## Sarpalius says $99.5 \%$ oppose proposal

Parents and teachers alike expressed the view that children can absorb knowledge only to a point and think that $2: 30$ or $3 \mathrm{p} . \mathrm{m}$. is the limit for keeping attention, especialy among younger children. Many felt that the additional time Many felt that the additional time at school would be close to making the children wards of the state and thereby cause deterioration in the family structure. Many who expressed views stressed the importance of getting back concentration in the first few grades concentration in the first few grades els at higher grades. A sizeable number of responses expressed concern at not allowing a child to enjoy childhood experiences. These people said that activities such as piano, dance classes, baseball, scouting, time for play with friends and family would be severely restricted by long hours at school. They feared that children life. Sarpalius had earlier expressed Sarpalius had earlier expressed fears for those rural students who lready spent long hours being used to and from school. He said he long trips would make it necessary to be away from home The Senator noted that sinces the The Senator noted that sinco the district, the subcommittee on Educating the Child has made the recommendation for a longer school day to the full Select Committee on ducation. The official recommendation is that for grades $\mathrm{K}-12$ the six-hour school day be used for academic experiences (plus an appropriate lunch period), and a two-hour period following the academic block be approved enrichment activities. The two-hour block would be optional on the part of the students except for those who needed desired tutorial assistance. Sarpalius said he felt that the subcommittee received a strong outcry from the citizens of Texas when the initial proposal of a mandatory eight to nine hour school mandatory eight to nine hour school to tone down the recommendation and making it less demanding.
