SENIOR CITIZENS DAY

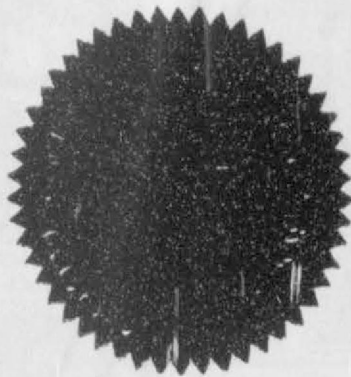

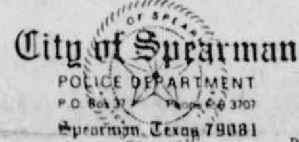

TORNADO SAFETY  
BEFORE AND AFTER Chief of Police

We interrupt this program for the following announcement.....

This is a Tornado warning. A tornado has been sighted West of town. All residents are urged to take cover immediately. I repeat, This is a Tornado warning.

These words along with the piercing sound of sirens often strike terror in the hearts of those who live in areas prone to tornadoes. Too often, however, the warnings are not taken seriously enough.

Tornadoes can occur anytime of the year, most frequently during April, May, and June. Although more tornadoes strike Texas than any other state. No state is entirely free from the threat.

In the last half century, more than 23,000 tornadoes have struck the United States taking a total of some 7,060 lives. Since these killer storms often strike suddenly and with little or no warning, knowing what to do - Before, During, and After the storm could save your life.

#### WHAT TO DO BEFORE A TORNADO

1. Have emergency supplies on hand during the tornado season.
2. Keep a battery operated radio, a flashlight, and a supply of fresh batteries in a convenient place.
3. Know the locations of designated shelter areas in public facilities. Most schools, public buildings, and shopping centers have such areas.
4. Make an inventory of your household furnishings and other possessions. Supplement the written inventory with photographs of each room, including furniture pictures and valuables. All inventories should be kept in a safe deposit box in some other safe place away from the premises.
5. If you live in a single family house in a tornado-prone area it's advisable to reinforce some interior portion as a shelter.
6. PLAN-Be sure everyone in your household knows in advance where to go and what to do in case of a tornado warning.

#### WHAT TO DO DURING A TORNADO

1. Take cover immediately if a tornado warning is issued. A tornado has been sighted in your town. Too often people do not take these warnings seriously enough.
2. Stay calm-Don't panic. Don't attempt to flee from the path of a tornado in a car or other vehicle. They are no match for the swift erratic movement of a tornado which sometimes has wind speeds of more than 200 miles an hour.
3. Abandon cars or mobile homes and seek shelter elsewhere. Automobiles and mobile homes afford the least safety during a tornado. If you are in a car when a tornado approaches, get out and head for the nearest ditch or depression if there is no better shelter available. Persons who live in mobile homes also should seek shelter elsewhere, unless adequate shelter is provided by the mobile home park.
4. If you are at home or at work, stay inside, away from windows and exterior walls until the storm is over. The safest place in a home during a tornado is in the basement. If there is no basement, take shelter in a bathroom, a closet, or under a heavy piece of furniture on the lowest level.
5. If a tornado strikes during school hours, teachers should keep children away from windows and seek shelter either in a designated area or in interior hallways. Concerned parents should not attempt to go out in the storm to pick up their children at school.

#### WHAT TO DO AFTER A TORNADO

1. Be alert for potential hazards. Take extreme care when moving about in an area damaged by a tornado. Be alert for broken power lines, shattered glass, splintered wood, or other sharp protruding objects.
2. If your property is damaged, make temporary repairs to prevent looting. Keep your receipts-the cost of temporary repairs may be reimbursable under your home owners insurance policy.

Hopefully we will have a nice summer and not have to experience any tornadoes. In the event that we do, we hope that some of these tips will aid you.

## Commissioners meeting

The Hansford County Commissioner's Court met in regular session Monday morning.

The meeting was opened by the reading of the minutes, receiving the Treasurer's report, and paying the bills.

The court will advertise for bids for a new pickup for the new county agent.

The Commission passed resolution to request 1 cent out of every 5 cents on the proposed new gasoline tax laws. The 1 cent will be used for road and bridge fund in the county.

The Commission accepted the bid from Crawford Motor Co. to buy a new Ford for the Sheriff's Department. The new Ford cost \$7,695 difference with the trade in of a 1982 Chevy.

Judge McClellan was appointed to look into buying some new storage shelves for the tax office records.

The telephone company notified the Commissioners Court that they had laid a new telephone line in the Oslo community.

The Commissioners Court authorized tax assessor-collector Helen Dry to take bids for a new cash register for the tax office. Judge McClellan stated that they had tried to repair the old cash register but agreed that the tax assessor-collector's office needed a new one.

The Court authorized a salary for Debbie Hornsby who is a new employee and will replace Joyce Crum who is resigning. Joyce has been with the tax assessor office 6 1/2 years and we all wish her the best of luck.

The Commissioners discussed helping the Appraisal District with their new building program. This was tabled and more discussions will be held on this proposal in the future.

The Chemical People Task Force will hold their regular meeting tonight at 7:30 at the County Library.

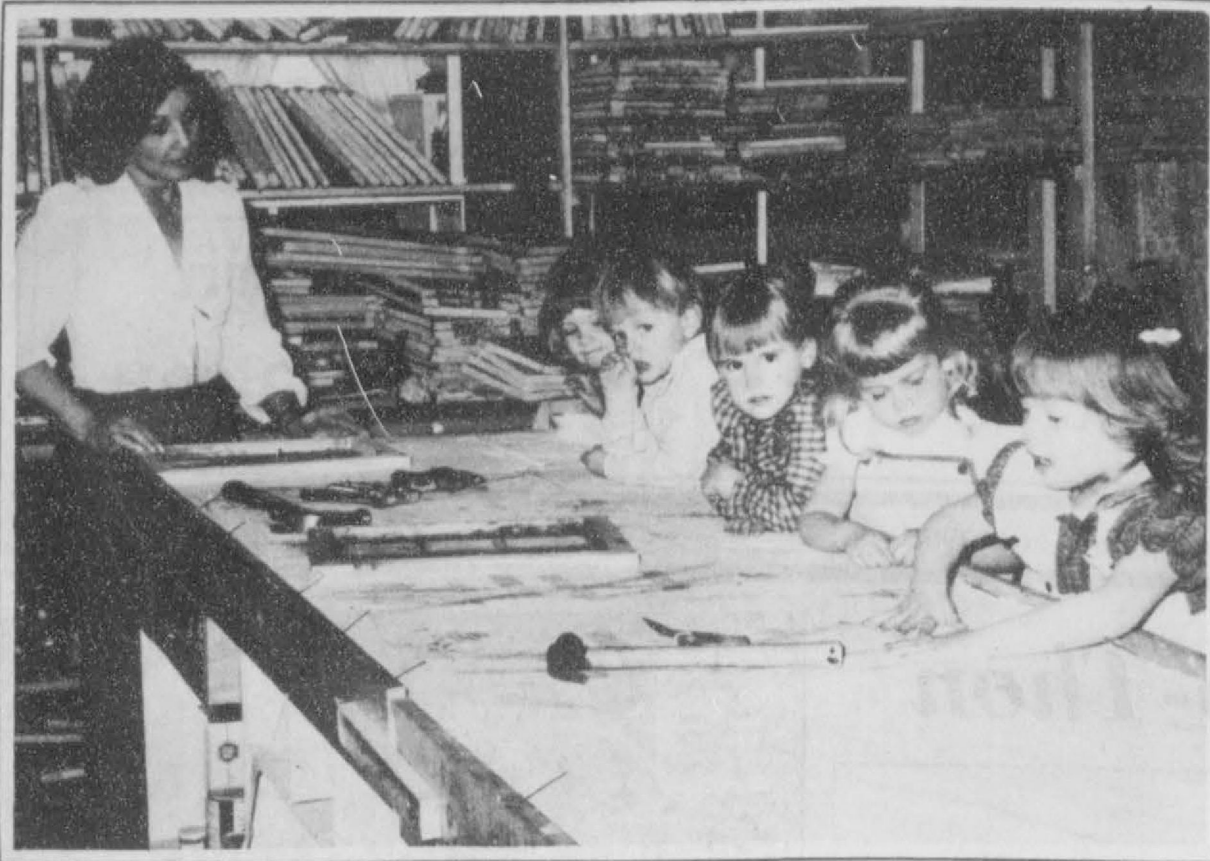

**Sarpalius announces public hearings**

AUSTIN--State Senator Bill Sarpalius, chairman of the Senate Subcommittee on Agriculture, has announced dates for four public hearings of the subcommittee over the next several months. The results will form the basis for a report on agriculture in Texas to the 69th Texas Legislature.

Soil and Water conservation and the control of predatory animals will be the topic of the initial hearing in Amarillo on April 10th, beginning at 10 a.m. in the Texas A&M Research and Extension Center.

Hearings will be April 17th in Corpus Christi, Midland will be the site of a hearing May 23 and a September 26th meeting will be at Texas A&M University. Hearings will be set in

Lake Jackson and Tyler at later dates.

At the Amarillo meeting, the subcommittee will take testimony on reclamation of surface land from gravel pits and the efficient use of irrigation water. The predatory animal subject will deal with possible state measures for control.

Sarpalius said his subcommittee would welcome testimony concerning other areas of Texas agriculture. Members of the subcommittee include Senator Carlos Truan of Corpus Christi, vice chairman and Senator Ted Lyon of Mesquite. Ex officio members are Senator Buster Brown of Lake Jackson and Senator Bill Sims of San Angelo.

### Karen's Rogy Corner

Stress is a family affair. One family member experiencing stress send ripples through the entire family.

Often the most stressful times occur when a family experiences the pile-up of many stressful events. One farm family experienced a day piled high with stressful happenings--the farmer's hay was rained on for the third time, his truck's transmission went out, and his prize Holstein got sick. The entire family was affected by these events.

Serious, single stressful events and pile-up situations call for creative planning to master family stress. Experts in family relations have identified three steps in mastering stress as recognizing the symptoms, finding the sources, and then taking action to deal with the stress.

Family members display warning signals when they experience stress. Among them may be sleeplessness, irritability or physical symptoms, such as headaches, fatigue or backaches. Symptoms such as frequent parent-child conflicts, breakdowns in communication, fault-finding and sarcasm, or hostile behaviors among family members, also show up in the family. To recognize that your entire family is under stress rather than thinking that only one member has a problem is an important first step.

You will often have trouble finding the source of family stress, since it can come from both expected and unexpected sources. You might not consider events that you look forward to or plan for as stressful; yet they can bring change and disruption to your life. The long-awaited birth of a baby, for example, can be a source of stress for a family.

It's easier to recognize unexpected events such as having to move, a child's serious illness or a natural disaster as a source of stress. Sometimes unexpected but pleasant events--like a visit from a favorite relative--can cause stress too.

Identifying sources of stress is especially useful for anticipating stressful family times so you can be prepared for them.

You can take four actions to deal with family stress. First, you can control some events. When surgery is planned for Mom, for example, Dad or another family member can learn to manage in the kitchen before she goes to the hospital.

Second, you can control your attitudes, or how you look at events. A financial emergency can ruin a planned vacation or give a family the opportunity to relax and enjoy each other at home--it's all in how you look at it.

Third, you can control the responses you have to the stressful event. A distressed family does not need to treat each other with criticism that ends in angry conflict, or resort to over-eating or isolation, for relief. A family can even choose to play together in order to work off some tension that is building up.

The fourth way to take action is to recognize and use resources. Reaching out for help is not a sign of weakness. It is knowing your own limits and then asking for help when you are feeling pulled beyond those limits. Family members, the family unit and those outside the family unit are among the resources to consider for help.



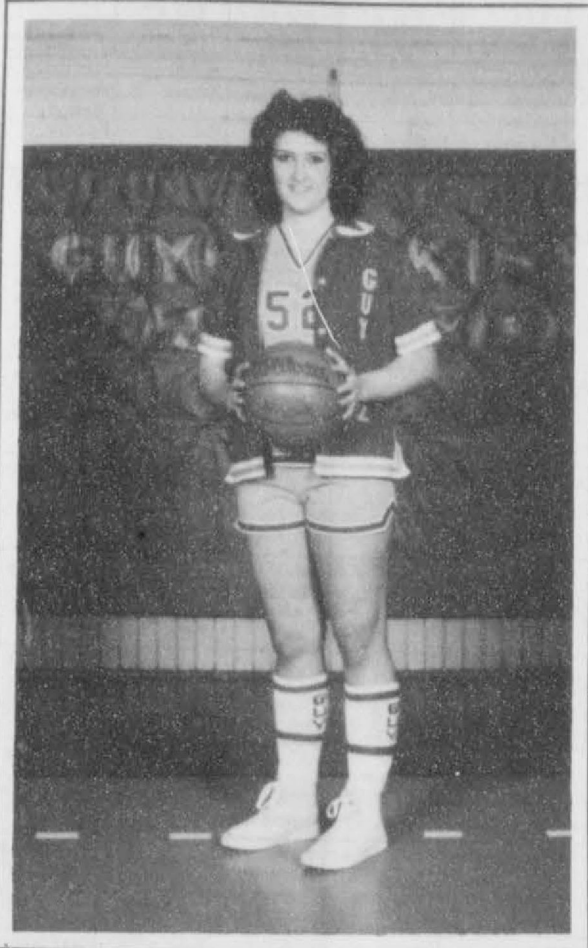

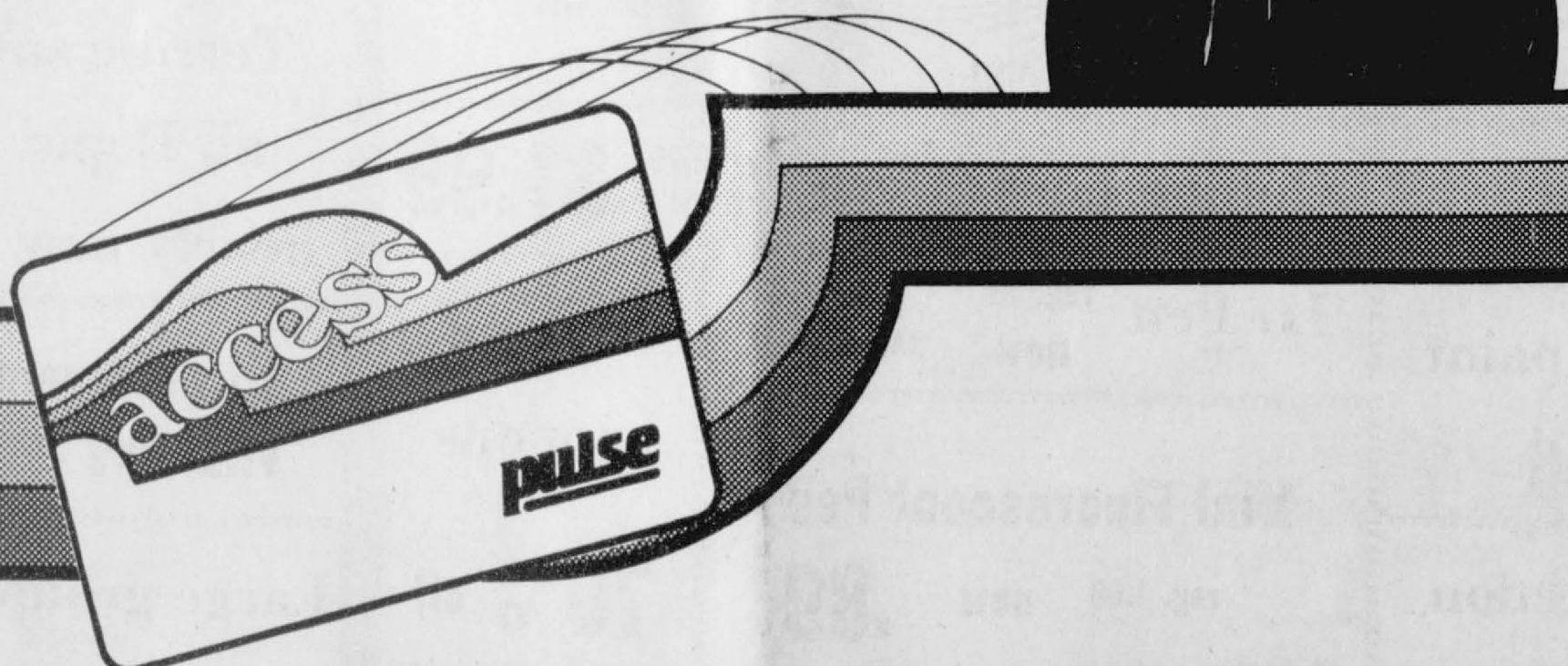
