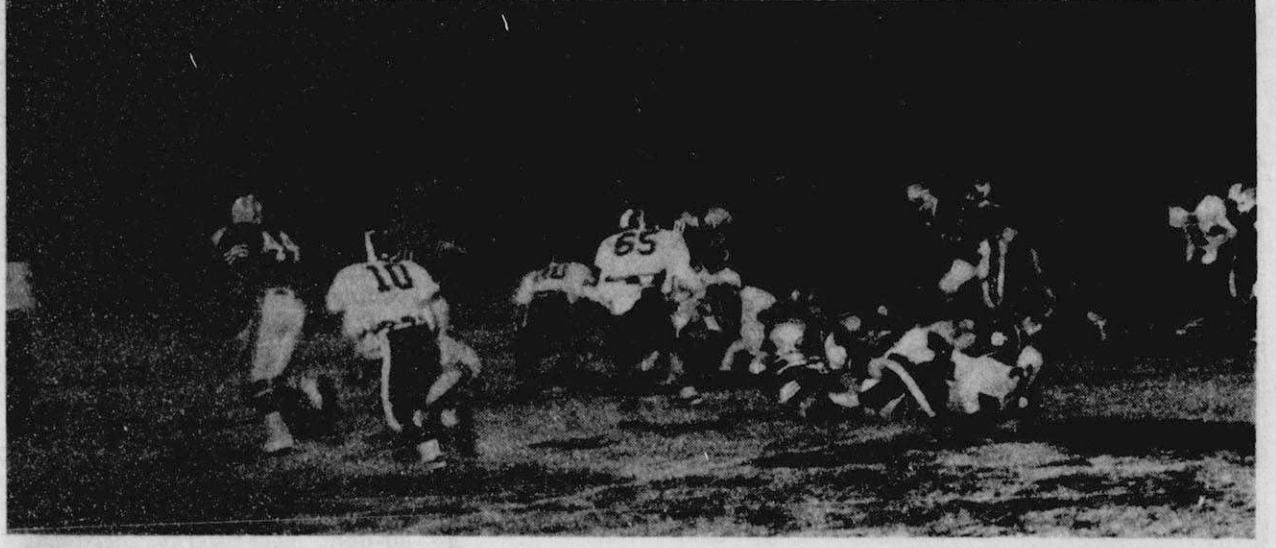
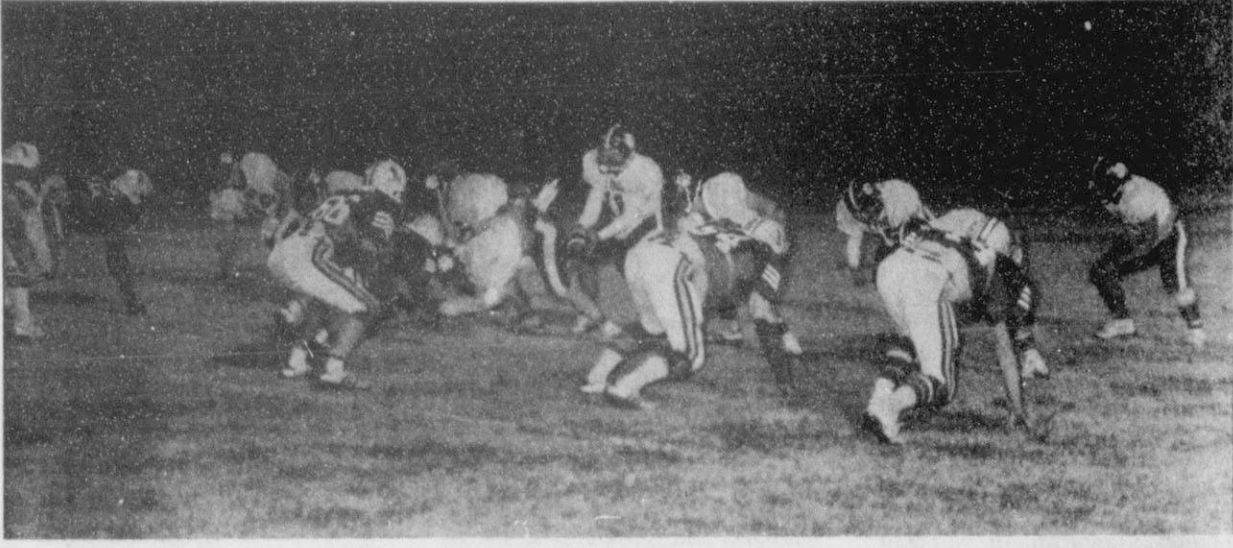

Deer Season opens Friday at Canadian



The Spearman Lynx "Cooked" the fine Fritch Eagles at Fritch Friday night, 29-7 before 1500 cold windblown fans. The win enabled the Lynx to share the District 1AA championship with the Panhandle Panthers. Although Spearman beat Fritch 29-7 and Fritch beat Panhandle 9-0 they were declared co-champions with the Panthers.

This Friday night at Canadian Spearman will meet the fantastic White Deer Bucks. The game will be rated a toss-up according to most fans. Weather will have some effect on the outcome of the game however as heavy snow or

rain could impair the aerial attack of "Ross the boss" and his receiver "Big Mack McLain."

The Spearman Lynx lost to White Deer 7-6 in the opening game of the year. White Deer is an excellent ball team and the Lynx will not enter the conflict overconfident. The Lynx will have an all new offense and defense for White Deer. With four outstanding backs, Donahue, Cook, Lopez, Morris reaching maturity the Lynx have their first real offensive threat of the year.

THINK AHEAD WHEN STORING TURKEY LEFTOVERS

Some families enjoy leftover turkey from Thanksgiving. In fact, some like the leftovers better than the holiday meal itself!

The key to using leftovers effectively is to plan ahead when packaging.

If your family prefers turkey sandwiches and creamed turkey dishes, you can freeze the leftovers in slices and small pieces. If possible, cover the slices and pieces with broth or gravy to prevent contact with air. This also lengthens storage life. Package in air-tight, meal-sized packages or containers and freeze quickly.

Frozen turkey doesn't improve with age, and it doesn't retain good eating quality for as long as some other meats.

If you're going to freeze turkey, remember this storage guide: one month for slices or pieces, six months for slices or pieces covered with broth or gravy and six months for turkey casserole dishes.

Tasty casseroles can be prepared by combining cubed turkey with vegetables, sauce, seasonings, cooked spaghetti, macaroni, noodles or converted rice. Regular rice and potatoes become mushy after freezing.

Prepare the turkey casserole, cool it quickly and place it in a meal-sized freezing container. Cover tightly with moisture-vapor resistant wrap and freeze immediately.

By planning for leftovers, you can spread the enjoyment of turkey over a longer period of time and save food preparation time later during the busy holiday season.

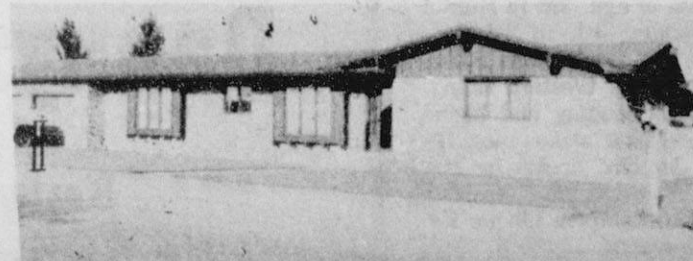

Girlstown needs financial help

Girlstown USA's Borger campus needs help-at least \$165,000 worth-by Nov. 30.

The rejuvenating facility four miles east of Borger hopes to build a \$1,016,000 residential treatment center as part of its revamped program, but there's a catch.

The Mabee Foundation of Tulsa, Okla., has offered Girlstown a \$399,000 challenge grant, but the Borger center first must come up with a total of \$667,078, by Nov. 30, Director Don Myers said Friday.

Myers said a Pampa woman has donated a \$288,000 section of land to Girlstown, but the center needs to sell that and apply the cash toward its \$677,000 goal.

"We need to sell that land. It would be a tremendous jump for us if we could do that," Myers said. "My work's cut out for me."

"But from what I've seen, there's enough interest in Girlstown and what's going on here that I feel we'll accomplish it," Myers said.

He said the residential treatment center for which the money is needed is a major part of the restructuring of Girlstown's operation.

For the past 17 years, he said, the Borger campus has operated as a basic child care institution with a licensed capacity of 25 girls.

Girls who suffered from abuse or neglect, whose parents were unable to care for them or who were simply unwanted were taken to the Girlstown campus.

But only nine to 15 girls, ages 5-17, were usually in residence at the campus, and the Girlstown Board of directors concluded that the facility wasn't reaching its full use potential, Myers said.

So last year, he said, the decision was reached to convert Girlstown to a residential treatment center.

The "new" Girlstown will help teenaged girls who are runaways, who have suffered family abuse or have become victims to alcoholism or drug dependence, Myers said.

"You wouldn't believe how many teenager alcoholics there are," he signed.

Girls who enter the Borger campus will not be there for a number of years, as had sometimes been the case in the past.

The new entrants, who will range from 12 to 18 years old and mostly be residents of the Panhandle, will in many cases remain there only six months to a year, Myers said.

"It will be more short term. We expect them to stay about six months to a year. It won't be a situation where they come and grow up here," Myers

said.

He explained that whereas the present Girlstown staff consists of five members (a counselor, an administrator and three dorm mothers), the new staff will number about 23 and will consist of psychologists, psychiatrists, psychiatric social workers and other specially-trained personnel.

The staff members will work with girls to solve their problems so they can assume a normal, useful role in society, he said.

The center will have a 30-girl capacity and already has three times that many referrals, Myers said.

"We're also going to increase our budget from \$100,000 to \$500,000, so we feel we're going to contribute back into the community as far as the economy goes," he said.

The presently-existing buildings will be used as a staff residence, a vocational training center and a campus school office center, Myers said.

The \$1 million building Girlstown hopes to get would serve as a dormitory, a cafeteria and a recreation facility.

Which brings back the money issue.

"This is a very important stage for the facility," Myers said. "More and more kids are becoming involved in drug and alcohol abuse, just with the tensions in family living the way it is."

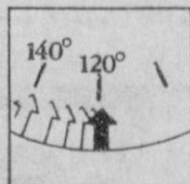

FmHA loan reviews

Reviews will begin November 19, 1984 of Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) loan accounts to see which farmers in Hansford County need and will qualify for a one-time set aside of part of their loan, Larry Goetze (Assistant County Supervisor) said today.

FmHA has been authorized to set aside up to 25% -- to a maximum \$200,000.00 -- of the debt owed the agency for farmers who are experiencing severe financial difficulty, if the set aside will help achieve a positive cash flow for the borrower.

"We will begin scheduling appointments for our borrowers to review their accounts, determine if they need special assistance and see if we can make that assistance available," Goetze said.

"Not every borrower will qualify for the set aside, but there might be some other way to help, such as consolidation or re-scheduling of existing loans. We will look at all alternatives."

Goetze said all accounts will be reviewed. There are some exceptions, such as accounts in bankruptcy or foreclosure or those determined able to graduate to other sources of credit.

Dr. David McClellan recertified to ABFP board

Dr. David A. McClellan of Spearman, Texas, has been recertified as a diplomate of the American Board of Family Practice (ABFP) as a result of passing a recertification examination offered by the ABFP. The physician thus maintains specialist status in the medical specialty of family practice.

ABFP diplomates must continue to show proof of competence in the field of comprehensive, continuing care of the family by being recertified every six years. Family

practice was the first medical specialty to require diplomates to be recertified on a continuing basis.

The written examination is designed to prove the candidate's continuing competence in the basic components of family practice--internal medicine, surgery, obstetrics and gynecology, pediatrics, psychiatry and neurology, and community medicine.

To qualify for certification initially a physician must have successfully completed three

years of residency training in family practice and passed an intensive certification examination. There are some 385 residency training programs in teaching hospitals and university medical centers across the United States.

There now have been certified more than 29,000 diplomates in the specialty. Most are members of the American Academy of Family Physicians, the national association of family doctors. The Academy was the first national

medical group to require members to take continuing study, and was chiefly responsible for securing specialty status for family practice.

Governor Urges Cut In Teacher Paperwork By Governor Mark White

AUSTIN—Enthusiasm is growing among educators for the new emphasis on academics and other educational reforms adopted by the Texas Legislature and implemented this fall in school districts across the state.

But while classroom teachers tell me they support the reform program, they express concern that increased paperwork is infringing on the time they can devote to teaching and preparing lessons.

The goal of House Bill 72 is to recapture the school day for academics, not for filling out forms.

How can any teacher be expected to do a quality job if he or she is not allowed the time to work with students? How can we expect teachers to meet students' needs during the work day and then spend their evenings completing

forms or filling out excessive lesson plan requirements?

I have posed these questions in a letter mailed to the members of the newly appointed State Board of Education, asking the board and the Texas Education Agency to address this problem as soon as possible.

The education reform bill adopted this summer contains specific language instructing the board and TEA to make every effort to require no additional paperwork from local school districts, but instead to substitute any new information needed for previous reporting requirements.

This same attention to the needs of school districts should also be paid to the needs of teachers. It is imperative that we alleviate the undue burden of excessive paperwork.

Any investigation of this problem inevitably leads to a review of House Bill 246 passed in 1981. That bill was an attempt to get curriculum writing out of the Legislature and into the hands of professional educators.

That law is quite short but the guidelines it generated are extensive. Even though comprehensive guidelines are necessary, it should not be necessary to require experienced and professionally trained teachers to fill out form after form to document the basic elements in their daily lessons. The essential elements should be documented in curriculum guides, not in daily lesson plans.

I know that the members of the State Board of Education share my concern, and I am confident that they will make it their top pri-

ority to resolve this legitimate complaint of teachers throughout Texas.

Our children deserve their teachers' undivided attention, and our teachers deserve an opportunity to do what they were hired to do—teach their subject areas.

Food stamps

allotment to increase

The 1.3 million Texans participating in the Food Stamp program will receive increased benefits beginning November 1, it was announced today by Martin Dukler, Deputy Commissioner for Programs of the Texas Department of Human Resources.

Dukler said the increase in food stamp allotments will average about \$3 a month for a four-person household. Allotments vary with size of households and family income.

Authority to increase the allotments is contained in a joint Congressional resolution passed October 12, 1984, and signed the

same day by President Reagan.

The increase will provide an additional \$12,000,000 in benefits to Texans annually, Dukler said. The food stamp program is funded by the U.S. Department of Agriculture and administered by the various states.

Forty-two outstanding members of 4-H Clubs in 20 Panhandle counties were honored here Saturday night with the coveted Gold Star Award. And the youths were challenged by Dallam County Attorney Ron Enns, himself a former Gold Star winner, to view their honor as a responsibility to continue using their leadership abilities to help others.

Joining the youths at the awards banquet in the cafeteria at

West Texas State University were parents, government officials, Extension leaders, fellow 4-H'ers, educators and other community leaders.

Honored from Hansford County were Stephanie Friemel, daughter of Mr. & Mrs. Kenneth Friemel of Spearman and Karla Latta, daughter of Dr. & Mrs. Tom Latta of Spearman.

Enns told the 4-H'ers, parents

and friends that his own 4-H experience has played a major part in his life. "If it wasn't for 4-H, I wouldn't be here tonight," he said.

"Four-H taught me that short, ugly people with freckles can stand up in front of people and do something," he said, explaining that as a short, freckled boy, he had learned confidence and skills from his 4-H activity.

"A lot of you think your 4-H career is almost over, but it's not," he told the youths. He said their actions and examples are always being watched by younger 4-H'ers and others in their communities.

"You're not just getting an honor, you're getting a responsibility. That responsibility is to take this leadership home and do something with it," he challenged.

Enns told the audience there are many types of leaders. He urged the youths to be the type of leaders who do things because they want to help others, not the "glory seekers" who do things for what they get from their actions.

And he urged the boys and girls to disdain mediocrity. "There is a lot of pressure right now to be 'average', to not do any more than you have to. If everybody was average, there wouldn't be any Gold Star banquets, because no one would be outstanding. There would be no fine universities, because no one would go. There would be no advances, no new ideas."

And he cautioned the young leaders that even though they might do something better than it had ever been done before, their effort would still be mediocre unless it was their own best effort.

Master of ceremonies was Bobby Martin, president, district council, Carson County. Guests were welcomed by Tommy Weems of the Deaf Smith Electric Cooperative, one of six electric cooperatives which sponsor the banquet annually. The others are Rita Blanca, North Plains, Swisher, Greenbelt and Lighthouse.

The awards were presented by Mrs. Sue Farris and Paul Gross, district Extension directors.

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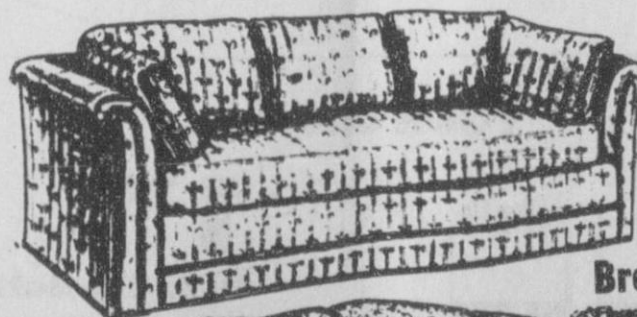

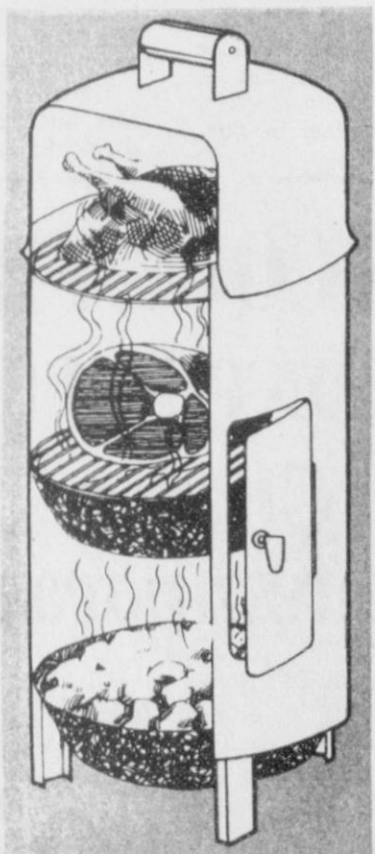
