



Hollie Riley stopped by the Reporter early this week to get a copy of the Constitutional Amendments that we are voting on. A summary of the Amendments are printed on this week's front page.

Texans to vote on 8 amendments

The following amendments will be voted upon by Texas voters during the general election, Nov. 6. They have been prepared in the exact order in which they will appear on the ballot.

Proposition 1: "The constitutional amendment to provide state banks the same rights and privileges as national banks." (Page 182, Aug. 3, 1984, *Facts for You*.)

Proposition 2: "The constitutional amendment to create from general revenue a special higher education assistance fund for construction and related activities, to restructure the permanent university fund, and to increase the number of institutions eligible to benefit from the permanent university fund." (Page 193, Aug. 17, 1984, *Facts for You*.)

Proposition 3: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for payment of assistance for



the surviving dependent parents, brothers, and sisters of certain public servants killed while on duty." (Page 177, July 27, 1984, *Facts for You*.)

Proposition 4: "The constitutional amendment to abolish the office of county treasurer in Bexar and Collin counties." (Page 165, July 13, 1984, *Facts for You*.)

Proposition 5: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the state senate to fill a vacancy in the office of lieutenant governor." (Page 173, July 20, 1984, *Facts for You*.)

Proposition 6: "The constitutional amendment to permit use of public funds and credit for payment of premiums on certain insurance contracts of mutual insurance companies authorized to do business in Texas." (Page 177, July 27, 1984, *Facts for You*.)

Proposition 7: "The constitutional amendment relating to the membership

of the State Commission on Judicial Conduct and the authority and procedure to discipline active judges, certain retired and former judges, and certain masters and magistrates of the courts." (Page 199, Aug. 24, 1984, *Facts for You*.)

Proposition 8: "The constitutional amendment to provide a per diem for members of the legislature equal to the maximum daily amount allowed by federal law as a deduction for ordinary and necessary business expenses incurred by a state legislator." (Page 190, Aug. 10, 1984, *Facts for You*.)

One-sentence descriptions of proposed constitutional amendments are by necessity incomplete, and can be misleading. Additional information on each of the proposed amendments above is available, on request, from the Texas Farm Bureau Department of Research and Education.

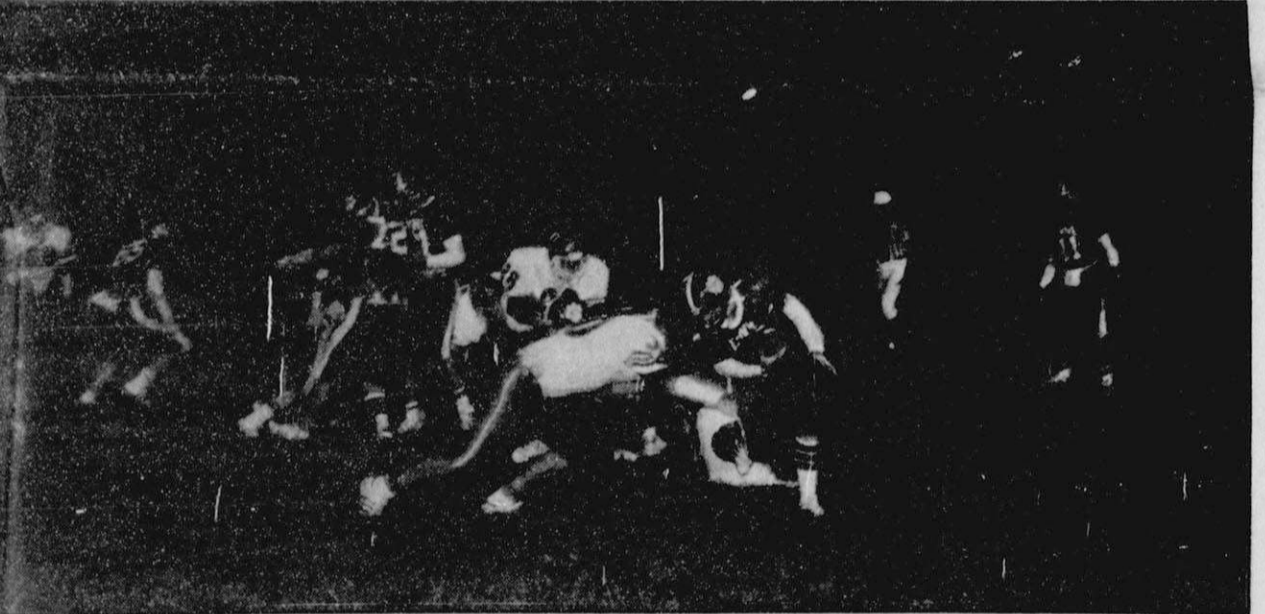

The vehicle hit a Bronco, Sheriff

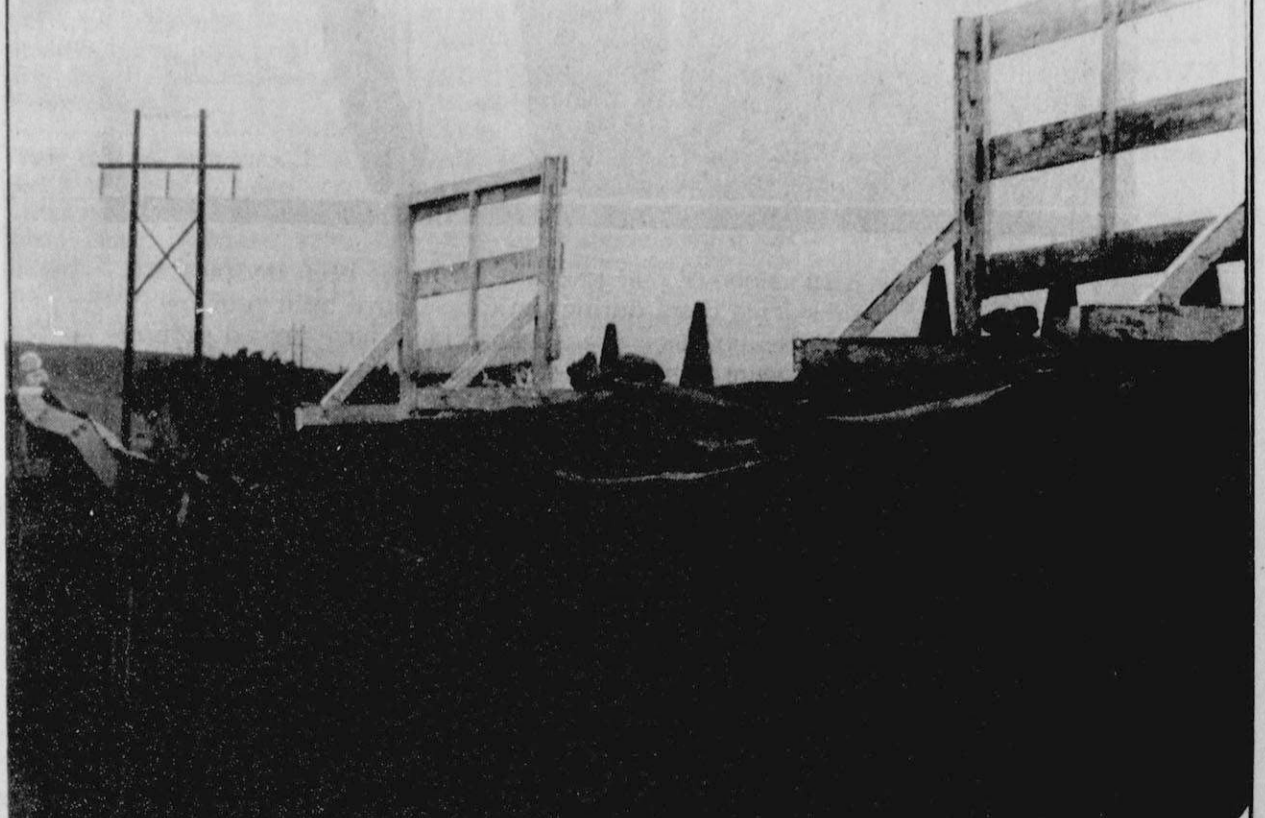
McFarlin's car, and an El Camino before crashing into the front of the bank.

Bridge wrecked at Hansford

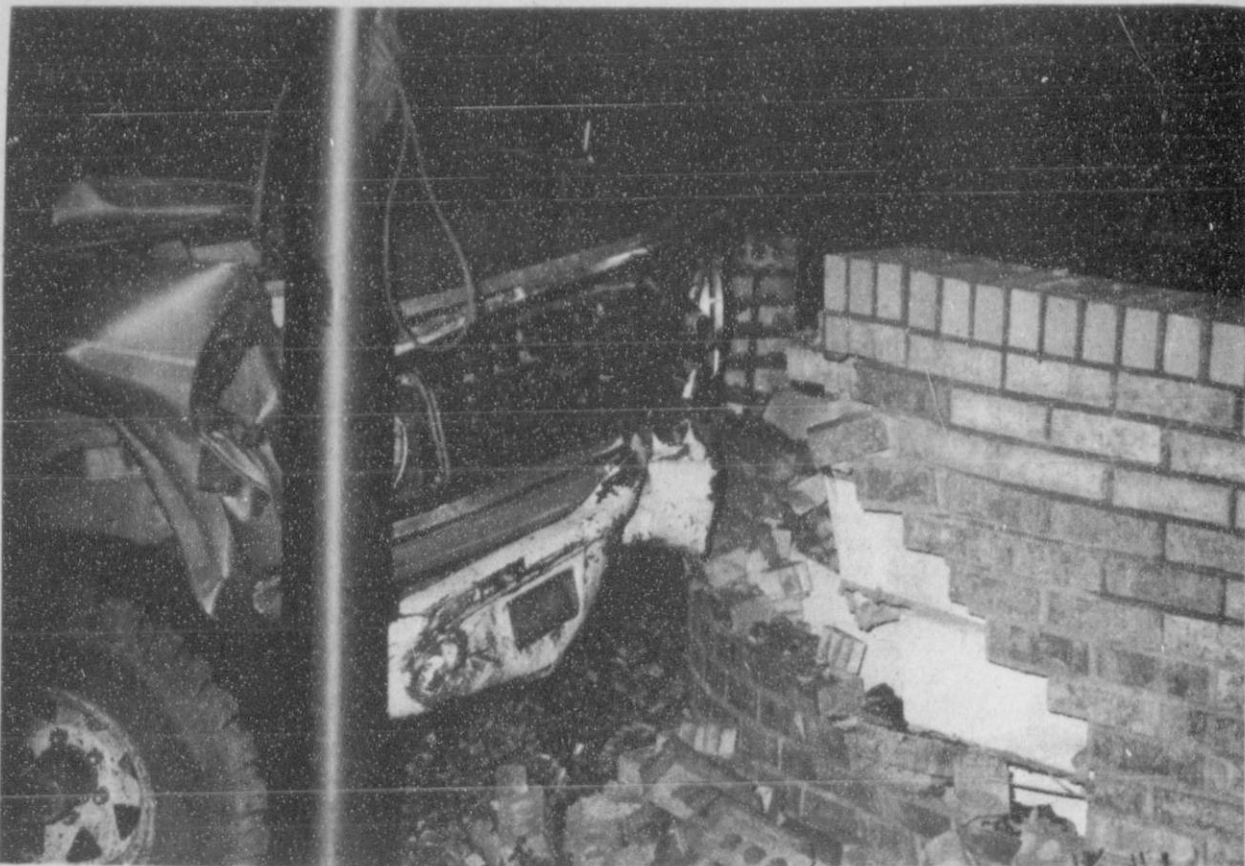


Gus McLain was driving a semi-truck filled with wheat which crashed through the guard rail at the Old Hansford Bridge Friday night at 8:00

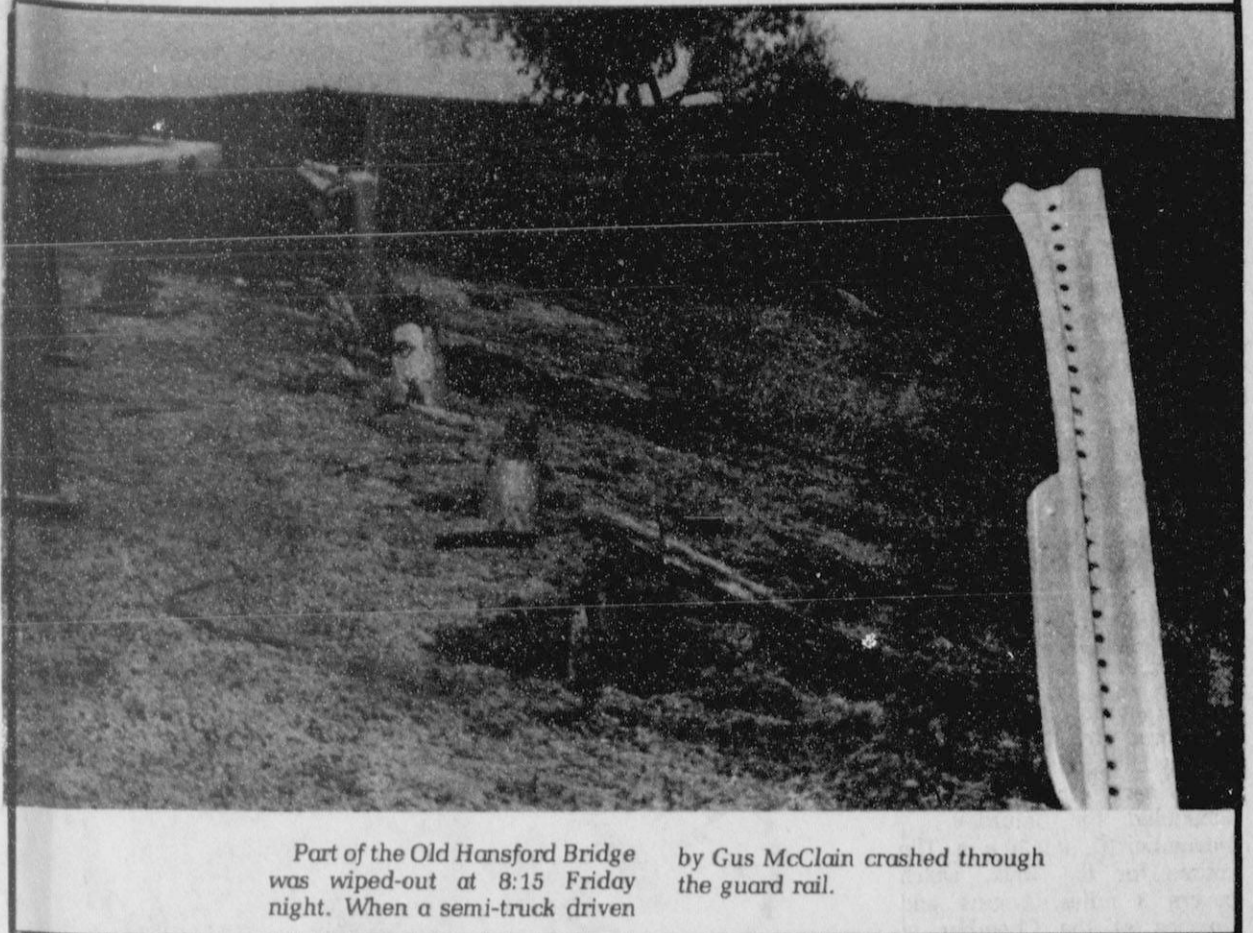

Child safety seat recycling

As Texas citizens prepare to comply with the new child safety seat law which becomes effective October 31, they should resist the option of getting seats from garage sales because of potential safety problems, according to George R. Gustafson, Executive Vice President of Texas Safety Association.

"Of course, recycling child safety seats in a systematic fashion such as in the hospital-based and other established loan-

er programs is a good use of resources. Buying a seat at a garage sale, however, can involve too many unknown facts about the condition of the seat," he said.

Missing information and missing straps or other parts can be a significant safety concern.

"One of the safety concerns of buying used seats is not knowing whether the seat has been through a crash. In some cases it may be difficult for the layperson

to determine whether a seat has sustained structural damage in an impact. The best practice is to retire with honor any child safety seat which has been through a crash. In fact many loaner programs, including the one operated by Texas Safety Association, require participants to return a seat that has been in a crash so that it can be exchanged. This practice just ensures added protection for these young riders," said Gustafson.

Federally approved child safety seats are required to show the date of manufacture and required to include manufacturer's instructions. The current crash standard was implemented in January, 1981, so the consumer should look for seats manufactured on or after the date.

"A person who is unfamiliar with child safety seat design and who does not have manufacturer's instructions available may not recognize when parts of a seat are missing," he said.

Mistaking a common household infant carrier or household booster seat for a safety seat device or booster device made for motor vehicles is another danger of buying an article at a garage sale.

People who plan to recycle child safety seats among friends and family members need to keep in mind the need to retain all stickers and manufacturer's instructions and to maintain a vigilance on the condition of the seat so that the next parent or other adult can use the seat with assurance, said Gustafson.

The new law requires Texas residents to transport children up to age 2 years in a federally approved child safety seat and children 2 up to 4 years in a child safety seat or safety belt. Fines of \$25 or \$50 for noncompliance will be assessed beginning January 1, though the law takes effect October 31. The law provides for dismissal of a fine if the person shows proof of acquisition by purchase, loan, or rental within 10 days after the offense. The law applies to passenger cars and light trucks. Exempted are persons transporting children for hire and persons transporting a child in a vehicle in which all seating positions equipped with child passenger safety seat systems or safety belts are occupied.

"Clearly, this is a lifesaving law that can, along with continued education, secure for our youngest passengers safer rides," said Gustafson.

3,300 Absentee to open

Absentee voting for the November general election opens Wednesday and runs through November 2. With a record total of 3300 registered voters, this year's turnout of voters could be the highest in the county's history.

Along with the presidential and U.S. Senate stakes, county voters will find three other contested races on the ballot as well as eight proposed amendments to the Texas constitution.

The Mondale-Ferraro vs. Reagan-Bush item is the first on the ballot menu, with the U.S. Senate listing, Lloyd Doggett vs. Phil Gramm, second. Local voters also will decide on the 13th District's U.S. representative, two spots on the Texas Supreme Court,

and a judge of the criminal appeals. For U.S representative, incumbent Jack Hightower is being challenged by Republican Beau Boulder.

The official ballot, which measures an incredible 17 inches by 28 inches, also lists Independents Lyndon LaRouche-Billy M. Davis as seeking the presidency and vice presidency. They are the only Independent-third party candidates on the listing.

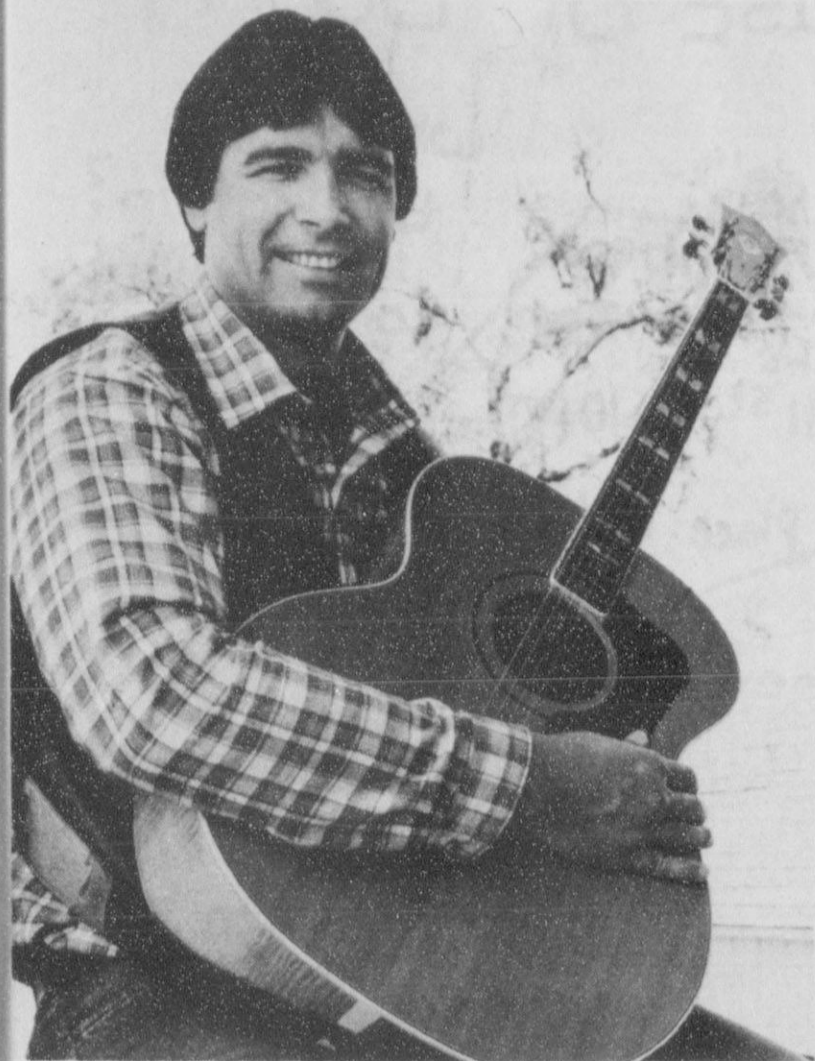

Anyone for chess?

In a collecting milieu where instant collectables — Star Wars toys, E.T. dolls and made-yesterday collector's items — are all the rage, chess sets carry the unusual cachet of being bona fide representatives of a truly ancient tradition and art form.

In fact, chess is such an ancient game, its roots are hard to trace. Most experts agree to a beginning some 1,300 years ago in a war game devised in India. Most sets collected today are considerably less ancient; still, the most popular sets date from the 18th and 19th centuries.

Many of these elaborately fashioned sets were considered works of art and were never intended for the rigors of actual play.

Of the sets that were intended for play, the most popular design dates from the middle of the 19th century. Named after a famous English chessmaster of the time, the Staunton design standardized a hitherto confusing variety of completely different designs with almost unrecognizable individual pieces. Semi-abstract yet recognizable, the Staunton pieces are the models for most of today's derivative chess designs.

Genuine Staunton sets made by the original manufacturer and designer, J. Jaques, often sell for \$1,000 or more. Look for a tiny crown stamped atop a rook or a knight of opposing colors. Some Staunton kings are marked "J. Jaques, London" on their bottoms. Sets of various sizes, in both ivory and wood, can be found.

Chess sets are available in almost all materials and in all price ranges, but they are not generally among the more affordable of collectables. Some collectors get around the high price tags of complete sets by buying incomplete sets at huge discounts. However, it is doubtful that a really significant collection can be mounted in such a manner.

Although a good many well-known modern artists and designers have produced chess sets, the best buys may be sets by unknown craftsmen working in the folk art tradition. These very desirable sets can sometimes be found at bargain prices (under \$100) and are probably sound investments, given the continuing interest in folk art.

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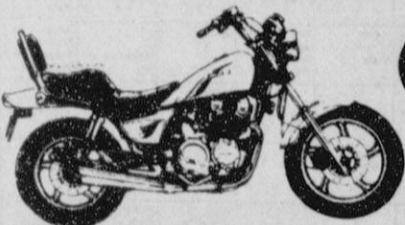

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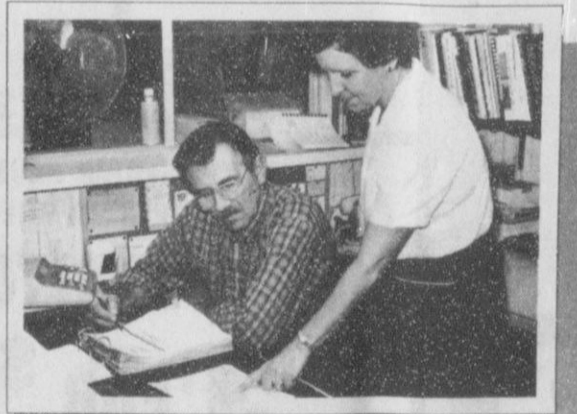

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Panhandle routs Spearman to keep playoff hopes alive

SPEARMAN — With their backs to the wall, starting elimination from the state playoffs right in the face-mask, the Panhandle Panthers were at their very best Friday night here.

Combining traditionally-strong defense with a new-found offense, the Panthers rolled to a surprisingly easy 30-6 victory over Spearman before 2,000 fans.

The Panthers, who own the area's longest current string of playoff appearances (five), got back in the District 12A race with the victory. Panhandle and Spearman are 1-1 in league play, trailing first-place Sanford-Fritch by one game.

Panhandle's chances of a sixth-straight playoff appearance would have been erased with a loss Friday night, but that prospect seemed to serve in its favor as the Panthers produced 366 yards and held the high-powered Lynx to 189 total

yards.

Spearman, which scored 61 points in its district opener against Stratford Oct. 12, managed just 64 total yards in the first half against the Panthers.

Spearman quarterback Ross Donahue, who had thrown for 1,008 yards in the first six games, completed only 12 of 30 for 139 yards against Panhandle's man-to-man coverage.

And while the Panthers' defense, which has allowed an average of 7.7 points per game this year, was its usual self, Panhandle also found an offense to go with it.

Fullback Wes ... rushed 161 yards and quarterback Derek Holmes passed 100 yards as the Panthers improved their season record to 4-2-1.

Spearman, which had won five games in a row, is 5-2 for the year.

Was the prospect of elimination from the playoffs a factor in the game which was expected to be close?

"That had a lot to do with it," said Panhandle coach Stocky Lamberson. "We got ready to play because of it. Now we'll have to do that every week."

There were a number of factors which resulted in the Panther's victory, but the main one was Panhandle's ability to stop Spearman's passing game.

With Kevin Powers keeping Mack McLain, Spearman's top receiver, in check, and with the Panhandle frontline keeping Donahue under heavy pressure, the Lynx quarterback had his worst passing night of the season.

In the first half, Donahue completed just 3 of 10 passes for 29 yards. The brisk wind was partly to blame, but Panhandle's defense got most of the credit.

"We just didn't block like we have been," said Spearman coach Larry Lanier. "But I give a lot of credit to the Panhandle secondary. I think that was a great effort on Panhandle's part to stop our offense."

"Our boys just weren't used to being shutdown like that. I think they got frustrated."

Panhandle first scored with 9:10 to play in the second quarter when Shane Mecaskey drove over from 2 yards out. The drive culminated a nine-play, 48-yard drive.

Panhandle's next score came six minutes later on the next possession when Holmes tossed to Wood who made a leaping catch, ran through two defenders and went 32 yards for the TD.

We came back after the half, and the boys were ready to come back and get with it," said Coach

"We knew we would be in a hornet's nest after they lost to Fritch (9-0) last week. We knew they had to win the ballgame to stay in the district race. Now we're in the same position. And we need to get after Stinnett, Sunray, and Fritch."

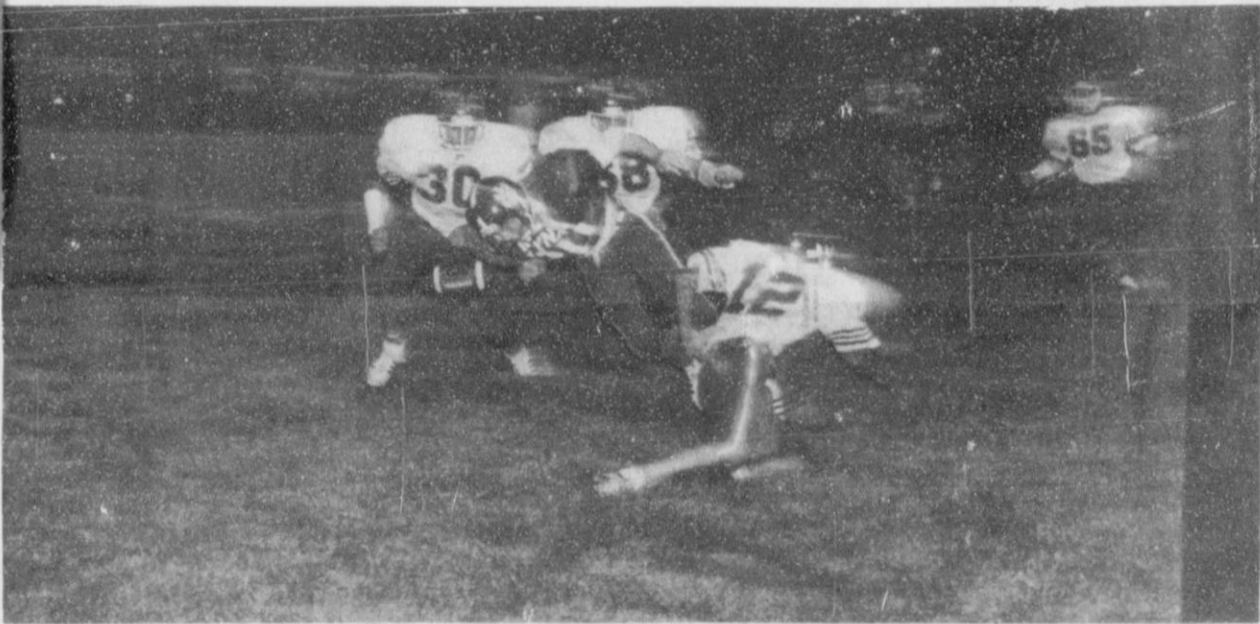

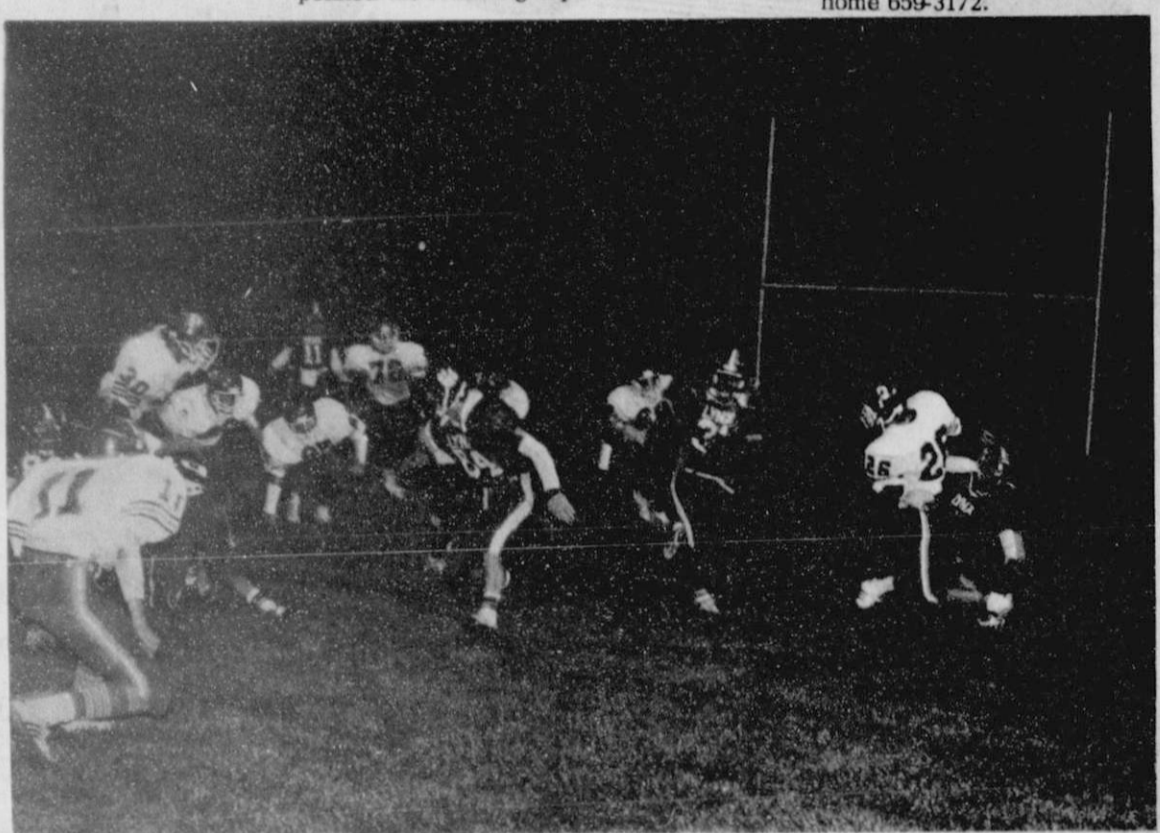

For any parent who plays Santa, Christmas brings the often frustrating task of buying toys. Most parents want to give toys that help their children develop while providing safe entertainment. At the same time they want to fulfill the child's wishes, which are often influenced by a flood of holiday toy advertising.

Starting early and using some of the following suggestions could make your toy shopping easier this year.

- Plan and write down how much you intend to spend on each child, making sure that the amount falls within your budget.
- Make a toy shopping list based on your children's wishes. Then look closely at advertised items on the list when you go to the store. Be flexible, since the children's lists may change several times during the holiday season.
- Think about the direction in which your child's interests have been developing over the year. Because children learn through play, be sure toys are appropriate for their size, age and developmental level. Be sure the choice fits the child's interests, rather than yours. Also, consider toys that offer enough variety to

motivate children to try new experiences.

- Try to shop early so you can look around and price a specific toy at several places.
- Look for quality. Be cautious about the toys that are "best-sellers" each year—often they are over-priced.
- Consider toy safety by looking for sharp points and corners, needle-like metal rods, small objects that can be swallowed or fabrics that burn easily.
- Determine whether you have storage space available for the toy.
- If a toy requires constant adult supervision, consider whether you have the time or interest to spend with it.

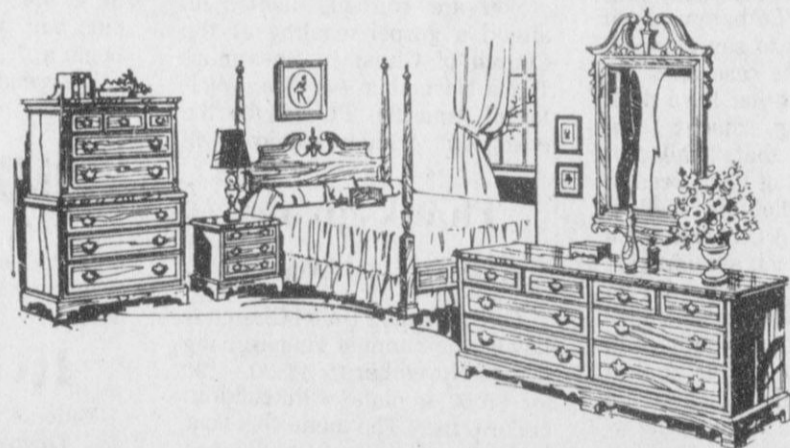
