## Anita Close services held

Funeral services for Anita Luann Close, 41, were held at 11 a.m. Monday at the First Christian Church here with the Rev. Martin Foster, pastor, officiating. Services here were under the direction of Boxwell Brothers Funeral Home. Services were also held at 3 p.m. Monday at the 11th Street Baptist Church in Shamrock with the Rev. Jeff Messer, pastor, officiating. Burial was in Shamrock Cemetery by Richardson Funeral Home.

Mrs. Close was killed shortly before 6 p.m. Friday, May 18, when the truck in which she was riding lost control on Farm Road 759, about 2.5 miles east of here. Mrs. Close's husband, Billy Pierce Close, the driver of the vehicle, was treated at Hansford Hospital and released.

Texas Department of Public Safety Trooper Ken Donahue said Close was westbound on 759 when crosswinds from a thunderstorm caused him to lose control of his truck. The truck left the roadway, entered a ditch, rolled over and landed on its top, pinning Mrs. Close underneath, Donahue said.

Mrs. Close was born in Shamrock and moved to Spearman in 1980 when she married Billy Close. She was employed by Hansford Hospital and was a member of the First Christian Church.

Survivors include her husband; three sons Mike Moore of Elk City and Paul and Terry Moore of Spearman; a stepson, Billy Frank Close of Spearman; two stepdaughters, Sue and Jeanne Close, both of Spearman; her mother, Gladys Loyd of Shamrock; her grandmother, Ida Cole of Shamrock; and four grandchildren.

# Swimming pool to open Friday

Under the management of the Hansford County YMCA, the Spearman swimming pool will begin operations for the 1984 season on Friday, May 25. Eddie Gage, a fourth grade teacher at Spearman Elementary School will be the pool director for the summer.

For the first time swim lessons will be offered most of the summer. This summer in 1984, the Y will be offering the National YMCA Learn to Swim Program. The program features a progressive style of lessons and the awarding of patches and certificates to children who accomplish determined skill levels.

The swim instruction program will be run in two week sessions starting June 4. Classes will be held on Monday, Tuesday and Thursday afternoons at 5:00, 5:30 or 6:00 p.m. Children will be placed into classes by skill level which will determine at which time they should come. Parents interested in enrolling their children should contact the Y early, because class sizes are limited. These classes are for children 4 years old and up.

In addition to swim lessons for children, there will be two special times for adults. The pool will be available for adult lap swimming from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. Monday

thru Friday. Again this year the Y will be sponsoring ladies water exercise classes on Monday, Wednesday and Friday's from 5:30-6:30. Registration is not necessary to do lap swimming but is required to attend the water exercise class. More information is available by calling the Y.

The swimming pool will be available for open swimming from 1-5 p.m., Monday-Saturday. Since the pool belongs to the city, the city council has set the rates for the summer's open swim. Daily admission for children 12 and under is \$1.00 and 13 & up is \$1.50. Season passes are Children 12 and under, \$40.00, 13 and

over, \$50.00; the family season pass is \$100.00.

During open swim it will be required that all children under 6 be accompanied by an adult. The adult may enter the pool area only if wearing a bathing suit, otherwise they may sit on the bleachers at the North end of the pool. This change in rules is for liability reasons.

The pool may be rented for private parties after 8:30 p.m. These parties must be arranged through the YMCA office.

To schedule a party or ask any questions concerning the pool, call the YMCA at 9-2591.

## Wheat field day

Hansford County area wheat farmers are invited to a wheat field day at 10:00 a.m., Wednesday, May 30 near Perryton.

The field day will be sponsored by the Southwestern Division of Pioneer Hi-Bred International, Inc., and will be on the Marvin Montgomery farm, located south of Perryton on Highway 70, then 7 miles west on Farm Road 759, then one-half mile south at the Conley Elevator.

Farmers and others attending the field day will have the opportunity to examine two new hard red winter wheat varieties from Pioneer--2157 and 2165--as well as other varieties grown in this area.

In tests conducted by both Oklahoma State University and Pioneer, 2157 and 2165 have demonstrated high yield, high disease resistance, strong standability, superior grazing, and high protein characteristics which are important to area wheat producers.



**On-To-School program**

AMARILLO--Class of 1984 seniors from all areas of the Texas Panhandle may have the opportunity this summer to prepare for fall entry into college or technical school. Amarillo College, Texas State Technical Institute, Frank Phillips College, and Clarendon College have cooperated in designing a pilot project, The On-To-School Program, under the sponsorship of the Panhandle Job Training Partnership. The schools have arranged for up to 50 eligible graduates to enroll in on-campus courses which serve as a bridge from high school to college. Students will also be provided parttime employment during the project.

Loretta Kindsfather, director of the project, said seniors who want additional education but have not made career choices and need

financial assistance will be considered. Eligibility is also based on family income guidelines specified by the Job Training Partnership Act.

The project, scheduled to begin in mid-June, will offer vocational counseling and testing, financial assistance packaging, and on-campus jobs, in addition to a curriculum of college reading techniques, strategies for learning, job skill training, and basic mathematics.

Class of 1984 graduates living in Amarillo should contact Rita Wells, at Texas Employment Commission, 1206 W. 7th or phone 372-2531 no later than May 29, 1984. Applications will be processed as completed.

**Erickson publishes 10th book**

Texas Panhandle author John R. Erickson has just brought out his tenth book, called "The Hunter" (Doubleday and Co., \$11.95). And it holds several surprises for his readers.

The first is that it doesn't deal with cowboying or humor, which have become Erickson's stock-in-trade. The second surprise is that he has written a western based on a story that is 6,000 years old.

In 1965, while Erickson was a student at the University of Texas, he read a translation of a story called "The Epic of Gilgamesh" which was written on clay tablets in Mesopotamia (present-day Iraq) 4,000 years before Christ.

"It was about a young king named Gilgamesh," Erickson recalls, "who was told a fascinating story by a trapper. The trapper claimed to have seen a wild man who lived with the animals. He had the appearance of a man but thought he was an animal."

King Gilgamesh cancelled his wedding and set out to trap the wild man, called Enkidu in the original epic. After all his efforts failed, he finally hit upon the idea of using a harlot to lure the wild man in.

That worked. Enkidu stayed with the woman several days, and when he tried to return to the wild, the animals ran from him. He had become a man, and later in the story, when he is dying, he curses the harlot and Gilgamesh for taking him away from the animal world.

Among the animals, he had not been aware of his mortality. Only man knows that he must die.

Erickson took the ancient story and set it on the Texas frontier in 1873-4. Gil Moreland, the main character, is a wealthy young man living in Weatherford, and the wild man is an Indian who has become separated from his people.

The story is set in Weatherford, Ft. Griffin, Ft. Phantom Hill, and the Texas Panhandle.

"It's a tragic story," said Erickson, "but unlike much modern fiction, it is tragedy with meaning and purpose. It speaks to us in the age of space travel, even though it was written by some unknown author 6,000 years ago. That in itself is rather astounding."

The author believes that the Gilgamesh story deals with themes that are also present in biblical story of the Creation.

"Both stories tell that man lived in harmony with nature at one time but lost it in the process of acquiring knowledge and civilization. A certain feeling of estrangement and sadness seems to be part of who we are."

Erickson, who is best known as a humorist, has no trouble going from comedy to tragedy. "People cry at weddings and laugh at wakes. It's all part of the same human experience."

The Perryton, Texas author is a member of Texas Institute of Letters, the Philosophical society of Texas, and is on the executive board of the Western Writers of America.

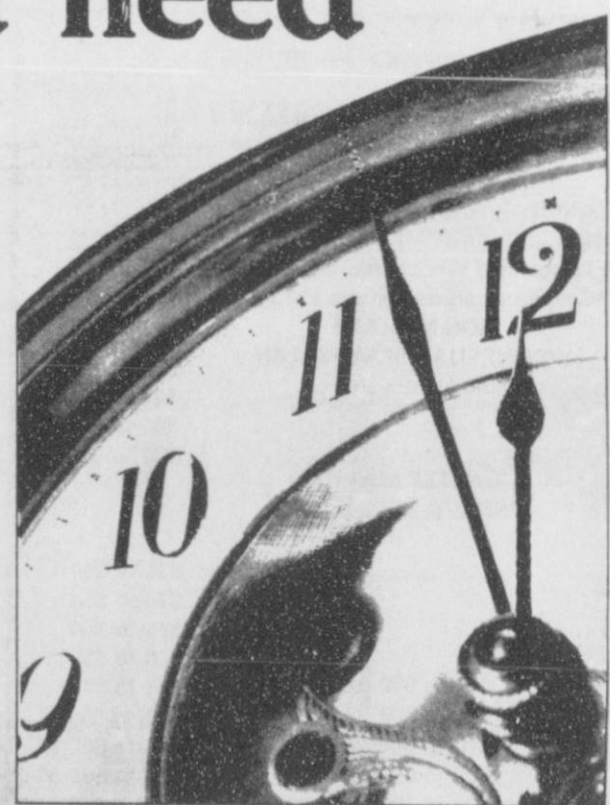

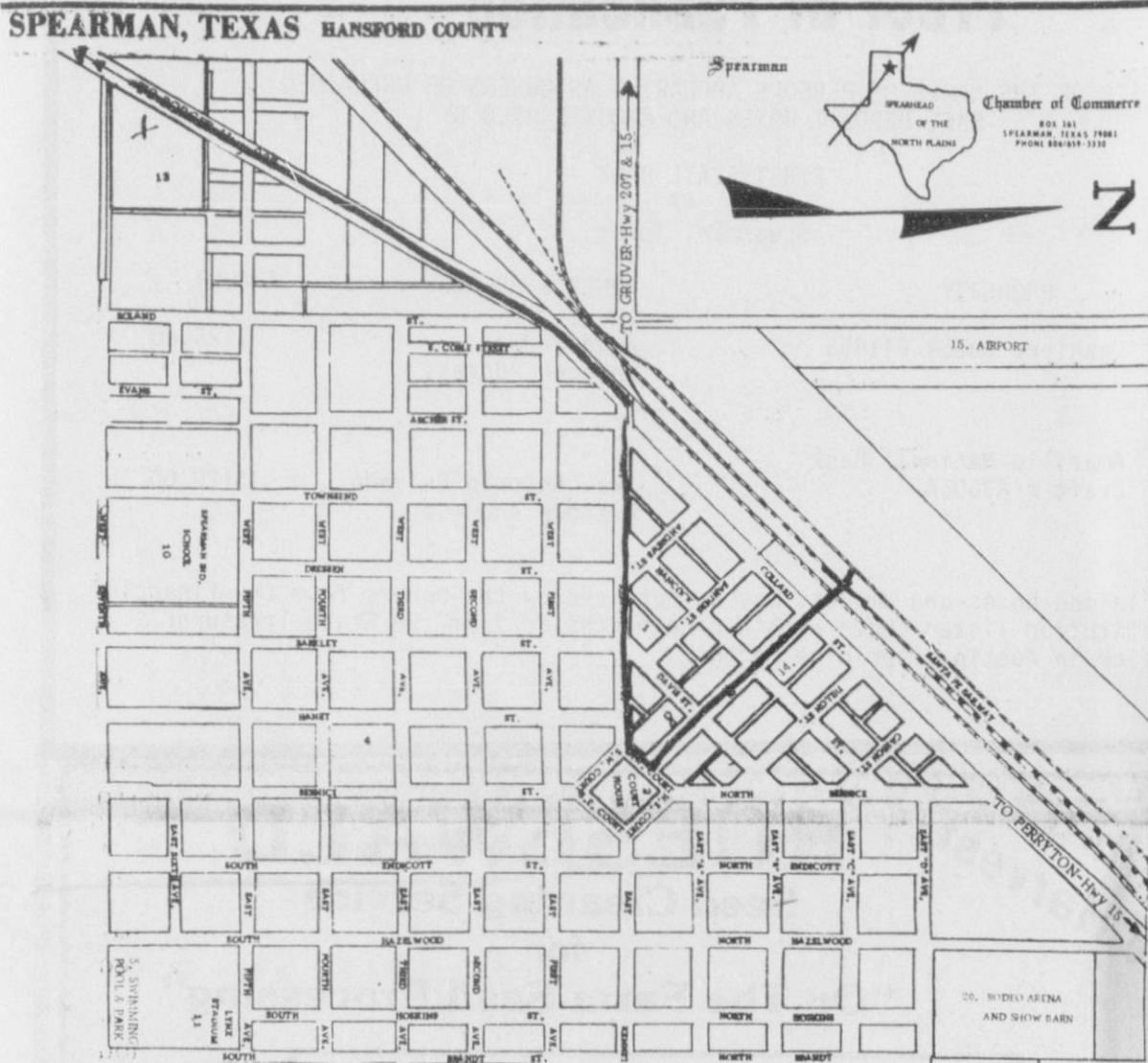
The annual Dogie Days Gallop will be held on Saturday morning at 10:45 a.m. The three and one-half mile run will begin at the

### TV: Clash Of Culture

What has happened in the past few decades in the United States, because of television, is not generally recognized for what it was, a clash of cultures.

The United States was established by peoples from Europe, mostly northern Europe, and the social, moral, and political ideas and traditions of that part of the world were, generally, those accepted here.

The majority, or mainstream, of the U.S. population accepted certain behavioral patterns, ideas of decency, proper language, etc.

The churches--all free and none state-supported--taught Christian values, good manners and desirable moral behavior.

With the advent of television, a different culture entered almost every U.S. home. It's the culture of minorities and jet-setters dominating the entertainment industry.

Coarse behavior, vulgarity, four-letter-word language, flashy, money-oriented values are sold hour after hour on U.S. commercial television. In effect, a generation of Americans has already been brainwashed in that alien culture. That brainwashing has changed life and values in this nation.

We see in our films today, with some exceptions, the most stupid, unrealistic and childish plots and stories, terrible acting, four-letter word talk (considered smart) and often a bosom display to attract boobs. Nine of ten films are utterly worthless, degenerate and perverse--to yesterday's American values.

The networks are too powerful to be reformed; politicians instead kowtow to them. The vulgarization and crime trend in this country caused by this clash of cultures is still to be finally measured in cost.

### THE Know Weather

Does dew fall? If so, when does it fall?

Dew does not fall, so there is no need to answer the second question. However, dew is an interesting weather element and close observation of it can tell you something about the weather to follow during the day.

Dew collects on surface objects, like blades of grass, and is moisture taken from passing, warmer air.

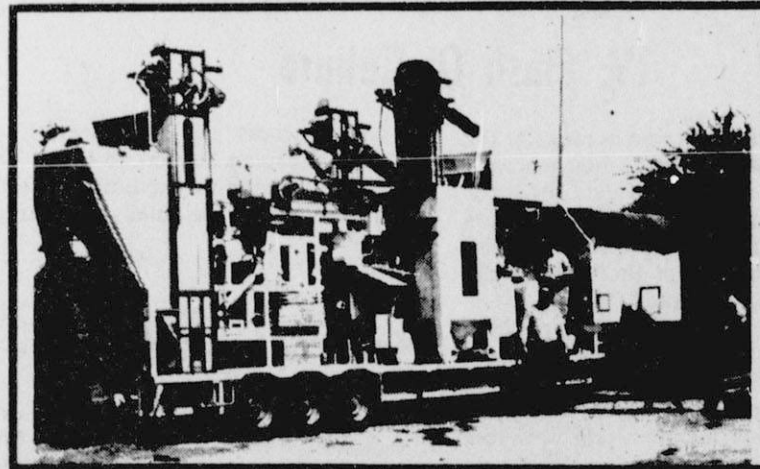
