

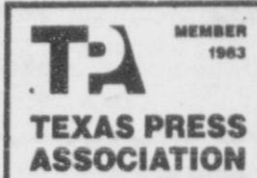

Area Lions clubs declare war on drugs

Lion Cecil Biggers, local lawyer and member of the Spearman Lions Club, brought the program Tuesday noon and it was on "Drugs." The Lions Clubs in the District 2T-1 area have "declared war on drugs" and are trying to educate the people on drugs in our area.

Some very interesting facts on drugs were brought out at the local meeting Tuesday noon. We visited with several persons concerning use of drugs, parents of children on drugs, and how to handle the drug problem. In the next several months the Spearman Lions club will try and educate the people of Spearman on the local drug problem.

First, it was alleged that most all boys and girls 16 years or older have tried, or are using drugs in some of our area towns. Spearman does not have quite as bad a problem as some of the other larger towns in the area.

How do you solve the drug problem? We talked with a man whose boy was smoking marijuana, and the man immediately stormed down to the school and demanded that the teachers do something; next he went to the sheriff and said "whatever it takes" we want this drug traffic stopped!

Then we talked with one of the boys who had "got hooked" on drugs and he said that his parents were "enablers." That is because of the fact that they did not say NO to the boy, this enabled him to start on drugs and stay on drugs. So in this particular case, the boy blames his own dad for letting him get hooked!

Next week, Sheriff McFarlin will bring the program at the local Lions Club...Members of the club are alarmed at the drug users in the area, and want to educate the kids and their parents as to the dangers of using drugs.

Junior Varsity

The Spearman Lynx junior varsity may be shy on players, but the players certainly are not shy on hitting or effort.

Friday before the Lynx-Tiger varsity tussle here, the JV took on a much bigger squad Guymon JV. The two teams played to a standoff with one touchdown each in open field play.

Despite the fact the Guymon junior varsity was able to substitute freely while the Spearman JV only have five substitutes on the sideline, the Lynx JV'ers moved in smartly for their touchdown while the Guymon score came on a fluke forward-fumble.

Although they scored only once the JV moved the ball fairly well on

the ground against Guymon, but the big play--and the score came on a long, picture perfect pass from Allan Mires to Bob Cook.

The Guymon score came after a sustained drive got the ball down near the goal. A stiff defense almost held, but on their last down, the Guymon JV scored. There was a flag on the play, and if it had been a regulation game, the play would have been nullified by a Guymon penalty. Hit hard short of the goal, the ball carrier fumbled, the ball rolled across the goal, where a Guymon player fell on it for a touchdown.

Guymon outscored the Lynx JV, 3-1 on the goalline stand plays after the open field scrimmage.

When it comes to calling the Hansford County Courthouse, some folks in the Gruver-Morse area are doing it the hard--and expensive--way, according to Sheriff R.L. McFarlin.

"We got three different calls in the other day from Gruver, all on the regular Spearman line to the Sheriff's office," McFarlin said. "We get calls like this all the time," he said, adding that when people place these calls from the Gruver-Morse exchange to the sheriff's office line, they not only have to pay for a long distance toll call, but that should they want another office in the courthouse, the call can not be transferred.

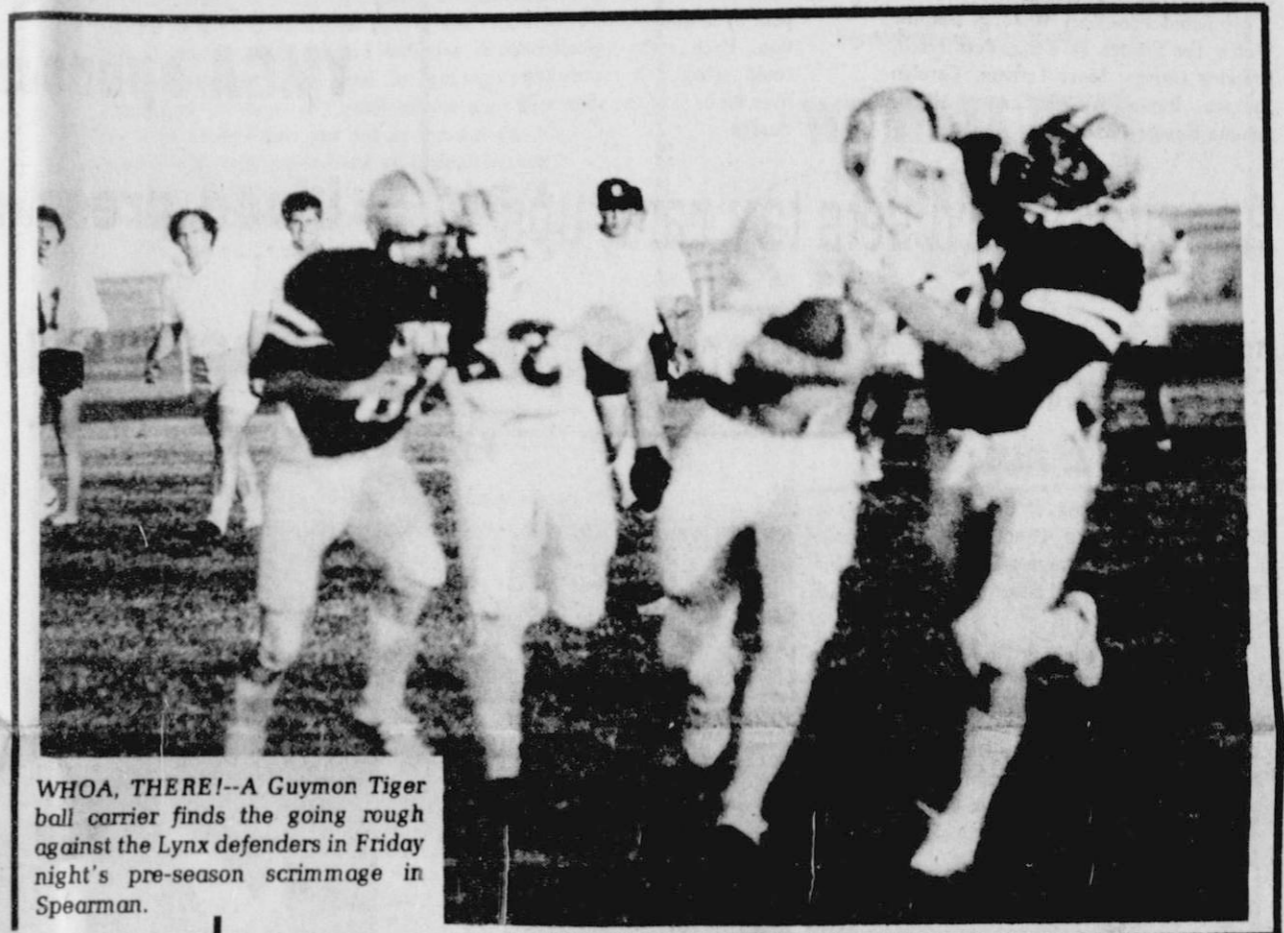
But it doesn't have to be that way, McFarlin said.

To give citizens of the Gruver-Morse more direct access to their county government, there is a direct line into the Sheriff's office and the county courthouse.

Manned by Sheriff's Department personnel, the direct line for folks in Gruver-Morse and anyone in the 733 exchange is open 24 hours a day, seven days a week, including all holidays.

The direct line number is 733-2901, and on it, the callers can not only reach the sheriff's office, but also the County Judge, County Clerk's office or any other office they want to contact, during hours these other offices are open, of course, McFarlin said.

And as it is a 733 number, there is no long distance charge, he added.

Like many coaches, Lynx Head Coach-Athletic Director Larry Lanier likes to line up the toughest opponents possible for pre-season scrimmages. To hit with the best is an excellent learning experience for the players and helps the coaches evaluate personnel, correct mistakes and make necessary adjustments that might go undetected against a weaker opponent, all very helpful in getting the team ready for the real thing--the rugged regular season play.

Follow this line of reasoning--which is quite sensible as the score means nothing and the learning experience everything--then the Friday night scrimmage when the Lynx hosted powerhouse Guymon Tigers was an unqualified success.

Coach Don Beck brought with him a highly rated, big in numbers and size Tiger team, throwing them against a small in numbers but big in line Lynx team.

The result was a spirited, hard hitting scrimmage, highlighted by fierce play between two of the bigger lines in the area.

Guymon's first string offense rolled to three scores in the open field part of the scrimmage, while the Tiger defense held the Lynx first string offense scoreless.

But none of the Tiger scores came on a really sustained drive, as the stout Lynx line pretty well contained the Tigers up the middle efforts.

It was the big play that did the Lynx in, and "long bomb" passes figured in two of the three Tiger scores. On their first offensive play from scrimmage, started mandatorially from their 30 yard line, the Tigers were thrown for a three yard loss by the middle of the Lynx defense, and their next two plays netted two yards, so they wound up their first three-play series with a minus one yard.

But with the ball placed back on the 30 for their second series of downs in their allotted 20 straight offensive plays, the Tigers scored in a hurry on two big plays.

A pitch left sweep moved the ball all the way to the Spearman 48. From there Chris Purdy, a quarterback that can run like a halfback and wears a fullback like 44 on his uniform, lofted a long pass to David Hale who took it over his shoulder and outtraced the Lynx secondary to score.

On their second series, the Tigers scored again on a "big play" as Mike Garcia cut back off tackle, picked up key blocks and raced 48 yards for a score.

The last Tiger score came a lot harder. On a second and eight from the Guymon 47, the Tiger quarterback just managed to get the ball off in time to avoid a sack from hard charging Lynx guard Mark Guthrie, and the pass fell incomplete forcing a third and eight situation. Garcia saved the series for Guymon by breaking loose to the Spearman 49.

For three straight plays the Spearman defenders held the Tigers to no yardage. On fourth down (the offenses got four chances to make a first down once they crossed mid-field), the Tigers again had to take to the air, and again Purdy was on target, this time hitting Mark Collins on a 44-yard pass play that carried the Tigers to the Lynx five.

Almost-almost, the Lynx held them. For three straight goal-line stand plays, the Spearman defense stopped the Tigers short, but on fourth down, and the last offensive play of the Tigers' 20 play series, Doug Booth finally bulled across from the one foot line.

On offense, the Lynx play was highlighted by the slashing running of Julio Vasquez. The speedy 148-pound senior tailback broke

loose on several sizeable gains, including a 17-yard jaunt on the second three play series for the Lynx, and a nine-yard run in the next series.

Another gem in the Lynx scoreless effort was a pass from quarterback Ross Donahue to end Mac McLain slanting across the middle, who made a fine running catch in traffic for a 12-yard gain. This drive died at the Spearman 48 when a third down screen pass went through the hands of the intended receiver.

The second string offense gained some yardage for the Lynx, but could not generate much of a drive and lost the ball once via interception. Guymon's second string offense found the going equally rough against the Lynx second defense which gave up only one first down. The only thing resembling a Guymon second string drive was snuffed when an alert defender picked off a pass.

The Lynx first string offense showed that it could score as it punched across two TDs during a 10-play goal-line stand series starting at the Guymon seven. Vasquez tallied both TDs for Spearman, the first on an up-the-middle burst from the two, and the second on a sweep around right end.

Guymon's first string offense scored four times on the goal-line series from the Lynx seven--two each by Garcia and Purdy. The Lynx second string offense scored twice and the Guymon second stringers four times in their respective goal-line series.

The Spearman second team varsity offense scored twice during its goalline series, with sophomore fullback Damon Goodheart and senior tailback Jeff Laird bowling over for the TDs.

Second string varsity Guymon goalline series TDs came on two scoring runs by Booth, one by Sean Cox, and a quick, stand-up-and-throw over-the-middle pass play from Sean Cox to Jeff Anderson.

Bank team heads for championship tourney

HOSPITAL BOARD

The Regular meeting of the Board of Directors of Hansford County Hospital District was held on August 16, 1983 at 7:30 p.m. in the Hospital Board Room.

Present were: R.M. Crawford, President; Waymon Edwards; John Trindle; Leslie Barkley; Albert La Rochelle, Hosp. Adm.; Dan Powers, Consultant; Ray Wasil, Hansford Manor Adm.; Dr. David McClellan, Chief of Staff; and one guest, Max Baggerly. Absent were Jack Oakes, Vice-President; and Alton Ellsworth, Sec. Treasurer.

The meeting was called to order by R.M. Crawford.

R.M. Crawford presented a plaque to Mr. Max Baggerly from the Board of Directors.

Mr. Baggerly thanked the Board and stated that it had been a pleasure serving on the Board and being of service to the citizens of Hansford County.

The minutes of the Regular monthly meeting were read and approved in a motion made by Waymon Edwards and seconded by Leslie Barkley.

The monthly financial statement was presented for the Board's consideration. Waymon Edwards moved to approve the bills for payment, John Trindle seconded, and the motion was passed by all present.

The Board instructed the Hospital Administrator to secure an additional \$30,000.00 from the \$250,000.00 open line of credit from the Gruyer State Bank.

The Budget hearing was held next with no citizens appearing before the Board.

After a thorough inspection of the Budget for the Fiscal 83-84 year by the Board, Waymon Edwards moved to accept the Budget as proposed, seconded by John Trindle, approved by all present.

Waymon Edwards presented a motion that the tax rate for the Hospital District be set at .2584 cents per 100 dollar valuation, seconded by Leslie Barkley, and approved by all Board members present.

A proposal for a pay increase for Hospital District Employees effective Oct. 1, 1983 was submitted for the Board's consideration.

A motion was made by Leslie Barkley and seconded by John Trindle to approve the pay increase as proposed and approved by all Board members present.

A proposal for a room rate increase was submitted to the Board for their consideration.

Waymon Edwards made a motion that the room rate increases be adopted as proposed and be put into effect Aug. 17, 1983, seconded by John Trindle and approved by all present.

Waymon Edwards made a motion that the management contract be renewed, seconded by Leslie Barkley and approved by all present.

Mr. Ray Wasil, Manor Administrator gave a progress update on Hansford Manor.

No further business was conducted and the meeting adjourned.

Each state association could select two representatives for each of the show's 28 classes.

More than two million Quarter Horses are registered with the Amarillo, Texas-based organization, more than all other breeds combined. The AQHA is the youth division of the AQHA.

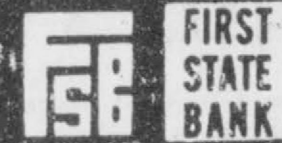

Something new has been added to the 1983 edition of the Tri-State Fair -- the "Great Rock and Roll Time Machine." The premiere showcase attraction, a new approach to rock entertainment, will play in the Sports Arena hourly during the entire run of this year's fair. Two years in production at a cost of \$750,000, the "Time Machine" is a new artform combining slides, film, animation and special effects with a stereo soundtrack of 215 songs encompassing the greatest musical moments of the past 25 years. "The Fair Board is delighted to be able to bring an entertainment experience such as the Great Rock and Roll Time Machine to the Golden Spread," says Lynn Griffin, manager of the Fair. Since the show's debut at Six Flags in 1980, more than five million people have seen it; the

show is now touring in 12 countries around the world. During the run in Amarillo, the Tri-State Fair is establishing a nominal one dollar admission charge. Bob Wilson, producer of the Great Rock and Roll Time Machine, says he's continually amazed at the audience involvement with the \$200,000 computer projection system and the 675 square feet of screen. "The interaction with people cheering and reliving emotional memories is much more than we ever had expected," he said.

4-H - A great way to learn

A great way to learn is by doing things. To help youngsters learn by helping them do things is the goal of the 4-H program, says Jim Smith, county 4-H program coordinator with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System. Through almost 50 different project areas youngsters can learn about new things, try something they have never tried before, and be introduced to new areas of the world in which they live.

For more than 187,000 Texas youths last year, 4-H was the way to new and exciting possibilities. These young men and women enrolled in 4-H either in their community clubs or through their school programs, says Smith.

The youngsters learned about projects like automotive care, safety bicycling and woodworking. They worked with large and small animals in the livestock projects. They trained dogs and cared for cats. They learned about computers, energy and conservation.

A common theme through all 4-H projects is career education, says Smith. 4-H'ers learn how an individual might make a living with skills like these, how these skills fit into another career field, or how these skills enhance their lifestyle.

As the youth phase of the extension Service, the 4-H program gets it support and

educational materials from county agents and specialists as well as from the state's land grant university, Texas A&M University, and the U.S. Department of Agriculture. However, the driving force of the program is the local volunteer leader.

some 22,000 adult and teenage leaders working with 4-H members in Texas. More information about the 4-H program is available from the County Extension office, says Smith.

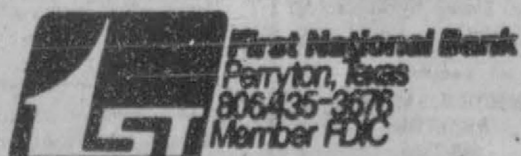

Patterson cows get special recognition

KANSAS CITY, MISSOURI—August 16, 1983—A list of 1,689 cows has been afforded special recognition by the American Hereford Association. Cows in this elite group have combined the single most important economic trait of fertility, with the second most important trait of growth of offspring.

Three cows owned by L.M. Patterson, Spearman, are among the Hereford cows on a special listing of cows within the Hereford breed that have combined the two most important economic traits of fertility and growth of her offspring during her lifetime.

To be a member of this elite group, a cow must meet very high criteria in that she must be four years of age or older, must have had her first calf at 25 months of age or younger, have a calving interval of 370 days or less, and her calves must have weaned at least five percent above the average of her herd.

Only some one-half of one of the nation's registered Hereford breeding cows can meet the rigid standards to attain listing. "Because of different management programs, many cows do not have the opportunity to be listed, however those making the listing are efficient, productive cows and

are deserving of the special recognition," stated H.H. Dickenson, executive vice-president of the AHA.

Some 1,689 cows from 362 breeders in 31 states made the list.

Savings Bond sales noted

Sale of U.S. Savings Bonds in Texas for the period January-May 1983 were \$113,012,014, up 36.2% over the same period a year ago. John W. Dixon, Chairman of the Board & CEO of E-Systems, Inc. in Dallas and Volunteer State Chairman for Texas, announced today. These sales represented 50.2% of the state's 1983 assigned dollar goal of \$224,700,000.

Sales of Series EE Bonds were \$3,461.00 in May 1983, for a total of \$44,058 for the first five months of 1983 in Hansford County, C.A. Gibner, Volunteer County Chairman, said. These sales result in 63% of the County's assigned dollar quota.
Nationally, sales for May amounted to \$418 million, up almost 73% over May 1982, making a year-to-date total of \$1,781 million, a 38% increase.
