Lynxettes drop

It's not often, if ever, that a team can lose in the second round of a winner's-loser's bracket basketball tournament, yet still play in the finals for the tourney championship.

But that's exactly what the Spearman Lynxettes pulled off in the Ralls Invitational tournament, a trick that may very well be a first in Lynxette history.

The Lynxettes swamped the Ralls, IV, 53-18 in their tourney opener, but could not withstand a fourth quarter rally and lost a thriller to Post, 49-48 in the second round.

Ordinarily this would have dropped the Lynxettes into the consolation bracket and would have eliminated them from contention for the tourney championship, but the Post Antelopes are playing in the state football playoffs, so the Post players dropped out of the tourney after the Lady Antelopes won in the first two

Tests show local 9th, 11th graders in U.S.'s top 3rd Spearman High School ninth and Both the Spearman ninth and

eleventh graders are smarter than average according to nationwide testing.

That's the word passed on to Spearman school board Monday night by Superintendent James Cunningham. At the regular meeting of the Spearman ISD trustees. Cunningham informed them of the results he just received of the latest SRA Achievement Series tests administered nationwide to ninth and eleventh graders.

The SRA tests showed the Spearman ninth and eleventh graders scored in the top one-third of the testing conducted across the United States, Cunningham told the board.

The 56 Spearman eleventh graders tested scored 65 percent as a group on a nationwide percentile

basis, according to the SRA Achievement test administrators.

The 77 local ninth graders scored even higher as a group, achieving a national score of 67 percent, Cunningham revealed.

Holding up a copy of the test results, Cunningham said, "It's good to know that when individuals say kids can't do certain things anymore, they really can. These tests prove that."

Cunningham said the SRA results showed Spearman students did "extremely well" in the nationwide

The grade equivalent score for Spearman ninth graders was 10 years, nine months, and for the eleventh graders it was 12 years, five months, according to the printout from the SRA testers.

eleventh graders scored best in the mathematics part of the testing. The local ninth and eleventh grade groups each placed at 71 percent nationwide in math. The Spearman eleventh graders placed at 66 percent in mathematics concept testing, and 69 percent in problem solving. Spearman's ninth graders scored 68 percent in math concepts and 69 percent in problem solving.

Cunningham said high math scores by the SHS students were particularly gratifying as math was one of the lowest scoring areas by

Lynx nab 3rd place in Ralls tourney

The next highest scorers by the local eleventh graders came in Language Arts and Sciences

where they recorded 64s, despite the fact that on the spelling part of the language arts testing, they scored lowest with a 49 percentile score, their only score below 50 percent in the national testing.

The ninth graders tied their math score with a 71 percent in survival skills, and scored a 70 percent in language arts, although spelling was also their lowest single score, a 58 percent.



When You See This Envelope ...

In a few days, you may be receiving this envelope in the mail. Open it immediately. It is a "Certification of Taxpayer Identification Number". In other words, it verifies your social security number. Please fill in the spaces, sign it, and return the form right away to the bank in the postage-paid envelope.

It's A Federal Requirement

Recent federal laws require that you provide the bank with your correct Taxpayer Identification Number. There are two types of taxpayer numbers: the social security number for individuals and the employer identification number for businesses.

Even if the bank already has your number, it has to be verified in writing this month.

By law, failure to provide the information could result in a \$50 penalty by the Internal Revenue Service, plus your interest could be subject to 20% withholding, starting January 1, 1984. Those are tough penalties.

So Let's Help Each Other

If you send back the Certification form with the correct social security number, we keep our records straight and keep you out of trouble with the IRS.

In the case of a joint account, we need the name and social security number of only one person — usually the first person named on the account.

If you don't have a social security number, contact the local Social Security office.





"Also, many people would rather do business at home with their own banker," she said, "and the Endowment Fund reminds people that the Harrington Cancer Center is daily serving the needs of their friends and neighbors."

More than 2,000 patients have received treatment at the outpatient treatment facility since it opened. Before that, cancer patients often traveled to Houston, Dallas or Oklahoma City for treatment. Often this meant a drastic change in

The \$10 million facility, located in the Medical Center complex in West Amarillo, was built entirely from private donations. No money was borrowed and no government funds were used.

"Now that the doors are open, we need continued financial support to pay for expanded patient care, research, and educational programs," Ms. Van Petten said.

In addition to basic treatment, the Center provides a wide variety of supportive care, including the services of social workers, pastoral counselors, pharmacists, and nutri-

"The Center is dedicated to the concept that the whole person must be treated, and that includes emotional, spiritual and financial needs as well as physical," Ms. Van

"We do not deny services to anyone," she added. "And it should be noted that the destitute are not the only ones who are unable to afford medical bills for cancer treatment."



He noted that the use of ZIP Code has increased again this year, which is essential in speeding the movement of mail locally and across the country. The increased use of machines and mechanical devices in handling makes the use of ZIP Code mandatory. ZIP Code usage by mailers increased during the past year from 93 percent to 94 percent of the mail now addressed with ZIP Code.



Rod On U.S. Tennis

Rod Laver, one of the greatest tennis players of the century, some believe the greatest, has spoken out on

Laver is the only man to have accomplished two Grand Slams in tennis--winning the U.S. Open, Wimbledon, Australian Open and French Open--in 1962 and in 1969. No one has done that since.

What does he say about the new behavior trend in tennis, begun in this country? America has its own ism. Laver says--it's do your own thing, act as you like. He says many players today actually try to control a match by being bad-tempered and throwing off an opponent.

Respect for the game is the most important thing in tennis, he says. And that bars throwing rackets, nasty scenes and spoiled-brat behavior. He admires Harry Hopman, the famed Australian coach, who would not tolerate bad manners, loud-mouth abuse of officials and other poor conduct on court.

Nor should today's tournament officials. The trouble is money, big money. Today's stars know they draw the fans (the gate) and that if they're kicked out gate receipts will decline. Some take advantage of this to abuse officials and players.

Obviously, all accredited tournaments need to be governed by unanimously-agreed-upon rules. The first should be that unseemly conduct bars a player from competition in all the accredited tournaments. Getting the various bodies to adopt such a solution may be a long process.

But if tennis is to represent sportsmanship, as it traditionally has, and as golf continues to do, that step is urgently necessary. A few players barred from real tournaments for a few months, or six, or even a year, would quickly bring back good manners to the tennis courts of the world.

Kate Says

Golf--4 Greats

Four of the greatest golfers in history recently played a televised two-day match with \$350,000 as prize money. The four all-time greats were Jack Nicklaus, Arnold Palmer, Gary Player and Tom Watson.

Gary Player, a clutch player but not among the top winners in 1983, and Arnold Palmer, charismatic favorite of millions but also out of the top-winner list for years, won most. Player won \$170,000, his biggest payday in thirty years of golfing.

Arnie, who hasn't been able to win a tournament in years, but who has come close, won \$100,000. "I'd never won more than \$50,000 in any tournament before," he said afterward, which surprised golf fans who assumed Arnie had received dozens of big purses. But his best years ended just as television began to inflate prize money.

The idea of only nine holes a day, for two days, is also good. Many don't have the time to watch 18 holes. And the consolation for Jack Nicklaus, the game's biggest money winner (over \$4,000,000) is that he is still, this year, in the top ten money winners on the PGA tour. Nicklaus won \$40,000 at the Desert Highlands playoff.

Tom Watson won only \$10,000 in the match, but more-recent dominance in the game has earned him over \$3,000,000, thus far. Not to worry.



DIET DRINK UPDATE

If you watch the labels on low-calorie carbonated beverages you're sure to see signs of a new artificial sweetner. The Food and Drug Administration approved the use of the sweetner aspartame two years ago, but, it has only recently appeared in carbonated beverages.

Aspartame is a sugar substitute that is 180-200 times sweeter than ordinary table sugar with only one-eighth the calories. For the same amount of sweetness produced by one teaspoon of sugar, aspartame contains only one-tenth of a calorie. A teaspoon of sugar has 18 calories.

Unlike saccharin, another sugar substitute, aspartame does not have the bitter aftertaste, which is a major drawback of previous artificial sweetners. But aspartame is about three times more expensive than saccharin.

If you have avoided low calorie "diet" drinks and foods because you disliked the bitter after-taste, try those

now using aspartame. Current brand names for the sweetner include Equal and Nutrasweet. Aspartame cannot serve all

sweetening functions and should not be consumed by some individuals. It cannot substitute for sugar when cooking and baking foods because high temperatures cause it to lose sweetness.

Anyone with Phenylketonuria (PKU) should not use aspartame, and products containing this sweetner should be labeled with a warning to that effect. Aspartame is composed of two amino acids,

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
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
