County Judge Roy Lee Mo-Clellan, Commissioner Precinct #1, Garland Head Gruver citizen Buddy Etling, Spearman citizen, Fave Lynch met Friday at the courthouse with Buck Ramsey of Amarillo, who is on the Potter County committe to get present county facilities accessible to handicapped individuals.

In order for the county to receive Federal Revenue Sharing they must have a plan devised by October 17, 1984 to bring county owned buildings under these standards.

The county then has two years to complete the project. The funds for this project will come out of revenue sharing money.


In order to comply, the county will have to build a ramp on the east side of the courthouse and also will have to install a chair lift that will take disabled citizens to all stories which they might need





PROPOSITION NO. 4 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 20 proses a constitutional amendment which abolishes the office of county treasurer in Bexar and Collin counties if a majority of the voters in each of those counties vote in favor of abolishing the office of county treasurer in a local election to be held on the issue. All the powers, duties, and functions of the office of county treasurer in each of these the county clerk.

The proposed constitutional amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to abolish the office of county treasurer in Bexar and Collin counties."

PROPOSITION NO. 5 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 22 prooses a constitutional amendment which provides a new method of filling a vacancy in the office of Lieutenant Governor. The amendment requires the President pro tempore of the Senate to call gether the committee of the whole Senate within 30 days after a vacancy occurs in the office of Lieutenant Governor. The committee would be required to elect one of its members to perform the duties of the Lieutenant Governor until the next general election. This individual would continue his duties as Senator at the same time that he performs the Lieutenant Governor's duties. If the Senator who is elected ceases to be a Senator before the next general election, another Senator must be elected according to the above procedure to perform the Lieutenant Governor's duties. The President pro tempore would be required to perform the Lieutenant Governor's duties pending the election of one of its members by the committee of the whole Senate.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the state senate to fill a vacancy in the office of

PROPOSITION NO. 6

House Joint Resolution 73 proses a constitutional amendment that permits the use of public funds and credit for payment of premiums on non-assessable life, health, or accident insurance policies and annuity contracts issued by a mutual insurance company authorized to do business in this state. The constitutional prohibition against a grant of public money to an individual, association, or corporation or against becoming a stockholder in a corporation, association, or company has limited life and health group policies of political subdivimit mutual insurance companies to

House Joint Resolution 4 proposes a constitutional amendment change the membership of the State Commission on Judicial Conduct to include one Judge of a Municipal Court and one Judge of a County Court at Law, who shall be selected at large and appointed by the Supreme Court with the advice and consent of the Senate.

The amendment also provides additional grounds for removal from office of judges or justices of Texas courts, and provides additional disciplinary actions that could be taken in lieu of removal or censure. The amendment would extend the Commission's disciplinary authority to masters, magistrates, and retired or former judges who hear cases by designation. The amendment creates a tribunal to review recommendations of the State Commission on Judicial Conduct for removal or retirement of a judge or justice. The review tribunal would be composed of seven (7) Justices or Judges of the Courts of Appeals selected by lot by the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court. The amendment also provides for appeal of the review tribunal's decision to the Supreme Court of Texas and grants an accused judge the right to discovery of evidence.

The proposition will appear on the ballot as follows: The constitutional amendment relating to the membership of the State Commission on Judicial Conduct and the authority and procedure to discipline active judges, certain retired and former judges, and certain masters and magistrates of the courts."

PROPOSITION NO. 8 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 22 prooses a constitutional amendment which increases the per diem of members of the Legislature. The amount of per diem allowed during a calendar year would be equal to the maximum amount set in federal income tax statutes as of January 1 of that same year as a deduction for ordinary and necessary business expenses incurred by a state legislator. Current per diem is \$30; the maximum deduction is now \$75.


The proposed constitutional amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to provide a per diem for members of the leg-islature equal to the maximum daily amount allowed by federal law as a deduction for ordinary and necessary business expenses incurred by a state legislator."

PUBLIC NOTICE BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS **GENERAL ELECTION NOVEMBER 6, 1984**

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 29 proposes a constitutional amendm that provides to state-chartered banks the same rights and privileges that are or may be granted national banks of the United States domiciled in this state. For example, if national banks become authorized to maintain branch offices, this amendment would extend the same privilege to state banks.

The proposed constitutional amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to provide state banks the same rights and privileges as national banks."

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 19 proposes a constitutional amendment that restructures the Permanent University Fund to provide: (1) for the expansion of the institutions eligible to participate in the bond-ing capacity of the fund to include the components of The University of Texas and Texas A&M University systems that have been added to those two systems of higher education since the Permanent University Fund was last restructured by constitutional amendment; (2) for the expansion of the purposes for which bond proceeds can be expended from new construction include major repair and rehabilitation projects and the acquisition of major capital equipment (e.g., computers and laboratory equipment) and library books and materials; (3) for an increase in the bonding capacity from 20% (% for The University of Texas System and 1% for the Texas A&M University System) to 30% (20% for The University of Texas System and 10% for Texas A&M University System) of the value of the assets (exclusive of real estate) in the Permanent University Fund in order to provide sufficient bond pro-ceeds to care for the addition of 10 new institutions to those authorized to participate in the Permanent University Fund bonding program and to care for the expanded pur-poses for which the bond proceeds can be spent; and (4) for the dedication of the dividends, interest, and other income from the Permanent University Fund remaining after payment of principal and interest due on bonds and notes issued, to the provision of support and maintenance (over and above normal legislative appropriations) for Texas A&M University in Brazos County, Prairie View A&M University, and The University of Texas at Austin.

House Joint Resolution 19 also an-

nually appropriates \$100 million in not otherwise appropriated by the spouses and dependent children of constitution) for the use of those agencies and institutions of higher

education which are not included in The University of Texas or Texas A&M University Systems and, therefore, not eligible to participate in the Permanent University Fund bonding program. The amount of this appropriation could be adjusted every five years by a 2/3 vote of the Legislature, but could not be adjusted in such a way as to affect outstanding bonding indebtedness. Each institution of higher educathat is eligible to participate (i.e., those institutions of higher education outside The University of Texas and Texas A&M University Systems) would be authorized to expend directly its share (such share to be determined pursuant to an equitable formula) of the \$100 million appropriation for the pur-poses of acquiring land, constructing and equipping buildings or other permanent improvements, major repair and rehabilitation of other permanent buildings or improve ments, and acquisition of major capital equipment (e.g., computers and laboratory equipment) and library books and materials. Additionally, each institution would be authorized to issue bonds backed by a pledge of up to 50% of its share of the \$100 million annual appropriation for the purpose of land acquisition, new construction, and major repair and rehabilitation

Except in the case of fire or natural disaster and in other extraordinary cases, verified by a two-thirds vote of each house of the legislature, all institutions of higher education would be precluded from receiving appropriations of general revenue funds for the purposes of land acquisition, new construction, and major pair and



Chemical People to have seminars here



Marilyn Golightly will be a featured speaker at the Substance

The Chemical People of Hansford County will take an inovative step in the growing battle against substance abuse among the young people of our community. On Monday, Sept. 17 representatives from the Panhandle Substance Abuse Consortium will present seminars in the Spearman Schools. The goals of this "Rally Day" are to raise community awareness of substance abuse in every age group of our society and to give specific help to youth and adults in ways to combat and prevent substance abuse. Wayne Hughes, Regional Alcoholism Services Director for the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission, belives this is the first time a project of this nature has been held in Texas schools.

The substance abuse consortium was formed in 1982 so that professionals in the substance

abuse field could share information about intake evaluation and referral programs, treatment operations and rehabilitation techniques and practise in the Texas Panhandle area.

The consortium is made up of professionals from all aspects of the field. The members are bound by letter of agreement to promote the development of services and facilities that provide the maximum attention to the needs of the substance abuser, his or her family and significant others. A primary aim of the consortium is to eliminate duplication of services while insuring that there is sufficient redundancy of service to serve the needs of all.

The Education Resources Team will present classroom seminars to Spearman students.

The team was formed by the consortium to provide information

about substance abuse to the school children of the Texas Panhandle. Members of the team are professionals in the substance abuse field whose expertise enables them to provide a variety of views on the complex subject of substance abuse.

The resources team is made available to school systems in the Panhandle free of charge. Depending on the distance from Amarillo and other circumstances, sponsoring communities or school systems, reimbursement for actual mileage driven by consortium members may be requested.

The Education Resources Team has five objectives:

1. To provide up-to-date information on substance abuse to school students in the classroom. Every effort is made to tailor presentations to the classes where the team members appear.

The consortium has made the decision to not interrupt the school day in any way.

2. To assist school administrators and counselors where requested in developing techniques to deal with the school's substance abuse challenges. Specific attention is given to the development of a student assistance program for each host school as an outgrowth of the team's involvement.

3. To orient student leaders of the school to a drug-free environment. The team will meet with student leaders at the discretion of the school administration for a brief 'pep talk' that will help them become aware of the resources of the community and the region.

4. To orient teachers of the school to the challenges of a drug-oriented society. This includes intervention and counseling techniques that can be used on an emergency basis. Particular emphasis is given to the value of a student assistance program.

5. To inform the general public. Team members belive it is important for the general public that supports the shool to know what kind of information their students

are getting and how they can get involved. This will be done in an evening session following the school presentation.

Speakers and topics throughout the day are as follows:

Larry Barber, Amarillo Council on Alcoholism will present Getting it Together--What it takes to identify the drug problem in the community and how to turn the situation around. Who do we go to? What do we do? How do we form student activist groups to help combat peer pressure. When do we use positive peer pressure?

Mr. Barber is a 1974 graduate of Baylor University with a bachelor's degree in communications. he has been executive director of the Amarillo Council on Alcoholism for over a year. Before that, he served as the council's director of education services.

Prior to working for the council, Mr. Barber was news director of KFDA TV in Amarillo. He held several similar posts around the state before coming to Amarillo in

He is a graduate of the Johnson Institute short course on Chemical Dependency and the Family and served in 1983 on the steering committee of the Texas Panhandle Chemical People. He was director of the young people's conference for the 11th Annual Tri-State Institute On Substance abuse.

Bill Thompson, Texas Tech Family Practice--Aspects of Substance Abuse--The disease nature of substance abuse. How moodaltering and consciousness-alternating substances affect behavior patterns. Presentation to science classes will deal with the chemical nature of substance abuse and how the long-range health, mental and physical abilities of the user are affected.

Mr. Thompson is an instructor in the Texas Tech School of Medicine and staff psychologist of the Texas Tech Family Practise Center. He joined the Tech faculty in 1982.

Mr. Thompson is a native of Alabama with a Master of Arts

Degree in Psychology from Alabama A&M University and a Bachelor's degree in Education from Athens State University. He graduated from Alabama A&M in

Before joining the Texas Tech faculty, Mr. Thompson was coordinator of the Substance Abuse Program for the Huntsville-Madison County Mental Health Center and was resident psychologist for the Huntsville Hospital.





Flood plain management survey Sept. 17-27

Masonic meeting

In 1983, the City of Spearman, Hansford County Commissioners Court and the Hansford Soil & Water Conservation District requested that the Soil Conservation Service (SCS) do a flood plain management study on portions of the City of Spearman.

The SCS has recently received funding to begin the study. The flood hazard areas in Spearman and these immediate adjoining areas will be identified. The probable depth, width and velocity of floodwater and occurence will be determined. In order to do this, detailed surveys must be made

The SCS has hired a private surveying firm to do the surveying and they will be conducting their field surveying from September 17-27th. Much of the surveying work within the city will be done down streets, etc., but it will be necessary for a portion of the elevation reading to be taken on private property. The majority of elevation readings taken in the rural areas will be on private property. The rural landusers involved will be contacted and access permission requested.

Following completion of the surveying work, maps showing where flooding is likely to occur will be developed and alternatives to reduce flooding will also be studied.
