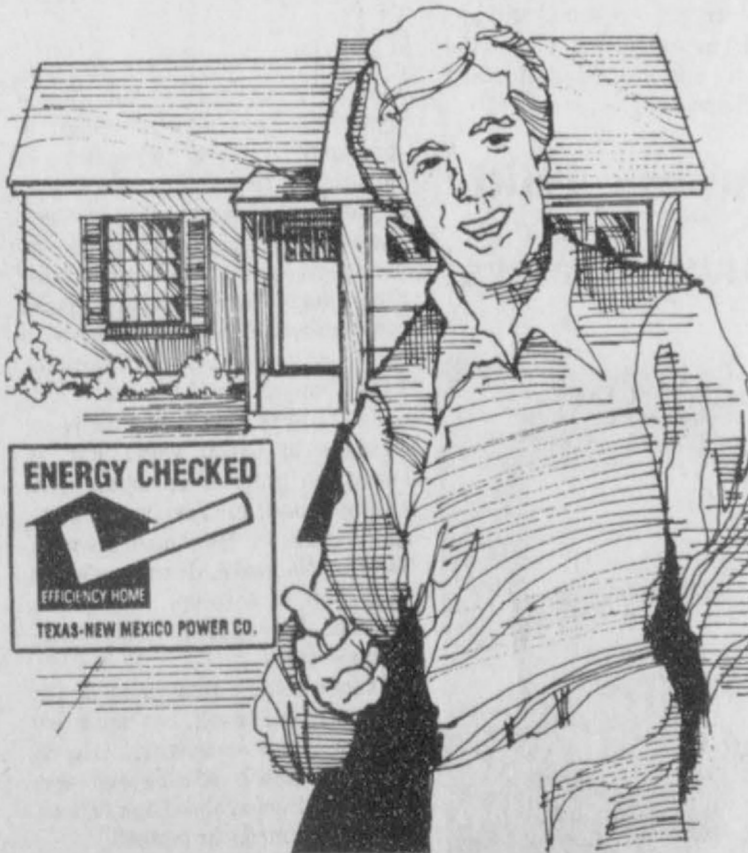

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Spearman Ruth'ers win before washout

Spearman's Junior Babe Ruth Leaguers beat Booker 15-6 in the opening round of the Guymon Babe Ruth League tournament Friday, but could not beat the rains which washed out the rest of the weekend's play and forced postponement of the rest of the tournament.

The Spearman team will get another shot at winning the tournament when play resumes. The tournament is tentatively scheduled to get under way again this Saturday at a time not yet announced. They are next scheduled to play Perryton

which beat the Guymon Drifters in their first round encounter Friday.

Meanwhile, the Spearman Babe Ruthers should have little trouble staying tuned up for tourney play-weather permitting. They were scheduled to host Laverne in a league game on Tuesday, after press deadline; and are slated to travel to Canadian Friday to play a league contest with Canadian Gold.

Spearman jumped out to a quick 3-0 lead, and built it to 10-0 in the second while hurler Brett Davis was blanking Booker.

Jessie Moon led off the first inning surge with a single. Will Black walked, Bob Cook walked, Davis and Justin Ooley hit back to back singles, and Allen Beeson walked.

In the big second inning, Scott Swan walked, Moore walked, with one out Black walked, Cook walked and Davis and Ooley again hit singles. Beeson, Nelson, Swan and Moore drew consecutive bases on balls and Jeff Williamson singled before the side was finally retired.

In the three run Spearman fourth, Davis smashed a one-out double, Ooley singled scoring Davis, Beeson walked, and after a strikeout, Swan walked and Moore singled before the side was retired. Spearman scored twice more in the fifth to balloon their lead to 15-5.

Davis struck out the first three batters he faced in the first inning, walked the first batter in the second, then struck out the side. He also mowed down the first two batters in the third via strikeouts, but ran into trouble as he walked T. Howell, and rival pitcher J. McDaniel, and yielded a single to D. Parker. Then, with the bases loaded, he pitched out of the jam by whiffing G. Goad, to keep his shutout alive.

Booker finally got to Davis in the fourth as he developed temporary control trouble. After yielding a single to S. Rodriguez, he walked five batters but sharp fielding and a strikeout got him out of trouble after five runs had crossed the plate.

In the sixth and final inning, Booker managed to score one more, capitalizing on a throwing error, that

allowed lead off batter D. Orr to continue home after rapping a double, the only extra base hit of Davis, and two walks but again two fielding gems and a strike out ended the threat, and insured the Spearman win.

Ooley went four-for-four to pace the Spearman hitting. Davis was three-for-four, with the teams only extra base hit—a double. Cook and Moon each hit safely twice in five at bats, and Williamson got the other Spearman hit, a single, in five at bats.

In all the Spearman Babe Ruthers raked McDaniel for 12 hits, and drew 11 bases on balls. McDaniel struck out three Spearman batters.

Davis, meanwhile, struck out 11 Booker batters, walked 11 and hurled a two-hitter.

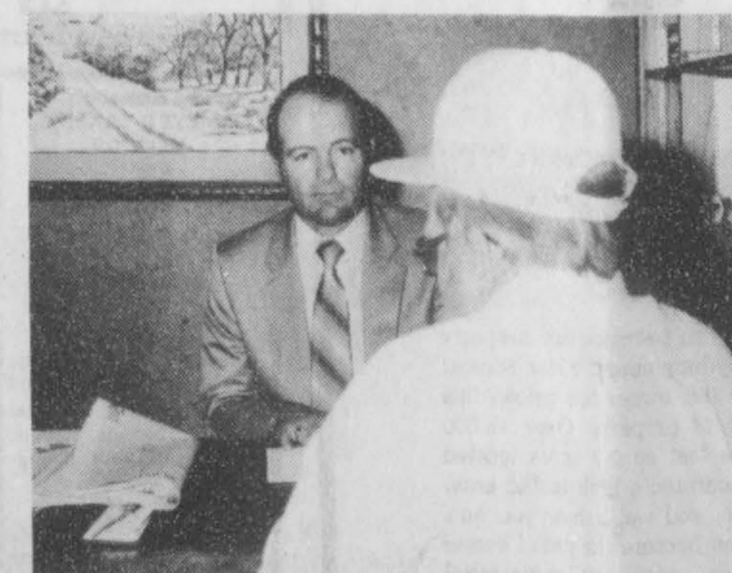

Low income households to get help with utility bills

Austin--Some low-income Texas households may be eligible for help in paying their cooling bills, according to the head of the Texas Department of Human Resources.

Human Resources Commissioner Marlin W. Johnston said the assistance with paying utility bills is available to low-income households who in June 1983 received food stamps, Aid to Families with Dependent Children, Supplemental Security Income, or needs-tested Veterans Administration benefits.

Potentially eligible veterans are those who receive payments under 415, 521, 541, or 542 of Title 38 of the U.S. Code or under Section 306 of the Veterans and Survivors Pension Improvement Act of 1978.

Eligibility is limited by gross income. For instance, aid is available for a one-person household having less than \$334.49 gross income per month. The gross income limit is \$546.49 for a two-person household, \$749.49 for a three-

person household, \$926.49 for four persons, \$1,092.49 for five, and \$1,277.49 for six.

Eligible households must be subject to energy cost increases--because of higher bills or rent due to rising utility costs. Households are eligible if they are privately owned or rented housing even if the cost of utilities is included in the rent payment or if the household pays only a portion of its home energy costs.

Johnston said applications are mailed automatically to

households which receive food stamps, AFDC, and SSI. Households receiving needs-tested Veterans benefits must request an application from DHR in June.

If you have not received an application and think your household may be eligible, contact a local office of the Texas Department of Human Resources, Johnston said.

Reed, the one to beat at TSHSRA finals

The tri-state area's top high school rodeo cowboys have their sights set on Hadley Reed this week as the Tri-State High School Rodeo Association (TSHSRA) unwinds in Amarillo.

That's because all those hoping to win this year's TSHSRA All-Around Cowboy honors know Reed of Spearman is the one they'll have to beat. Reed, who will be a senior next school year at Spearman High School, is this year's all-around point leader going into the finals which open Thursday and run through Saturday at Fair Park Coliseum in Tri-State Fairgrounds.

To date, the versatile Reed has amassed 159 points in the various rodeo events. His closest competition, going into the finals comes from Danny Johnson of Canadian with 129½ points.

Hadley leads the bareback bronc riding standings with 74 points and calf roping with 43.2. He is in a three-way tie for 13th place in ribbon roping with 9 points and is tied for sixth in the team roping stats with 33 points.

His lofty berth in the finals is no fluke, veteran rodeo observers say. Reed was reared on a farm and has been rodeoing since he was six years old. His father, A.D. Reed, is an old rodeo'er. A.D. used to rope and ride bulls.

Reed is just one of seven Hansford County youths who will compete in the TSHSRA finals. One of those competing with Reed for all-around honors will be Travis Patterson, a Spearman High School junior-to-be and the son of Mr. and Mrs. Pat Patterson.

Travis is currently 10th in the overall standings with 55 total points. He is tied for the lead in team roping with 48 points.

Another SHS junior-to-be, Mark Pearson, is currently sixth in the bareback riding competition with 21½ points.

Suzanne Hart, who was recently graduated from Gruver High School, heads up a strong trio of entries in the girls' competition. The 1982 Miss Hansford County and the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Jon Hart of the Gruver area, Suzanne is tied for sixth place in the competition for the TSHSRA's Best All-Around Cowgirl honors.

She is currently number two in the barrel racing standings with 42 points, sixth in breakaway roping with 16 points, and seventh in pole bending with 9 points.

Andrea Archer of Spearman is fourth in pole bending with 23 points, and seventh in barrel racing with 11. Donna Martin of Spearman is at present tied for 12th place in barrel racing with 5 points, and Diana Martin of Spearman is 13th in breakaway roping with 3 points.

Stacy Funk of Canyon is the leader in the All-Around Girls title going into the finals with 156 points.



Telephone repair service available at local service agency

Perryton--By taking advantage of repair services available at the GTE Local Service Agency in the Chamber of Commerce Office, 211 Main in Spearman, residential and single line business telephone customers can avoid charges that now apply if the customers request a telephone company employee be sent to their premises to repair a company owned telephone.

Robert J. Meyers, Operations Manager for General Telephone in Perryton, said the Public Utility Commission of Texas, May 19th, approved a premise visit charge that will be applied when residential and single line business customers have problems associated with the telephone instrument, and prefer to have the company send an employee to their premise to make the

repairs rather than bring the instrument to the Service Agency. The charge is \$17.00 for residential customers and \$22.50 for single line business customers.

In addition there are separate charges for each telephone outlet repaired if the problem is in the housewiring or jack and the customer prefers to have the telephone company make the repairs rather than purchasing a repair kit to make the repairs themselves, or have a third party make the repairs. Wiring and jack kits are available at the Service Agency for customers to purchase and avoid the additional charges by making the repairs themselves.

"We have responded to our customers' requests to come to their premises for years, and we are more than pleased to

respond now," he said. "The only change, brought about by deregulation, is that we must charge a fee to recover those expenses from customers requesting the service."

He explained the charge for sending an employee to a customer's premise to repair a telephone instrument is not a charge to make the repair, but rather to recover the costs associated with sending an employee to the premise.

"The charges for these services will help keep local basic rates lower than they would be otherwise," he explained. "It offers customers the opportunity to participate in the maintenance of their service to keep local rates as low as possible, while providing customers a more convenient repair service by making it possible for them to bring their phone in, at their

convenience, rather than waiting on service personnel to arrive at their residence or business location."

"Repairs to the telephone network which includes the cable, service wire and protection equipment at the customer's premises, will be done without charge, since these costs are recovered through basic service rates." However, Meyers cautioned customers

who leave their phone off the hook that they could be charged if it is necessary to make a field trip to clear the line.

Customers reporting service problems to the repair number will be asked a series of questions to isolate the probable cause of the trouble. They will then be informed of possible charges and options available to them.

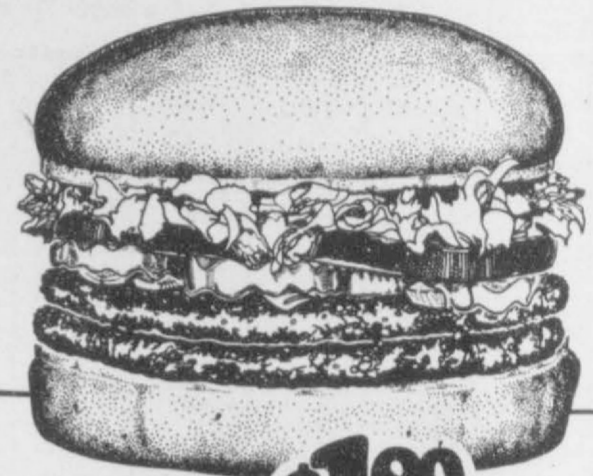
Richeson's daughter dies in Louisiana

Variety enlivens city Police activity

On Saturday, May 28, 1983, at approximately 9:20 p.m., this office received a telephone call from a Spearman resident requesting an officer to be sent to the residence in reference to a family disturbance. Upon arrival at the residence, the officers were advised that a member of the family and another individual were both intoxicated and causing trouble and refused to leave the residence. The officers advised the individuals that they would need to leave and if they returned to the residence that they would be placed under arrest. At approximately 10:30 p.m., the individuals were observed returning to the residence. The officer then placed the intoxicated individual under arrest for public intoxication and criminal trespass. The subject was transported to the Police Department for processing procedures, after which the subject was placed in the Hansford County Jail pending judicial proceedings.

Wednesday, June 1, 1983, at 10:00 p.m. a Spearman resident entered the Police Department and stated that he had had a tape case and some cassette tapes stolen from his pick-up on May 22, 1983, sometime between the hours of 6:00 p.m., May 22, 1983 and 9:00 a.m. May 23, 1983. The subject stated that he thought he had locked his pick-up, but was not sure. The tape box held 30 cassette tapes and was black in color, with the brand name of SAVOY and was a hard tape case. The subject also had 32 cassette tapes taken from the pick-up. This case is still under investigation.

At approximately 11:16 p.m. on Wednesday, June 1, 1983, an officer was dispatched to a Spearman residence in reference to a family disturbance. The officer arrived and met with a resident in the front yard of the residence. The resident advised that he had had a fight with his wife and had struck her once on the left side of the face, and that she was in the house. advised the officer that she and her husband had had a fight and that he had grabbed her, cursed at her, and then struck her on the side of the face. She advised that officer that the side of her face hurt and that she felt like she was having a heart attack. An ambulance was notified and arrived and transported the subject to the hospital. At this time, there is no further information on this incident.

On Thursday, June 2, 1983, the Animal Control Officer made two separate contacts with Spearman residents in reference to raising livestock within the city limits, specifically, their back yards. The residents were asked to remove the animals from their back yards, as this is in violation of a City Ordinance. As of Monday, June 6, 1983, the animals are no longer housed in the resident's backyards.

At approximately 9:00 a.m., June 2, 1983, a complainant contacted the Spearman Police Department via telephone and related that she was having a problem with her landlady. An officer was dispatched and arrived at the complainant's residence. The complainant related that her landlady was at her residence and had verbally abused her with obscene language and had entered another house trailer on the lot and had broken some glass in the trailer and had thrown a toaster out of the trailer. The complainant further related that she was afraid of her landlady and that she was afraid she would accuse her of doing the damage to the vacant trailer adjacent to the complainant's. Statements were taken from the complainant and a signed complaint was received. The complainant and the defendant were both told to appear in court on Monday, June 6, 1983 at 10:00 a.m. for further judicial proceedings.

At approximately 2:30 p.m., Friday, June 3, 1983, a complainant entered the Police Department and advised that at approximately 8:30 a.m. the same date, she had contacted a renter of hers. Upon contact, the renter reportedly used abusive and obscene language

towards the landlady. The complainant further stated to the officer taking the report that the renter had remodeled the trailer house she was renting without consent of the landlady. The complainant further stated that the renter had reportedly damaged a vacant trailer house next to hers and had stolen or damaged some items in the trailer. The officers activated their siren in an attempt to have the vehicle pull over. The vehicle finally pulled over approximately 5 miles East of the City limits. All subjects were placed in the Hansford County Jail.

tween 3:00 p.m. June 5 and 9:30 a.m., June 6, 1983, someone had taken a vehicle from behind his residence and had hit something with the vehicle. There were scrape marks all along the drivers side of the vehicle, where it appeared the vehicle had side-swiped. The complainant advised that the keys were left in the vehicle and the doors were unlocked. The vehicle was driven approximately 83 miles. The investigation is continuing on this case.

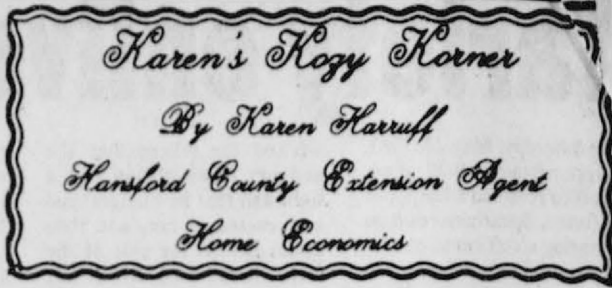

Tanning Pills --

An inside dye job
Even here in sunny Texas, some people will go to unbelievable lengths to get a tan. The latest fad for those in pursuit of the "bronzed look," is a tanning pill.

The tanning pill was first developed in Europe, spread to Canada, and can now be found in this country. While the pills are not illegal, the Food and Drug Administration is warning consumers to avoid using them until appropriate well-conducted studies can be done.

The pills contain two food colors which are chemical replicas of substances that occur naturally in some plants such as carrots, peaches and melons. After a week or two of taking the pills, the dye accumulates in the skin, giving the appearance of a tan.

But there are problems with the "tan." First, it doesn't look quite right. It has a distinct orange tinge that shows especially on the palms and soles of the feet. Second, this "tan" is no protection against sunburn.

More importantly, tanning pills have not been tested for safety. They contain synthetic versions of natural coloring substances beta-carotene and canthaxanthin. Although these additives go into many processed foods, tanning tablets contain 20 to 30 times what would be found in a normal diet.

Some complaints of side-effects from tanning pills including nausea, diarrhea, stomach cramps, itching and skin welts, have been reported.

Tanning pills are also expensive. A month's supply can range from 20 to 30 dollars.

Until tests are done to determine the safety of these pills, Texans are advised to stick to the natural means of acquiring a tan from the sun.
