# **Attention Parents!**



#### **Circuit Riders**

Hansford County Methodist, who will be observing the Bicentennial of Methodism in America with a 6:30 P.M. Camp Meeting, Sunday, July 1, have a heritage dating from December 1784.

It was in that year that John Wesley sent Dr. Thomas Coke to the Unted State to organize the Methodists in this country. Dr. Coke met with Francis Asbury on 14 November and they agreed to call a conference of the preachers to meet Christmas Eve in Baltimore. Sixty three of the eighty Methodist preachers in the United States gathered in Lovely Lane Chapel in Baltimore (then only ten years old) at ten o'clock in the morning 24 December.

The preachers who attended the conference were young--most of them in their twenties. Thomas Coke was thirty-seven and Francis Asbury was thirty-nine. They voted that day to establish the Methodist Epicsopal Church.

When the Christmas Conference was over, the preachers returned to their appointments. They and their successors did their work well for within seventyfive years Methodism was the number one Protestant denomination in the country.

The Camp Meeting was used for three generations by these the Methodist ancestors. From 1790

to 1810 Camp Meetings were widely held in frontier areas. People came to a site in wagons with families bringing their own provisions and staying for days and sometimes weeks. Crude pulpits were erected and services were held several times a day. The Camp Meeting was a great factor in the spread of the Methodist Church.

The heros of early United Methodisim in this country were the circuit rider preachers. They did not stay long in one place and their home was their horse as they traveled from community to community. At the Christmas conference in 1784, the annual salary approved for the preachers was sixty-four dollars. No minister made more than any other. In 1800, the salary was raised to eighty dollars per year "and their traveling expenses." A horse usually cost a year's salary, but it was necessary for a circuit rider.

'Tis now time for present day Methodists to honor these first American Methodists and to realize the wonderful heritage which is now ours to enjoy. Be sure you are in attendance at the Hansford County Methodist Camp Meeting at 6:30 P.M. Sunday, 1st July at the site of Old Hansford to enjoy a review of the past and a prevue of the future for Methodists everywhere

Activities such as walking over a 300 ft. deep canyon on a wire rope--then dropping, with a safety rope attached, to the bottom of


the canyon certainly caught the attention of the Rotarians.



### **Two-Bit Sermons**

Many of the Bible's smaller books are passed by. The book of Philemon is one of these books. It is a very small book containing only 25 verses. There is much to learn from Philemon, and we will look at some of it.

Our writer is the apostle Paul. Paul is the writer of 14 books of The New Testament. He also being the greatest evangelist of His day bore more physical suffering and knew what he was speaking of in this letter. The letter was written to Philemon on behalf of Onesimus, a run away slave.

To Philemon, Paul was thankful for Him. Philemon's character had reached Paul. Paul mentioned his love and faith toward our Savior, Jesus Christ. He was gracious to all the saints that came his way. These traits are what all Christians should desire to be found in their lives today.

Now Paul comes to the body of his letter, the plea for Onesimus. As a run away slave, Onesimus

faced a bleak future, maybe death, Onesimus Paul states, "I have begotten in my bonds'' had gotten saved. Verses 11-12 In times past Onesimus was a rebellious slave now would prove to be very profitable if allowed to return. Paul stated that Onesimus would be valuable unto his ministry also. Verses 13-16 Paul teaches that although Onesimus would be valuable to Him he knew that his rightful place was with his master and at

Paul's request he returned willingly to Philemon. Verses 17-22 Several important thoughts are put forth here. If you are going to be a partner you must treat him as Paul did. We must be willing to forget and forgive the past of the new converts to Christ. We must be willing to help the new saved people get to their place of Service. We need to be able to have confidence in the obedience of our brothers in Christ.

There are many more principles and values that space will not allow to be told. Read Philemon and see how this small book speaks to you.

Fresh lemon juice is a favorit for adding "zip" to salad dressings, vegetables and seafoods. Lemon juice freezes well. Keep handy by freezing measured amounts in individual ice cubes. Store frozen cubes in plastic bags, thaw and use as needed.



# Protection against declining crop prices?

Soon-to-be traded options on agricultural commodity futures contracts will offer a solution to a dilemma as old as farming itself-the dilemma of how to obtain protection against declining crop prices without giving up the opportunity to profit from rising crop prices. Options can do exactly that.

Or if you happen to be a livestock feeder and are concerned that feed costs may rise in the months ahead, you can purchase options for protections and still benefit from a decrease in the market price of feed.

Used in either of these ways, options provide what amounts to price "insurance" against adverse price changes.

The successful use of options begins with an understanding of how to use them. And those farmers who understand them first and best will clearly enjoy a competitive advantage.

Options trading isn't new. As long ago as the latter part of the nineteenth century there was trading in a form of agricultural options known as "privileges." At that time, however, there were no competitive, regulated markets for the options and no modern clearing organizations to protect the buyers and sellers. This led Congress in 1936 to impose a ban on further trading in options on domestic agricultural commodities--a ban which remained in effect until 1982. Removal of the ban was strongly urged by the Commodity Futures Trading Commission (CFTC), farm organizations and others. "Today's Farmer," the CFTC told Congress, "faces unprecedented economic uncertainties and needs every risk management tool that ingenuity can devise."

I predict that AG Options trading will outpace futures trading many times over. It's really going to be a tremendous market. a boon to those who shied away from the futures because of limit moves and margin calls. Options will essentially eliminate these inherent risks associated with futures trading.

An option--whether it's an option to buy or sell property or an option to buy or sell futures contract -- is exactly what the term suggests: It's a choice. It's an agreement between two parties which gives one party the right, but not the obligation, to buy whatever it is that the option allows to be bought, or sell whatever it is that the option allows to be sold.

It should be noted that calls and puts are two separate contracts.





The bride's chosen colors of pink and white were carried out on the serving table. The table was covered with a lace cloth




