## Lynx win homecoming game 63-34 LYNX MEET RANGERS THERE FRIDAY NIGHT

Shelly Cook was crowned Queen, and Buddy Pool was crowned King at the homecoming basketball game in Spearman Friday night. But, the big event of the evening, next to the crowning affair which was just super, was the performance of the Spearman Lynx, who now are the leaders in district 1-AAA. Ross Donahue and Mark Pearson combined to almost wipe-out the frisky Wildcats as Donahue hit 23 points and Pearson 21. But it was the defense that really destroyed the Wildcats. In fact, the Lynx held the Wildcats to only 3 points in the second quarter, and four points in the third quarter. This same team from Canadian almost upset the Lynx in their tournament final at Canadian last week, losing to Spearman 64-60 in the final.

Outstanding on defense for the Lynx were Haden, Burke and King

Pool. Final score was Lynx 63-34.

The Lynxettes were very impressive also, but their game was against the leagues leading tall Wildkittens, and they were just too much for the Lynxettes although Kellie Crawford managed 15 points and Rhonda Gibson 10 points. Late in the game, a girl from Canadian was injured, and the game was delayed 45 minutes. One of the Canadian girls injured her hip and the Spearman EMT personnel had to be called in, and the player was taken by ambulance to the hospital in Spearman. From there she was transferred to Amarillo for treatment of a dislocated hip.

Although the Lynxettes lost to Canadian by the score of 50-35, it was an excellent game, and the young Lynxettes still will be a determining factor in the district race as they continue to improve.

The Annual Stockholders Meeting of the First State Bank was held Tuesday, January 10, 1984 with C.A. Gibner, Chairman of the Board, presiding. The annual report to the stockholders showed the continued stable growth of the bank, notably the capital structure. Certified surplus was increased by \$1,000,000.00, bringing the total to \$2,000,000.00. This increase, in addition to capital of \$1,000,000.00 and Undivided Profits and Reserves of \$4,616,000.00, brings the total capital structure to \$7,616,000.00.

Following the report, Verma Lee Shirley, Vice President, presented plans of the new banking facility and a progress report. Despite inclement weather in December, plans call for an August completion.

In 1957, he went to work for Horizon Oil & Gas Co. of Dallas, Texas as Production Manager, a position he still holds. In 1967, he purchased the Phillips 66 jobbership in Spearman, Golden Spread Sales Co.

He has served on Hansford County Hospital Boards, Hansford Appraisal District Boards, and presently is director of Panhandle Producers & Royalty Association.

## Open House

Texas New-Mexico Power Company officials have invited the public to turnout for its big grand opening celebration of its ultra-modern new brick office in Spearman.

The open house celebration will formally get underway at 1:30 p.m. Thursday, Jan. 19, with a ribbon cutting by R.D. Woofter, of Ft. Worth, president of Texas-New Mexico Power Company, Joe Cook of Perryton, division manager for the utility firm, Robert Elliott, manager of Texas-New Mexico's Spearman office, local office employees Veda Collins, Carolyn English, and Jo Dell Tigrett, Spearman Mayor C. Ralph Blodgett, Chamber of Commerce Ambassadors and other chamber members, and other local dignitaries, according to Elliott.

Elliott said the open house will last from 1:30 to 5 p.m. and will be refreshments, including coffee, punch and cookies for those dropping by to help the firm celebrate the opening of its new office at 300 Hancock.

The recent two weeks or so of sub-freezing temperature was expensive for the City of Spearman as well as for residents who pay their utilities and also had frozen pipes. City manager Jim Murray said he had 5 to 6 people that worked 60 to 70 hours for three weeks, and he really couldn't actually say what the cost in labor is since the city pays time and a-half for overtime. The city did not hire additional help but shifted some people to the water department.

He said they answered approximately 100 calls to replace meter bottoms and other frozen items on city property.

There were also 25 water main breaks. Murray stated that the cost of repairs was mainly the cost of the overtime labor, including the cost of digging at the breaks on the main lines.

The city crews did a good job in what is probably a record long spell of zero and below weather. The City billed out 34,190 mcf at \$4.39 per mcf for the billing period on November 20 to December 20 which included the cold spell during Thanksgiving.

The next billing period Dec. 20 to Jan. 20 will reflect the gas used to heat homes, offices, etc. during the Dec. 21 to Jan. 3 cold spell.

The rate the city pays for gas varies a little from month to month which is passed on to customers along with the regular fee that the city charges.

The Nov.-Dec. billing was 500 mcf short for the same period last year. Murray said he was sure that the city would go over the budget due to the cold weather and the cost of repairing meters, lines, etc.

Filing deadline for county and district offices is February 6. County officials whose terms are expiring are Tax Assessor-Collector Helen Dry, Sheriff R.L. McFarlin; Commissioner Prec. 1 Garland Head and Commissioner Prec. 3 Joe T. Venneman, County Attorney, John Hutchinson, District attorney and district judge will also be up for election in the May primary. Democratic party chairman reports that no one has filed for county offices.

Two political announcements are carried in this paper that of Buck Buchanan, for state representative and Bill Sarpalius for state senator. Both men are seeking reelection. Candidates must file by Feb. 6 with either the Democratic chairman Carl Archer or Roy Bulls, County Republican chairman.

## Gruver EMS sets EMT course Jan. 23

The Gruver Emergency Medical Service will be presenting an Emergency Medical course at the Gruver Elementary School located at 405 Garrett. The course is scheduled to begin at 6:00 P.M. on Monday, January 23, 1984. This course is being presented through Frank Phillips College in Borger, Texas as an adult continuing education course.

The course is designed to provide training needed in Gruver and the surrounding area for ambulance and emergency service personnel. Upon successful completion of the course the student will have completed the state requirements necessary to become registered Emergency Medical Technicians.

The course will teach the role and responsibilities of the Emergency Medical Technician in providing emergency care. The course is designed to develop student skills in cardiopulmonary Resuscitation, Bandaging and Splinting, Traction Splinting, Patient Assessment, Me-

chanical Aids to Breathing, and other emergency treatment procedures which may be rendered in the field short of those rendered by a physician or by paramedical personnel under the direct supervision of a physician.

The course will be presented on Monday and Tuesday nights from 6:00 P.M. to 10:00 P.M. and is scheduled to conclude on Monday, April 23, 1984 with the state final. There will be 144 clock hours logged during the course which includes 40 hours of hospital observation time that will be completed during the course period.

Anyone 18 years of age or older is eligible for the course and you do not have to work or promise to work on an ambulance service to take this course.

Tuition for the course is \$50.00 with an approximate book cost of \$19.00. If you are interested, please contact Gruver City Hall at 733-5037 and have your name placed on a list so that we know how many people to plan for.

**SHOULD YOU LOSE WEIGHT?**

How can you tell if you are overweight? Is there a difference between being overweight and being obese?

These questions often bring conflicting answers and there's even some controversy among nutrition experts about the definitions of and the methods used to determine who is overweight or obese.

For many years most physicians have used height/weight charts to determine if an individual is the correct weight. These tables were developed by insurance companies based on their records.

They indicated the weight ranges at which people of various heights and builds were statistically at less risk of premature death. Recently, these weights were revised upward by about 5 to 7 percent, although several health associations have advocated using the original lower weights.

Because body weight alone does not determine fitness or leanness, the "average" weight of a person may be meaningless. For example, skeleton weight can vary from 4 to 9 percent from person to person.

This means that a 125-pound woman could have a skeleton that weighed as little as 5 pounds or as much as 11 pounds. Also, a very muscular person's weight may seem to be high in proportion to height, but the person actually has very little fat tissue.

Determining the amount of body fat a person has is the best method for defining overweight or "over fat." One way

to measure body fat is by weighing under water. Mathematical calculations are then made which define the amount of body fat.

A reliable method of determining body fatness which is easier than weighing under water is to measure skin fold thickness by constant tension calipers. About half of the body's fat is directly under the skin, so measuring the thickness of this fat (called subcutaneous fat) is a good index of total body fat.

The calipers are used to measure several different body sites for thickness. An index of percent of body fat can then be calculated according to readings at the various body points.

A simpler home test of body fatness makes use of a full-length mirror. A person is often able to decide whether he or she is carrying too much fat by a careful study of oneself before a mirror without clothes.

Have you gained several pounds over the years? Do you find your clothes a little tighter than in the past?

If the signs point to having too much body fat, don't wait. Check with your physician about a well-balanced, reduced calorie diet and an exercise program that would be right for you.

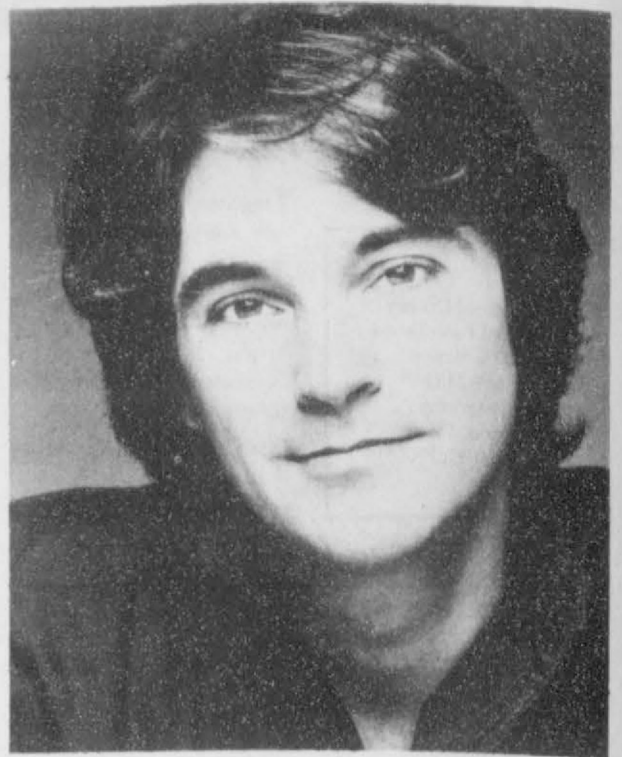

### About Beer

Recent figures on the best-selling imported beers brings to mind a long-standing need in the U.S. That's the desirability of having the alcoholic content of beer printed on bottle labels or cans.

The alcoholic content of wine and whiskey is specified on labels. Why not with beer and malt liquor? One hears reports the alcoholic content of beer sold in the various states averages about four percent. Some imported beers are stronger. It varies in states.

The public has a right to know the alcoholic content of all, in all states, and Congress should see to that, especially in view of the current effort to reduce highway accidents.

The biggest selling imported beers? Heineken's is first. Then come Molson, Beck's, Moosehead and Labatt's, according to brewery industry sources.

Heineken's is from Holland and Beck's from Germany; the other three are Canadian.

### Air Fares

Although air fares this winter are not as illogical as last year this time there is still no logic in the computation of air fares.

One can always fly from New York or Miami, for example, for less than a hundred dollars. Even the major lines offer these special fares. That's a distance of some 1500 miles.

Yet to fly other distances half that length, the fare is often twice as much. To fly between cities where one airline has a monopoly, the fare might be four times as high, figured per mile.

Airline deregulation has, for the most part, been a good thing. But the free enterprise system can have its weak points as well as its strong. One of them is the ripoff of passengers on shorter routes and routes where

In the old days the railroads charged passengers four cents a mile. The airlines need to come closer to a mileage rate that makes some sense. They can probably never get fares on a totally mileage charge, but they can do much better than they now do.

The Civil Aeronautics Board, Congress and the White House should do all they can to encourage more equity in U.S. airline fares.

### Real Peace

Probably the most realistic outline for practical detente with the Soviet Union available today is offered in a new book by Richard Nixon, *Real Peace*.

The former president demonstrates clearly his real-world understanding of Soviet leaders, history and policy. In the small book's first 53 pages, one finds a clear and safe formula for U.S.-USSR relations.

One suspects President Reagan is following this scenario rather closely. It's difficult to discern any divergence of policy between Reagan's policy and that propounded in the new Nixon book.

In brief, Mr. Nixon says we can have hard-headed detente with Russia, but only if strong, if willing to use force to defend freedom and allied or third-world countries.

In other words, detente is not possible without its necessary counterpart—deterrence. That was President Carter's fatal miscalculation. He sought detente while allowing a credible deterrence to disappear, via unilateral disarmament.

Nixon notes that between 1969 and 1974 hard-headed detente with linkage worked. Not one nation was lost to the Soviet bloc in this period. On the eve of a summit meeting in 1972, the bombing and mining of Haiphong was ordered.

Idealists thought this might torpedo the summit and prevent a peace treaty ending the Vietnam war. It helped in many ways, including achieving peace. Congress then abandoned South Vietnam.

It cut administration requests for aid to South Vietnam in half in 1974, another one-third in 1975. It banned the use of U.S. air power in Indochina—thus denying the president any means of enforcing the Paris peace accords.

Detente did not fail. Congress failed, and made the same mistake in Angola, Nixon says. President Carter's effort at detente without deterrence, while disarming relatively, allowed the Soviets to expand their power in the Arabian peninsula, southern Asia, Africa and in Latin America.

On reading Mr. Nixon's latest book, one is struck by the fact that he is uniquely realistic, practical and firm in his search for real peace, or hard-headed detente. The first 53 pages of *Real Peace* should be read by every high school and college student.

If President Reagan is reelected, one can't envision a more effective secretary of state, for a year or two, to get U.S. foreign policy firmly established, understood worldwide and properly protecting freedom than Mr. Nixon.

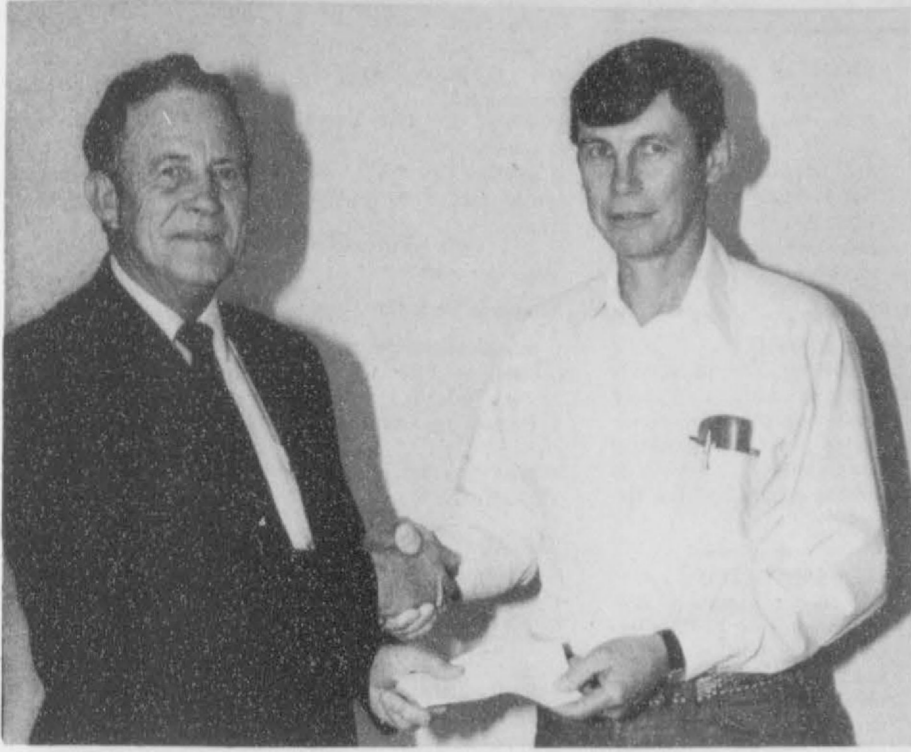

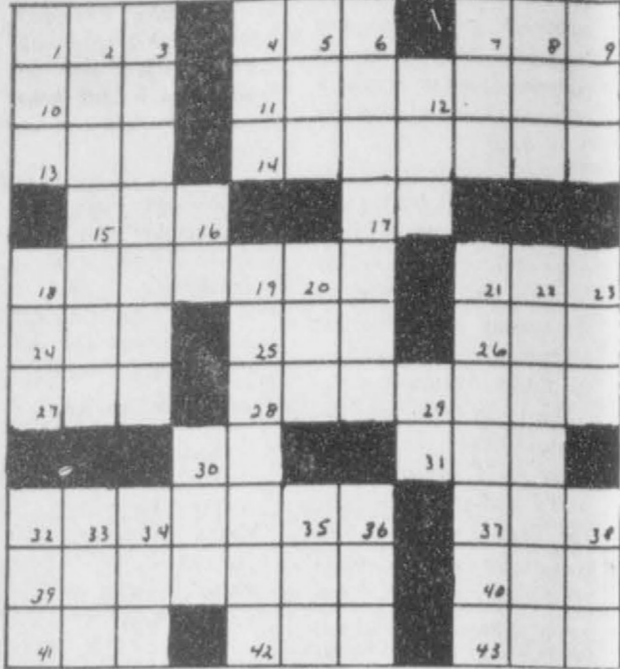

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### Congressman addresses farmers in convention

LUBBOCK, TX--The powerful chairman of the House Agriculture Committee was in Lubbock Friday to address the 80th Annual Texas Farmers Union convention. Congressman Kika de la Garza (D-Mission) spoke of agriculture's importance to the world and the "subsidy" that the American consumer receives from the farmer.

"The United States of America is the best fed nation on earth; possibly the best fed in history--yet the American farmer receives the smallest percentage of the amount that is paid for food. Many times the farmer is selling his product for much less than the

cost of his producing that product. If that is not a subsidy, then I must re-learn the definition," observed de la Garza.

The Mission representative also commented on the science of politics, noting that "a little something is a lot better than all of nothing; that is what I have to work with when we pass agricultural legislation; what is possible? Some organizations are of the mind that if they don't get what they want, they'll take nothing. That isn't the way to work."

Noting that the 1981 Farm Bill only passed by two votes in the House of Representa-

tives, de la Garza said, "That is the kind of thing we have to deal with in passing a 1985 Farm Bill, but when I get back we will begin working on the bill, and we need to hear your positions, your comments."

The question posed to the Chairman, "What is your message to the American Farmer?" and de la Garza phrased his answer, "Hang in there; and God bless you. God made farmers a very special kind of people. God made them for a very special reason; to feed his children. And they are the

eternal optimists; people think that all the gamblers are in Las Vegas and Atlantic City; no my friend, they're on every farm and ranch across the nation. We are the only country that is feeding itself, independent of any other nation. Thank God for that, and I'm proud to be an American, and farmers should be too.

# Electric company announces deferred payment plan

Record low temperatures throughout the state caused the Texas-New Mexico Power Company and District Manager Robert Elliott concern that some low income customers might have trouble paying their (December usage) electric bill in one lump sum.

"The Texas-New Mexico Power Company never wants to place undue hardship on anyone," stated Robert D. Woofter, chairman, president and chief executive officer of the utility. "Therefore in compliance with a request from the Governor's office and Public Utility Commission Chairman, Alan R. Erwin, TNP restates its 'Deferred Payment Plan', which should assist low-income families." Woofter emphasized.

Robert Elliott explained the program: If a customer has not been disconnected for nonpayment or has not been delinquent more than twice in the last 12 months, the Company will offer, at the customer's request, a deferred payment plan. The deferred payment plan will be applicable to the current delinquent amount, and payments will be of equal amounts for a period of not less than 30 days or greater than 90 days. Those wishing to participate in the Deferred Payment Plan should contact the TNP office at 659-2336 as soon as possible.

The Deferred Payment Plan meets the requirements established by PUC Commissioner Erwin. "(This) is not to be used by the customers as an excuse not to pay a bill, but rather to ensure that the customer's electric service is not disconnected because of an inability to afford a single payment for December's usage," stated Commissioner Erwin.

TNP also makes available average pay plan which spreads electric costs over twelve months. Such a plan is beneficial to families living on fixed incomes.

# Chamber to have coffees on Tues. and Thurs.

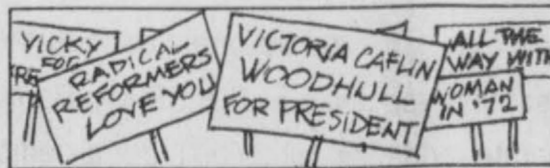

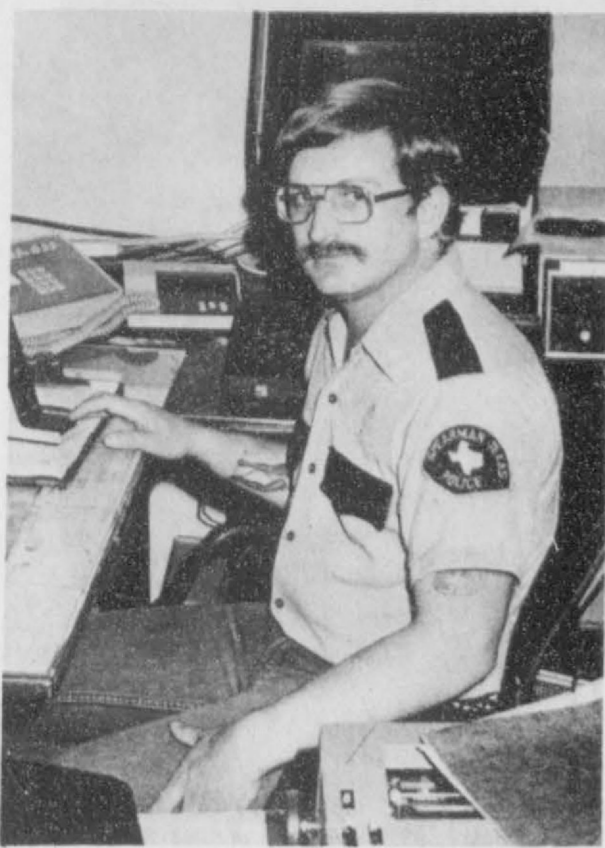

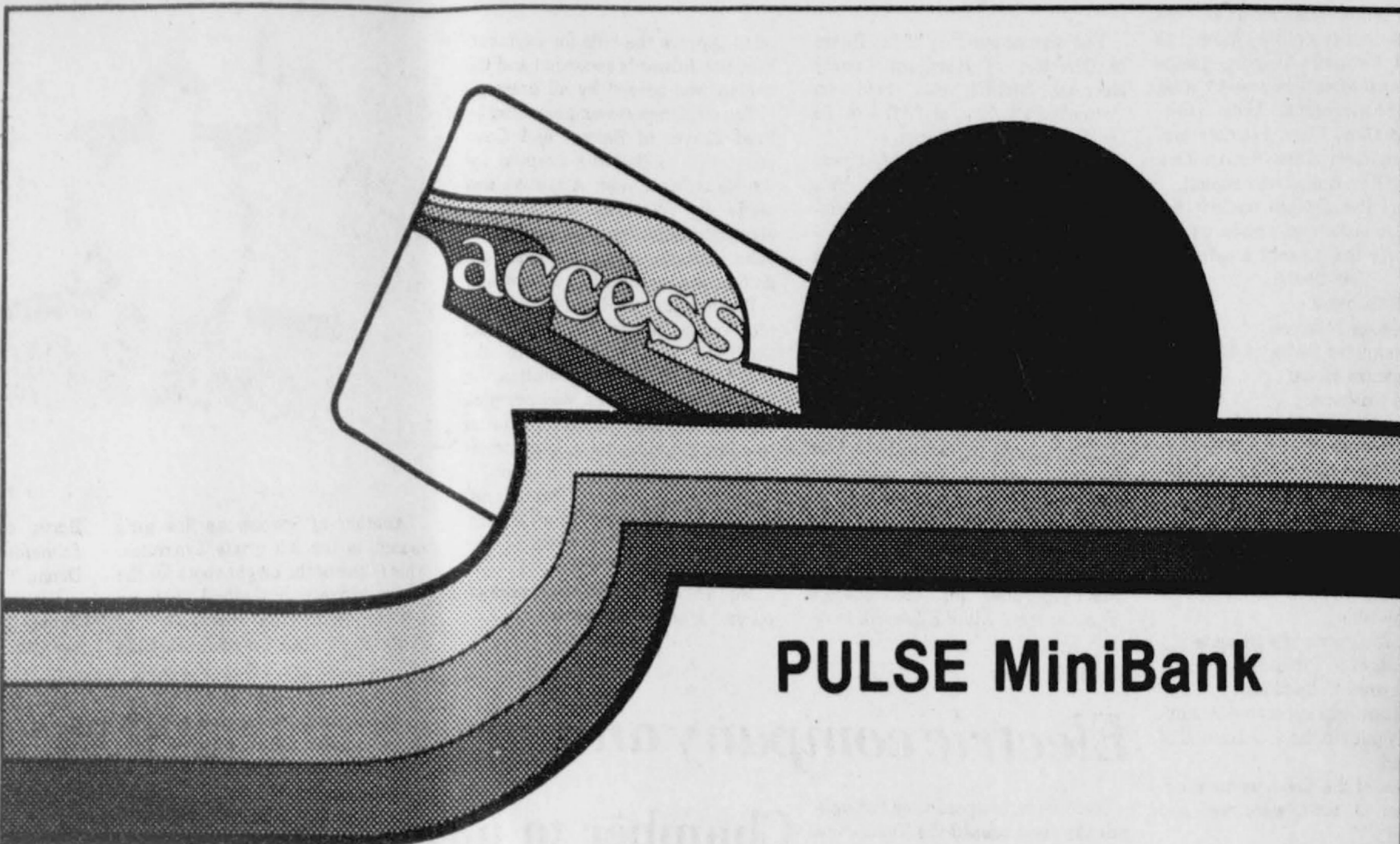
