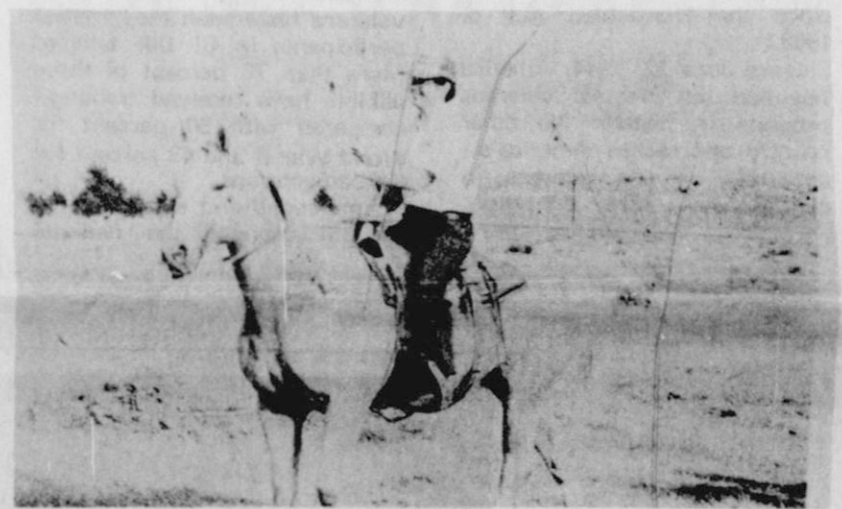

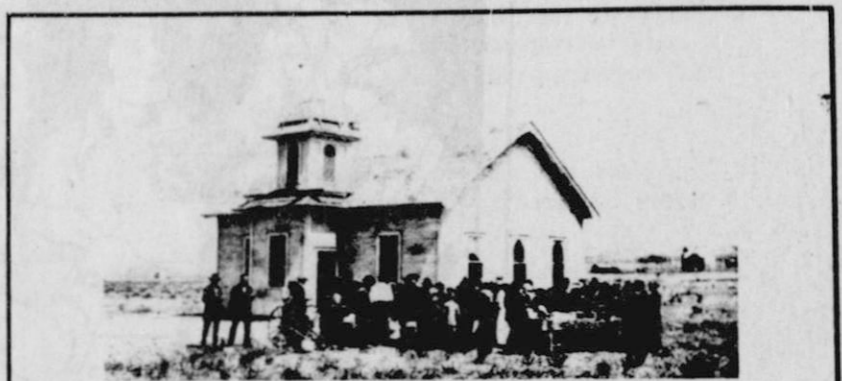

This First Methodist Church at Old Hansford was dedicated May 22, 1915

Three hundred twenty Methodists and friends from Spearman and Gruver met at Old Hansford Sunday evening to celebrate one hundred years of Methodism in our nation.

The first Methodist Church at Old Hansford was dedicated May 22, 1915. The Camp Tents Sunday were set up some twenty feet North of the entrance of the old Methodist Church pictured above.

Methodism began in Hansford County in 1900 with the appointment of Rev. B. McKeowen to the Coldwater Mission in November 1900.

On February 1, 1910, Rev. McKeowen preached his first sermon in Hansford County.

The first pastor at the Hansford Mission was Rev. Leslie Robinson, in November 1907.

The congregation worshipped in the Courthouse at first.

July 16 deadline to certify crops

Hansford County farmers have until July 16, 1984 to report the sizes and intended uses of their spring seeded crops such as grain sorghum to the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service.

Keith Martin, CED says farmers need to furnish the reports to qualify for price support loans, deficiency payments and future programs.

For a nominal fee, farmers may request that their spring seeded crops be measured.

Keith Martin says this is a valuable service not only to farm program participants but to any producer who desires an accurate acreage measurement.

Crops may be certified at the local ASCS office between 8:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m. Monday through Friday.

GI Bill good for veterans & America

President Franklin Roosevelt signed the World War II GI Bill on June 22, 1944. There was little realization, then, of the impact this legislation would have on life in America. According to Stephen Lemons, Director at the Waco Regional Office, "This single act is believed to have had more impact on the American way of life than any other law passed since the Homestead Act of 1862."

Since June 22, 1944, America has had the greatest veterans program in history. No other country approaches America's generosity to its veterans in quality health care, education, job-training opportunities and a

chance for a decent home.

More than 19 million persons have received some form of training under the GI Bill. This includes 8 million World War II veterans, 2 and one-half million Korean Conflict veterans, and 8 million Post-Korean and Vietnam Era veterans and active-duty service personnel.

Proportionally, Vietnam Era veterans have been the greatest participants in GI Bill training. More than 70 percent of those eligible have received training—compared with 50 percent for World War II and 43 percent for Korean veterans.

Amended and extended, the GI Bill changed the national

concept of adult education. It also started the greatest home construction boom in history. The GI Bill transformed something as ephemeral as an American dream into something as solid as a house on a plot of land with a mortgage. By backing loans of \$224 billion for homes and businesses, the GI Bill has been a way of American life for more than 11 million veterans. For millions more, it promises to be a way to secure dreams in the future. "Unlike many VA benefits," Lemons stated "there is no expiration date for use of the home loan entitlement." Veterans who have already used it once may have their entitlement

restored and be able to obtain a new VA guaranteed home loan. Widows of veterans who died of service-connected causes are eligible. So are the wives of men who are prisoners of war, or missing in action.

Lemons added, "the program has been made more flexible in terms of the kind of housing that may be bought. Veterans can use their loan guaranty entitlement at whatever time in life it is most useful—whether it is for a manufactured home near a military base, a retirement home, or a condominium in the city."

The GI Bill has had a tremendously positive impact on veterans—just as it has had a powerful effect on all America. The GI Bill has been good for veterans and good for America.

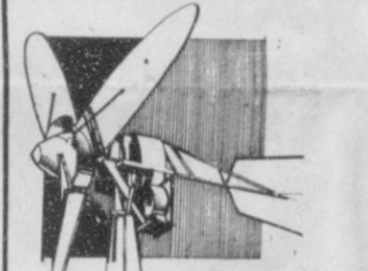
In January, 1984 the Hansford County Tax Office mailed new valid Voter Certificates to every registered voter in Hansford County. These Certificates are blue in color.

Texas FFA convention Set

Six thousand Texas FFA members and guests are expected to attend the 56th Annual Convention of the Texas Association of Future Farmers of America, July 11-13, 1984, at the Lubbock Memorial Civic Center.

The FFA is composed of students who are studying vocational agriculture in the public schools in preparation for a variety of careers in Agriculture and Agribusiness. Vocational Agriculture is well know for providing learning experiences to students through the FFA with the theme this year - "Keeping America On The Grow." The ultimate objective is to produce future leaders for American agriculture with its vital role of producing food and fiber. Texas now has more than 900 FFA chapters with over 60,000 active members and more than 500,000 former members.

During the convention, over 2,000 award winners will be recognized with more than 1,700 members receiving the Lone Star Farmer Degree, the highest level of recognition by the state association. Educational scholarships totalling more than \$450,000 will be presented to many of the members in attendance.

Durwin Hill, Executive Secretary, reports that deserving adults who have supported the FFA and its activities will be recognized by the presentation of Honorary State Farmer Degrees, Distinguished Service Awards, and VIP Awards.

Outstanding speakers scheduled during the three-day convention include State Senator Bill Sarpalius, Amarillo, Texas; Dan Clark, nationally known motivational speaker, Salt Lake City, Utah; and Bill Caraway, National FFA Secretary, Clovis, New Mexico.

Brad Bass, state president from Mount Vernon, Texas, will preside at the general sessions. These sessions will include the election of the 1984-85 state president from the state officer

candidates nominated by the 10 area associations. From 10 area nominees, voting delegates will also select the state FFA sweetheart to represent the state association during 1984-85. Those in attendance will hear and recognize the Outstanding Public Speaker who will represent Texas at the National FFA Convention in Kansas City, Missouri.

Recreational activities will include the Fun Night and Talent Contest where the delegates will select the Outstanding Talent Team from 10 area nominees.

The Texas FFA Alumni Association will hold its annual meet-

ing on Thursday afternoon along with the State FFA Convention. In addition, the alumni will host a reception for the past state FFA officers and participate in the presentation of its publicity award.

Convention participants will have the opportunity to visit with approximately 60 commercial exhibitors to observe new methods, products, and equipment in the agribusiness industry.
