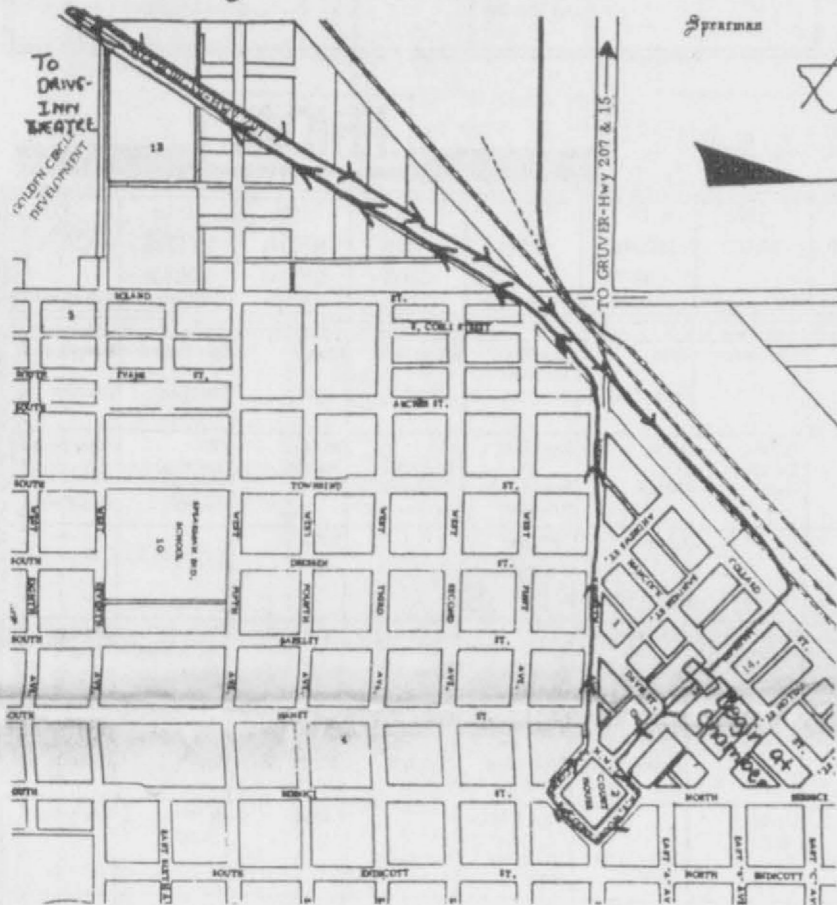

Rangers here

The Spearman Lynx will try to add a little sweetener to a season soured by an incredible string of injuries, and at the same time play spoiler to Perryton's perfect District 1-3A record when the Lynx and Rangers square off here Friday night. Game time is 7:30 for the Lynx Stadium contest.

Perryton has only one loss—to an out of state school—to blemish its season record, and has rolled to four straight conference wins, and only the Lynx stand in the Rangers way of a perfect 1-3A mark.

The Lynx, despite an injury plagued season, have battled to a 4-5 season mark, and would like nothing better than to even up their record at 5-5 by pulling off the upset of the season with a victory over arch-rival Perryton.

The Lynx started the season with very little depth or bench strength, but had high hopes for the 1983 grid wars because of high quality returning starters.

But early in the season, a major portion of the Lynx big, highly regarded line was knocked out of action with injuries, and when the Lynx finally got their "big boys up front" back in the lineup, there was one brief lull at mid-season when they were at near full strength before a rash of injuries to key players almost completely decimated the Lynx offensive backfield.

The Lynx are still hurting and hurting bad—physically—in the backfield, and for the third week in a row will have to go with a patchwork

UIL changes classification of Spearman & Gruver

The University Interscholastic League (UIL), which governs and regulates secondary school athletics in the State of Texas, has dropped Hansford County's two high school teams a notch in classification.

The announcement that the Spearman Lynx would drop from 1-3A and compete next season in athletic and scholastic events in District 1-2A, and that the Gruver Greyhounds would compete in 1-1A, came over the weekend.

On Monday, representatives of each school in the two school districts met to iron out plans for the upcoming season and set the 1984 gridiron schedules.

The District 1-2A meeting was attended by Spearman Superintendent James Cunningham, High School Principal Eddie Clemmons and Lynx Head Football Coach-Athletic Director Larry Lanier.

The District 1-1A meeting was attended by Gruver ISD Superintendent Jack Weldon, High School Principal Kenneth Baker.

Lanier said Tuesday morning the Lynx 1984 gridiron schedule is set except for one non-district game that has to be lined up for Sept. 21.

He said the Lynx will play two pre-season scrimmage games—against the Guymon Tigers in Guymon on Aug. 24 and against Booker here on Aug. 31.

The Lynx will open their regular

'83 football season by hosting the White Deer Bucks on Sept. 7. Despite the realignments, the traditional Spearman Lynx and Gruver Greyhounds game for "county bragging rights" has not been scrapped. The Lynx and Hounds will battle it out in the second game of the season on Sept. 14.

Right now Sept. 21 is listed as "open", pending the possible lining up of an opponent, Lanier said. On Sept. 28, the Lynx will travel to Beaver, Okla. to take on the Dusters, and will be in Vega on Oct. 5 to play the Longhorns.

The Lynx will jump into the thick of the 1-2A race in a hurry as they open district play against this year's and last year's champs—the Stratford Elks on Oct. 12 in Stratford.

The following Friday, the Lynx second district opponent will be powerhouse Panhandle as the Panthers invade Lynx Stadium on Oct. 19—meaning the Lynx take on two district champs of this year in a row next year in district play—Stratford and Panhandle.

On Oct. 26, the Lynx will do district battle against "neighbor" Stinnett, there. This year the Rattlers appear headed for a second place playoff berth in 1-2A.

On Nov. 2, Spearman hosts the Sundry Bobcats on Nov. 2, and winds up regular season football play against Sanford-Fritch on the

Eagles home turf on Nov. 9.

"I'm elated," Coach Lanier said of his personal reaction to the Lynx being dropped into a 2A district.

"Now we'll be playing district schools nearer our size. Fritch is our largest 1-2A opponent—they're one student away from going into 3A—but the rest of the schools are all about the same size, in the 200 to 225 student range.

"We'll still be in a tough district. Panhandle, Stratford and Stinnett are already established powers, but they're not Perryton, Dalhart and River Road," Lanier commented.

He said projected attendance figures based on current enrollment in Spearman Junior High School and lower grades—do not indicate the Lynx will move back up into 3A in the foreseeable future, that "we'll stay at this level (2A) for a while."

Lanier said Spearman Junior High 7th and 8th grade teams and the Lynx junior Varsity schedules were not quite set as of Tuesday morning, but that the junior high teams and the JV squad will all play on Thursday nights in opposite towns from where the Lynx varsity will play—that they'll be home when the Lynx are on the road, and vice versa. There will be few non-district games if any for them, they'll play district foes twice.

Gruver Greyhound mentor Haenisch also welcomed his team's drop

into a league where they would not be playing larger schools.

He said that the 'Hounds will be playing only two non-conference games, and as it stands now have an open date before taking on the other eight schools in 1-1A. The sites of the non-district games have not been set yet.

But those two non-district contests could be toughies. On Sept. 7, the Greyhounds will open their regular season against long time rival and former district foe Stratford and on Sept. 14, the 'Hounds will play Spearman (Lanier has said the game will be in Spearman). After an open date (as of now) on Sept. 21, the 'Hounds open district play against McLean in McLean on Sept. 28.

On Oct. 5, the Greyhounds will play their first 1-1A encounter on their home turf as they host Booker, then it will be back on the road for the Hounds when they travel to Phillips Oct. 12 for a district clash.

On Oct. 19, Follett and the Greyhounds will collide in Gruver, and then the 'Hounds will play their second home game in a row against Groom on Oct. 26.

LeFors will be the Nov. 2 foe for the Gruver team in LeFors, followed by Claude in Gruver on Nov. 9. The Greyhounds will wind up regular season play on the road against 1-1A power Wheeler.

lineup.

Julio Vasquez the Lynx number one rusher, tried to come back from a knee injury in last Friday's loss to River Road, but played only the first few minutes before being shelved, for the season, when his leg received a hard knock.

Jeff Laird, Julio's back up at tailback and a starting cornerback on defense is still hobbled with an injury and it's still questionable whether he will see action according to Lynx Head Coach-Athletic Director Larry Lanier.

Lanier said that quarterback Ross Donahue, who suffered a dislocated knee in the Canadian game but has played extensively in the Lynx two games since that encounter, is now able to move "at about 85 percent" of his old, pre-injury self.

"He says his knee is feeling good,

but his mobility is hampered somewhat by its having to be taped and braced," Lanier said.

The Perryton team will be at full strength for the encounter, as far as the Lynx coaching staff knows, according to Lanier. For a while, the Rangers key running back Bocox was out of action with an injury, but appears to now be fully recovered, Lanier said.

"Perryton knows it's already cinched the district championship and will be playing to keep their momentum rolling into the playoffs, Lanier commented. "We don't anticipate them doing anything different. They'll predominantly run the ball and pass about 20 percent of the time."

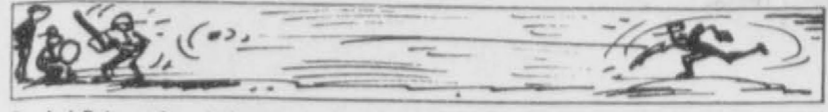
"They've got good speed, power and size."

But while the flesh may be a trifle

weak from all the injuries, the Lynx spirit is burning as bright as ever-maybe even brighter because the opponents are the Rangers, Lanier remarked.

"For all they've been through, the kids still have a great attitude. They've come along as a team and are really pulling together. We feel like they'll play a real good game against Perryton," and to help shore up the Lynx injury-riddled lineup, "we've moved up a few boys from the JV to replace those who were injured."

There is still another reason for the Lynx to want very badly to pull off an upset of the Rangers. This will be Spearman's last game in 1-3A--next they will drop and play in District 1-2A against schools more their size--and they'd like to make their 3A swan song a happy one.

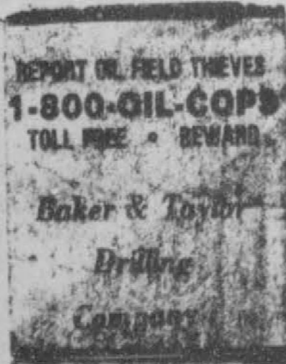

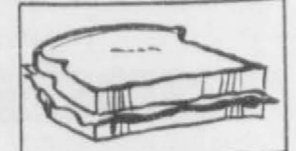

TV & Children

The sweeping change that has
commonized U.S. society in
recent years is television. Chil-
dren who once grew up in
communities and families where
certain local values and tradi-
tions were accepted as a matter
of course, now get their ideas
about conduct, behavior and
morals from television.

They are no longer relatively
isolated. They get "Broadway
trash" in their living rooms
each night (plus other good
programming, admittedly). A
recent study showed that today's
average high school student,
at graduation, has spent twice
as many hours in front of the
tube as in school!

David Pearl, of the National
Institute of Mental Health,
speaking in Chicago recently,
stressed the heavy impact on
American children, by televi-
sion. He says parents consis-
tently underestimate the time
their children spend in front
of a video tube.

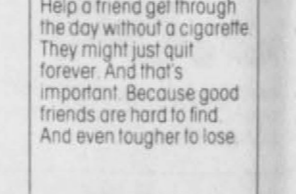
Studies show, he says, that
the average American child,
9 to 12, spends 1,000 hours in
classrooms in the school year,
but 1,340 before a television
tube! One can imagine the
impact on television if these
figures are accurate.

Dr. James Holroyd, at the
same Chicago meeting, warned
that not only excessive TV
viewing but video games, the
use of automobiles and com-
puters is also excessive among
today's American youth. (Dr.
Holroyd is a pediatrician at the
University of Southern Califor-
nia.)

The message to parents is clear.
Limit children's activities in
these areas to reasonable hours-
in their own interest. Dr.
Holroyd says more time should
be devoted to gymnastics,
swimming, ballet and physical
activity.

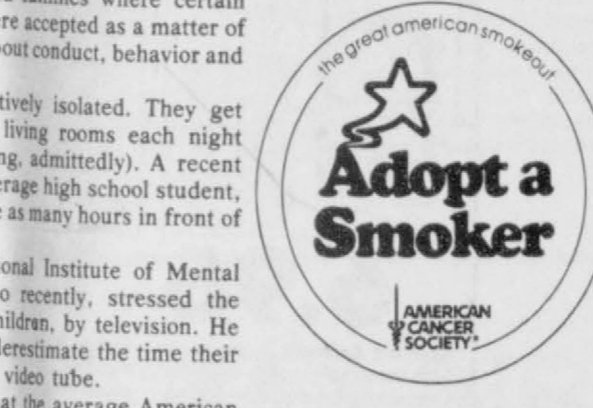

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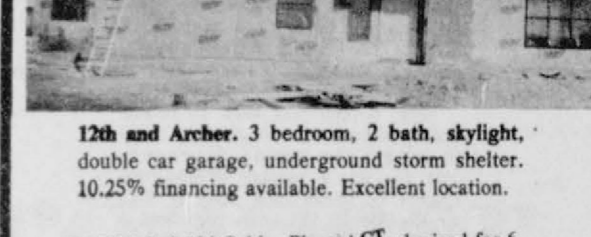

Glenn Miller was the legendary big-band leader from the 1940's whose band created great dance music. Today's world-famous Glenn Miller Orchestra plays all the

favorites like "In The Mood," "Tuxedo Junction," "Little Brown Jug," "Chattanooga Choo-Choo," and the immortal "Moonlight Serenade."

June Kinky, president of the Senior Citizens Association, says, "Thanks to the community, we have a beautiful center. There are some things inside we need to complete the center. 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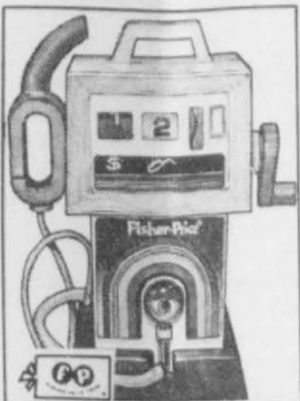

In addition, he ordered the arrest of Argentina's central bank president! He ruled that Argentine law superseded New York State law, which by mutual consent of the parties, was to have been the legal guideline in any dispute involving repayment.

Though its foreign debt is not as large as that of Brazil or Mexico, Argentina's debt is one of the largest in the world. So, when this ruling was publicized, what was the reaction in the U.S.?

In the next four days the stock market in New York advanced to a new all-time high. The reminder, dear reader, is no one has yet consistently and accurately forecast markets or economic trends. If the experts can't, others who miss the mark need not feel badly, whatever consolation that is.

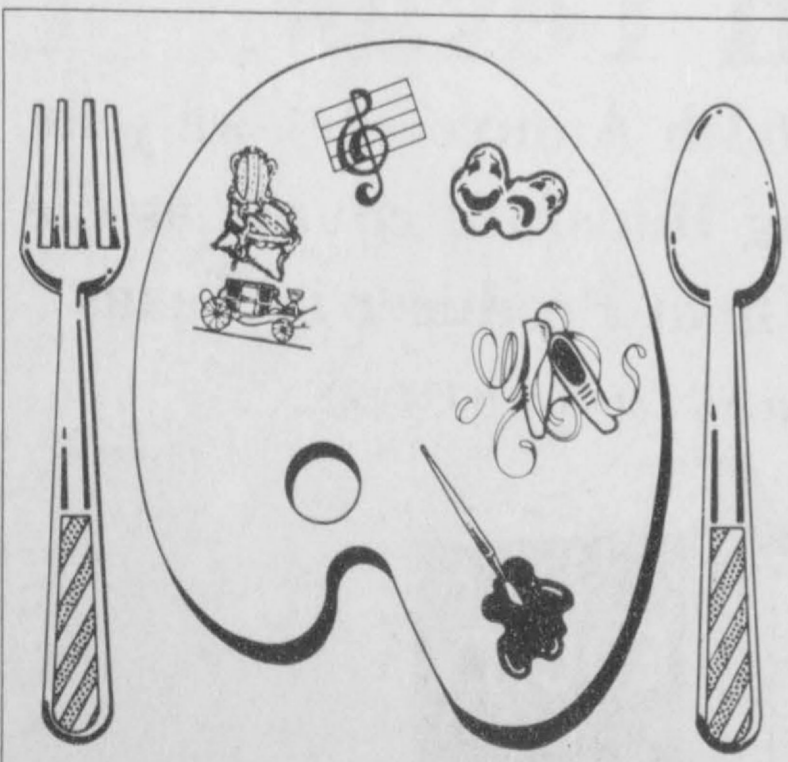

River Road gets Lynx 38-0 Friday

Maybe the Spearman Lynx should have worn big red crosses on their jerseys Friday night.

Certainly the River Road Wildcats showed no mercy to Spearman's "mobile infirmary" as they bombed the severely crippled Lynx 38-0 in Amarillo in the next to last game for the teams.

With a number of key players out of action with injuries, particularly from the offensive backfield, the already player-short Lynx could not match the firepower of the Wildcats. The Lynx played most of the game without their starting tailback, minus their starting fullback and with their first string quarterback greatly slowed by a previous injury. The Lynx ace rushing back, Julio Vasquez, tried to come back and play with an injured knee suffered two weeks ago against Canadian.

Vasquez gave it a spirited try, but on his first carry from scrimmage, Julio received another hard knock to his injured leg, and was forced to sit out the remainder of the game.

With a patchwork offense bearing little semblance to the Angry Purple lineup of earlier in the season, the Lynx could generate little yardage against a fired up River Road team that recorded only its second win of the season.

The Lynx battled, but could only come up with 107 yards in total offense. The Wildcats almost completely shut down the injury-hobbled Lynx running game, allowing Spearman just 32 yards on the ground.

Despite the Canadian game injury that still hampers his movements, Spearman Lynx quarterback Ross Donahue did pass for 75 yards, completing nine of 23 throws, most of them to his favorite target, swift split end Mac McLain. But even this most effective part of the Lynx attack was tempered by the 'Cat secondary that picked off four passes.

In all the Lynx turned the ball over to River Road six times as Spearman also lost the ball twice via fumbles.

Still, the hustling Lynx defense kept the Spearman team in the game until halftime, and the Wildcats were only able to take a 12-0 lead off the field at the mid-game break.

The third quarter was a disaster for Spearman as the Wildcats wore the wear "bench-thin" Lynx down with frequent substitutions and rolled to 20 unanswered points.

The Lynx defense tightened up again in the fourth quarter and shutout the River Road squad the rest of the way, but the frustrated Spearman offense could not stoke up

enough fire to score. The last quarter ended in a 0-0 stalemate, leaving the final score 38-0.

River Road got on the scoreboard first in the first quarter when Aurelio Campos capped a drive with a one-yard run. A running try for extra points failed.

Campos was the Lynx number one tormentor as he rushed for 138 yards, including two more touchdowns in the first quarter and also tossed a 10-yard touchdown pass to Rodney Stovall. Joe Wilson scored the last Wildcat TD on a one yard carry, and Mike Carter booted a couple of PATs.

Gutless Government

Most Americans probably agree with Congressman Robert Michel (R-Ill) in his disappointment over congressional behavior this year.

The Republican leader of the lower legislative body in Congress says that in a non-election year there should be a drive to pass badly needed legislation--such as a law to begin to control U.S. borders and check the flood of Hispanics into the country.

Yet House Speaker Tip O'Neill, a Massachusetts Democrat, recently axed a long-awaited immigration reform and control bill because of pressure from Hispanics, almost all of whom are Catholic Democratic, like O'Neill; the suspicion has to be that potential votes have predominated over the national interest.

Reducing the federal deficit has gotten scarcely any House attention. The majority in the House won't cut spending further, even with a \$200 billion deficit. An aide to Cong. Michel concluded that Congress this year is "gutless government," a non-election year and still nothing much is being done. Most Americans would agree.

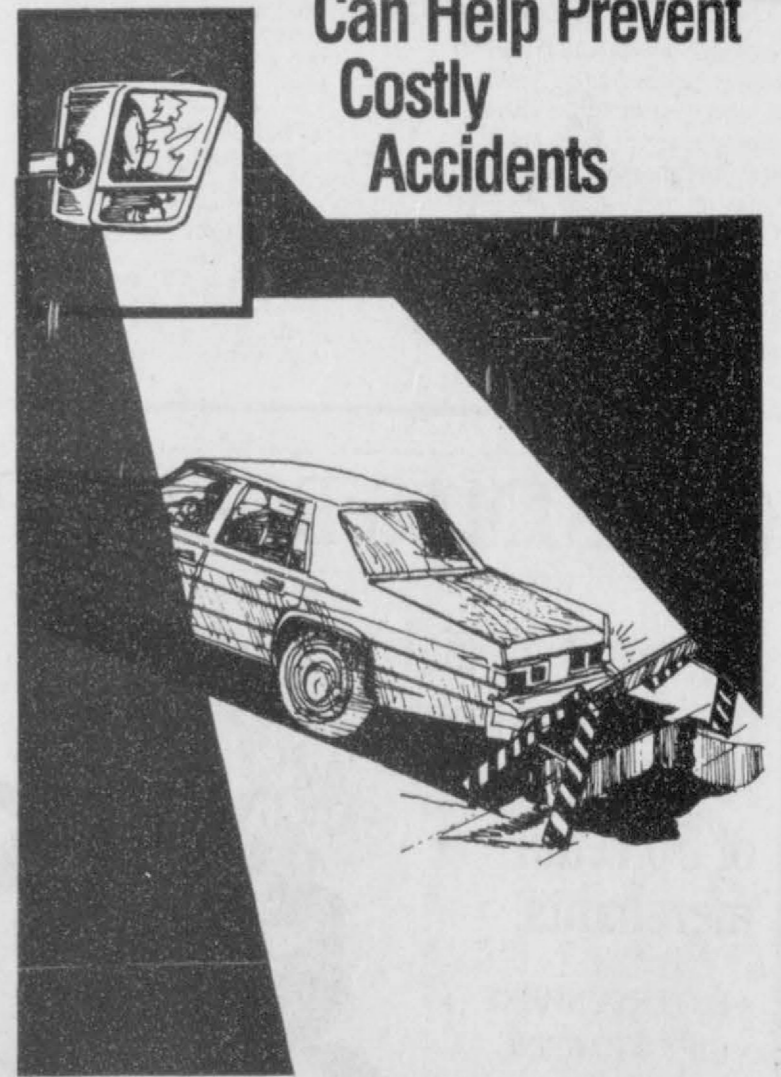

JV drops heartbreaker in last 9 seconds

The Spearman Lynx Junior Varsity and the junior high's teams will try to get back in the winning groove after hard-fought losses last Thursday as they wind down their respective seasons against Perryton teams.

The JV travels to Perryton seeking "revenge" against the powerful, undefeated Ranger JV that beat them 39-6 earlier in the season. Game time is 6 p.m.

Meanwhile, also on Thursday, the seventh and eighth grade teams will host their Perryton counterparts. Game times are 5 and 6:30 p.m.

In Thursday's JV game against River Road here, the Lynx JV dominated play throughout the game—except for two big Wildcat JV plays—until the last nine seconds of play when the River Road team scored the decisive touchdown.

The Lynx JV scored first in the first quarter when Monty Morris slanted off tackle for six yards and a TD to cap a 55-yard march, a drive sparked by the running of Morris, Brian Davis and Michael Lopez.

Morris also took a quick pitch, got a clearing block from Timmy Willis, and dashed around end for a two point conversion and an 8-0 Spearman lead.

The two teams played a defensive standoff until some four minutes were left in the fourth quarter. Desperately trying to get back into the game, the Wildcat JV'ers pulled a wingback reverse and galloped 75 yards for a TD. But on the running try for PAT to tie the score, David Herndon, Willis and other Lynx JV players teamed to stop the effort short to keep an 8-6 lead for Spearman.

The Lynx JV almost iced the game as they drove to a first down on the ensuing Spearman series and got a good punt that put River Road in a hole.

But with 1:55 left to play, the Wildcat JV went for more razzle dazzle, and completed a 40-yard halfback pass. From there they drove to a first and goal at the Spearman four, the big play after the pass being a 14 yard burst of tackle.

At the four the Lynx JV defense stiffened and held for two downs, but on third down and nine seconds left to play, the River Road quarterback drilled a pass to the wingback for a touchdown and for the first time all game, River Road led, 12-8. The Lynx rose up to stop the running try for PAT short, but could not score again in the nine seconds left.

Lynx JV Coach Gordon Lockett said the Spearman junior varsity "Played a good game, and lost a real tough one. We moved the ball well and generally beat them all over the field. And except for those two big plays—the reverse for a touchdown and the pass that set up a touchdown—we played real good defense."

The seventh grade Spearman team also lost a "heartbreaker" as they rallied for 24 points in the second half, but it was not quite enough and they lost to River Road 38-24.

The Wildcat seventh graders scored 32 of their 38 points in the first half, and appeared to be coasting toward an easy victory. But the Spearman seventh graders came out fired up in the second half, whittling away at the lead with a 24 point burst while holding River Road to six.

Matt Tucker barreled over for the Spearman seventh graders' first touchdown on a five-yard third quarter run, then blasted the line again for the two point conversion, making it 32-8, River Road. The

drive was highlighted by two long runs by Bob Cook, and a long run by James Garcia.

The second Spearman TD came on a sparkling 30 yard bootleg run by quarterback J. Garnett, and Keith Clark annexed two more points as he carried on an end reverse on the PAT attempt.

They duplicated their feats again in the fourth quarter as Garnett "bootlegged" for 20 yards and a TD, and Clark ran the end around over again for the two point conversion.

Coach Richard Trantham said the Spearman seventh graders "played a real good game against a tough team—the best team we've played this year."

The eighth graders also fought their way to a lead, and held it until the last three minutes of play, but the River Road eighth graders rallied for two TDs in the final three minutes for a 20-14 victory.

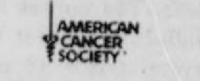

This select group of independents involved are of the opinion that they're entitled to produce the oil and that it's in the best interest of the royalty owners, mineral owners, cities, counties and all our people to do so.

I would like to make available to you, a spokesman for this group of independent oil producers. You no doubt have questions from time to time. I am associated with this group and am authorized to act as an intermediary with you in their behalf.

The independents have selected Ralph Blodgett of Spearman, Texas to be their official spokesman. Ralph is an independent oil producer who operates as B & B Farms at Spearman and is most knowledgeable about the business and the role played by our independent producers. He can be contacted during the day at 806-659-2551 and at 806-659-2364 at night.

I would be most happy to arrange interviews for you. Should Ralph not be available at some time, there are two other persons, both of which are part of this small oil producer's group and the operating their own respective oil and gas production

companies. We would welcome the opportunity to present the point of view of this select independent producers group.

My phone number is 859-355-4104. That phone rings at both my office, my home, and the answering service. I spend a considerable amount of time during the daylight hours Monday through Friday in the oil producing counties of the Panhandle, but am home most every night. The answering service will know my location at all times. I carry a pocket pager while in Amarillo and work on both Saturday and Sunday. Please feel free to contact me at any time, day or night, seven days a week.

We feel it's most important that the people be presented both sides of the dispute since the question involves several BILLION dollars over the life of the field in which production may, or may not, take place.

In your defense, we also are very much aware that it may have been no small problem for you in the past to have been able to identify the independents involved. Having been in the news business myself for many years, I found it was most difficult to present both sides of an issue if it wasn't possible to locate a spokesman from the other side. I will make that spokesman available to you.

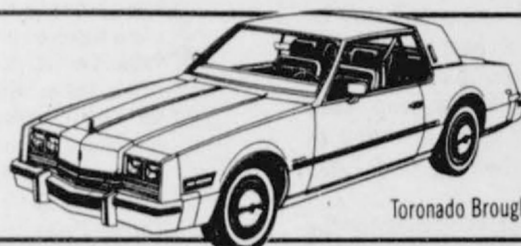
