District Showdown at Fritch Friday

The Spearman Lynx, with help from the Stinnett Rattlers, vaulted into a first place tie Friday night by thundering past the Sunray Bobcats, 21-6. The sun went down on Sunray as Ross Donahue ran for a three yard touchdown and passed to McLain for a 39 yard TD. However, the game was a struggle with Sunray taking a 6-0 lead in the first quarter. Tricky Ricky Lopez ran 12 yards in the 2nd quarter to tie the score at 6-6.

Last week in the Stinnett ballgame, Kevin Bynum made a block enabling Ricky Lopez to score the winning touchdown. Ironically enough, it was Kevin Bynum who cleared the way for Ricky's touchdown in the Sunray game. It was, however, a team effort. Sunray opened the scoring on a two yard run in the first quarter. Lopez scored for Spearman on a 12 yard run. The Lynx scored a touchdown on a 39 yard pass from Ross Donahue to Mack McLain in the 3rd quarter. Donahue added another TD on a 3 yard run in the 3rd quarter. Donahue passed to Bob Cook for a 2 point pat. Final score Spearman 21, Sunray 6.

Fans were treated to an outstanding half time show by 100 Spearman band members. The band lined up on the sideline in front of the Spearman fans. The percussions marched to the center of the field and turned around facing the Lynx stands. The remainder of the band marched out on the field and turned about, facing the Spearman stands. The announcer then announced "Ladies and gentlemen, for your further halftime enjoyment, we present the Spearman Lynx bands in a combined setting, featuring the High School and Junior High Bands. The 100 plus members will be performing "Ace in the Hole" by Ken Karris."

After their stellar performance of "Ace in the Hole," the band marched off of the field playing the Lynx "Fight Song."

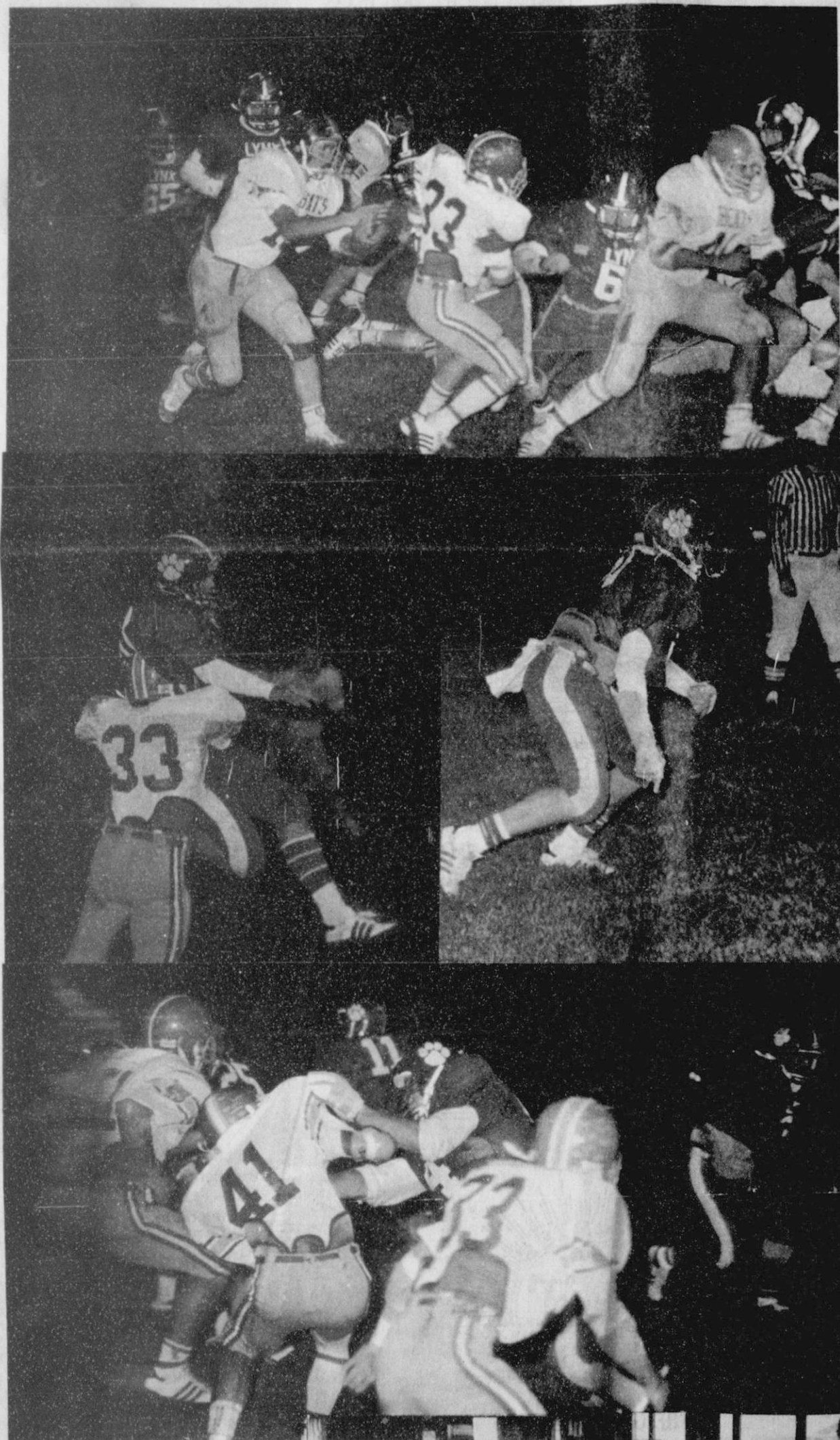
If the Lynx get in the playoffs, all playoff games will be played on neutral fields probably.

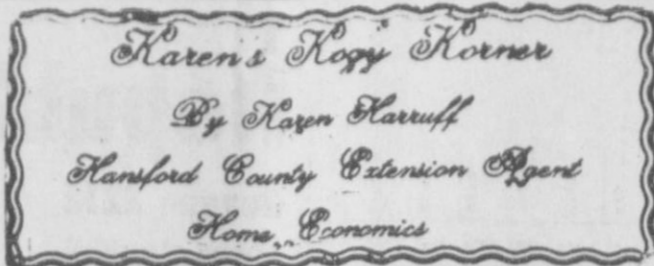

Consumers can use their microwave ovens to restore a fresh taste to week-old milk without affecting its nutritional value.

Researchers at Cornell University have tested microwave heating as a way to kill the souring bacteria that develop in stored milk. Their tests show that a two-minute treatment at 2450 MHz reduces the bacteria in a cup of 10-day old milk to the level present in fresh milk.

Milk "goes bad" long before it is actually unsafe to drink. One study has shown that over 40 percent of 10-day-old milk samples rated poor because they have a fruity, fermented and rancid off-flavor.

One of the main causes of deteriorating quality is psychotropic bacteria which lead to stale, bitter or sour flavors as milk is stored. Milk becomes contaminated with these bacteria during handling, so the pasteurization process which improves the quality of fresh milk cannot prevent the development of these off-flavors.

But microwave heating of pasteurized milk when it is eight to eleven days old reduces the contaminating bacteria and the

off-taste as well.

One advantage of microwave heating is that it uses fairly low temperatures, so the milk is not left with a "boiled" taste. Most importantly, microwave heating does not destroy any of the important nutrients in milk.

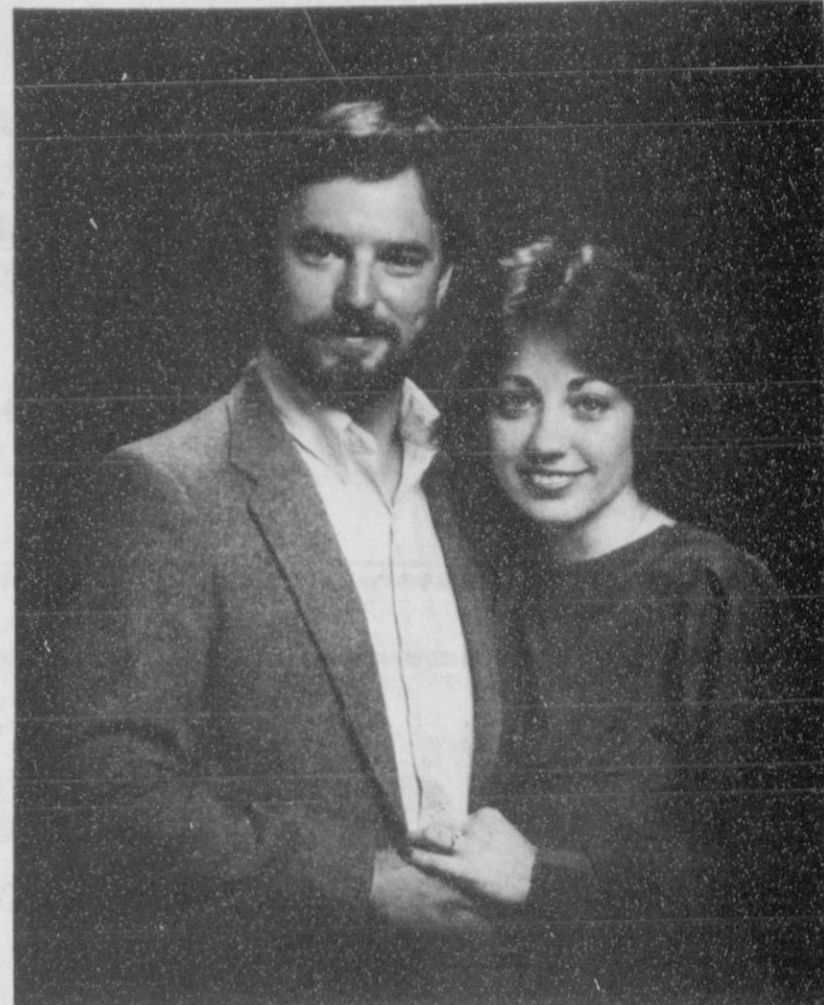
The microwave treatment is most effective on store-bought milk that is about eight days old, or two to three days before the "pull date" marked on the carton.

Milk can be kept in its original paper or plastic carton for microwaving. Heating the milk to 60 degrees C or 140 degrees F at 2450 MHz would preserve it up to 21 days, or double the average shelf life.

Most microwave ovens run at a frequency of 2450 MHz, but consumers should check the oven manual to make sure.

"Miss Kitty" chairman for 1984 Smokeout

[*"Something hot for something hot," she says.*]

The American Cancer Society announced today that television actress Amanda Blake, renowned for her role as Miss Kitty in "Gunsmoke," will serve as honorary chairman of the 1984 Great American Smokeout in Texas.

Claiming she'd rather see a gun smoke any day before seeing a friend or loved one do the same thing, the celebrated Austin resident will be asking Texas smokers to give up their cigarettes for just one day--November 15.

A former smoker, Miss Blake quit smoking eight years ago. "I smoked two packs a day for twenty years and quit cold turkey," she said. "But of course, mouth cancer is a strong incentive to give up cigarettes."

Amanda Blake was diagnosed as having cancer of the mouth in 1976. After undergoing surgery, she is completely free of the disease today.

The annual Smokeout, now in its eighth year, is sponsored by the ACS nationwide to good-naturedly encouraged smokers to give up their cigarettes for just one day--if only to prove to themselves they can.

A survey conducted by the Gallup organization last year indicated that almost 36 percent of the 52 million American smokers tried to quit for the day. Eight percent made it the full 24 hours and about four percent were still not smoking one to 11 days later. According to Texas ACS volun-

teers planning the Smokeout, Miss Blake's involvement is particularly timely. "The ACS recently announced that lung cancer has exceeded breast cancer as the leading cause of cancer deaths among Texas women," said Russell Autry of El Paso, who is the volunteer spearheading the campaign in Texas. "We feel that with Miss Blake as our honorary chairman, we'll increase our chances of reaching this target group."

Last March, Miss Blake received the American Cancer Society's Courage Award from President Ronald Reagan in ceremonies at the White House. The award salutes her personal courage in her battle against cancer and cites the hope and inspiration she gives all Americans in the fight for life and health.

As Texas' honorary Smokeout chairman, she will be making appearances at rallies, parades and other Smokeout celebrations in several Texas cities.

A Day to go Smokeless

Smokeout

The cigarette habit is a tough one to break. But one day each year, smokers nation-wide can get lots of support when they toss away their packs and actually have fun while they do it!

The occasion is the American Cancer Society's Great American Smokeout—a day when all types of smokers, from those who know they want to quit to those who are just thinking about it—can give a try.

The big day takes many forms, with all the festivities designed to amuse and inform those trying to kick the habit.

Programs slated for 15 November 1984 which help smokers kick the habit include: "Adopt a Smoker," the "KWIT" line and "Breathing Easy." "Adopt a Smoker" allows a non-smoker to pick a special smoker and give him or her extra encouragement all day. "Adoption papers" are available at local ACS units.

The nation-wide "KWIT" line, 900/210-KWIT, is set up to offer minute long messages giving advice and inspiration based on personal experience to Smokeout quitters.

On the eve of this year's Smokeout, "Breathing Easy", a one-hour long variety show aimed at helping teenagers quit smoking, will be aired on PBS television stations across the country.

Last year more than one in every three smokers in the United States (36%) participated in the Smokeout. Of these, over 8% did not smoke all day, and over 4% reported that they were not smoking one to 11 days later.

Just this year, the U.S. Surgeon General C. Everett Koop has challenged us to make America a "smoke-free society by the year 2000," says Larry Hagman, chairman of the Great American Smokeout. "A successful Smokeout can go a long way toward accomplishing that goal."

Mr Hagman, well-known for his role as J.R. Ewing on "Dallas" is serving as national Smokeout chairman for his fourth year.

Mike McLain named outstanding farmer

The Hansford Soil and Water Conservation District had several significant activities during the 1984 fiscal year. The highlight of the year was the Banker's Awards Banquet. This year Mike McLain was recognized as the Outstanding Conservation Farmer and Mrs. Gary Evans was the Outstanding Homemaker of the Year. Throughout the year the Soil Conservation Service assisted District Cooperators in applying many conservation practices. Tailwater recovery systems were installed to hold irrigation water runoff until it can be pumped back to the top of the field. This is very important for water conservation.

SCS personnel serviced 38 ASCS Agriculture Conservation Program Referrals of which 37 were for irrigation pipelines. 63,450 feet of pipeline were

installed to conserve water. High levels of irrigation water management were also done on approximately 50,000 acres of irrigated farmland.

Grassed waterways are designed to carry rainfall across the soil surface at a non-erosive rate. The channel is shaped and seeded to a permanent grass to prevent the soil from eroding. Waterways also have secondary uses such as livestock grazing, hay production and wildlife habitat. 10 acres of waterways were shaped and seeded this year.

The Hansford SWCD will be accepting orders for farmstead windbreak trees beginning in December. Trees will be ordered from Texas Forest Service and Colorado State Forest Service and delivered in March.

When the urge to smoke hits, take a deep breath. Hold it for ten seconds, then release it slowly. Taking deep rhythmic breaths is similar to smoking, only you'll inhale clean air, not poisonous gasses.

Exercise to relieve tension. Climb stairs rather than take the elevator; park your car a block or two from your destination and walk the rest of the way. At home, practice touching your toes, jog in place, do jumping jacks.

Reward yourself with oral substitutes in the same way you may have used cigarettes. Good examples: sugarless gum, lemon drops, pumpkin, or sunflower seed, apple slices, carrot sticks, unbuttered popcorn.

Eat three meals a day—this maintains constant blood sugar levels, thus preventing urges to smoke. Avoid sugar-laden goods and spicy items that can trigger a desire for cigarettes.

Long distance service interrupted

Long distance service was interrupted Thursday for most Oklahoma panhandle communities and several in Texas, (including Perryton, Spearman, Booker, Darrouzett, Follett, and Higgins), when General Telephone's computerized switch at Guymon experienced an electronic failure, according to Gerald Hamilton, General Manager.

"The computer failure began about 6:30 a.m. and began processing calls again at 3:45 p.m.," said Hamilton.

An electronic office is designed to detect problems or errors within the system and to take precautionary measures until the problem is corrected. The precautions can range from a simple alarm to tell technicians that a potential problem exists to the more severe measure where the complete system is made inoperative until the problem is corrected.

The service interruption yesterday was the result of the computer finding a fault in the electronic circuitry.

One feature of the new technology in electronic offices is protection of the system.

Once the computer recognizes a problem, several things can happen.

In more severe cases, the system has a redundancy feature which allows it to automatically switch to a backup system when a problem is encountered. Usually there is no interruption of service. However, in the case of more severe problems, the computer may shut down to keep from causing extensive damage to both the primary and backup systems. In rare circumstances, the problem may be such that it damages

both systems and causes a complete outage.

"The computer switch at Guymon is the newest 'state of the art' system available and is recognized for its dependability.

"A team of company and industry experts are currently testing the unit to determine the exact cause of failure and to ensure against future problems.

"We sincerely regret the disruption of service for our customers and appreciate their patience," Hamilton said,
