Deer season opens here Friday 8:00

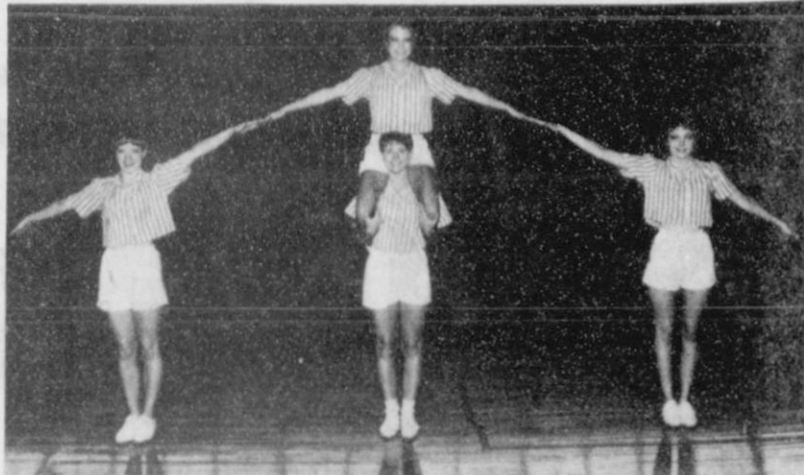

Hansford Hospital Board of Directors Meet

The regular meeting of the Board of Directors of Hansford County Hospital District was held on August 9, 1984 at 7:00 a.m. in the Hospital Board Room.

Present: Jack Oakes, President, Alton Ellsworth, Vice President, Leslie Barkley, Sec-Treas, Dwight Hutchinson, John Trindle, Jerry Hunt.

Administration: Albert La-Rochelle, Hosp. Adm., Ray Wasil, Manor Adm., Dan Powers, Y.D.P.

Medical Staff David McClellan, M.D.

The meeting was called to order by Jack Oakes.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved in a motion made by Dwight Hutchinson and seconded by Leslie Barkley.

The monthly financial statement was presented for the Board's consideration. Leslie Barkley moved to approve the bills for payment. John Trindle seconded and the motion was

passed by all present.

Budget hearing was held next with no citizens appearing before the Board.

After an inspection and discussion of the budget for the fiscal year 84-85 by the board, Dwight Hutchinson moved to accept the budget as proposed, seconded by John Trindle, and approved by all board members.

Alton Ellsworth presented a motion that the tax rate for the Hospital District be set at .1852 cents per 100 dollar valuation, seconded by Dwight Hutchinson and approved by all board members.

Alton Ellsworth made a motion that the management contract be renewed and seconded by Leslie Barkley and approved by all.

Next, in accordance with Article 6252-17, Section 2 (C) Texas Revised Civil Statutes, the board met in executive session to discuss hospital matters. In the prescribed manner the meeting was again open to the public.

Next an addendum to the original letter of collection of past due accounts, by Cecil R. Biggers, Attorney at Law, was presented to the Board. Dwight Hutchinson made a motion that the addendum be accepted as submitted, seconded by Alton Ellsworth, approved by all present.

A letter of engagement was submitted to the board from Gary, Thayer and Bowers, C.P.A. for the audit of the 83-84 fiscal year. Leslie Barkley made a motion to accept the letter of engagement, seconded by Dwight Hutchinson, approved by all present.

The final update on the Blue Cross Communication System was submitted to the board for their information.

Mr. Ray Wasil next gave a progress update on the current affairs of the Hansford Manor.

There being no further business the meeting was adjourned.

Eight involved in alleged feedlot scam at Caprock

Hansford County Sheriff R.L. McFarlin informed the Hansford County papers that a total of eight people had been arrested in the Caprock Feedlot scam. Each of the eight people had bond set at \$10,000 by Judge Chunky Blackburn in District Court in Spearman Tues. All were charged with alleged "theft by appropriation." They are Joe Bennett, Janice Crist, Perry Lamb, Bill Don Adkins, Richard Wagner, Jim Eakin, Mike Glass and Buddy Shipp. All have been taken into custody except Joe Bennett. All of the seven are out on bond.

Caprock Feedlot officials reported last week that a problem at #2 Feedlot had arisen. It did not involve the actual weighing or scaling at the feedlot in any way. The problem was caused by manipulation of the ticket machine. Hay, wheat, and corn that wasn't delivered was involved in the investigation initiated by Caprock. The investigation was headed by Robin McIntire, investigator for Cargill, according to R.L. McFarlin, Hansford County Sheriff.

According to statements given by Caprock officials, a total of

approximately \$112,000.00 is involved in the alleged scam.

Indicted by the Grand Jury to stand trial also were the following: Kristi Lee Prince and Malinda Morales bond set at \$2,000.00 each for burglary of a vehicle. Sheriff McFarlin also reported that Steven Wayne Crisp was being held in Dumas on a forgery charge in Hansford County. His bond was set at \$10,000.

Johnny Howard Thomas had bond set at \$10,000 for forgery. All of the above are out on bond except Steven Wayne Crisp.

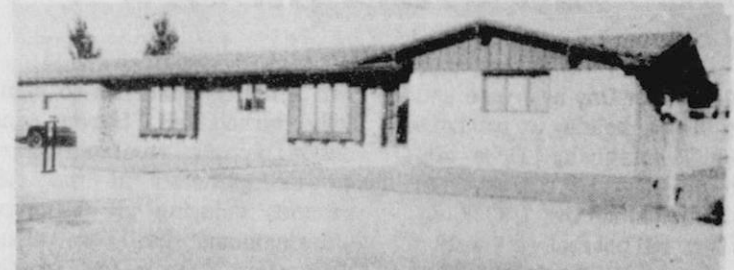

Two-Bit Sermons

by James D. Jones, Pastor Fellowship Baptist Church
 "If He Hath Wronged Thee"
 Phileman is a very small book of our New Testament. Yet Paul uses this small book of 25 verses to present the grace of Jesus. The Gospels give the example of the good Samaritan but Phileman gives a real life account of this basic principle. The principle of caring for others.

Now in verses 8-21 Paul states his purpose in writing. This purpose is intercession for others. Paul found a man named Onesimus. Onesimus when found by Paul was a rebellious run away slave. After hearing the gospel of Jesus, he received Christ as Savior. There was then a desire to return to Philemon and right the wrongs which he had done.

In this story Paul is the Samaritan. Onesimus was the one beat up in the ditch. Philemon was the gracious innkeeper who would care for the man after Paul left. Which in the story would you be?

Does it mean weighing food and counting calories? Giving up fast food, convenience food and snacking? Making big changes in your life-style? The answer to all these questions is "NO."

Eating a balanced diet can be easier than you think. All it really takes is a commitment to eat a variety of foods from the five major food groups.

The major food groups are easy to remember once you learn them:

The "protein" group of foods like meat, poultry, fish, eggs and beans.

The vegetable and fruit group. The bread and cereal group, which also includes pasta.

The dairy group which includes milk, cheese, yogurt, ice cream and other dairy products.

The fats, sweets and alcohol group.

Eat a variety of foods from each of the first four groups daily, moderate your intake of fats, sweets and alcohol, and you're on the way to achieving a balanced diet.

The only other thing you have to remember is to eat a variety of foods from each category. No one food can provide all necessary vitamins and minerals. So eating different foods from each of the four groups increases the chance you'll get enough nutrients.

Eating a balanced diet doesn't have to be a chore, but it does take a little thinking about the food you eat.

Stratford shows interest in lake

Stratford residents are interested in obtaining water for municipal use from a proposed Palo Duro lake that could supply water to northern Panhandle cities.

Johnnie Lee of Spearman, manager of the Palo Duro Water Authority, reports he met last week with about 30 Stratford and Sherman county residents to explain the planned water project. The group included city councilmen and county commissioners.

"They are interested in the project and water it could provide," Lee notes. "Our engineers are studying their plans to determine whether there would be enough storage to supply Stratford."

The PDWA is proposing to build a 60,900 acre foot water reservoir, north of Spearman, plus a treatment plant and 90 miles of pipeline to supply six member cities in Hansford, Moore, Ochiltree and northern Hutchinson counties.

Cost of the project is estimated at \$50 million. Residents of Moore and

Ochiltree counties and the City of Stinnett, however, must vote to become members of the district in special elections, which would be held in January 1985.

Prospective member cities outside of Hansford county are Dumas, Sunray, Perryton and Stinnett, Spearman and Gruver are already in the water district.

Lee reports that Stratford would require a 625,000-gallon a day allotment of water and notes that would increase the pumping rate for the proposed water project to maximum capacity of 7.5-million gallons a day.

"This figure includes Cactus and the industries in Schroeter Industrial Park," the PDWA manager points out. "I believe we need maximum sales since water would be cheaper for all of us; however, we don't want to run short."

A bond issue will be required to finance the project. Current estimates are that the district would have to charge \$2.14 per 1,000 gallons of water to pay back the debt.

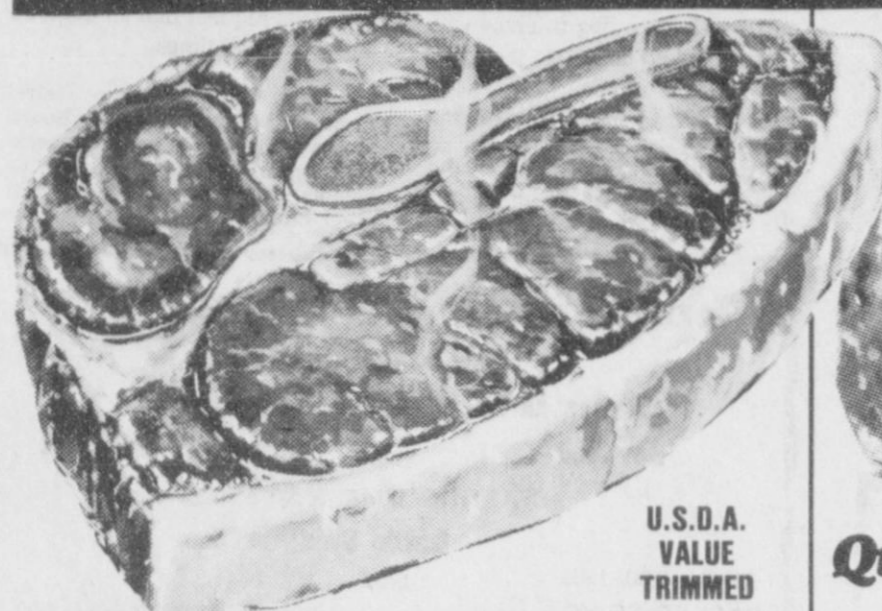

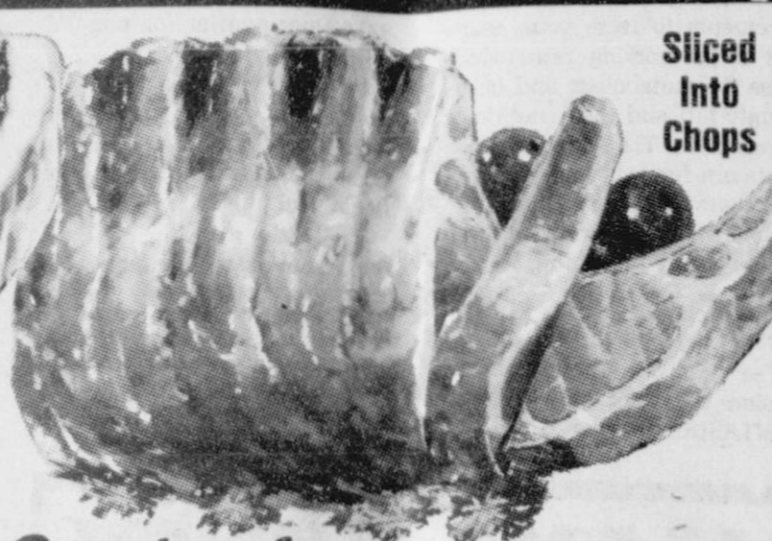

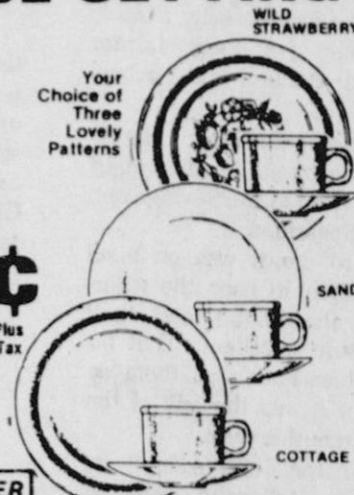
