One suspects President Reagan is following this scenario rather closely. It's difficult to discern any divergence of policy between Reagan's policy and that
propounded in the new Nixon book propounded in the new Nixon book.

Idealists thought this might torpedo the summit and prevent a peace treaty ending the Vietnam war. It helped in many ways, including achieving peace Congress then abandoned South Vietnam. Yetnam in half in 1974, another one-third in 1975. anned the use of U.S. air power in Indochina.-thus denying the president any means of enforcing the Paris accords.
Detente did not fail. Congress failed, and made the effort at detente without deterres. President Carter's relatively, allowed the Soviets to expand their power in the Arabian penninsula, southern Asia, Africa and in Latin America.
On reading Mr. Nixon's latest book, one is struck by the fact that he is uniquely realistic, practical and firm in his search for real peace, or hard-headed detente. The first 53 pages of Real Peace should be read by every high school and college student.
If President Reagan is reelected, one can't envision a more effective secretary of state, for a year or two, to get U.S. foreign policy firmly established, understood
worldwide and properly protecting freedom than Mr . worldwison.
