# Public favors buying bank for City Hall, Council says



Public sentiment is running 80 percent in favor of the city purchasing the present First State Bank building for a new city hall, city councilmen concluded at a special session Saturday after comparing results of individual polls each had been conducting.

The councilmen met in an emergency, called session at B & B Farm Industries to discuss the possibility of buying the First State Bank building and to contrast this possibility with the proposed renovation and fire damage repair on the old city hall.

Mayor C. Ralph Blodgett asked the councilmen to each report results of a poll of the citizenry they had been conducting to get the people's reaction to the possibility of the city buying the bank building.

Blodgett said, "It is of vital interest to the city...for us to determine where we are as of today " on the proposal to buy the bank building as a new city hall and police station.

Alderman Wilson McClellan said that among those he had polled on the possibility of buying the bank, he had "one flat no," and several others indicated they would be in favor of whatever the majority decided, but that about 80 percent of those polled "are favorable, so far."

Mayor Blodgett said he had polled 120 citizens and that the big majority favored the plan to buy the bank building.

He said he was a little surprised at the positive reaction of the retired people--those with fixed incomes--to whom he had talked.

"I rather expected retired people to be against it, but most of them seemed to be for it. They told me it would be worth the difference, just to be able to get into the place," Blodgett said.

The temporary city hall presently in use is located in cramped quarters with limited parking on the front edge of a grain elevator lot. The old city hall now under consideration for renovation after heavy fire damage, has limited parking capacity and no

drive-in windows.

Councilman Bob Pearson said he had interviewed 17 people on Friday and that by a big ratio most felt purchasing the First State building

for a city hall would be a good move.

Pearson said the "Weirdest"
suggestion he got from one of those
he polled, was that the city and
appraisal district buy the bank
building and share its use and the
use of its drive-up windows.

Several of the councilmen then spoke out, saying they would not favor sharing the building with the appraisal district, that it would be operationally unwise to do so.

"I'd a whole lot rather the appraisal district buy the old city hall then to share the (bank)

building with us." Alderman Burl Buchanan remarked, and Pearson agreed that "we've got a pretty good thing going--I'd hate to upset the mix." Buchanan said he would like to see a comparison of the total square feet of the old city hall with the square feet available in the bank building and an estimate of how much it would cost to remodel the First State building to meet the needs of a city hall.

In response to Buchanan's question. Jim Muray said there was from 2,400 to 2,600 feet of floor space in the old, fire damaged city hall, another 2,000 feet or more in the fire department bays area and another 700 to 800 feet of space in the police department. In all, he said the old city hall had approximately 5,000 feet of total space.

Alderman Jim Nicholson said the question most asked by those he polled was "How much is it going to cost?"

Although the councilmen agreed they had heard no firm, official offer by bank officials to sell the city the bank, the aldermen did mention a figure in the neighborhood of \$300,000 to \$350,000 as a possible purchase price.

Nichsolson said he understood purchasing the bank would not cause the city to have to raise taxes, and that he told this to those he polled. Pearson said that the city could not guarantee at this time, that it would not have to raise taxes, although the purchase of the bank for a city hall by itself would not cause such a raise.

City Secretary Donna Thomas was asked to report on the telephone survey the city staff had conducted. She said 228 people were contacted and of these, 77 percent were for buying the bank for city hall, 10 percent were against and 11 percent were for "whatever the majority wanted."

She said one woman favored building a new building and another said she would "like to see us move back into the old city hall."

Pearson agreed with the mayor that "the biggest deal" to those he talked with, was the easier access the location, ample parking and drive in windows the bank building

location would give as a city hall. Prior to considering the First State Bank building as a posible site for city hall, the councilmen had considered renovating and repairing fire damage at old city hall. They had received three base bids from Amarillo firms, the lowest for \$178,516, with drive in windows to cost extra. In fact, the council voted to accept the apparent low bid for the renovation at their June 14 meeting but held up on awarding the contract at that time. At their next meeting they again held up on awarding the contract.

Southwestern Bell, in accordance with the rules of the Public Utility Commission of Texas, hereby gives notice of the company's intent to implement a new schedule of telephone rates in Texas, effective August 1, 1983, unless otherwise determined by the Commission.


A complete copy of the new rate schedule is on file with the Texas Public Utility Commission (PUC) at Austin. Texas, and with each affected municipality served by Southwestern Bell, and is available for inspection in each of the company's public business offices in Texas. The Commission staff has contended in the past that all rates are subject to change as a result of Southwestern Bell's rate application.

As a result of the settlement of a lawsuit brought by the U.S. Department of Justice against AT&T, Southwestern Bell, on January 1, 1984, (or as otherwise ordered by the United States District Court) will no longer be a part of the Bell System, but will be owned by public shareholders. Under the terms of the settlement, Southwestern Bell has identified 15 areas in the state within which it may provide service, and the federal court with jurisdiction of the settlement has tentatively approved these areas, called LATAs (Local Access and Transport Area). On or about January 1, 1984, Southwestern Bell can not provide service between these LATAs, and in addition, must transfer to AT&T customer premises equipment that it leases to customers.

Southwestern Bell has filed a proposed revised rate schedule with the PUC reflecting these changes. These rates would become effective August 1, 1983, if they are not suspended by the PUC; however, it is expected that they will be suspended and that the rates ultimately set by the PUC will become effective on or about January 1. 1984. If the rates were to become effective as filed, they would produce a 48.2% increase in Southwestern Bell's unadjusted test year revenues (or a 76.36% increase in Southwestern Bell's test year revenues adjusted to reflect the effect of Southwestern Bell's divestiture from AT&T). Any change in the rates for any interLATA services offered by AT&T or a subsidiary after January 1, 1984, could affect customers of Southwestern Bell Telephone Company.

> Notice to Customers of Other Telephone Companies

While Southwestern Bell has proposed no increase in rates for intraLATA interexchange toll services, any change in those rates could also affect customers of other telephone companies. 





TIPS ON ZIPPERS

Tippers provide a fast and easy means of getting in and out of clother

Over time they have become much lighter, and virtually invisible in the
garment.

As you choose a sipper and application technique, consider the hang of your garment as well as the care and location of the closures. The length and type of sippers needed will be indicated on the pattern envelope. But you say decide to use different length sippers because of body proportions or convenience. A longer opening lessens the strain on the sipper as you get in and out of the garment.

There are many techniques for inserting a zipper. Follow the directions that come with the zipper package or check directions in your favorite sewing book.

Here are some additional hints on improving the look and ease of insertin sippers in home sevo clothes:

- · Always close the ripper before drycleaning or laundering.
- e Fre-shrink the sipper if it will be used in a washable garment
- Stitch the sipper opening edges directionally in the semm ellowant according to the pattern.
- Extend news allowances of the sipper opening in your garment with added news binding if they are less than 5/8 inches wide.
- . When pinning the sipper in place, work from the top downward.
- Plaids or stripes should match at the sipper closing as well as at the other seams. With a regular sipper, baste the closing shut, matching the patter of the fabric; with an invisible sipper, mark the sipper tape with lines corresponding to the patters of the fabric.
- s Always say both sides of the zipper in the same direction, preferably from bottom to top. This eliminates purharian.
- a Due the sewing guideline that is woven into some of the regular sipper tapes to give you a straight line of stitching.
- To stitch past the elider, leave the needle in the febric, raise the foot, and move the elider up or down.
- Bise seams or stretchy fabric will require stabilizing before inserting
  the sipper. Cut two strips of seam binding the length of the sipper opening,
  and baste it to the wrong side of the fabric along the seamline to the seam
  allowance.

While there are no fool-proof methods of applying a sipper, methods have improved considerably over the years.



"It's that time of year when we must remind people to use sense in the sun to avoid over-exposure which can cause skin cancer. Cancer of the skin is diagnosed in over 120,000

Americans each year," said Mrs. Patsy Hunt of the Hansford County Unit American Cancer Society.

She explained, "Most skin cancer is caused by excessive

exposure to the sun. People who occupation places their work outdoors--for example a lifeguard or construction work. er-should be very careful. So should fair-skinned, fairhaired people. Senior citizens take care in the sun

Since skin cancer occurs more frequently than any other type of cancer, it is important to know its early warning signals: a sore that does not heal; change in size or color of a wart or mole. "If a symptom appears, the person should not try to wish it away

or 'doctor' it himself, Pasty Hunt stated. "See your physician as soon as possible. Skin cancer is highly curable if detected and treated in time."

"That's why it is so tragic that about 5,000 people are expected to die of skin cancer this year." Patsy Hunt added, "They will be victims of a disease that is largely preventable and highly curable."


