

They toured the Longhorn Cavern near Burnett, Texas. According to geologists, Longhorn Cavern was at least one million years in the making. The huge cavern is awesome evidence of the changes wrought by variations in climate, earth movements, the rise and fall of the seas and the slow solution of limestone by water. It is 130 feet below the surface of the earth. The scenic beauty of the cavern is heightened by the sparkling displays of calcite crystals, the unusual shapes formed of fiint and the clusters of stalacities and stalagmites, and the

A recent study shows par-ents are most likely to abuse male infants, children under age 6. illegitimate children and females age 12 and older. and females age 12 and older, the same study also points out high-risk families. "A fairly high rate of unemployment and an extremely high rate of marital disorder characterized abusing families," said William Friedrich, a researcher at The University of Texas School of Public Health. About 65 percent of the abused children in the study did not have both natural parents. have both natural parents living with them. The study appears in the October issue of TEXAS MEDICINE, the Texas Medical Association's monthly journal.

data, drawn Friedrich's from Harris County statistics, shows that parents of any age race, educational or econo category abused children. race, educational or economic category abused children. A large percentage seem to be repeat offenders. About 85 percent of the children reportedly abused had been in similar incidents previously.

"A parent who was himself abused, social isolation, unrealistic expectations of the infant, inability to use or seek belo and a personality best

help and a personality best described as deeply unlike-able" profile a potential child abuser, an article in the JOURNAL OF THE AMERI-CAN MEDICAL ASSOCIA-TION states. Parents demonstrating two or three of these characteristics who have or will have young children should be offered help before abuse occurs, said the article's

The first step in getting someone help is reporting abuse. Texas law requires anyone who suspects child abuse or neglect to report it to the proper authorities. A person can call the child abuse hotline number, 1-800-292-5400, free of charge and report a potential or suspected case. People can call the nearest welfare office or law enforcement authorities as well. The ment authorities as well. The Texas welfare department says "as long as your report is made in good faith, you are protected by law from damage suits". A report also can be made anonymously. The law made anonymously. The law says someone can be prose-cuted for not reporting a

Suspected case.

The information is relayed to the nearest child welfare office and a worker investigates the report. After invest-igation, parents may get coun-selling if needed. If a child's safety depends on it, he may

be placed in another home at least temporarily.

Welfare department figures for 1973 show there were about 4,000 reports and more than 2,500 confirmed child abuse cases. There were 104 recorded deaths from child abuse. Friedrich's article says there may be as many as a many as abuse. Friedrich's article says there may be as many as 500,000 abuse cases in the U.S. every year. Texas child abuse reports have increased but Friedrich said that child abuse reports show only a small part of the problem that includes emotional abuse and intentional neglect. Dr. Chadwick said "more support needs to go into identification and care of the high-risk patient who has not yet abused an infant." an infant.'

Farmers buying certified eed to plant their 1977 crop

seed to plant their 1977 crop should pay particular attention to the labels on the seed bagthere's been a change.

"Certified seed sold after January I next year must bear two labels-one certifying the variety and the other indicating a number of seed quality factors," points out Dr. Robert B. Metzer, cotton specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Whereas in the past, seed was certified for both variety and quality factors, the certification now pertains only to the genetic identity of the seed. However, since the

seed. However, since the lexas seed law still requires that seed quality information be truthfully stated, an analye truthfully stated, is label must also accompany all certified seed, explains

sis label must also accompany all certified seed, explains Metzer.

"The analysis label will tell the farmer such things as purity, inert matter, other crop seed, weed seed, noxious weed seed and germination," notes the Texas A&M University System specialist. "The fact that the seed is certified has nothing to do with these particular factors."

Metzer explains the new certification labeling this way. "Take cottonseed, for example. TAMCOT S.P37 sold as certified seed must bear a label (blue in color) that indicates that the seed is indeed the SP37 variety. The certification label will show net weight, kind and variety and who produced the seed, but nothing on quality factors. A second label on the seed bag will list the various quality factors mentioned above and will tell the farmer the percentage that the seed contains, such as the percent of weed seed.

"The main thing for farmers

with as the percent of weed seed.

"The main thing for farmers to remember when buying certified seed for the 1977 crop is to look at both labels on the seed bag," emphasizes Metzer. "Both labels must be checked to get the complete story on the seed."

The change in seed certification standards in Texas came about recently in an effort to assure a more dependable supply of certified seed and to give seedmen more flexibility in producing seed for different markets, explains the specialist. The change also establishes uniformity with the Federal Seed Act and encourages international seed trade.

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

#### County Agent News

Frost has occurred in most parts of Hansford County, and this could lead to prussic acid poisoning in livestock grazing certain pasture grasses and forages, points out Jim Kuykendall, county agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

review.

Although many plants contain the toxic material that causes poisoning, those causing the highest mortality in livestock when grazed after they have been frozen and wilted are Johnson and Sudan grasses and sorghum or hybrids of these.

The most dangerous time as far as the grazing of these plants is concerned is following frost when the plant material begins to wilt, emphasizes Kuykendall. Livestock should not be allowed access to the wilted material until it has dried completely. This usually takes three or four days of good sunlight. New plant growth usually becomes non-toxic and can be grazed within 10 days to two weeks following a rain.

As far as prussic acid poisoning is concerned, the poisoning acts rapidly and can kill animals within minutes. In

contain prussic acid. Animals that are not hungry will not be affected as seriously by toxic material since their intake will Annual Thanksgiving Dinner Set

material since their intake will be limited.

3. Remove all animals from the pasture if one in the herd shows any signs of poisoning.

4. Call a veterinarian immedi-ately if an animal appears to be poisoned. An antidote to treat affected animals is highly efficient if given early. This product is available from vet-erinarians.

erinarians.

5. Have suspect plant material checked by the Texas Veterinary Medical Diagnostic Laboratories at College Station or Amarillo. Local veterinarians will be happy to submit samples for you.

The overall key to preventing prussic acid poisoning in livestock is to be aware of plant materials that may cause poisoning and then to keep cattle from grazing such plants until a safe period has passed, points out Kuykendall.

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
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
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
