## Erickson publishes 10th book

Texas Panhandle author John R. Erickson has just brought out his tenth book, called "The
Hunter" (Doubleday and Co., S11.95). And it holds several surprises for his readers. The first is that it doesn't deal with cowboying or humor, which have become Erickson's stock-intrade. The second surprise is that he has written a western based on story that is 6,000 years old In 1965, while Erickson was fudent at the University of Texas, he reed a translation of a gamesh" which was written on clay tablets in Mesopotamia (present-day Iraq) 4,000 years before Christ.
It was about a young ling named Gilgamesh," Erickson recalls, "who was told a fascinating
story by a trapper. The trapper claimed to have seen a wild man who lived with the animals. He had the appearance of a man but hought he was an animal.
King Gilgamesh canoelled his wedding and set out to trap the wild man, called Enkidu in the original epic. After all his efforts failed, he finally hit upon the idea of using
man in.
That worked. Enkidu stayed with the woman several days, and when he tried to return to the wild, the animels ran from him. He had become a man, and later in the story, when he is dying, he curses the harlot and Gilgamesh for taking him

Among the animals, he had not man knows that he must die. Erickson took the ancient story and set it on the Texas frontier in 1873-4. Gil Moreland, the main character, is a wealthy young man living in Weatherford, and the wild man is an Indian who has become
ple.

The story is set in Weatherford, Ft. Griffin, Ft. Phantom Hill, and the Texas Panhandle. "It's a tragic story," said Erickson, "but unlike much modern fiction, it is tragedy with meaning and purpose. It speaks to us in the age of space travel. even though it was written by
some unkown author 6,000 years ggo. That in itself is rether astounding.'
The author believes that the Gilgamesh story deals with themes that are also present in biblical story of the Creation.
"Both stories tell that man lived in harmony with nature a one time but lost it in the process
of acquiring knowelege and civilof acquiring knowelage and divi"-
zation. A cortain feeling of eszation. A cartain feeling of es
trangement and sadness seems to be part of who we are."
Erickson, who is best known as a humorist, has no trouble going from comedy to tragedy. "People cry at weddings and laugh at human experience
