Ruby McLaughlin services held

Graveside services were held Monday, Feb. 13 in San Antonio, for Ruby McLaughlin, mother of Mrs. George Collard of Spearman.

Mrs. McLaughlin died Thursday in an Amarillo hospital. She was 83.

She was a former San Antonio resident and had been living here near her daughter for several years.

Survivors are her daughter, Dorcas Collard of Spearman and two grandchildren, Randall Scott Collard and D'Dee Collard.

A blood drive will be held from 2 to 6 p.m., next Monday, February 20, for Rev. Bruno Gaskamp, pastor of the Bethlehem Lutheran Church of Perryton, and former pastor of the Faith Lutheran Church of Spearman. The drive will be held at the First United Methodist Church, 321 S. Baylor, Perryton.

Gaskamp, who moved to Perryton last August from here, is suffering from myelofibrosis, a rare disease which decreases the body's ability to produce its own blood. The illness was diagnosed three weeks ago, and Gaskamp has been in the hospital receiving transfusions. While myelofibrosis is incurable, it can be treated, but it is estimated that Gaskamp will require a pint of blood each week for the rest of his life.

The Coffee blood bank, which is supplying the transfusions, requires payment in a four-to-one ratio, and the drive will seek to replace as many of the more than 200 pints of blood Gaskamp will need this year. Donors of any blood type are welcome, and while it can also be pledged in anyone's name, it is requested that it be given for Rev. Gaskamp.

A school trustee election was called for April 7, 1984 for the purpose of electing two trustees. Terms are expiring for Jim Davis and Tommie White.

Williams named Hansford agent

Hansford County commissioners met in regular session Monday, Feb. 13 at the county courthouse.

They discussed several matters and appointed Burt Williams to be county extension agent. He will begin the job June 1, 1984. Williams has been an agriculture teacher in Spearman schools for several years. The commissioners and the county judge are very pleased to have Burt in this new position.

The court paid bills and set a salary for Phillip Walters, Precinct 3 employee.

They approved Charles Lynn Martin as an auxiliary deputy for the sheriff's office. Martin is not on salary but will be paid for his time when he is needed. Judge McClellan stated that probably he would mostly be used when the sheriff's office is transferring prisoners or has to pick up one somewhere.

They discussed the Agricultural

Development Cooperative which has been formed by Swisher, Moore and Potter counties. A new law passed in the last session of the legislature, enables counties to issue municipal bonds to agriculture producers in new ventures, such as a plant using their products. The court did not join the other counties but will deal with the issue if needed.

Approval of a telephone line by Southwestern Bell Telephone in Precinct 3, north of Gruver was given.

The treasurer presented her quarterly report, which was approved by commissioners.

Judge McClellan was appointed by the commissioners to meet the new requirements of the new revenue sharing regulations. This deals with making services that the courthouse offers citizens easily accessible to handicapped individuals.

Biscuits

1 pkg. yeast
2 T lukewarm water
1 t salt
2 1/2 t baking powder
1/4 t soda
1/2 c shortening
2 T sugar
3/4 c buttermilk
2 c flour

Dissolve yeast in water for 5 minutes. Stir flour, salt, soda, baking powder and sugar together; add shortening.

Combine yeast and buttermilk. Add to flour mixture slowly, stirring with a fork. Turn on floured board and knead.

Roll out 1/2 inch thick and cut.

Bake at 450 degrees to 10-12 minutes.

Omit soda if sweet milk is used but add 1/4 teaspoon more baking powder.

Makes 16 biscuits; double recipe for larger dinners.

WASHINGTON, D. C.—Ross Atkinson, a staff writer for the *Christian Science Monitor*, is right when he suggests that the various college bowls and Superbowl could reduce ticket prices and improve halftime shows by avoiding show-biz.

Already the nation is beserk on the subject and pastime of show biz, TV and film. In recent years the various bowls have gone to great lengths, at great expense, to stage entertainment extravaganzas at the half.

Atkinson would prefer a good marching band, and so would this writer, and millions of other Americans. And if ticket prices were lowered, as they could be, by kicking show-biz dandies out of the halftime scene at bowl games, just about everyone would approve.

Good band music is stirring and one seldom hears it or sees bands these days. A generation or two

ago, however, people went on Sunday afternoons to band concerts and were thrilled at the sight of a fine marching band. That can be an inspirational sight.

The Orange Bowl and Gator bowls, and also the Sugar Bowl, have gone in too heavily for show-biz. Entertainers can't perform their best in a huge stadium, with various sound conditions. They are best on stage in their element—which is not a football field.

Many football fans couldn't care less about some pop singer or dancer; fans pay good money to see a bowl game, and often travel some distance. If it's show-biz they get, they can do better at home.

They come for football, and part of football has always been marching bands. If former greats of the game are introduced at halftime, that would be more interesting to fans than show-biz entertainment. Mercifully, spare us the politicians also.

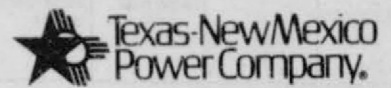

MICROWAVE OVEN NEEDS SEPARATE CIRCUIT

Power surges from other kitchen appliances can damage a microwave oven and result in costly repair bills. A microwave oven should have its own 15 amp circuit, especially if it has touch controls rather than a mechanical dial control.

Microwave oven manufacturers subscribe to the Underwriter's Laboratory standard that each major appliance should have its own electrical line. But most houses are not wired that way, and many consumers have counter-top ovens that are simply plugged into the most convenient outlet.

A microwave oven with touch control number pads has a micro-processor which is susceptible to the rapid rise and drop in electrical power caused by appliances like an ice-maker refrigerator or air conditioner. This power surge can damage the micro-processor's electronic circuit board, causing the oven control unit to fail.

A warranty typically covers the control unit for two years. After that, the unit will cost \$125-200 plus labor. While the magnetron tube in a microwave usually carries a 5-10 year warranty, the control unit is covered for only two years.

Check the amperage on the circuit you are now using to make sure it is sufficient to handle a microwave oven and other appliances at the same time.

If you have doubts about the circuit's adequacy, and don't want to install a separate one for the microwave alone, consider re-arranging the appliances in your kitchen.

Use your circuit-breakers to determine which outlets are on different circuits in your kitchen. Then arrange the appliances so the microwave oven is not on the same circuit with other power-intensive appliances.

Avoid placing a frost-free refrigerator, toaster and toaster-oven on the same circuit as the microwave. But lights or low-power appliances like an electric can opener or mixer could be placed on the same circuit with little risk.

Placing the microwave on a different circuit from other appliances can have another advantage. When several appliances are on the same circuit, you may not get full power on your microwave, even on the high setting.

Paying attention to how the microwave fits into the demands on your home's electrical power system can help get maximum performance and extend the use life of the appliance as well as save on

WHAT IS CHOLESTEROL?

Cholesterol is a fatty substance found in animal tissue. Primary sources of cholesterol in the American diet are fatty meats, egg yolks, and whole milk dairy products. Cholesterol is essential for certain body processes, but the amount the body manufactures is sufficient for these needs. High levels of cholesterol in the bloodstream are associated with a higher risk of heart disease and stroke. This risk can be reduced by adopting an eating pattern moderate in cholesterol-containing foods and saturated (animal) fats, which can increase the cholesterol level in the blood. On Nuclear War

The best single volume describing the weapons, tactics and strategies of nuclear war, as envisioned by the experts, is probably Harper and Row's *Nuclear War in the 1980's*.

This book, by Christopher Chant and Ian Hogg, contains hundreds of color charts, diagrams and maps--showing just what the current strategies of the nuclear powers are.

It lists the weapons and depicts them in drawings and charts, and shows what they can do. It gives numbers and details the weapons available to every nuclear power, new ones being built, and specifies those countries likely to build them in the future--and when.

It gives an authentic and easily understood comparison of the U.S. and U.S.S.R. nuclear weapons arsenals. It treats nu-

clear submarines, the cruise missile, nuclear defense systems. All this is in color and simplified so that the average reader can readily grasp the 1980 picture.

Relatively new weapons such as the intermediate-range Pershing missile the U.S. is now installing in Europe are pictured and performance statistics listed. The system of command, to be used in an emergency, is described--with color pictures and drawings.

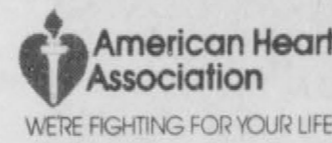
If the reader could obtain only one book on the world nuclear arms situation for the 1980's, this is probably the most valuable small, easily-comprehended volume available.

It's a must for anyone attempting to write on the subject and highly desirable for anyone who hopes to participate, in an informed manner, in any nuclear weapons discussion or debate.

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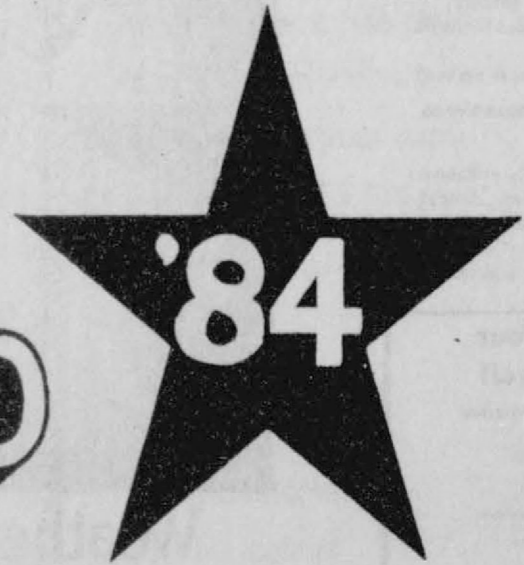


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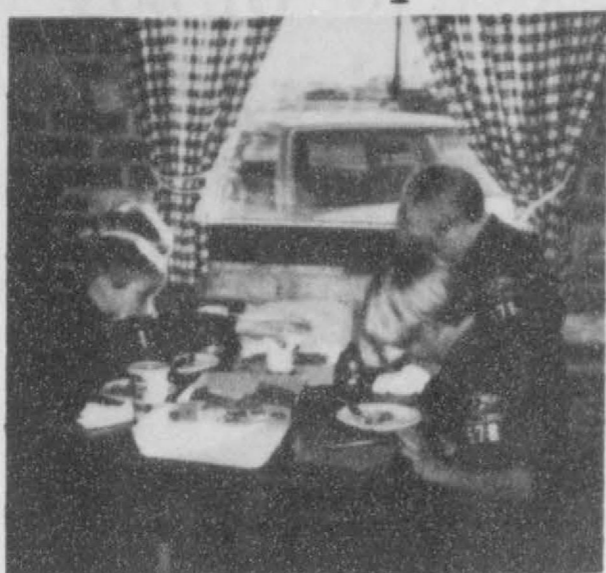

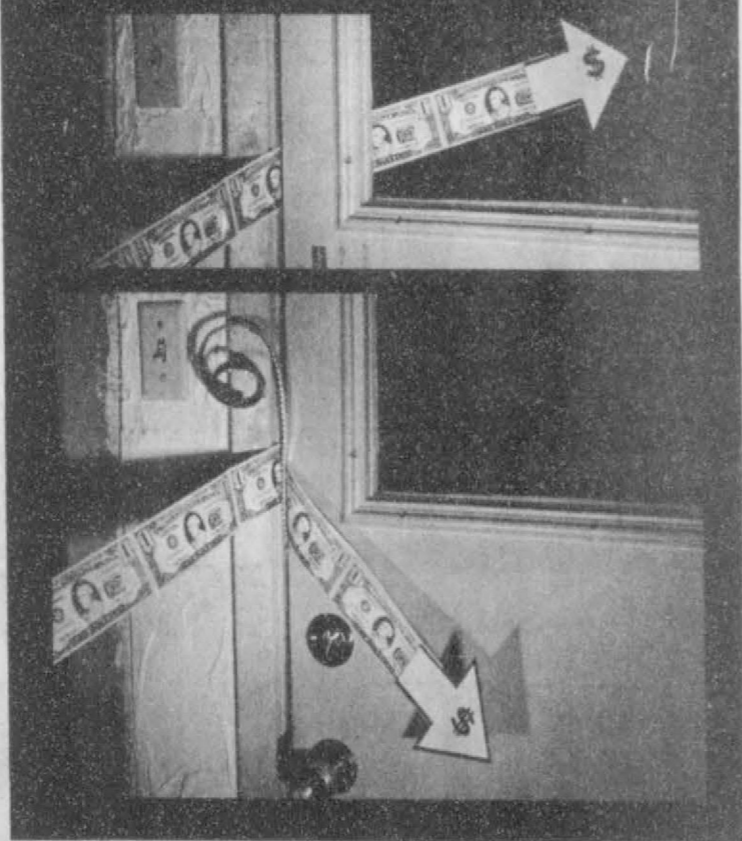

THE Know Weather

What are the signs in the sky which foretell the approach of a cold front? There are few signs in the sky which will give you any clue to the approach of a cold front, despite what some may claim. A warm front usually gives ample warning before moving in but a cold front may often give none at all.

The first sign of a cold front is usually not far enough in advance of its



actual arrival to do much good. This clue is a sharp pickup in the wind.

This is actually the leading edge of the cold front, moving over the surface of the earth, and will probably be leading the full-bodied front itself only by hours.

Notice the sky. If it is clearing or has just cleared, and the wind is picking up appreciably, with gusty blasts, a cold front is probably not far away.

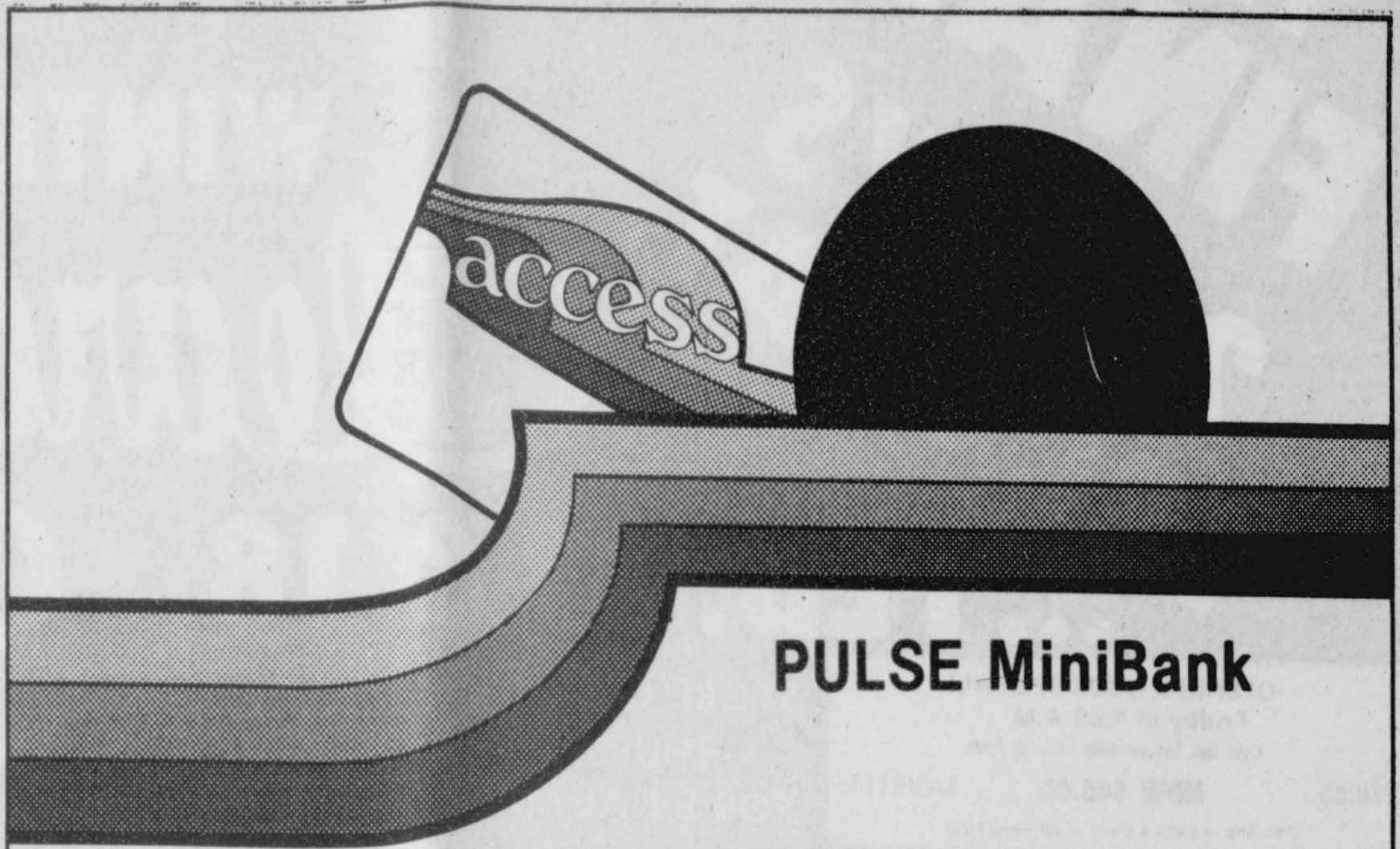
