County junior livestock show March 16 & 17

The Hansford County Junior Livestock Show and Sale will be held March 16 & 17, 1984, in the County Ag Barn in Gruver.

Clubs and chapters participating in the show will be the Gruver FFA, Spearman FFA, Gruver 4-H, Spearman 4-H and Morse 4-H.

Weighing will begin at 8 a.m. for swine and sheep and at 10 a.m. for Steers on Friday, March 16.

The grand opening of the show will be at 1:45 p.m. with directors, ag teachers, FFA chapter presidents, 4-H club chairmen and FFA sweethearts participating.

The lamb show will begin at 2 p.m. The swine show will follow the lamb show.

Sarpalius says 99.5% oppose proposal

AMARILLO—Panhandle residents who responded to a poll by Senator Bill Sarpalius to determine sentiment for lengthening the public school day have overwhelmingly rejected the idea.

Newspapers from throughout the 29 counties of the 31st Senatorial District assisted in conducting the poll.

"I have never had an issue before the Legislature which generated the amount of response as did my request for input on the extension of the school day," Sarpalius said.

"More than 99.5 percent of those responding were opposed to adding hours to the daily schedule," Sarpalius added. He said compilation included more than 1,000 responses and that additional replies were still being received.

Sarpalius said it was apparent from the tone of the instructions he was receiving from constituents that they would rather see better quality education than quantity through an extended school day.

More than 150 students added comments, many saying that they have jobs after school to help with finances at home and felt that longer hours in school would interfere with necessary jobs and with chores

around the house and farm.

Many students added that longer hours would cause an increase in drop-outs in their school.

Parents and teachers alike expressed the view that children can absorb knowledge only to a point and think that 2:30 or 3 p.m. is the limit for keeping attention, especially among younger children.

Many felt that the additional time at school would be close to making the children wards of the state and thereby cause deterioration in the family structure.

Many who expressed views stressed the importance of getting back to basics and felt that greater concentration in the first few grades would increase comprehension levels at higher grades.

A sizeable number of responses expressed concern at not allowing a child to enjoy childhood experiences. These people said that activities such as piano, dance classes, baseball, scouting, time for play with friends and family would be severely restricted by long hours at school. They feared that children would receive too narrow a view of life.

Sarpalius had earlier expressed fears for those rural students who

already spent long hours being bused to and from school. He said the long trips would make it necessary to be away from home from before sunrise until after dark.

The Senator noted that since the time the poll was begun in the district, the subcommittee on Educating the Child has made the recommendation for a longer school day to the full Select Committee on Education.

The official recommendation is that for grades K-12 the six-hour school day be used for academic experiences (plus an appropriate lunch period), and a two-hour period following the academic block be used for Texas Education Agency approved enrichment activities.

The two-hour block would be optional on the part of the students except for those who needed or desired tutorial assistance.

Sarpalius said he felt that the subcommittee received a strong outcry from the citizens of Texas when the initial proposal of a mandatory eight to nine hour school day was first set out, causing them to tone down the recommendation and making it less demanding.

Sarpalius said the recommendations would be acted on as the Select

"I was pleased to have the cooperation of the news media in assisting us in determining the will of the Panhandle on this issue," Sarpalius said.

He added, "I now feel that I have a strong sense of direction from the people of the district as this particular issue comes before the Legislature. It also afforded me the opportunity to get first hand input as to what the people think is important in education and to use their comments as a basis for formulating my response to these issues."

The total number of responses opposed to the extended school day was 1047.

Total number of responses in favor of extending the school day was insignificantly small (less than 5).

Over 99.5% of the respondents from the 31st Senatorial District are opposed to the proposal to lengthen the school day.

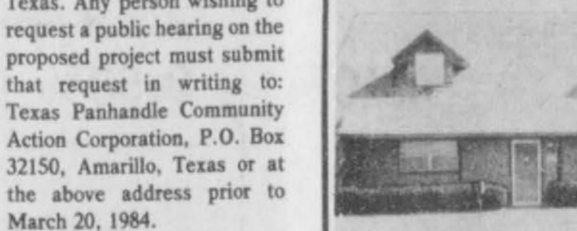

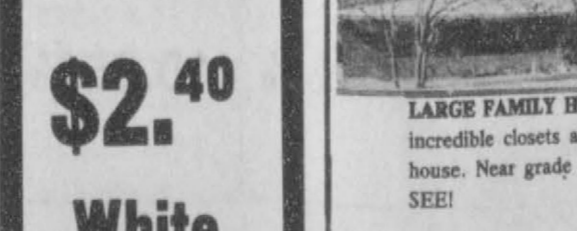

Cancer Society needs volunteers

An estimated 44,500 residents will learn that they have cancer this year. Because of advances in medical research, there will be cures for many. Getting to the cures, however may be a problem.

"One cancer patient requiring radiation therapy could need anywhere from 20 to 30 trips in six weeks," said Clementine Renner, Chairman of the American Cancer Society's Transportation Program for the Hansford County Unit. "A patient receiving chemotherapy might report for treatment weekly for up to a year. In many cases, a patient is driven to hospitals or clinics by relatives or friends, but even these patients must occasionally seek alternative transportation. That's where Road to Recovery comes in."

Road to Recovery is a program of volunteers who drive patients to treatment centers and home again. The Hansford County Unit is trying to recruit more volunteers to insure that all patients have transportation when they need it, according to Mrs. Renner.

Road to Recovery volunteers arrange their own schedules, with some volunteering as little as one afternoon a month and others driving patients as often as twice a week." Mrs. Renner noted.

"If you have a car and some spare time, you can help someone keep a very important appointment," she said.

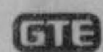

Older Worker Week Activities

State and local officials, older workers, and employment program administrators gathered at a luncheon March 7 at the Hill Country Senior Complex in Dripping Springs to launch Older Worker Week activities in Texas.

Governor Mark White, in a proclamation designating March 11-17 as Older Worker Week in the state, said that the "Citizens of Texas strongly affirm the value of hard work and the right of people of all ages to make productive contributions to society."

"This right," the governor continued, "has found positive expression through organizations such as the Texas Farmers Union Green Thumb and Senior Texans Employment Programs." The two programs currently employ about 2,000 of the state's 3,000 older workers whose jobs are funded through the Title V Senior Community Service Employment Program.

Participants are 55 or older and must meet income guidelines. They work part time for schools, libraries, senior centers and municipalities, providing services that would not otherwise be available.

Older Worker Week is an annual event designed to spotlight the assets of older workers, who actually have fewer job-related accidents than their younger counterparts, and who are much more likely to have perfect attendance records. Many large corporations, Union Carbide and Bankers Life among them, are actively recruiting older employees.

"We are extremely proud of Governor White's recognition of the state's older workers," said Mike Moeller, President of Texas Farmers Union (TFU). "Hiring the experienced is good business—chronological age should be the least important measure of a person's true value when being

considered for employment."

One of the state's Title V workers is 95-year-old Joe Judie, Jr., who lives and works in Falls County. Much of his work is done outside and includes painting and weatherization.

Judie is a "retired" farmer, and his application for the Title V program listed his previous occupation as "Farmer—80 years." No one on the program is likely to have as much experience, or a greater desire to work.

"Joe Judie is an outstanding example of the enduring contributions that older persons can make to this state," said TFU President Moeller. "These people believe in work, they were raised on work, and they'll do a day's work for a day's pay. It is fitting that the older workers of Texas be recognized for their contributions to society."

Judie was a special guest at the Dripping Springs luncheon, which was also attended by State Representatives Phyllis Robinson; Bob Barton, Jr.; Gonzalo Barrientos; Walter Tibbetts, representing Governor Mark White; Sam Gorena, representing Lt. Governor Bill Hobby; Walter Richter, Texas Department of Agriculture; and Sandy Dochen, representing Congressman J.J. Pickle. Administrators from Green Thumb, STEP, Texas Department on Aging, The National Council of Senior Citizens, The American Association of Retired Persons, and National Urban League were also present.

WASHINGTON, D.C.—The new football league is now in its second season with six new teams, and more NFL players. Only one team made real money last year, but there is hope eternal in sports franchises, and three stayed out of the red—Denver, Oakland and Tampa.

With ABC-TV money, and Keith Jackson to stir interest as the prime sports announcer, the new league might make it. But only time will answer that question.

The league is now composed of these teams: Arizona, Birmingham, Chicago, Denver, Houston, Jacksonville, Los Angeles, Memphis, Michigan (last year's champs), New Jersey, New Orleans, Oakland, Oklahoma, Philadelphia (1983 finalists), Pittsburgh, San Antonio, Tampa, and Washington.

This year's season is eighteen games, with the final regular season game on June 25. (Memphis and Houston at Houston). Then come the playoffs.



Of greatest interest this year will be whether more than one team makes a profit and whether the several former NFL quarterbacks make a big difference in the quality of play.
