Mayor Blodgett seeks re-election

I am this day, Monday, February 6, 1984, filing for re-election as Mayor of Spearman, and would greatly appreciate your vote in the upcoming city election.

I am completing my fourth term as your Mayor, and I believe that I have been able to serve the city in the best interests of all. I have tried to be a good leader for all citizens, steering our city in a sound financial program. I hope that I have given an attentive ear to everyone's problems. Our city is in excellent financial condition. Our bond indebtedness will be retired in the next 8 years.

As you may or may not know, I have had an active role at the State level in city governments. I have served on the Board of Directors of

Texas Municipal League for seven years, and in October of 1983, I was elected President of Texas Municipal League. This is a first in two areas: We have never had a president to serve from the Panhandle, and never in all of Texas from a town the size of Spearman. I also serve on the Transportation & Communication policy-making committee of the National League of Cities. It will take another term as mayor for me to serve out my term as President of Texas Municipal League, and my tenure on the National League of Cities committee, for you have to be an elected city official to serve in either capacity.

I believe I can serve Spearman and the balance of the Panhandle

well, by finishing out the task before me. There is much to be done to improve our phone systems, electrical service, television viewing, water for the years ahead, adequate fuel for heating, and all at an affordable price. I work each day trying to help all citizens in these matters.

I intend, if I am re-elected, to make this my last term as your mayor. It has been enjoyable work, and believe me, it does require work if the city is to be run under an affordable budget, giving the best of services for the money available.

Thank you for allowing me to be your mayor for the past 8 years. I would appreciate your vote April 7th.

Memorial services for Pat Cates, 63, who died Friday in Amarillo, were held at 11 a.m. Monday, February 6 in First United Methodist Church with the Rev. Lane Boyd, pastor, officiating. Burial was in Hansford Cemetery by Boxwell Brothers Funeral Home of Spearman.

Mr. Cates was born in Pushmataha County, Okla., moved to Spearman in 1940. He was a World War II veteran of the Coast Guard. He was a member of the First United Methodist Church, was on the administrative board and a former trustee of the church. He had been an employee of the Hansford County appraisal district. He married Virginia Buchanan in 1952 in Spearman.

Survivors include his wife, of the home; a daughter, Sandy Atkinson of Higgins, a son, Charles of Austin; two sisters, Beatrice Patton and Janice Jamar both of Ada, Okla.; and two grandchildren.

Three more Democrats file for election

The filing deadline for county and district offices was Monday, Feb. 6 for the May primary election.

Latest candidates to file are for county Democratic chairman. Willard McCloy filed for chairman of precinct 9, J.L. Brock for chairman of precinct 5, and Tommy Gumphory, chairman of precinct 3.

The only incumbent running for re-election that is opposed is Garland Head, Commissioner Precinct 1.

Vance Snider, local businessman, is also running for election to this post.

Other Democratic candidates for the May primary election are

incumbents, Helen Dry, Tax Assessor-Collector; R.L. McFarlin, Sheriff; John Hutchison, County Attorney; B.J. Renner, Commissioner, Precinct 3; W.L. Johnson, Chairman Precinct 7 and Carl Archer for Democratic County Chairman.

Spearman, Gruver sales tax down

The City of Spearman received a check for \$25,923.89 for its 1% sales tax from state comptroller Bob Bullock for the period ending 1-27-84. This amount is down from the previous year which was \$30,554.12.

Total payments in 1984 to date are \$36,164.32 down 12.81% from last year's payment for the same period of \$41,479.26.

The City of Gruver received \$5,318.75 for the period ending 1-27-84, compared to \$8,736.85 for the same period last year.

Total payments to Gruver are \$7,432.54 down 14.91% from the \$8,736.85 for the same period last

year.

Bullock reported that statewide, 1984 payments are running 2.57 percent ahead of last year. However, because of changes in reporting requirements that converted 15,000 small- and medium-sized taxpayers from quarterly to monthly payment schedules it is difficult to compare raw payment figures for 1984 with the same period last year, since what were quarterly payments last year are now spread over three months.

February checks reflect sales made during the final, Christmas quarter of 1983 and reported to the Comptroller's office by January 20.

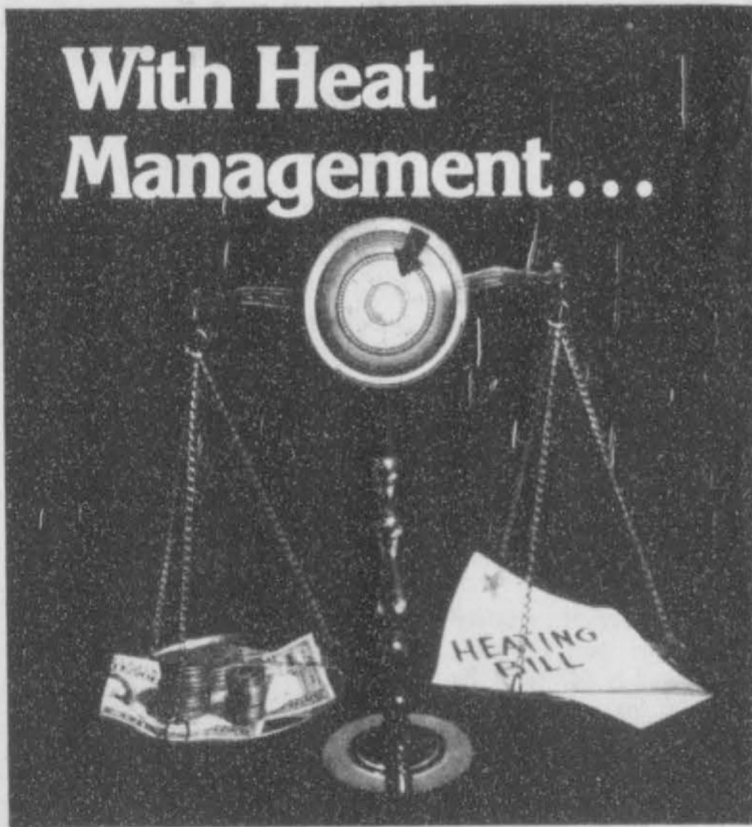
FFA Recognition Day will be on Wednesday, Feb. 8, and the FHA members will bring food and decorate the lockers for the FFA members.

WHO SHOULD GET FLU SHOTS?

You may not enjoy being down with a "flu bug", but should you get a shot to prevent it?

Outbreaks of influenza virus infections occur every year in the United States, although where and how severely they strike varies greatly from one geographic area to another.

Health professionals make an effort to reduce the impact of influenza by protecting those people at greatest risk of serious illness or death. So an annual vaccination is recommended for all older persons, particularly those over 65 years, because the risk of death during flu outbreaks increases with age.

Children and adults who have medical conditions while placing them high risk should also have flu shots. These conditions include acquired or congenital heart disease, severe asthma, cystic fibrosis, chronic obstructive pulmonary disease, bronchitis, chronic kidney disease, diabetes and other metabolic diseases, severe chronic anemia such as sickle cell disease and other immune

Wheat crop should recover from frigid temperatures

COLLEGE STATION--While the late December cold wave that swept Texas dealt a heavy blow to grazing from small grains, most of the crops should recover.

That assessment comes from Dr. Travis Miller, agronomist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

"Both wheat and oats were burned back severely by the long period of extremely cold weather," says Miller. "Oats were especially hard hit along with late-planted wheat that had not yet developed tillers (secondary stems)."

Miller noted that a considerable amount of wheat was damaged in central and western areas because it was planted late due to lack of soil moisture last fall. Some of this was replanted wheat where

early stands had been poor due to dry conditions followed by heavy rains in October.

To check for freeze damage, Miller suggests looking at the growing point or crown node of the plant about one-half inch below the soil surface. Cut the middle of the stem with a sharp knife and look for green material. If the growing point appears water-soaked or brownish in color, the plant is dead. Live plants will generally revive and green color will be restored after a week to ten days of favorable weather.

"The best thing for producers to do right now is to let cattle graze off the dead topgrowth," says Miller. "This is high quality forage with up to 15 percent crude protein. If the small grains

were severely frosted, take cattle off the fields to enable plants to recover once this dead growth is removed. If a considerable amount of green leaves remain, continue normal grazing operations. Mild weather is needed and some areas need additional moisture to facilitate growth."

The agronomist advises producers to let small grains put forth 4 to 6 inches of new growth before grazing them again. Overgrazing fields prior to the December cold led to heavier than usual freeze damage to wheat and oats in some areas.

In addition to keeping cattle off small grains to speed up recovery, Miller also advises against applying fertilizer at this time. "Fertilizing now would just cause a flush of

tender growth which would be highly susceptible to more cold weather," he says.

Small grains should be top-dressed with nitrogen just before the jointing stage of growth, or about the time cattle are pulled off to enable grain production, notes the agronomist. This ranges from mid-February in southern areas to early March in the plains.

Texas boasts about 7.4 million acres of wheat this year and about 1.5 million acres of oats. About 70 percent of the oats planted are grazed out by livestock, but a good portion of the wheat is left to make a grain crop, Miller says. Depending on weather conditions the rest of the winter and into the spring, the Texas wheat crop should not be reduced significantly due to frigid conditions in December.

Some improvement expected for farmers

COLLEGE STATION--While it may not be a banner year for agriculture, 1984 should bring some improvement in Texas farm income over the depressed conditions of recent years.

"We could have a 10 to 15 percent increase in farm income over 1983," points out Dr. Carl Anderson, economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

Anderson sees an increase in farm earnings due to slightly higher prices, fairly steady production costs and continued improvement in demand for farm commodities.

"However, there is a dark

cloud hanging over crop producers," contends the economist. "The potential for over-production is there. It could take hold again and put farmers right back where they were a year ago--facing surplus commodities and depressed markets."

Government programs are offering farmers higher target prices and larger deficiency payments in 1984 which should boost cash flows for participants, notes Anderson.

However, the voluntary nature of the programs and the \$50,000 payment limitations will not entice enough farmers to participate so as to have a

major effect on curbing production.

"Without doubt, farmers will be facing either tighter production controls or lower prices for the next several years," says Anderson. "At current demand, some crop acreage must be retired. However, the mood in Washington reflects a more flexible farm policy, less government control and market-oriented programs for the 1985 farm bill."

For 1984 farmers with strong management skills in producing, financing and marketing and with little or no debt should do well, says the economist. But agricultural

leaders will tighten up on credit conditions, with the Farm Credit System and the Farmers Home Administration handling an increasing number of loans.

Ranchers, like farmers, should see some improvement in prices during 1984, notes Anderson. Reduced beef and pork supplies should help market prices along with an improved demand resulting from continued economic recovery. However, heavy marketing of culled dairy cows as a result of the new dairy program could dampen meat prices somewhat.

As far as land values are concerned, Anderson sees

cropland prices stagnating or declining slightly, especially in prime agricultural areas such as the Texas High Plains. But

he expects Texas ranchland values to continue to advance faster than the rate of inflation.

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Hightower files for re-election

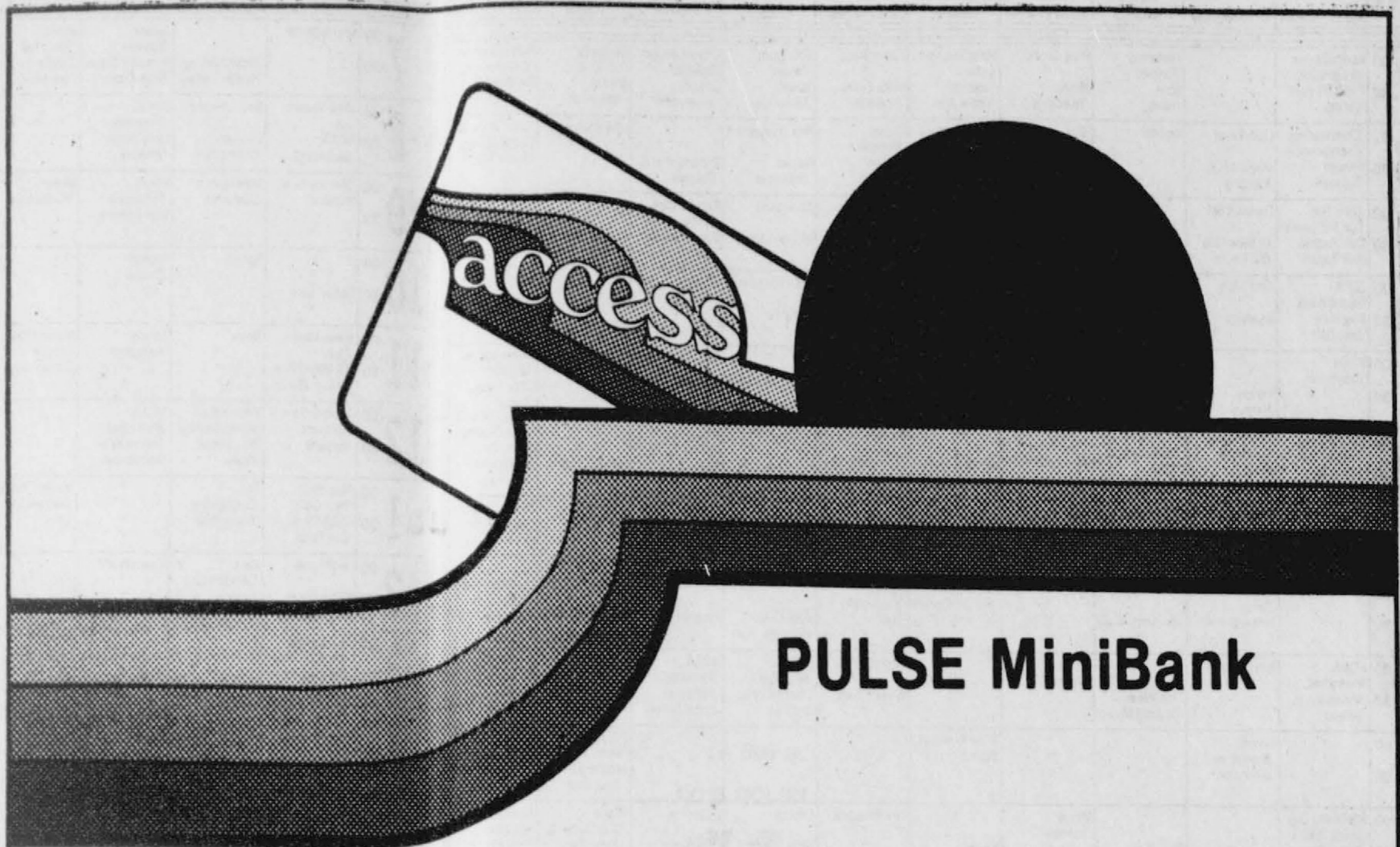
