Where does all the money go? You'll never have a good answer to this question, or a grasp of your family finances unless you have a method for keeping financial records.

Keeping good records may not be the most desirable task, but it is a necessary one for effective money management.

Record-keeping should be a cooperative effort among all members of the household, although the person best qualified should assume major responsibility for the task.

The first step is to organize a work space, which includes a table surface and adequate facilities for storing records.

Then you will need to develop a workable recordkeeping system. This is simply a procedure for forecasting expected income, estimating money you need, making spending plans, keeping a record of how money was used and reviewing family money management.

Develop a system to get started, but don't feel like you're locked into it. It's better to make changes in your system that not to abandon it because it's too difficult to follow.

Here are the home economist's suggestions for starting a basic family record-keeping system:

Keep all cash register tapes and receipts for bills paid in one

place—like a box or drawer—until they can be filed or recorded in a monthly record keeping book. Be sure that each tape or receipt identifies the amount of money spent and what it was spent for.

Have each family member record the money they spend and its use, then give it to the person who is keeping the monthly bills.

Decide who will pay the bills and record the spending plans and expenditures. Also decide whether the recording will be done weekly, every two weeks or monthly.

Set a specific time, like once a month, for a family council to evaluate goals, spending plans and record of how money was used and to make spending plans for the next month.

It's important that accurate records and plans are kept for all money, otherwise, you can't spot leaks and improvements in your family financial situation.

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Notice to Moped Owners

Moped operators must have a Moped operators license.

Operators of mopeds must have an operators license and obey the traffic laws the same as drivers of automobiles. The operator must be at least 15 years old. To obtain a moped operators license the driver must have successfully completed a written examination concerning traffic laws applicable to mopeds.

The operator if under 18 must wear a helmet. If over 18 the operator does not have to wear a helmet. A passenger must wear a helmet at all times regardless of age this also applies to motorcycle passengers. Not more than one passenger is permitted.

Mopeds must display a valid inspection sticker and valid license plate on the rear of the moped.

Remember: Moped drivers must obey the traffic laws.

Owners of mopeds must have liability insurance. Also they must have proof of the insurance with them when riding the mopeds.

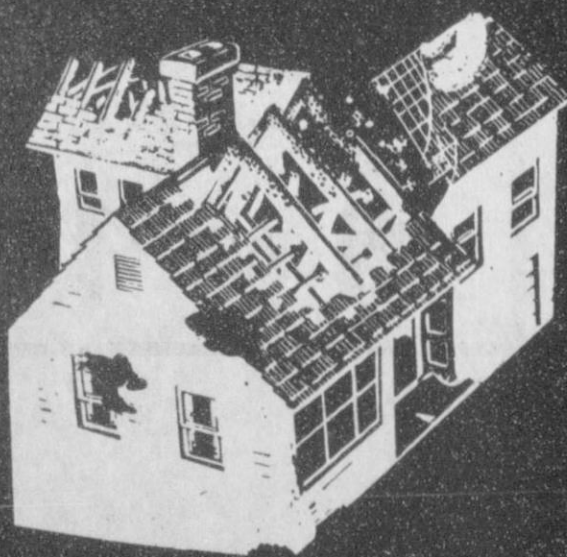
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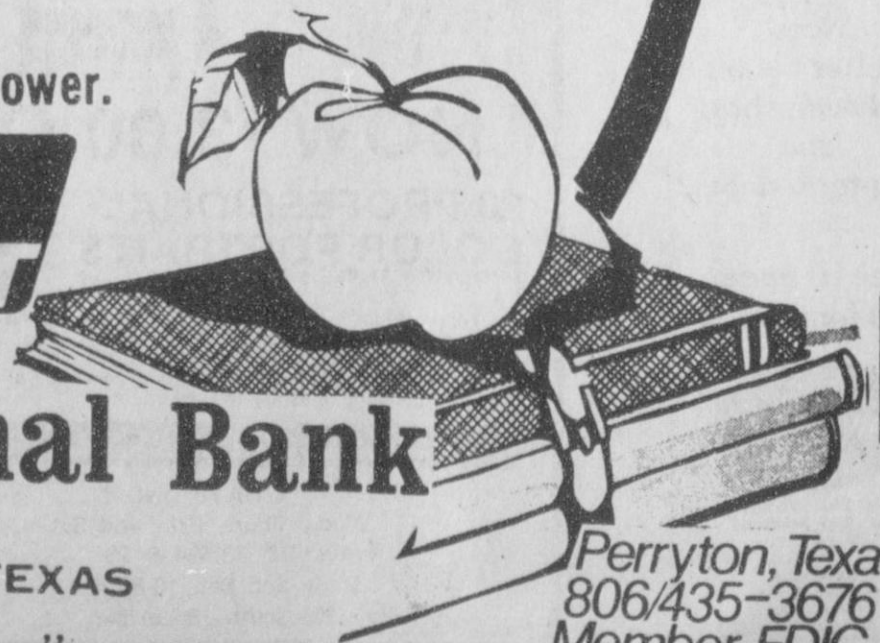

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Supt. gives report on new law

We have discussed extracurricular activities, report cards and grade reporting, social promotions and driver education in previous articles. All of these have been brought about by H.B. 72.

This time we will consider Tutorial Services and Student Absences. These are two very important areas to students and parents.

A student that fails any course may be required to attend the tutorial programs.

"Student absences" involves a very critical area. This part of the law says that a student will not pass a class if the student has more than five unexcused absences. Excused absences are principally, personal (student) sickness, sickness or death in the

immediate family, quarantine and road conditions.

The excused absence must be requested in writing by the parent or guardian and presented to the principal.

The law speaks to these two areas as follows:

Section 21.103. Tutorial Services. (a) Each school district shall provide tutorial services at the district's schools.

(b) A district may require a student whose grade in a subject for a grade reporting period is lower than 70 on a scale of 100 to attend tutorials in the subject during the following reporting period twice per week or more as determined by the district.

(c) A district is not required to provide transportation for stu-

dents attending tutorials.

Beginning September 1, each school district must provide tutorial programs on each campus at least twice a week. Sessions shall be a minimum of 45 minutes and may be provided during or in addition to the instructional day. The tutorials may not be in place of subjects or courses required under the provisions of 19 TAC Chapter 75 Curriculum. Attendance at such tutorials is voluntary for students during the first six weeks reporting period.

Beginning with the second six weeks reporting period, districts may require students who score lower than 70 in a subject to attend the tutorials.

Tutorials shall be provided in the subjects of English language

arts, mathematics, science, and social studies, for grades K-12.

Tutorials sessions must be under the supervision of an appropriately certified teacher for each subject, but peers and para-professionals may assist.

ABSENCES

Section 21.041. (a) A student may not be given credit for a class if the student has more than five days of unexcused absence during a semester.

(b) In this section "unexcused absence" means an absence not excused under Section 21.035 of this code.

Each Board of Trustees shall adopt a policy that defines an unexcused absence under the provisions of Section 21.035 Texas Education Code.

Palo Duro Dam Project

The Palo Duro River Authority is pushing right ahead with plans for a dam in Hansford county where eventually it is expected that a body of water will be impounded which will provide water for the municipalities of Perryton, Spearman, Gruver, Dumas and perhaps others. In addition, this lake will provide a close source of recreation in the form of boating, fishing and camping. It is a project that has been in the making for many years and while it has been killed to all intent and purposes from time to time it keeps surfacing and is now very much alive. Johnny Lee resigned as Hansford county judge to take over the job as executive director of the Palo Duro River Authority. At the time this seemed like a gamble, because he was trading a sure job as county judge for one that was financed only by Hansford county at the time.

But Johnny Lee is a persistent fellow, and an optimistic one. He has kept on working to get the Palo Duro dam project off the ground and in this era of water conservation measures, believes that it can be built with local tax money rather than wait an indefinite period for the federal government to do it. The U.S. Corps of Engineers has done studies on the proposed lake site and the government has spent some money in preliminary work for this dam which would be smaller than Lake Meredith or Lake Optima but still a sizeable body of water. In the beginning the lake was promoted as a source for irrigation water but it soon became obvious that farmers could not afford what they would have to pay for water from this source. Cities in the area, if their inhabitants got thirsty enough, would be glad to pay whatever it took.

This week the Ochiltree county commissioners court approved a resolution which would put the matter of a maintenance tax to the voters of Ochiltree county, the proceeds being used to finance the ongoing studies and planning for the dam. The vote, when it comes, is expected to ask approval of a 2 cent per \$100 levy on all taxable property in Ochiltree county for this purpose. Now, a levy of two cents seems pretty small, indeed, but when you compute this on the basis of the \$781,000,000 taxable values on the county tax roll it comes to a tidy annual sum of \$156,200 which should be enough to support the office, especially if Hansford and Moore counties come in for their share of the support.

A number of local persons are pushing for the Palo Duro dam in the conviction that an area never has too much water supply and that the time to dam up the Palo Duro creek is now instead of waiting until the future is upon us. Other supporters see this as a fine place for recreation and would like to take advantage of it before they get too old to enjoy it. In its past history it was assumed that the dam would be built by local tax money and the estimated cost was \$7 million. Now the cost is estimated at \$50 million and this is not based on specific cost studies as yet. After the \$7 million cost was deemed too expensive by local taxpayers, efforts were renewed to get the federal government to build it and the project was placed in the hopper from whence come the annual "pork barrel" appropriations. It never was approved but of course may be some day.

In its beginning, enthusiasm for the Palo Duro dam project was high but it cooled off when local property owners realized that they would have to pay for its cost. It is different to wish you

had a dam that is given to you and quite another thing to want a dam badly enough to pay for it for the next 50 years with a tax on your property. So the opponents of the dam mounted a campaign to get rid of it. Gene Steed, at that time county judge of Ochiltree county, was perhaps the toughest opponent of the Palo Duro project and succeeded in getting Ochiltree county disassociated from it. Later he went to the trouble of going to Austin and getting the original enabling legislation wiped from the statute books. Promoters of the dam had to start over when the issue was resurrected.

Back when the Palo Duro dam was presented, the Perryton city council faced the question of whether or not to enter into a long term contract, agreeing to take water from the dam at a specified price, in order for the bonds to be issued with which to build it. At that time the council members did not feel that they could do this because other studies had shown that sources of underground water for the foreseeable future could deliver water to the Perryton water system at lower cost and indeed water rights had been secured toward this goal. The present city council, while not going so far as to become legally obligated for Palo Duro water, has indicated that they would approve an election to see if city residents wanted to get into the project.

It has been a dream of many years on the part of many people that there would one day be a magnificent lake some nine miles northeast of Spearman where the waters of the Palo Duro creek would form a body of water suitable for recreation and for drinking. But projects such as this are not built in a day and it takes years and years of planning and promotion to get it accomplished. The Optima dam project was some 40 years in the making and it finally came into being when the federal government put the money in it to build the dam and pay for its maintenance. The Palo Duro dam project has no such assurance and the best bet seems to be to build it with money from local tax rolls, with some assistance from the state water funds.

Supporters of the Palo Duro project do not take kindly to criticism of it, feeling that critics are not progressive and can't see into the future. On the other hand, there are plenty who would like to have such a lake but want to know exactly what it will cost, and more especially what it will cost them, in order to have it. When it comes down to buying a lake, supporters of the Palo Duro dam project will have a selling job to do. It won't be built for nothing.

Johnny Lee's predecessor on this Palo Duro River Authority job tended to paint too many glowing pictures and was much too optimistic about the federal government's role in the project. He managed to make a pretty good living talking about it but was not able to translate much of this talk into action. Johnny Lee has been much more creditable and while it is no doubt true that he wants to carve out for himself a secure job as director of the authority, he has made progress and no doubt the Palo Duro dam project is about as close to reality now as it has ever been. The people of Ochiltree county will have some say about its future when the time comes for them to vote whether or not to support it with their tax money.

Judge Roy L. McClellan speaker for Rotary on new D.W.I. laws. At the noon meeting of the Spearman Rotary the Honorable Judge Roy L. McClellan discussed the new D.W.I. (Driving while Intoxicated) law.

One problem with those who drink an alcoholic beverage is that they can't tell where they are in their usage. The person drinking may believe they are sober while actually they are drunk and will probably cause an accident because of their inability to drive a vehicle properly.

The penalties are: First offense: confinement in jail for not less than 72 hours or more than two years and a fine of not less than \$100 or more than \$2,000.

Second offense: confinement in jail for not less than 15 days or more than two years and a fine of not less than \$300 or more than \$2,000.

Third offense: a fine of not less than \$500 or more than \$2,000 and confinement in jail for not less than 30 days or more than two years by imprisonment in the state penitentiary for not less than 60 days or more than five years.

If a person is stopped for being intoxicated and refuses to give a sample of breath, blood, urine or other bodily substance, as requested by a peace officer, after a hearing the persons drivers license may be automatically suspended or if he doesn't have a drivers license he will be denied one for 90 days whether or not he is prosecuted.

A owner of an automobile may be fined up to \$200 for knowingly or intentionally permitting another person to use their motor-vehicle knowing that the driver's license of the other person has been suspended for conviction of D.W.I. or as a result of the failure to give a specimen.
