Career Day set for SHS

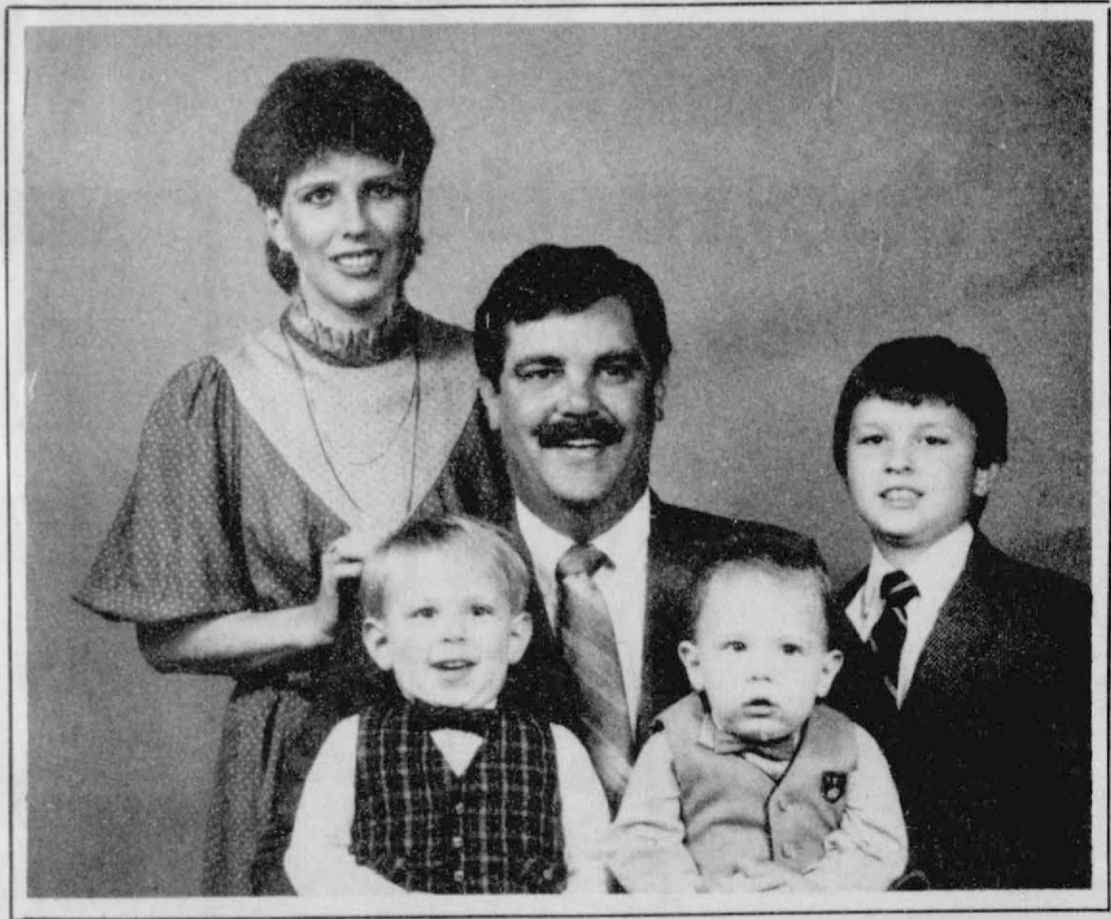

Cancer Crusade underway

In announcing the appointment, Mrs. Patsy Hunt, President of the Society's Hansford Unit said, "Under the dynamic leadership of Georgia Holt, this year's Crusade should be one of our most successful campaigns ever!"

Volunteers of the Hansford Unit of the American Cancer Society will be waging an all-out door-to-door battle against cancer during the April C-Days, April 2 through April 14th, according to Mrs. Holt.

"This year, our more than seventy volunteers in Hansford County, will be carrying

information on the two most common and deadly forms of cancer," Georgia stated.

A folder offering a "Quick Test on Cancer Risks for Lung, Colon, and Rectum" will be handed out to all residents. "This short test may help save some lives right here in our Hansford County. The test helps people find out how lifestyle, medical history, and health habits could affect their risk of getting lung and colorectal cancer."

C-Days in our Country will also provide an opportunity for people to contribute toward the support of the Society's year-round cancer control program which includes research, public and professional education and patient services and rehabilitation.

Last year, a total of \$11,203, was raised in our Hansford

County which included the 1983 Crusade returns, Memorials, and the monies gained from the raffling of the beautiful oil painting contributed by Mrs. Clarence (Marilyn) Yanke during the Hansford Celebration.

In preparing for the 1984 Crusade, Chairman Holt feels it is important for the residents of Hansford County to realize ACS expenditures. "It is one part of the ACS of which we're most proud and I think our friends and neighbors will be more than willing to give to cancer control if they know how well their money is being spent," she said.

This 108 percent expenditure reflects increased research allocation to Texas by our National Society. 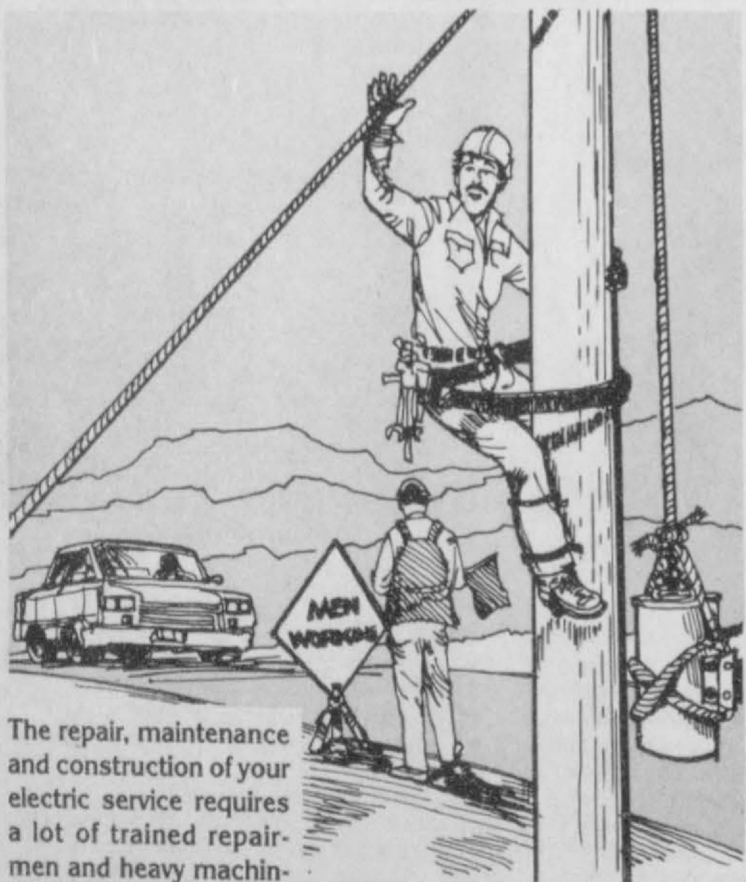

Together, heart disease, stroke and related disorders kill almost as many Americans as all other diseases combined. According to the American Heart Association, about 1.5 million people will experience a drastic medical heart emergency in 1984, and about a third of them will die.

Some of these people could probably be saved if they have emergency medical identification, or Medic Alert. The Medic Alert emblem bears the symbol of the medical profession and is recognized internationally. It includes a toll-free number for emergency personnel to call to get the wearer's medical records and name of person to be notified.

The whole idea of emergency medical identification is to protect the lives of people who are unable to speak for themselves.

In the hospital emergency room, or in your own living room, the physicians or paramedics need to know if there is something medically important about you that they can't see. Quick identification of "hidden" conditions, means faster treatment. This is especially true in the case of

heart attacks. Medic Alert lists ten heart problems in particular where wearing emergency medical identification has the highest life-saving potential:

- Taking Anticoagulants (Including Coumadin)
- Implanted Pacemaker
- Hypertension
- Taking Inderal
- Myocardial Infarction
- Angina Pectoris
- Taking Nitroglycerin
- Bypass Surgery
- Congestive Heart Failure
- Arrhythmia

Landowners may use productivity valuation

Is the land you own being used for agricultural purposes? If it is, then you may be eligible for tax relief on that property.

According to Mrs. Alice Peddy, chief appraiser of the Hansford County Appraisal District, landowners have the option of applying either for agricultural-use valuation or for open-space land valuation on their property.

Applications should be filed before May 1 this year for any property to receive agricultural, or for open-space land valuation on property that did not receive that type of appraisal in 1983. Applications received after May 1 and until the appraisal in 1983. Applications received penalty for late filing.

Two constitutional amendments permit taxation of land on its agricultural-use, or productivity, value, Mrs. Peddy said. "This

means that taxes would be assessed against the productive value of the land instead of what the land would sell for in the open market," she explained.

Mrs. Peddy noted that the legal basis for special land appraisal is found in the Texas Constitution in Art. VIII, Secs. 1-d and 1-d-1. The two types of land and valuation are commonly called "ag-use" or "1-d" and "open-space" or "1-d-1," the chief appraiser added.

"The requirements for application and for qualification of both the land and the owner are different," Mrs. Peddy said.

For 1-d ag use valuation, the owner must file an application with the chief appraiser each year. Some other requirements under this provision are that the land must be owned by a "natural person," not a

corporation, partnership, agency or organization; the land must have been devoted exclusively to agricultural business conducted on the land must be the owner's primary occupation and source of income.

Also, the chief appraiser must determine that the landowner qualifies and must approve the application, and the owner has to file a sworn statement each year he applies, attesting to the land's agricultural use.

For the other type of land valuation, 1-d-1 open-space, the land may be owned by an individual, corporation or partnership, and the agricultural business need not be the principal business of the owner. Agricultural and timber lands and ecological laboratories are eligible for 1-d-1 appraisal.

However, the land must be involved in a qualifying agricultural use to the degree of intensity generally accepted in the area; it must have been devoted principally to a qualifying use for at least five of the past seven years; and, again, the chief appraiser must approve the application.

Once an application for 1-d-1 valuation is filed with the chief appraiser and approved, a landowner is not required to submit another application as long as the land qualifies, unless the chief appraiser requests another application to confirm current qualification.

Mrs. Peddy also explained that the possibility for a "rollback tax" exists under either form of special land valuation. This liability for additional tax is created under 1-d

valuation by either sale of the land or a change in use of the land. It extends back to the three tax years prior to the year in which the change or sale occurs.

Under 1-d-1, a rollback is triggered by a change in use to a nonagricultural purpose that would not qualify for productivity valuation. Taxes are recaptured for the five years preceding the year of the change.

The additional tax is measured, Mrs. Peddy said, by the difference between taxes paid under productivity valuation provisions and the taxes which would have been paid if the land had been put on the tax roll at market value.

Mrs. Peddy noted that persons whose agricultural lands are located in more than one county must apply for productivity valuation with each

county's appraisal district. Failure to do so could result in one or more taxing units taxing the property on its full market value.

More information and application forms are available from the local appraisal office. Personnel there will be able to assist landowners with the information necessary for determining if their property qualifies for the special valuation.

Crucial highways are aging

AMARILLO—"Transportation is as crucial to a society as blood circulation is the human body," claims the Texas Governor's 2000 Study.

"The society of the Texas Panhandle is no exception," quickly adds Amarillo District Engineer A.L. McKee of the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation (DHT).

"The mobility provided by the Amarillo area's efficient and complete transportation network has enabled this society to improve and maintain its quality of life."

"And yet, we are facing a rapid aging of the component roadways in our system," according to McKee.

The district engineer said that the average age of Interstate highways in Texas and the Panhandle is now over ten years. The average age of the area's Farm to Market Roads is nearly 20 years, with the average of the state's and the region's state and primary roads even older than that.

For instance, the first section of Interstate 40 in the Panhandle, a four-mile section west of Bushland, was completed and the highway opened to traffic twenty years ago this spring.

DHT records show U.S. 60, which was then State Highway 33, got its start back in 1918 in Randall County west of Canyon. The first construction of U.S. 87, then SH 9, also in Randall County, was completed a year later. Also in 1919, U.S. 83, formerly SH 4, was started in Hemphill County.

McKee explained that many city and county roads and streets "grow up" to become FM, State, U.S. and Interstate highways as cities' population counts increase requiring traffic facilities to accommodate that growth.

In 1949, the Texas legislature passed the Colson-Briscoe Act, which allocated \$15 million to the highway department from the state's general fund for construction of local

roads which would not develop sufficient traffic volumes for counties to pay for their construction and maintenance.

Consequently, the majority of the Panhandle's Farm and Ranch to Market Roads were constructed in the 1950s, getting numerous area farmers and ranchers out of the mud.

Forty years ago, the Interstate-highway system was actually initiated by the 78th U.S. Congress. Put on hold by World War II, the system was later given top priority by the Federal Aid Highway Act of 1956.

Interstate routes were located "...to connect by routes, as direct as practicable, the principal metropolitan areas, cities and industrial centers, to serve the national defense, and to connect at suitable border points with routes of continental importance in the Dominion of Canada and the Republic of Mexico."

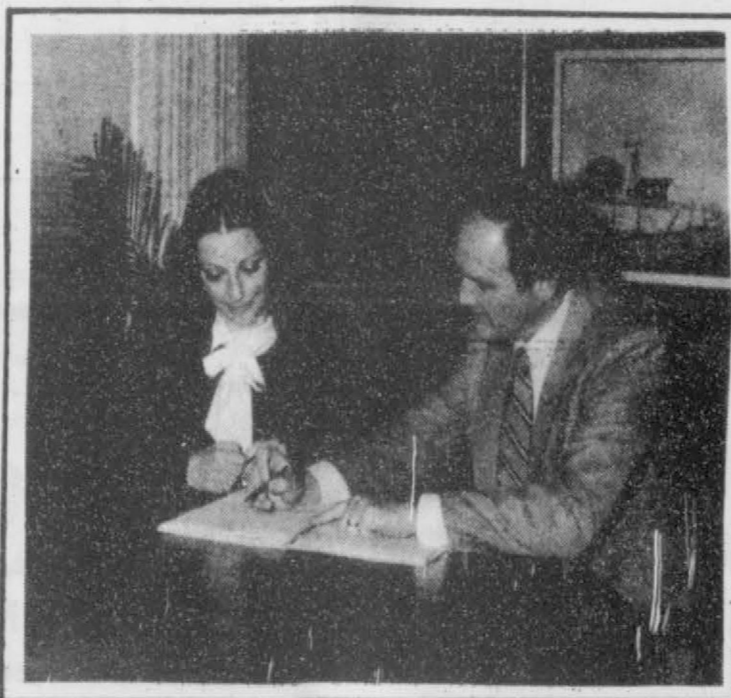
In the Panhandle, I-27 (also called the Canyon Expressway) grew from U.S. 60-87, construction of which was first underway in 1928. Official dedication of the Amarillo-Canyon Expressway was held on December 1, 1960. The rotary directional interchange where both I-27 and I-40 cross was opened to traffic in February 1966.

McKee said the 17-county Amarillo district today has some 9,100 lane miles of state-maintained highways valued at more than \$5 billion in today's dollars.

In the last decade, some \$77.5 million has been spent on maintaining the Amarillo district highways. McKee indicated that more dollars will need to be spent on those roadways in the future.

"Our first priority of business for the next 20 years will be the maintenance and preservation of the existing highway system," McKee said. "We are looking hard at ways in which the capital investment of this system can be saved."

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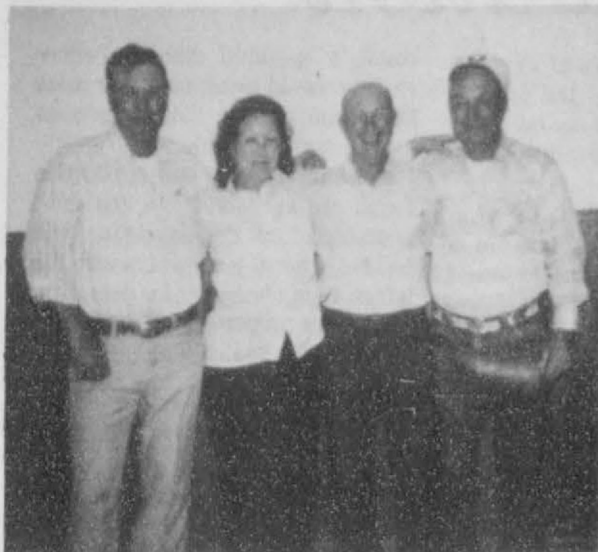

WASHINGTON, D.C. -- Golfers discouraged with their swing, or body movement, or stance, or anything, can find encouragement in Gary Koch.

He had been a very promising amateur and joined the pro golf circuit with high hopes in the seventies. He did his best but after a few promising finishes, was out of the money for six years.

At that point he was discouraged--as are so many golfers--and went back to his teacher, Peter Kostis. Kostis told him it would take a lot of hard work and perhaps a half year to straighten out his habits, to break the bad ones and learn anew.

Koch, a Tampa, listened and followed Kostis' directions. Kostis told him he would be playing poorly for a few months, as he

practiced his corrections. Koch believed him, followed the recommended routine. That was in 1981. In 1982 he had a good tournament at Pebble Beach.

In 1983 he won the Doral. This year he has already won two major tournaments--the latest being the Bay Hill Classic, where he had a closing round of 63, including eight birdies and no bogies.

Arnold Palmer called that round "an absolutely amazing performance." And with that victory Koch became the early-year leading money winner on the PGA tour this year.

If he keeps up the pace, Koch may be one of the new superstars. He is fighting hard to avoid complacency and make that happen.

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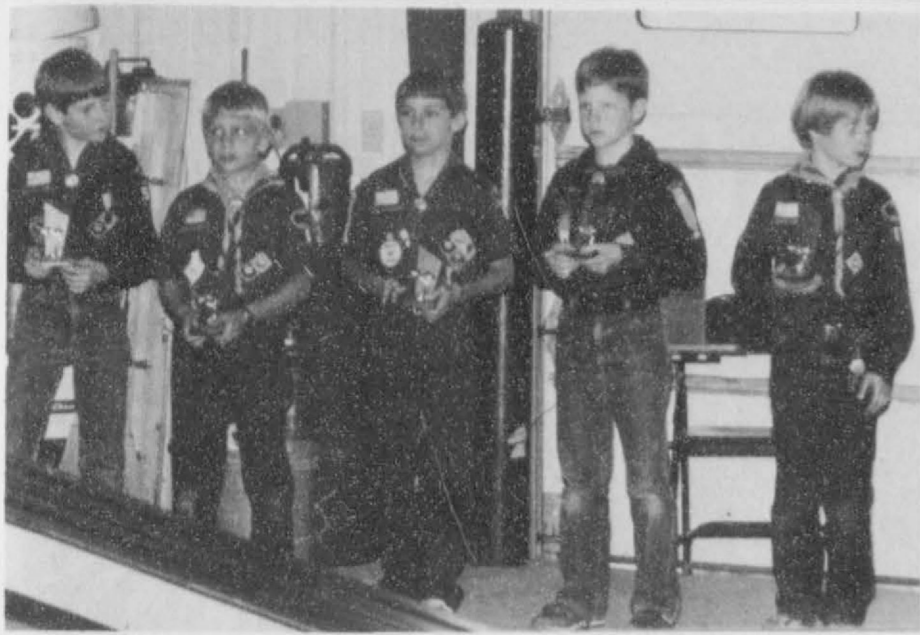

Amarillo doctors freeze all fees

The Amarillo Diagnostic Clinic is freezing physician's fees retroactive from March 7, 1984. According to Richard Burns, Administrator, this action was taken by the Professional Staff of the Diagnostic Clinic in cooperation with the American Medical Association in an effort to curb ever-rising medical costs. Current prices for direct physician charges will remain in effect through March 7, 1985. However, they believe the medical community should take a leadership role to control this inflation and that this can be done most effectively through voluntary action.

NEWS REPORT FROM WASHINGTON

The Reagan Team - In Disarray - Meese, Shultz - Feldstein, Weinberger -

WASHINGTON, D.C.-- As November's elections approach to within six months, the disarray of the Reagan Administration seems nearing a three-year peak.

This is bad news for the president. Some aides believe he must use a strong hand to discipline his team. But when disagreements occur among Cabinet officials who don't fear a return to private life, how is Reagan to discipline them?

The Edwin Meese controversy is the latest of many personnel problems, which if not cleared, could compromise Mr. Reagan's up-to-now, fine reelection chances.

Meese's confirmation as attorney general is now very doubtful. He may not have--and probably didn't--do anything intentionally illegal. But his judgment about personal loans and federal jobs is certainly suspect--and disapproved of by millions.

Secretary of State George Shultz has not been a success at State. His Middle East ventures have proven naive; in his eagerness to demonstrate to Israel he is not less favorable than predecessors, he

went too far. The Lebanon debacle is a result.

Secretary of Defense Caspar Weinberger is said to have told close friends Shultz should resign.

Martin Feldstein, the president's chief economic advisor, has long been out of harness. His views may be correct; only the economy's future will answer that question.

But the fact that he and Treasury Secretary Donald Regan are openly at odds, adds to the picture of an administration whose top officials are in disarray. (Of course, Regan may be proved correct.)

The president has been struggling most of the year to reach an agreement with his own party's leaders in Congress on the question of reducing the federal deficit.

The fragile compromise recently worked out is unlikely to be totally accepted by the Democrat-controlled House. Mr. Reagan will probably have to compromise a bit more--or face November with the deficit badly out of control.

Note: A major plus for the administration is said being secretly sought in the way of an arms control agreement. The administration might need it by November.
